Meeting began at 10:05AM

Chris Belden welcomed the group and asked to go around the room and give introductions, as well as have members and those in attendance to indicate what they bring or expect from the Task Force.

#### Introductions

Chris Belden: Serves as Assistant County Planner for Warren County. Indicated that he is serving as coordinator, but is looking for direction from this group. Additionally, he hopes that we can find ways to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and find ways to make our infrastructure more resilient to climate change.

Jim Lieberum: Serves as District Manager of the Warren County Soil and Water Conservation District and Hazard Mitigation Coordinator for Warren County. His office manages Warren

County's MS4 Program (visit <u>https://warrenswcd.org/ms4.html</u>) and is very involved with stormwater and green infrastructure projects around the county.

Dan Durkee: Serves as the Senior Health Educator for the Warren County Department of Public Health. He stated that in relation to climate change, his office is monitoring disease migration caused by warming temperatures. Right now that primarily includes 2 diseases, Zika and Eastern Equine Encephalitis. The New York State Department of Health has identified global warming as one of the largest public health threats facing the state.

Doug Beaty: Serves as an At-Large County Supervisor representing Queensbury. He is looking forward to being involved with this group – to help see what the County and Town of Queensbury can do to address climate change.

Scott Royael: Employed by SUNY Adirondack, as the Sustainability Coordinator. He is excited to be part of this group. Currently, the college is looking to improve energy efficiency and reduce contributions of greenhouse gases.

Peter McDevitt: Represents Ward 2, in the City of Glens Falls, as a County Supervisor. Peter also serves as chair of the Economic Development & Growth Committee of the Board of Supervisors. He stated that he is glad that Warren County is taking steps to address climate change. Peter referenced a few anecdotal references about climate change:

- The populations of lobsters along the coast of Massachusetts are diminishing. Lobsters prefer cooler water and are now moving north due to rising water temperatures;
- Insurance companies are beginning to raise insurance premiums along coastal communities because they understand that as a result of climate change we will be seeing greater damage along the coastal areas; and
- The Pentagon is looking at the issue of climate change very seriously.

Amanda Beck: Junior Planner with the County Planning Department. She indicated she is excited to be working with the committee on this issue.

Sara Frankenfeld: GIS Administrator at Warren County. Sara plans on assisting with some of the projects, such as the Natural Resources Inventory.

Amy Drexel: Emergency Services Coordinator for Warren County - is looking forward to being involved.

Andrea Hogan: Serves as the Town Supervisor for the Town of Johnsburg. She indicated that she represents a more rural perspective to the group. In the past, she worked with helping low-income families – so she will be viewing things through the lens of poverty.

Claudia Braymer: Represents Ward 3, in the City of Glens Falls, as a County Supervisor. Claudia also serves as the chair of the Real Property & Environmental Concerns Committee of the Board of Supervisors. She has been involved with advancing the Clean Energy Communities (CEC) Program in Warren County. She's optimistic that by planning we can work to reduce expenses down the road.

Allison Gaddy: Senior Planner for the Lake Champlain-Lake George Regional Planning Board. Allison is a community planner and looks forward to working with the group. Beth Gilles: Director of the Lake Champlain-Lake George Regional Planning Board. Her office has been involved with infrastructure planning, especially involving stormwater.

Tammie DeLorenzo: Serves as the Assistant to the County Administrator. She glad that this group has brought all of these players together. She's looking forward to finding solutions that consider the reasonability of cost and where we can save money down the road.

Dave Wick: Serves as the Executive Director of the Lake George Park Commission. Not a member of the Task Force, but was interested in what the group is doing. Dave indicated that we are already seeing the indications of climate change in Lake George. Within the last 30 years there has been a 4°F increase in water temperature on Lake George. In addition, there have been increases in algae growth and aquatic plant growth. We are also seeing more icing versus snow events, which will inevitably change the way we clear our roads and use road salt. He indicated that he is part of a state group that is looking at some of these issues; however, he said that he will be looking to see what this group comes up.

Thom Randall: Reporter for the Sun Community News/Lake George Mirror. While not a member of the Task Force, he indicated that he has long had a passion for health and environmental issues.

Tara Donadio: Serves as Sustainability Coordinator for the Capital District Regional Planning Commission (CDRPC). She can provide technical assistance to the group.

Jeff Flagg: Serves as the Climate Smart Communities Coordinator for the City of Glens Falls. Much of the work that the City has been doing, so far, has been focused on energy savings. He offered that something that we should be considering is not only unintended consequences, but 'unforeseen consequences'. For example, in California the power company is shutting of power to residents to avoid wildfires.

Travis Whitehead: Queensbury resident and serves on the Town of Queensbury Climate Smart Task Force and Clean Energy Committee. He has a longstanding interest in reducing greenhouse gas emissions and exploring the use of alternative fuels.

#### **Introduction to the Climate Smart Program**

Chris Belden gave a brief introduction to the state's Climate Smart Communities Program. The purpose of the program is to encourage local communities to make strategies to:

- Reduce contributions of greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, such as, reducing energy consumption and landfill gas capture.
- Adapt local infrastructure and the way we do things to prepare for the changes we are seeing and will experience.

The State offers 50% reimbursable competitive grants for implementation actions, such as, culvert/bridge right-sizing, streambank stabilization, and relocation of critical infrastructure. The maximum award for implementation actions is \$1M. Additionally the State offers funding for the completion of priority certification actions, such as, Natural Resources Inventory and Climate Vulnerability Assessment. The maximum award for certification actions is \$50,000.

Completion of certification actions go toward awarding communities with becoming Certified Bronze, Silver, or Gold. Chris expressed that the County is working towards certification. Chris directed attendees to review the list of actions he passed out. He indicated that these actions advance the County's effort to become a Certified Climate Smart Community and noted that these specific items were either being considered, underway, completed, or will possibly be grant funded.

#### Warren County Climate Smart Program

Chris Belden explained that in June 2019, the Warren County Board of Supervisors unanimously supported a resolution to adopt the Climate Smart Communities Pledge, thereby making Warren County a Registered Climate Smart Community.

Chris told the group that the Planning Department put a funding application in to the NYSDEC's Climate Smart Communities program to undertake a number of climate adaptation related certification projects. He indicated that there was broad support for assessing critical infrastructure that may potentially become more vulnerable as a result of climate change. Chris explained that as the program moves forward we should look at ways to reduce energy use/contributions of greenhouse gases.

Supervisor Braymer agreed that we should begin to do more to reduce energy consumption at the County, such as the purchase of more hybrid/electric vehicles. She added that the City of Glens Falls and Town of Queensbury are working together to complete a greenhouse gas inventory. She asked could Warren County also work with Glens Falls and Queensbury.

Chris responded that he had reached out to other Climate Smart Coordinator's in Warren County, as it was his belief we needed to improve coordination. However, the City of Glens Falls received grant funding for the development of its Greenhouse Gas Inventory – it was his understanding that the City and Town were going to try and do a combined report, but couldn't due to funding limitations. In his estimation, it was probably unlikely that Warren County could do so.

Jeff Flagg told the group that it had been discussed originally, but as Chris indicated they weren't able to include Queensbury with the funding they received. Jeff stated that this inventory has been useful for highlighting buildings requiring energy efficiency improvements.

#### Warren County Climate Smart Task Force

Chris Belden told the group that the Task Force consists of a diverse group of representatives. The reason being that climate change will put stresses on a variety of services and infrastructure in Warren County. As we go forward with creating/implementing strategies the Task Force will be instrumental in prioritizing actions Warren County takes.

Chris identified that while Global Climate Change is still a controversial subject – the evidence at this point is irrefutable. To that end, Chris made clear that while members of the public may have disagree with the existence of climate change or how Warren County plans to respond to it, he is looking to maintain decorum and will not tolerate abusive comments at Task Force meetings.

Additionally, those wishing to make written statements to the Task Force can share them with Chris Belden for distribution.

The County's Climate Smart Communities program is allowing Warren County to become more prepared and less reactionary. As an example, Chris asked Jim Lieberum to share some of the recent shifts in rainfall over the past 30 years. Jim explained that the commonly used 100-year

storm event is a method of describing a type of event that has a 1%-annual chance of occurring in a given year (it <u>doesn't</u> mean you will get that event once every 100 years). Jim indicated that according to the Northeast Regional Climate Center at Cornell University, the 100-year storm event, 24-hour rainfall (in inches) for Warren County was between 5.0"-5.5" in 1990. Today that number has risen to 5.5"-6.0". While seemingly minor, these changes (which are expected to increase) will put added stress on local infrastructure.

Dan Durkee stated that local codes and zoning can have an impact too. For instance the unused parking lot for the former Kmart on Dix Avenue [7.5acres], which was constructed to accommodate the zoning requirements but has gone underutilized for years – doesn't allow the stormwater to get into the ground easily.

Dave Wick stated that the Lake George Park Commission has proposed changes to stormwater regulations in the Lake George Park to mitigate impacts from stormwater runoff. – see <u>https://lgpc.ny.gov/system/files/documents/2018/08/summary-proposed-stormwater-regulations-changes.pdf</u>

Supervisor Beaty stated that while the County was making positive steps to deal with climate change but he is concerned about the number of people leaving New York State because we're overtaxed. Mr. Beaty questioned how we advocate with Albany to get additional resources to deal with these problems.

Chris Belden stated that it's an age-old dilemma. However, we can improve our prospects of dealing with these issues by coordinating with each other to access funding and resources from various sources. Dan Durkee stated we need to begin by taking local action. Allison Gaddy indicated that efforts should be taken to plan, as State and Federal funding agencies appreciate well thought through strategies.

#### **Grant Application**

Chris Belden explained that the Planning Department submitted an application to the NYSDEC Climate Smart Communities Program to undertake six (6) priority certification actions, which include:

- 1. Climate Vulnerability Assessment Utilize existing resources, such as the County Hazard Mitigation Plan, to identify operations and infrastructure that will be made more vulnerable as a result of climate change.
- 2. Climate Adaptation Strategies After identifying climate related vulnerabilities in Warren County, through the Climate Vulnerability Assessment, we will develop strategies for addressing those concerns.
- 3. Climate Smart Resiliency Plan Review existing plans, policies, and projects to determine the adequacy of Warren County's effort to become more climate resilient.
- 4. Natural Resources Inventory

Warren County GIS will create an online resource for finding geological and biological natural resources in Warren County. Most other Natural Resources Inventories are done in a report format, we feel that having an interactive interface will allow be more useful to the public and local review boards. Assistance will be provided by Warren County Soil and Water.

5. Fleet Inventory

The fleet inventory would build off what Warren County uses already for tracking its vehicle fleet. However, this inventory would include other equipment/machinery and specialty vehicles. The purpose of this inventory is to help the County with planning for energy reductions.

6. Heat Emergency Plan

Assistance will be provided by Emergency Services and Public Health to ensure that the County is prepared for heat wave events, which are expected to become more frequent.

#### **Certification Actions**

Chris Belden asked the group to review the different actions available for certification points. Chris indicated that if there is an action that he hadn't already mentioned as being done or considered, to let the group know.

#### Roundtable

Chris Belden said he had 2 questions to ask before the roundtable:

- 1. He was asked if there a desire to have video recording of the meetings? The group responded 'no'.
- 2. We can obtain certification points for maintaining a social media page. Did anyone have thoughts about the County having a page for that?
  - The group was supportive. Amy Drexel suggested first developing a social media policy Amy said she would share the Emergency Service Office's policy.

Dan Durkee: Mentioned the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) Social Vulnerability Index. Indicated that this could be useful, especially in developing the heat emergency plan. See <u>https://svi.cdc.gov/</u>. Dan also mentioned that there was an upcoming announcement on the results of the Governor's Cancer Research Initiative. See <u>https://www.health.ny.gov/diseases/cancer/docs/warren\_executive\_summary\_2019.pdf</u>

Doug Beaty: Mentioned that he was very encouraged by what was being discussed by this group. He believes many of these ideas are very capable of moving forward.

Scott Royael: Highlighted that SUNY ADK is moving towards becoming STARS (Sustainability Tracking, Assessment & Rating System) certified.

Peter McDevitt: Indicated that he was very interested in Warren County pursuing a greenhouse gas emissions inventory at the Municipal Center building. Tara Donadio indicated that an easy first step is to complete the Energy Benchmark for Government Buildings. Chris Belden agreed to look into the matter more by the next meeting.

Sara Frankenfeld: Mentioned how she thought more could be done at the County to encourage recycling.

Chris indicated that the next meeting would be held in January 2020.

Meeting adjourned at 12:00PM.
