WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS ORGANIZATION MEETING WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 4, 2002

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren convened at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center, Lake George, New York, at 11:01 a.m.

Board called to order by Harold E. Robillard, Clerk of the Board of Supervisors.

Invocation was given by Supervisor Michael O'Connor, Chaplain.

Salute to the flag was led by Supervisor Haskell.

Members of the Board of Supervisors subscribed to the Constitutional Oath as administered by Caryl Clark, County Clerk.

Clerk announced the first order of business would be the selection of a Temporary Chairman.

 $\mbox{Mr.}$ Monroe nominated Mr. Ralph Bentley as Temporary Chairman, seconded by Mr. Caimano.

There being no further nominations, Mr. Bennett moved that the nominations be closed, and the Clerk cast one ballot for Ralph Bentley as Temporary Chairman, seconded by Mr. Tessier and carried unanimously.

Clerk requested Mr. Quintal and Mr. Haskell to escort Mr. Bentley to the Chair. The board members acknowledged Mr. Bentley with a round of applause.

Mr. Bentley thanked the members of the board for the honor of being selected Temporary Chairman. He stated the next order of business would be the selection of a Permanent Chairman.

Mr. Belden stated it was an honor to nominate William Thomas as Permanent Chairman, and Mr. O'Neill stated it was a pleasure to second the motion.

There being no further nominations, Mr. Sheehan moved the nominations be closed, and the Clerk cast one ballot for William Thomas as Permanent Chairman, seconded by Mr. Morrell and carried unanimously.

Mr. Bentley, Temporary Chairman, requested Mr. Kenny and Mr. Brower to escort Mr. Thomas to the Chair. The board members acknowledged Mr. Thomas with a round of applause.

Chairman Thomas subscribed to the Constitutional Oath as administered by Caryl Clark, County Clerk.

Chairman Thomas presented the following remarks:

"STATE OF THE COUNTY JANUARY 4, 2002

"Good morning.

"The act of terrorism on the United States of America on September 11th was devastating and has changed our lives forever, but it also sent a signal that our Nation was vulnerable to those who have no value for human life or freedom.

"The act of aggression has had a dramatic effect on the economy of our Country and has resulted in bankruptcy of large and small companies and has led to millions of layoffs nation-wide. Warren County has lost an estimated \$2 million plus in State Aid as a result of the attack.

"Following the attack, this Country became instantly united, came to the aid of those who lost loved ones, and rallied behind President Bush in the Declaration of War against those who harbor terrorists. The problems faced by Warren County prior to the attack no longer seemed as important as they were on September I0th, 200l.

"Warren County responded to the needs of the City of New York with a check in the amount of \$100,000, which came from the County's share of the Tobacco Master Settlement Fund. The check was presented to Governor Pataki on December 19th, when he visited Warren County to announce the creation of an Empire Zone. The County has tried for years to obtain a trading zone designation; and after a cooperative effort, the zone was approved.

"The creation of the Empire Zone will mean businesses that move or expand in the Zone will be able to operate almost tax free for a period of I0 years. The designation will make Warren County more competitive in its efforts to attract businesses and create much needed new jobs. I feel very confident that the County will be successful in its efforts to bring businesses to the County.

"I would be remiss if I failed to mention the spirit of cooperation that was evident throughout the process, both inter-municipally and the effort put forth by the Warren County Economic Development Corporation. As a result of the designation, I feel there is more hope for the future. I feel that the County received an early Christmas present with this designation.

"Regarding the Resource Recovery Plant, which has placed an overwhelming financial burden on County taxpayers, there may be a light at the end of the tunnel as Supervisor Monroe, Chairman of the Solid Waste & Recycling Committee, and committee members work diligently to solve the problem.

"The County is seriously exploring all options, including purchase of the Plant, if feasible. The Committee is working diligently to get the best deal possible for the taxpayers of the County.

"I have high hopes that the issue will be resolved by either purchase and refinancing or by refinancing and negotiation of a revised contract by year's end. Committee Chairman Monroe has never given up hope that the issue can be resolved, and he has given uncountless hours to the task of resolving the issue once and for all. Thanks, Fred, for your devotion to the task.

"The Social Services Budget for 2002 exceeds \$21 million dollars, of that \$7.2 million represents the County's share of Medicaid costs, which are raised by real property tax. The Legislative Committee of the Board of Supervisors will work with the New York State Association of Counties in sponsoring legislation that would have the State takeover the local cost of Medicaid. There are only two or three states in the Nation that force counties to pay a share of Medicaid. The financial burden placed on counties by Medicaid has resulted in higher real property tax rates over the years as well as delays in projects that we consider important to our County.

"The County needs to find new sources for revenue in an effort to reduce the amount raised by real property tax. The County has made no secret that two methods for raising revenues are the implementation of a I percent increase in sales tax and a 3 or 4 percent bed tax. A decision on the revenue enhancements is expected to be made by April of this year. The Board will hold open forums to which the public will be invited and given an opportunity to speak on the issues. I pledge that the Board will make all issues known and will discuss the proposals in open forum.

"If the County Sales Tax is raised by I percent, property taxes could be reduced by onethird or more and the County would be able to establish some long-term capital projects and not raise the funds by property tax. The proposed bed tax will enhance or supplement tourism, or both. The bed tax, in most cases, is paid by those who visit our County, especially during the summer and fall months.

"The County has spent millions of dollars over the past years to house inmates at various locations in the State as a result of overcrowding in the County facility. The County is currently in the design stage for a facility, to be built on County property, north of the Municipal Center. The facility will house l35 inmates and is being built at a project cost of between \$19 and \$21 million. In the past two years the County has spent \$1.16 million in housing inmates at other locations due to the lack of beds in our facility. Nearly \$4 million in Tobacco Settlement Funds have been placed in a capital project for construction of the facility.

"The County has established a capital project for a new Tourism Building to be located opposite of Exit 20 of the Northway. By placing the Building opposite the Exit, the tourists will use the facility as well as shop in area businesses. The capital project was established by using \$809,000 in funds received in Tobacco Settlement Funds.

"I would be very remiss if I failed to acknowledge our department heads as well as all County employees for their loyalty and their service to the public. Most department heads work more than 40 hours a week in an effort to provide the best service possible to the residents of Warren County, and I applaud them for their dedication.

"I would also like to say thanks to the members of the Board of Supervisors for granting me the privilege of serving my second term as Board Chairman. I find the task very challenging; and with the assistance of the other I9 supervisors, as well as the County workforce, I find the task very rewarding.

"Thank you, and God Bless America. "William H. Thomas, Chairman Warren County Board of Supervisors"

Chairman Thomas stated the next order of business would be the selection of a Clerk, and that nominations were in order.

Mr. Bennett said it was his pleasure to nominate Harold Robillard as Clerk of the Board of Supervisors for a term of two years. He acknowledged he had been on the County Board for four years, and said he felt Mr. Robillard has indeed established a working relationship with all of the supervisors that has been above and beyond what one could expect. He commended Mr. Robillard for being a great leader in the workforce that so capably helps in that role as Clerk of the Board. Mr. Moynihan echoed the remarks and seconded Mr. Bennett's motion.

There being no further nominations, motion was made by Mr. Belden that the nominations be closed and one ballot be cast for Harold Robillard as Clerk of the Board of Supervisors for a term of two years. Mr. Champagne seconded the motion and it was carried by unanimous vote. The board members responded with applause.

Chairman Thomas stated the next order of business would be the selection of a County Attorney, and nominations were in order.

Mr. Montesi nominated Paul Dusek as County Attorney for a term of two years. He stated he worked with Mr. Dusek in the Town of Queensbury for six years and also on the Board of Supervisors for six years and commended his job performance. Mr. Quintal seconded the motion.

There being no further nominations, Mr. Tessier moved the nominations be closed, and the Clerk cast one ballot for Paul Dusek as County Attorney for a term of two years, seconded by Mr. Bentley and carried unanimously. The board members responded with applause.

Clerk and County Attorney subscribed to the Constitutional Oath as administered by Caryl Clark, County Clerk.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Mr. Robillard, who thanked the board for their confidence in his handling of the position of Clerk of the Board. He also noted that John O'Neill was still sitting in the same place he was on January 3, 1978, and he was the only supervisor on the board now that was there then. He said he noted over his 24 years, his department has attempted to establish a line of communication with all departments in the county and with most of the employees in the county. He said he felt this has worked out for the best because he knows on given days the task gets easier because of the cooperation of the department heads.

Mr. Robillard thanked the County Attorney's Office for all they have done. He said they have had some tumultuous times this year with the preparation of over 700 resolutions. He acknowledged it was a lot of work, and the cooperative spirit was present. He acknowledged Julie and Kelly from the County Attorney's Office, who were present at the meeting, and thanked them for their efforts.

Mr. Robillard said he appreciated the efforts of the Board and the authority he was given to operate on a day-to-day basis and to handle difficult problems. He said his advice to all department heads if they want something done, to make sure their chairmen know it (both committee chairmen and the Chairman of the Board).

In closing, Mr. Robillard thanked the board members again for their confidences.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Paul Dusek, who thanked the supervisors for granting him another term as County Attorney, and the opportunity to continue to be of service to Warren County, its board, the officers and employees, and the citizens of Warren County.

Mr. Dusek said he has had the good fortune of having a very hard working and dedicated staff in the County Attorney's Office. He said they have shared his commitment to a constant and never-ending improvement of the County Attorney's Office, and they have tried every year to undertake new endeavors to try to make the office grow and be of better service to the County. He said he looked forward to continuing to work with the Board of Supervisors and department heads, many of whom he has developed very good relationships with, not to say the least of which was the Clerk's Office. He commended Mr. Robillard for his assistance to the office and said he certainly was a guide to many things undertaken in the office and issues they have had to deal with.

Mr. Dusek again thanked the board members, and said he looked forward to the coming year to face new challenges they will face together.

Mr. Robillard announced his first order of business for the new year, reappointing Joan Parsons as Deputy Clerk of the Board of Supervisors. The board members responded with applause.

Chairman Thomas welcomed guests and extended privilege of the floor to the supervisors and several introduced family and friends present at the meeting.

Chairman called for reading of communications.

Clerk read communications, including the following:

William Remington, Superintendent of D.P.W., naming William Lamy Acting Superintendent of D.P.W. and Deputy Superintendent of D.P.W.; John Farrell, Deputy Director of Natural Disaster and Civil Defense and Deputy Energy Coordinator; Rose Lamy as Deputy Public Works Records Officer and Deputy Superintendent of Public Works - Administration; Marshall Stevens, Assistant Airport Manager; and Brian Humphrey, Deputy Superintendent of Public Works/Highway.

Kathleen Hogan, District Attorney, pursuant to Article 18, Section 702(4) of the County Law, designating Ted M. Wilson, First Assistant District Attorney, as the person who shall exercise the duties of the Warren County District Attorney in the event she was unable to perform the said duties.

Communications, resolutions and reports ordered placed on file.

Chairman called for reading of resolutions.

Clerk noted a resolution was necessary to bring Resolution Nos. 1 through 25 to the floor. Motion was made by Mr. Caimano, seconded by Mr. Tessier and carried unanimously to bring Resolution Nos. 1 through 25 to the floor.

Chairman called for vote on resolutions.

Resolution Nos. 1 through 25 were approved. Certificates of Appointment, reappointing members representing rural areas of Warren County on the Policy Committee of the Adirondack-Glens Falls Transportation Council; reappointing members of the Technical Committee of the Adirondack-Glens Falls Transportation Council; reappointing representatives on the District Fish and Wildlife Management Board; naming Margaret Sing Smith as Director of Youth Bureau; appointing and reappointing members of Greater Adirondack Resource Conservation & Development Council; reappointing members of the Warren County Labor/Management Committee; appointing member of the Quality Assurance Committee of the Westmount Health Facility; and appointing representative to the Lake George Watershed Conference, were submitted.

Chairman Thomas announced the 2002 Standing and Special Committees, and a copy of the committee listings was submitted. A copy was also distributed to each supervisor.

RESOLUTION NO. 1 OF 2002 Resolution introduced by Supervisors Bentley and O'Neill

ADOPTING THE RULES OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

RESOLVED, that the Rules of the Board of Supervisors providing for the conduct of its meetings, committees of the Board of Supervisors and the exercise of its governmental functions are hereby adopted as set forth in Schedule "A", attached hereto, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the said Rules as adopted shall be effective immediately and all Rules adopted in preceding years are hereby repealed.

SCHEDULE "A" RULES OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

A. Meetings of Board of Supervisors

1. At the Regular Meeting of the Board of Supervisors held in December of each year the Board shall by resolution fix the date for the organizational meeting of the Board for the ensuing year, which date shall not be later than the 8th day of January, and the place and hour of such organization meeting. A total of 500 weighted votes, as allocated among the elected Supervisors pursuant to Local Law No. 10 of 2001, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. A quorum being present, the Clerk of the last Board shall call the meeting to order and the members present shall by roll call vote, by a majority of the total weighted voting power of the members of the Board, select one of their number Chairman, who shall preside at such meeting and at all meetings during the year. In case of the absence of the Chairman at any meeting, the Finance Chairman shall serve as Vice Chairman, as provided by Local Law No. 1 of 1968. The Chairman may call any member temporarily to the Chair. The Board may transact such other and further business as may properly come before such meeting.

2. In addition to the foregoing, the Board shall at the annual organization meeting transact the following business: the appointment of any officers required by law or desired by the Board; adopt the Rules of Procedure for the ensuing year; and any other matter that the Chairman wishes to bring before the meeting.

3. The Board shall convene in regular meeting at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon on the Friday following the second Monday of each month for the public meeting of the Board, unless a different time shall have been determined at a previous meeting. Meetings shall be called to order as soon thereafter as a quorum is present. Any regular meeting of the Board may be adjourned by motion adopted by a majority vote of the membership present.

The Board shall convene in special meeting upon call of the Chairman (or, if appropriate, the Vice Chairman) or upon written request for a special meeting signed by a majority of the total membership of the Board. At the direction of the Chairman (or Vice Chairman) or upon receiving such a written request, notice in writing stating the time, place and purpose of the special meeting shall be served personally or by mail upon each member by the clerk of the board at least forty-eight hours before the date fixed for holding the meeting or a member may waive the service of the notice for such meeting by a writing signed by him.

4. Business shall be transacted in the following order:

5. All resolutions shall be in writing and filed with the Clerk before noon on the Thursday preceding the regular meeting on Wednesday of each month and at least three days prior to any adjourned or special meeting. The Clerk shall photocopy all resolutions and mail copies thereof to each Supervisor on each Thursday prior to a regular meeting and on the third day prior to any adjourned or special meeting. All resolutions shall be considered by the Supervisors on each regular meeting date. No resolution shall be presented after noon on the Thursday before the regular Wednesday meeting except with the approval of a majority of the total weighted voting power of the members of the Board. Any Supervisor may request a resolution to be tabled until the next meeting, either regular or special or adjourned, and, if approved by the majority of the total weighted voting power of the Board, such resolution shall not be voted upon at the meeting when presented except where a statute prescribes a date on or before which the Board of Supervisors must adopt a resolution. A majority of the total weighted voting power of the Board shall be necessary to take it off the table.

- Conduct of Meetings of Board of Supervisors
 - 1. All questions relating to the priority of business shall be decided without debate.
- 2. The Chairman shall preserve order and shall decide all questions of order, subject to the appeal of the Board.

3. The Chairman in all cases shall have the right to vote, and when his vote makes an equal division the question shall be lost.

- 4. Any member desiring to speak or present any subject matter shall address the Chair and shall not further proceed until recognized by the Chair and granted the floor.
- 5. No debate shall be in order until the pending question shall be stated by the Chair or read by the Clerk.
- 6. No member shall speak more than once on any question until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken. If the Chairman wishes to enter into debate, he may do so only after he excuses himself from the Chair and a Temporary Chairman is appointed by the Chairman.
- 7. Any member, upon being called to order, shall take his seat and remain there until the point raised is determined. If the point be sustained, he shall not further proceed, except in order, unless by permission.
- 8. No business shall be transacted by the Board, as such, while a Committee or Committees are out at work, except to adjourn.
- 9. All motions and resolutions shall be presented in open regular meeting. The Chair will state to what Committee the motion or resolution shall be referred unless such reference is objected to in which case the Board shall decide.
- 10. All motions shall be reduced to writing, except those introduced at the Organization Meeting, if desired by the Chairman or any Supervisor, delivered to the Clerk and read before the same shall be debated. Any motion may be withdrawn at any time before amendment with the consent of the Second.
- 11. While a member is speaking no member shall entertain any private discourse or pass between him or the Chair.
 - 12. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.
- 13. When a question is under debate no motion shall be entertained, unless for adjournment of the Board, for the previous question, to place on the table indefinitely; to place on the table for a certain day; to hold; to amend it. These several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are here stated and shall not be subject to debate.
- 14. The minutes of this Board shall be printed monthly and delivered by the Clerk of the Board on or before the regular meeting of the Board for the next succeeding month.

C. Committees of the Board of Supervisors

1. Standing Committees consisting of at least three (3) members shall be appointed by the Chairman at the Organization Meeting or not later than the first regular meeting following the Organization Meeting, upon the following subjects, to wit:

- Special Committees may be authorized at any legal meeting of the Board. They shall, unless otherwise ordered and directed by a majority of the Board, be appointed by the Chairman. The period of time that a special committee shall serve shall be designated when it is created.
- 3. The first member appointed to each committee shall be and act as the Chairman of such committee. The meetings of each committee shall be held upon call by the Chairman thereof, except as hereinafter provided. The Chairman of each committee shall give or cause to be given by the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors notice in person, by telephone or by mail at least two days in advance of the day, hour and place of each meeting of the committee except that no advance or prior notice shall be required when the committee meeting is held on a day when the Board shall be in session. A meeting of any committee shall be held at any time whenever a majority of the members of a committee shall sign a written notice of such meeting, which notice shall clearly state the day, hour and place of such meeting, provided that such notice shall be served in person or mailed to the Chairman of such committee and the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors at least three days in advance of the day specified in such notice.
- 4. All reports of Committee shall be in writing and shall be read on presentation upon the request of any member.
- 5. Committees making reports shall return to the Clerk with such reports all papers relating thereto.
- 6. The Chairman of the Board of Supervisors shall be an ex-official member of a standing committee when a) a quorum is not present at any regularly or specially scheduled committee meeting; b) if such membership will provide a quorum as herein specified; and c) the Chairman is available to attend. The total membership of the committee as established by Board Rules shall not change or be increased by the presence and availability of the chairman in determining whether a majority of members are present to allow the conduct of business, rather the chairman shall be considered an alternate or substitute for a non-present committee member. Once the Chairman becomes a member by virtue of the criteria set forth above (whether at the start of or during a meeting), the chairman shall be a voting member and shall continue as a member of the committee until a quorum is established or reestablished by appointed Committee members at the subject meeting or subsequent meetings.
- 7. When any Committee of the Board of Supervisors is acting on any matter affecting a single Municipality or is engaged in seeking or obtaining rights of way in a particular municipality, the Supervisor(s) of the affected municipality shall be provided with an opportunity to make a presentation or otherwise be heard by the Committee.
- 8. Copies of the Minutes of all meetings of any committee shall be made available to any member of the Board of Supervisors upon specific written request for the same submitted to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors.

- D. Voting by Members of the Board of Supervisors
 - 1. All members present shall vote upon each question at the request of any member.
- 2. Each amount or claim of any item thereof shall be voted on by items, if requested by any member.
- 3. All questions shall be decided by a majority of the total weighted voting power of the Board unless otherwise required by law or as required herein. All questions shall be decided by weighted vote in accordance with the terms of Local Law No. 10 of 2001, as it may be amended from time to time. Whenever in these Rules of Order there is reference to a majority vote or a 2/3rds vote of the Board, it means a majority of the voting power of the members of the Board or 2/3rds of the voting power of the members of the Board as defined in Local Law No. 10 of 2001.
- 4. The following resolutions shall require a roll call vote: fixing or altering salaries, or establishing salary and wage classifications; adoption of the budget; any appropriation or expenditure of public funds; transfers within the authorized budget; levying of taxes; bond resolutions; any authorizations to fund or refund indebtedness; legalizing informal acts of a town meeting, village election, town or village officer; legalizing municipal obligations incurred through error or mistake wherein a 2/3rds vote is required; alteration of the boundaries of a town; local laws; any sale or conveyance of county property, either real or personal.
- 5. A roll call vote upon any resolution or other proceeding shall be taken upon request of any member.
- 6. All resolutions adopted by the Board of Supervisors shall become effective upon their adoption or as otherwise provided by law or as specified in the resolution.

E. General

- 1. No standing rule of the Board shall be rescinded, suspended or changed, or any additional rule or order added thereto, unless it be by 2/3rds consent (as 2/3rds vote defined under Local Law No. 10 of 2001). In the event a rule is suspended, such suspension shall apply only to that matter which is before the Board at the time of such suspension. The rules may be amended at any time.
- All questions not covered in the rules shall be decided according to Robert's Rules of Order-Revised.
- 3. The rules of the Board shall be published in the Proceedings in the year first adopted and whenever amended.

WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 16, 2002

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren convened at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center, Lake George, New York, at 10:00 a.m.

Mr. William Thomas presiding.

Salute to the flag was led by Supervisor Quintal.

Roll called, the following members present:

Supervisors Gabriels, Monroe, Mallison. Sheehan, Moynihan, O'Connor, Kenny, Belden, Bentley, Thomas, Tessier, Bennett, Brower, Caimano, Morrell, Champagne, Montesi, O'Neill, Haskell and Quintal - 20.

Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing on Proposed Local Law No. 1 of 2002 open at 10:01 a.m., and requested the Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

Deputy Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak on the proposed local law, Chairman declared that the public hearing would remain open for a short time in the event anyone wishing to speak might appear.

Chairman Thomas called for committee reports for January.

The following committee chairmen or vice-chairmen presented verbal reports on January meetings or activities:

Supervisor Quintal, Parks & Recreation; Supervisor O'Neill, Health Services; Supervisor Caimano, Revenue Enhancement; Supervisor Bennett, Planning & Community Development; Supervisor Kenny, County Clerk-Motor Vehicles; and Supervisor Monroe, Solid Waste & Recycling.

In conjunction with the Revenue Enhancement Committee report, Mr. Caimano reminded the supervisors and the public that the committee's next meeting was scheduled for January 22nd at 1:00 p.m. He referred to Mr. O'Neill's Health Committee report wherein he noted that a request to travel to a conference by two nurses was refused, and he thanked the committee for looking at priorities.

Mr. Caimano referred to information published in *The Post Star* regarding the fact that State leaders reached an agreement to give raises to health care workers across the State, paid for in part by an increase in the State's cigarette tax and a 6 percent increase in nursing home Medicaid rates (to trigger additional federal matching funds). He noted this action will cost Westmount Health Facility \$156,000 this year.

In conjunction with the Solid Waste & Recycling Committee report, Mr. Monroe mentioned there have been several meetings with Casella Waste Management for negotiating sessions, and there have been on-going discussion with EnergyAnswers. He said they were still waiting to hear whether Wheelabrator and Foster-Wheeler have resolved their differences on their negotiations.

The public hearing on Proposed Local Law No. 1 of 2002 resumed, and there being no one wishing to speak, Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing closed at 10:09 a.m.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Mr. Dusek, who introduced Amy Bartlett, the new Assistant County Attorney, whom he noted was hired pursuant to the arrangements previously discussed with the board members. He noted that Ms. Bartlett has become a full-time employee, working half-time in the PINS and juvenile delinquency programs, as she always has, and working half-time in his office in a manner similar to what the other assistant county attorneys have done in the past. The board members welcomed Ms. Bartlett with a round of applause.

Chairman called for reading of communications.

Clerk read communications, including the following:

Capital District Regional Off-Track Betting Corporation, Financial Report as of October 31, 2001, and November 30, 2001.

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Urbach, Kahn & Werlin, LLP, Certified Public Accountants, Independent Auditor's Report of Warren County for the year ended December 31, 2000.

Paul Dusek, County Attorney, pursuant to the provisions of County Law Section 502, appointing Amy C. Bartlett as First Assistant County Attorney, effective January 7, 2002; pursuant to the provisions of Resolution No. 191 of 1962 and Resolution No. 201 of 1996, deputizing Amy C. Bartlett, H. Bartlett McGee, Jr. and David R. Filion to represent the County Attorney in Family Court and other legal proceedings in connection with the work of the Social Services Department and the County Attorney's Office; and reappointing H. Bartlett McGee, Jr. and David R. Filion, as Assistant County Attorneys to serve during the pleasure of the County Attorney.

Annual Reports: Cornell Cooperative Extension Service Sealer of Weights & Measures

Communications, resolutions and reports ordered placed on file.

Chairman called for reading of resolutions.

Clerk announced that Resolution Nos. 26 through 95 were mailed to the supervisors, and a motion to bring Resolution Nos. 96 through 129 to the floor was necessary. Motion was made by Mr. Belden, seconded by Mr. Tessier and carried unanimously to bring Resolution Nos. 26 through 129 to the floor.

Mr. Robillard requested an amendment to Resolution No. 45, authorizing computer software maintenance agreement with New World Systems Corporation for the Sheriff's Department, to correct the amount in the third term of the agreement to \$32,550.

Mr. Caimano referred to the resolution and questioned why the difference between the first and second year of the agreement was 7%, and the difference between the second and third year of the agreement was zero. Sheriff Cleveland responded, noting that the company had initially proposed a three-year contract with three increases, and it was negotiated to one increase between the first and second years.

Mr. Mallison asked for explanation of the service the company was providing for this money, and Sheriff Cleveland replied it was a software vendor who operates the entire computerized network, which includes action reports, tickets, criminal cases, investigations, incident reports, dispatch, plus they also do case tracking for the District Attorney's Office. He estimated they had about \$1.5 million in software in the department, and the vendor provides the maintenance on the software, and installation of any updates. He said he thought the maintenance charges they were paying were low compared to what other vendors were charging.

Motion was made by Mr. Tessier, seconded by Mr. Gabriels to approve the amendment to Resolution No. 45, as requested. The motion was carried unanimously, and Clerk noted amendment for the record

Mr. Kenny discussed Resolution No. 128, Enacting Local Law No. 1 of 2002 (A Local Law Fixing the Salaries of Certain County Officer sand Employees of Warren County). He recalled the discussion was substantial at the December Board Meeting, and it was the understanding of many supervisors that the budget process was going to disallow any increases to employees whose salaries were \$40,000 or above. He said he understood that at some point the Budget Committee did away with that proposal because of the reaction of several supervisors about their particular committees. Mr. Kenny said it has always been his stance that the disparity between the top and bottom salaries in this County has been a problem, and the supervisors keep saying they are "going to take care of the little people." He said he felt the supervisors continued not to take care of the little people. He mentioned that the County provides health benefits and makes exceptions there, but pointed out there were employees in the county that were making \$18,000 and \$19,000 and are trying to support a family.

Mr. Kenny said he felt the supervisors needed to continue to move forward to try and do something for those bottom employees. He said he would support the resolution if anyone earning over \$40,000 was excluded. He called the process a "reverse Robin Hood," and suggested the supervisors were taking money away from the little people and giving it to the

people on the local law list, and the top salary on the list was \$94,000. He said it seemed to him that when the supervisors tightened their belts and said they would not take their raises as supervisors, it was a symbolic gesture. He said he felt symbolic gestures were great, but gestures that contain substance are the things that matter. He said he felt maybe the supervisors made headlines by giving up their raises, but then they turn around and give 3 percent to people making \$80,000-\$90,000 per year. To him, he said this was a "reverse Robin Hood, and it did not make sense.

Mr. Caimano said that the presumption was that the people who head the County departments, and the sub-heads of departments, should not get paid what they get paid, and he remarked that may be so, but he did not see the committees doing anything about it during the year. He recalled he had said they would not give raises to those earning over \$40,000 per year, and he was immediately approached by several, almost all, chair people indicating that their particular people making over \$40,000 needed to have special dispensations. He said it was decided, and was published in the budget, that rather than do that, they would give 3 percent raises and none of the change of job titles or special raises requested on the "salmon" sheets with the budget submissions would be approved. He mentioned there was a large amount of money involved with these requests.

Mr. Caimano commented he felt the supervisors giving up their 3 percent raises was symbolic, but not in just giving up 3 percent while everyone else gets it, as it was letting the people who work for the County know how serious the situation could be financially in this community, and in all communities in New York State. He said he has heard the head-line grabbing discussion for four years now about the little people, and he agreed, but he countered he has not seen anyone who speaks that way coming forward with a resolution that will help change things. He said because they have to do something for the little people, does not mean they have to do something against the big people. He challenged the supervisors to put forth a resolution on how to do something for the little people, and assured he, as Budget Officer, and Mr. Thomas, as Chairman, and the Budget Committee, was willing to listen.

Mr. Kenny recalled the Budget Committee said it was going to be an extraordinary year after September 11th, and they could no longer count on help from the State, and further, that the County had to take extraordinary measures to be able to continue to operate in Warren County. He recalled the supervisors were asked to lead the charge, and he said he had no problem with that. However, he said when he "got to the top of the hill" he wanted someone to be behind him. He suggested if they were going to tighten belts, it needed to be done across the board. He asked how to explain to people in private industry that are earning \$20,000 per year that Warren County has tightened its belt, but they are giving an employee who earns \$90,000 per year a 3 percent raise.

Chairman Thomas suggested this discussion should have taken place during the budget process. Mr. Kenny countered that unfortunately, it got lost in the budget. He said it was never brought out at a meeting he was at that the 3 percent for those earning over \$40,000 per year was going to be re-included in the budget. Mr. Caimano suggested Mr. Kenny could have asked questions. He also remarked he felt he was "leading the charge up the hill," and he was sorry to see that Mr. Kenny and several others will not be behind him.

Mr. Moynihan said he was sorry to see this deteriorate into an "us against them" situation. He said his recollection was that when the budget process started, the Budget Officer was very plain that it was belt-tightening time, and we were all going to have to cut. He said that was the assumption the supervisors were under, and the \$40,000 threshold for raises was not a punishment of those in the higher echelon, but it was just to set the example that times were tough, and they were going to get tougher. He referred to Mr. Caimano's recent remarks on the additional costs for Westmount Health Facility that were forthcoming, and said he felt the supervisors were setting the wrong example.

Mr. Caimano remarked that the \$40,000 threshold was an arbitrary figure to begin with. He said the comments by Mr. Moynihan indicate there was no belt tightening, when in fact

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that was wrong. He noted he attended all of the budget meetings that supervisors, as chairmen, held. He commented that not one meeting held without the chairman signing off on the budget and leaving the budget to the Budget Officer. He commented that he did it, and this was where they were.

Mr. Tessier said his understanding was that the \$40,000 threshold was relative to requested increases of \$5,000 here and there for department heads. He said this was what was cut from the budget, and his understanding was that the 3 percent was across the board. He referred to discussion about helping the little people, and suggested the supervisors have to stand up when negotiations start with the union, because that is what controls the people on the bottom of the scale. Chairman Thomas said he also understood it this way.

Mr. Brower discussed Resolution No. 98, appointing member to Warren County Planning Board, and he supported the appointment of Richard Merrill, and said he felt he would be a fine addition to the board. Mr. Caimano concurred with the remarks.

Discussion returned to the proposed Local Law, and Mr. Champagne said he believed every job had a value. He said he felt rather than giving 3 percent to everyone that the supervisors should look at each job individually and identify criteria to value that particular job. Chairman Thomas acknowledged that Mr. Caimano has agreed to again serve as Budget Officer, and suggested the County needed to come to grips with this issue.

Mr. Montesi said it was understanding that all of the "salmon" sheets from the budget process were done away with, and Chairman Thomas concurred. He suggested if the supervisors are going to approve the 3 percent raises, which are already in the budget, what will happen as these requests that were submitted at budget time and were denied start coming back. He questioned what kind of a stand was truly being made and mentioned he has heard supervisors already talking about employees who are truly justified in having a different job title and an increase. He suggested this may be just a futile effort.

Mr. Caimano mentioned one job was discussed at the County Clerk-Motor Vehicles Committee meeting, and acknowledged there were jobs where a title change is warranted. He recalled during the budget process he suggested those requests should come forward in the year 2002 at the committee meetings, be discussed, and sent to the Finance & Personnel Committee. He acknowledged there were legitimate reasons for changing job titles. Chairman Thomas agreed with the idea, and said he felt this put a little more pressure on the individual committees to make decisions, rather than leaving it for the budget process.

Mr. Mallison agreed with Mr. Champagne's idea to do an independent analysis of the salary levels of County employees. He also suggested the County try to get that analysis for free from the State Comptroller's Office, as opposed to hiring an outside, independent auditor, as that will add to the County's costs. Secondly, he asked whether it was possible to readjust the resolution so that a flat 3 percent increases was not given to everyone, thereby saving a little money this year. Chairman Thomas pointed out that there was a budget process and this is what came out of the process. He suggested the supervisors go forward with what they have right now. He suggested that since Mr. Mallison was appointed to the Legislative Committee, he could follow up on his suggestions there.

Mr. Moynihan said he agreed with rather than waiting until August or September to review changes of personnel during the budget process, that this be done committee-by-committee during the year. Chairman Thomas and Mr. Caimano agreed with the idea.

Mr. Brower thanked Mr. Caimano for his work as Budget Officer during a difficult budget year. He said he felt Mr. Caimano worked extremely hard and he said he felt he had to support his efforts.

Mr. Quintal referred to the personnel requests that come in a budget time, he noted several related to people working out-of-title. When someone is working out-of-title, they are entitled to be paid for the job they are doing, he said. He suggested when these requests are being made in the various committees, he thought the committee needed to look at them. Mr. Caimano added he felt there needed to be some give-and-take, as well, and if the changing of a job title costs a budget \$3,000-\$4,000, the question should be asked what the department head can leave out of the budget to provide these funds.

Mr. Kenny pointed out there was a Civil Service procedure to follow when someone believes they are working out-of-title. Those people will probably get their out-of-title pay, he said, because if the County denies it, they have access to the grievance procedure. He agreed that Mr. Caimano did a good job with the budget.

Chairman Thomas suggested the supervisors support the department heads and people in the County that do a wonderful job, and if they want to discuss the issue on salaries, they do it at a future date.

Mr. O'Connor referred to the remarks about discussing salary raises during the year, and historically, he pointed out, anytime this has come up during the year, the committee has ruled it should be brought up at budget time. He complimented Mr. Caimano's efforts as budget officer, and recalled he was quoted in the newspaper as saying "We are trying to prevent layoffs, and that's how tight the budget was." Mr. O'Connor said if the supervisors were agreeing to discuss salary raises during the year, that was fine, but if they are trying to prevent layoffs, he said he felt the \$50,000-\$90,000 per year people are entitled to a raise, but he felt the 3 percent was exorbitant.

Chairman Thomas noted that due to supervisors attending the Association of Towns meeting from February 17th through 20th, and Warren County hosting the Inter-County Legislative Committee of the Adirondacks on February 21st, the February Board Meeting needed to be rescheduled to Friday, February 22nd.

Motion was made by Mr. Brower, seconded by Mr. Caimano to change the board meeting date, as recommended. The board members unanimously approved and Clerk noted this was Resolution No. 130.

RESOLUTION NO. 130 OF 2002 Resolution introduced by Supervisors Belden and Caimano

CHANGING THE MEETING DATE OF THE WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

RESOLVED, that the Warren County Board of Supervisors changes the date of the February Board of Supervisors meeting to February 22, 2002.

Adopted by unanimous vote.

The County Attorney requested an executive session to discuss negotiations concerning the County's proposed acquisition of the burn plant. He replied to questioning that no resolutions were anticipated to be forthcoming from the executive session.

Mr. Monroe reported that there was a significant Decision of the Federal Second Circuit having to do with solid waste. He noted the Decision was if solid waste facilities were municipally-owned, solid waste can be directed to those facilities. He said this Decision was appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court and they ruled not to review it. He said what that means to Warren County is if they purchase the plant, then they could re-enact flow control for Warren and Washington Counties. He commented he felt this was a significant development. Mr. Caimano said he understood that if three federal judges agreed, this Decision could be reviewed. Mr. Dusek said he would have to double-check the law.

Privilege of the floor was extended to John Salvador, of Queensbury, who referred to a recent article in *The Post-Star* regarding information that a newly formed organization of tourism-dependent businesses has been quietly pushing Warren County Supervisors to adopt an occu-

pancy tax. He said he felt that was progress. He pointed out there was a distinction between an occupancy tax and a bed tax, and added that a bed tax on just hotel rooms would be highly discriminatory. He noted this is one hurdle they have gotten over, but there remain a few.

Mr. Salvador said he felt it was essential that the board members recognize the definitions when it comes to the Tax Law, and also, in order to forecast what the County will derive from this in the form of revenues. As an occupancy tax, he said there were many types of businesses that charge for occupancy, not just hotels and motels, so he said he felt this would become the next hurdle to get over if the occupancy tax would be the solution to the revenue enhancement problems. As he elaborated on the definitions, he noted there were not many hotels in Warren County, so if this was the case, they should not expect to derive a lot of revenue from hotel rooms.

Mr. Tessier and Mr. Caimano left the meeting at 10:55 a.m.

Mr. Salvador mentioned the law allows certain exemptions, and the County will need to come to grips with this fact. He also elaborated on how the tax law reads regarding other areas which he said should be considered. He urged the supervisors to come to an understanding with regard to these items, so they understand what revenues will be raised by this program, and then, how it is intended to be used.

Mr. Salvador said he was not able to be present at the January 22nd meeting of the Revenue Enhancement Committee; however this information was discussed at a recent Lake George Town Board meeting. He assured the supervisors that Mr. Tessier had a firm understanding of the ramifications of this sort of tax and its administration. He suggested before the supervisors move too far ahead with the alternates on how to enhance revenues, that they define the terms.

Chairman Thomas apprised that Mr. Salvador's comments will be included in the discussion on revenue enhancement at next week's meeting.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Dorothy Harris, of Lake George, who also spoke concerning revenue enhancement. She referred to earlier discussion in the meeting wherein the supervisors noted that the people earning \$18,000 and \$19,000 per year with the County were not getting a very significant raise in their salaries. She reminded that those same people will be paying the additional taxes that the County wants to impose, and she said she did not feel that was very good either. She pointed out that the government is saying that taxes have to be reduced in order to spur on the economy, and here this County is talking about raising taxes.

Mrs. Harris referred to the upcoming meeting on revenue enhancement, noting that a group was coming in to talk about revenue expenditures, and they want money from the County to promote the area. She said they already have the Warren County Tourism Department, they have all of the chambers of commence in the area promoting the area, and they are trying to increase the time when people come to this area. She said she felt people came to this area in the summertime because that was when it was warm, and in the wintertime, they go to Florida. She suggested if the County wants to increase people coming in other seasons, they have to start looking at what is happening in the schools. She pointed out that some schools go back in August and others before Labor Day in September, and she said that affects the tourism season. She said she hoped if in the future any of the supervisors move politically from the local level to the state or federal level, that they would work to change this. She said these early returns to school cause the tourism businesses to lose their help, as well as the people who come to the area. She concluded that when the supervisors look at revenue enhancement, they have to look at a lot of different things, and she did not feel increasing taxes was the right way to go. She concluded, noting she felt the county should be looking at reducing taxes.

Chairman Thomas declared a five-minute recess, noting that an executive session would be called upon the board reconvening.

Recess was declared from 11:04 a.m. to 11:15 a.m.

Board reconvened, and motion was made by Mr. Champagne, seconded by Mr. Bentley and carried unanimously to declare executive session pursuant to Section 105(h) of the Public Officers Law

Executive session was declared from 11:15 a.m. to 11:53 a.m.

Board reconvened, and there being no further business, on motion by Mr. Gabriels, seconded by Mr. O'Neill the meeting adjourned at 11:53 a.m.

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WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 22, 2002

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren convened at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center, Lake George, New York, at 10:04 a.m.

Mr. William Thomas presiding.

Salute to the flag was led by Supervisor Gabriels.

Roll called, the following members present:

Supervisors Gabriels, Monroe, Mallison, Sheehan, Moynihan, O'Connor, Kenny, Belden, Bentley, Thomas, Tessier, Bennett, Brower, Caimano, Morrell, Champagne, Montesi, O'Neill, and Haskell - 19.

Absent: Supervisor Quintal - 1.

Motion was made by Mr. Caimano, seconded by Mr. Haskell and carried unanimously to approve the minutes of the January 4, 2002, Organization Meeting, and January 16, 2002, Board Meeting, subject to correction by the Clerk.

Due to a lengthy agenda, followed by a Local Development Corporation meeting, Chairman Thomas dispensed with committee reports for February, and extended privilege of the floor to any committee chairmen or vice-chairmen who wished to report on a particular meeting or activity.

The following committee chairmen or vice-chairmen presented verbal reports on February meetings or activities:

Supervisor Haskell, Westmount Health Facility; Supervisor O'Neill, Health Services; and Supervisor Bennett, Community College and Finance & Personnel (joint meeting), and Regional Economic Development.

Supervisor Belden thanked Sewer Administrator, William Lamy, and County Attorney, Paul Dusek, for the work they put in on the Sewer Project in Hague.

Chairman called for reading of communications.

Clerk read communications, including the following:

Frank O'Keefe, Warren County Treasurer, 2001 Annual Dog Licensing Report.

Warren County Historical Society, 2001 Annual Report.

Warren County Health Services, Home Care Division, 2001 Policies.

NYS Office for the Aging, summary of findings from December 4, 2001 annual evaluation of the Warren/Hamilton Counties Area Agency on Aging.

Eric D. Goetzmann, Pyramid Company of Glens Falls, LLC, supporting an occupancy tax initiative to fund tourism promotion and development, and suggesting the additional funds be managed by a private entity from the tourism community.

Margaret A. Dziwulski, Senior Financial Analyst, U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Community Planning and Development Division, regarding audit report for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2000, Community Block Grant Program (CDBG), Warren County, and indicating the report did not identify any findings or deficiencies pertaining to the County's management of the CDBG Programs.

Communications, resolutions and reports ordered placed on file.

Chairman called for reading of resolutions.

Clerk announced that Resolution Nos. 132 through 191 were mailed to the supervisors, and a motion to bring Resolution Nos. 131, and 192 through 231 to the floor was necessary. Motion was made by Mr. Belden, seconded by Mr. Tessier and carried unanimously to bring Resolution Nos. 131 and 192 through 231 to the floor.

Motion was made by Mr. Caimano to introduce a resolution supporting Elizabeth Little as Warren County's Assembly Representative, and condemning the archaic and ill-thought out process used in redistricting both the Senate and Assembly. Mr. Montesi seconded the motion

Mr. Dusek replied to questions on introducing the resolution, and noted the Rules of the Board require all resolutions to be in writing. He suggested there needed to be a vote to waive that rule, unless the board members wanted him to try to prepare the resolution in writing before the meeting was over.

Mr. Caimano moved that his motion be amended to add that the Rules of the Board calling for resolutions to be in writing to be waived, seconded by Mr. Montesi.

Mr. O'Connor asked who this resolution should be sent to, and Mr. Caimano replied, Assemblywoman Little, Assemblyman Silver, Senator Bruno, Governor Pataki, Congressman Sweeney, and Senator Stafford. Mr. Caimano moved the additional amendment to his motion, seconded by Mr. Montesi. The motion was carried by unanimous vote. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 232 for the record.

Mr. Robillard requested an amendment to Resolution No. 137, changing the verbiage to send a copy of the resolution to Assemblyman McDonald, rather than retired Assemblyman D'Andrea; amending Resolution No. 139, expanding the language requesting the New York State Legislature to hold New York State Counties harmless from the costs of the new health care legislation and mandated programs; and amending Resolution No. 168, noting further identification of the bridge project in the resolution to state "Clarence White Bridge over Stony Creek."

Mr. Caimano also requested that Resolution No. 193, appointing members to the Empire Zone Administrative Board be amended to state that Alan Redecker was a board member of the ACC Foundation. He moved the amendments to Resolution Nos. 137, 139, 168 and 193, as stated, seconded by Mr. Belden and carried unanimously. Clerk noted amendments for the record.

Mr. Caimano requested a roll call vote on Resolution No. 216.

Mr. Brower requested clarification by the County Attorney of Resolution No. 231, Home Rule Request by Warren County for the enactment of Senate Bill No. 3968 and Assembly Bill No. 7542 entitled, "An act to amend the Tax Law, in relation to the terms of a sales tax distribution agreement in the County of Warren." Mr. Dusek explained this was a resolution requesting the Assembly and Senate to pass legislation which would allow Warren County to enter into a sales tax agreement with the City of Glens Falls. He recalled this was discussed earlier last year, and noted that under the current law there is an issue of how many years the County could do this. He noted this legislation gives Warren County the authority for a 40-year agreement.

Mr. Dusek noted this would also address another problem, and explained there is legislation on the books regarding sales tax intercept, which basically takes the sales tax out of the hands of the County, passes it through the State Comptroller and Trustee before it comes back to the County. He said that the aforementioned legislation addresses the fact that the City's money would come *after* the sales tax intercept, if in fact, it was ever used.

Mr. Dusek also pointed out that this legislation, if passed, would give the County the authority to enter into the agreement, but it would not bind the County to the agreement with the City of Glens Falls. Later, he noted, there would be an agreement proposed to the board members, between Warren County and City of Glens Falls, but that agreement would not come until after this legislation is in place, and then the agreement would be presented for approval.

Mr. Champagne asked what if the legislation was not approved. Mr. Dusek replied that the County could still do an agreement, but they would be sharply limited in terms of time and other issues. Mr. Champagne asked if the sewer contract between the City and the Town of Queensbury was tied to this agreement. Mr. Dusek noted that as far as the sewer project, it has operated and moved ahead independently of this legislation. However, he added, it was his understanding that there have been some conversations between the City and the Town which does not involve the County. Whether or not the parties make this sales tax agreement tied to the sewer district was up to the City and County, he said.

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Mr. Brower commented the Town just wanted to make sure they had an agreement with the City prior to the Board of Supervisors approving the sales tax agreement with the City. He said he felt the negotiations between the City and the Town were moving ahead and they hope to meet the February 28th deadline they agreed upon for the finalization of the agreement. He noted they have had some very positive meetings recently in this regard. He recognized the tremendous amount of effort that has gone into this process from both communities.

Mr. Caimano stated he understood that the contract for the sewer (between the Town and the City) was separate from the sales tax agreement (between the City and the County). Mr. Dusek indicated that so far, the County has taken no action whatsoever to formalize a commitment to the City of Glens Falls. Mr. Brower said his concerns have been addressed and everyone knows that there has to be a signed agreement between the City and the Town before the agreement between the City and the County proceeds.

Mr. Mallison asked if was not written in the agreement between the City and the Town that if at any point the sales tax does not come to the City from the County, the agreement between the City and the Town was null and void. Mr. Brower replied there was language roughly to that effect. He said both communities understand the intent.

Mr. O'Neill said he felt the county had a big interest here, too. He noted if the County goes forward and builds a new Public Safety Facility, hooking onto the new sewer line will save about one-quarter of a million dollars. Chairman Thomas agreed, noting he did not feel this was an "if", and when the County moves forward on the project, they plan to hook into the

As general discussion continued, Mr. Dusek pointed out that the legislation is being sought and the agreement with the City is being sought more than for just the reason of the sewer. He noted that part of the City's problems in the past, according to his understanding, was the drain on the City infrastructure and other issues that the City had in terms of being able to enter into intermunicipal agreements. He said that this sales tax agreement, as presented, goes beyond just the sewer arrangement and addresses City use by all of the County and the contribution of the County's money is so the City will be able to make capital improvements. Mr. Montesi confirmed that the County's \$300,000 in sales tax money is being held in abeyance until the agreement is signed between the Town and the City, and Mr. Dusek replied yes, that was correct. He reiterated that the resolution before the supervisors today does not give the City the money and it does not commit for an agreement. All it says to the State, he pointed out, was that the County wants this legislation so they can do an agreement if desired.

At Mr. Bentley's request, William Lamy, Sewer Administrator, reported on the Lake George Basin Sewer Project. Mr. Lamy referred to proposed Resolution No. 213, requesting that New York State Department of Transportation release maintenance jurisdiction on a parcel of property located west of Route 9N and north of Dodd Hill Road in the Town of Hague. He noted it was with regard to the procedure for acquiring the property for the main pump station in Hague. He complimented Mr. Dusek's efforts in putting together an agreement with the willing sellers of the property and noted the County would actually be entering into a friendly condemnation to acquire the property and work out the purchase price. He stressed that this parcel was key to being able to go ahead with the project and award contracts. He predicted they would have a notice of award in the hands of the contractors next Friday, and they anticipate a Spring construction start.

Mr. Lamy also pointed out there were a few other resolutions before the supervisors to tie up some loose ends on the other plants. He reported that the Lake George Plant was done, other than one minor punch list item, and they are 95% complete at the Bolton Project. He concluded that they are scheduled to meet with the Queensbury Town Board later in March to update them on the SEQRA process.

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In conclusion, Mr. Bentley mentioned that there was a resolution changing the name of the Lake George Basin Sewer Committee to the Warren County Sewer Committee, in an effort to encompass the whole project.

Chairman called for vote on the resolutions.

Resolution Nos. 131 through 215, and 217 through 232 were approved. Resolution No. 216 was defeated. Certificates of Appointments, naming member of the Warren County Youth Board; and naming member of the Saratoga-Warren-Washington Counties Workforce Investment Board, were submitted.

SCHEDULE "A" PURCHASING POLICY FOR WARREN COUNTY REVISION PURCHASING DEPARTMENT 2000

SOLE SOURCE (MONOPOLIES) AND TRUE LEASES -- ORIGINAL

Competitive bidding is not required under Section 103 of the General Municipal Law, where the subject of the contract is controlled by a monopoly such as electric service, or where there is only one possible (sole) source from which to procure certain patented goods or services, and therefore no possibility of competition exists. Should certain supplies or

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materials be obtainable o, my from a specific manufacturer, then a true monopoly would exist and the purchase would not be subject to bidding requirements. However, should there be any possibility of purchasing the item from two or more vendors, sealed bids should be requested after public advertising.

True leases are neither purchases nor contracts for public work and, thus, are not subject to bidding under General Municipal Law. These agreements cannot contain either a "buy out" or an "extension" clause. Any Warren County lease MUST contain a" funding out" clause in case of non-appropriation of funds. All leases require at least three (3) written quotes. A written explanation must be sent to Purchasing when the lowest lease quotation is not taken, and a Board of Supervisors' Resolution must be obtained. This decision-making process should also be documented, as necessary, as to why leasing is better than buying.

BIDDING THRESHOLDS AND PROCEDURES

Purchase contracts for materials, equipment, and supplies involving an estimated annual expenditure of over \$10,000.00 and public works contracts involving over \$20,000.00 shall be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder only after public advertising soliciting formal sealed bids (Section 103 of the General Municipal Law). The tern public works contracts would apply to those items or projects involving labor or both materials and labor. Included in this category would be construction, paving, printing, and repair contracts. Although not defined in New York State General Municipal Law, Section 103, the Office of the State Comptroller has expressed the opinion that the term "contract for public work" encompasses contracts for services, or labor or construction by a "taborer, workman or mechanic service requiring wage rates". When a contract involves acquisition of both goods and services, such as a commodity where installation is required the contract should be viewed as a purchase for purposes of the competitive bidding monetary threshold if the services are minor, incidental, or customarily provided by the vendor as a component of the purchase. Conversely, if the services are extensive, substantial, or involve specialized skills, so that the acquisition of the commodity is incidental to the work the contract should be treated as a contract for public work (1987 Opns St Comp No. 87-46, p 70). For example, a contract for interior painting of a building involves both material and labor. In most cases, the labor component of the contract will be predominant, making it a contract for public work. In contrast, replacing a boiler or furnace, while involving both labor and equipment, (the boiler) will, in most cases, consist primarily of a charge for the equipment, making it a commodity purchase.

The Purchasing Agent should obtain pertinent information, relative to county contracts, fr om the appropriate vendor and department head before sending them to the County Attorney to be prepared for Board Approval. The Purchasing Agent's Office shall maintain all original bid proposals and RFPs. Original materials and equipment purchasing information as well as original bid documentation must also be on file in the Purchasing Department.

PURCHASING POLICY FOR WARREN COUNTY REVISION PURCHASING DEPARTMENT 2002

SOLE SOURCE (MONOPOLIES-) AND TRUE LEASES CHANGES (Bold)

Competitive bidding is not required under Section 103 of the General Municipal Law, where the subject of the contract is controlled by a monopoly such as electric service, or where there is only one possible (sole) source from which to procure certain patented goods or services, and therefore no possibility of competition exists. Should certain supplies or materials be obtainable only from a specific manufacturer, then a true monopoly would exist and the purchase would not be subject to bidding requirements. However, should there be any possibility of purchasing the item from two or more vendors, sealed bids should be requested after public advertising.

True leases are neither purchases nor contracts for public work and, thus, are not subject to bidding under the General Municipal Law. County policy, however, requires that

- 1) After a department has been given budget funding and approval to lease equipment, unless the lease is on the State contract, RFP's must be obtained through the Purchasing Department;
- 2) A written explanation must be sent to Purchasing when the lowest lease quotation or response to an RFP is not taken, and a Board of Supervisors resolution must be obtained:
- 3) Appropriations be specifically available for the lease (this will be considered authorization by the board to enter into the lease)
 - 4) The lease agreement entered into may be for multiple years but must:
 - a) not contain any automatic buyout or automatic renewal clauses
 - b) con tain a non-appropriation clause
 - c) address the disposition of the equipment at the end of the lease so that the vendor pays the cost for the return of the equipment etc.
- 5) All lease agreements shall be treated as purchases and signed by the Purchasing Agent
- 6) While the lease agreement may not contain an automatic renewal clause, at the end of the lease term, departments may extend the lease agreement beyond the original term for a period of up to 18 months without securing additional quotes or engaging in an RFP process provided that
 - a) the lease payments do not increase
 - b) the department has appropriations therefore and
 - c) Purchasing Agent approval is received.

AUTHORIZING AND RATIFYING APPLICATION TO THE NEW YORK STATE CONTROLLER'S OFFICE FOR INCREASE IN IMPROVEMENT OF FACILITIES TO WARREN COUNTY SEWER DISTRICT (INDUSTRIAL PARK), AND ATTESTING TO ACCURACY OF APPLICATION - LAKE GEORGE BASIN SEWER

WHEREAS, the Warren County Board of Supervisors previously adopted Resolution No. 556 of 2001, titled Resolution Making Determination of Public Interest in the Necessity Of, and Authorizing, an Increase or Improvement to Sewer Facilities for the Warren County Sewer District (Industrial Park) And, Subject to Permissive Referendum, Providing for Excess Facilities, and

WHEREAS, the Warren County Board of Supervisors also adopted Resolution No. 651 of 2001, titled Resolution Authorizing Intermunicipal Agreement Between Warren County, Washington County, Town of Queensbury and Town of Kingsbury Concerning the Establishment of Districts, Construction of Collection Systems, and Disposal of Waste Water at the City of Glens Falls Waste Water Treatment Plant, and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid Resolution No. 651 of 2001, also provided that the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, Administrator of the Sewer District and County Attorney be authorized and directed on behalf of Warren County and the Industrial Park Sewer District to take all appropriate action concerning execution of any applications or other documents

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necessary to seek any approvals that may be necessary from the New York State Controller and/or any other State or Federal Agencies and to cause the construction of the Sewer District that is described within the Resolution, and

WHEREAS, the County Attorney has advised that the application to the New York State Controller may not be necessary under State Law but has been made in the event that the New York State Controller's Office should determine otherwise and to avoid delay in connection with the project, and

WHEREAS, rules of the New York State Controller's Office concerning the submission of an application requires a specific resolution by the Warren County Board of Supervisors providing certain information and/or statements, and now, therefore, be it

WHEREAS, included in the information provided in the application is a statement of factors considered in making the determination that the improvements are in the public interest, said statement reading:

As mentioned above, the County District is actually a part of a larger project and therefore, a joint effort with common and individual goals. The area in the vicinity of the Project is unique in that it includes an industrial park owned by the Industrial Development Agency formed by the contiguous counties of Warren and Washington, separate develop able areas are in the Towns of Queensbury and Kingsbury, an airport owned by Warren County. The four (4) municipalities are seeking to address an alleged violation of SPDES permit effluent limits for a WWTP operated by District #1 and future development. While the WWTP currently only serves the Warren and Washington Counties Industrial Park, the municipalities see this proposed Project as a way of solving wastewater disposal problems for the Industrial Park while at the same time stimulating mutually beneficial economic development in the area. The regional approach envisioned by these entities will enable the area to be developed for light industrial uses (in accordance with the zoning of the area) while avoiding potential environmental impacts from multiple wastewater systems. This solution will also significantly increase the ability of the Industrial Park to attract tenants by eliminating the difficulty of installing an acceptable wastewater treatment system as an impediment to development. Similarly, industrially zoned properties in the Town of Queensbury along the route of the proposed sewer line will become more attractive to potential developers as a result of the availability of municipal wastewater disposal service. It is believed that the property is the Warren CSD which will be assessed is benefitted and that no benefitted property has been excluded from the larger project.

RESOLVED, that the application which has been submitted by the County to the New York State Controller's Office is done so at the direction of the Board; that the Board believes the contents of the application to be accurate; that the Board has determined that the improvement and expenditure for which permission is sought is in the public interest and will not constitute an undo burden on the property which will bear the cost thereof; and that the cost of the proposed improvements to the extent assessed against a benefitted area includes all property to be benefitted and no benefitted property has been excluded, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the County Attorney, County Sewer District Administrator and Chairman of the Board of Supervisors be, and hereby are, authorized to take such other and further action as may be necessary to obtain New York State approval, if necessary, and take all other further action that may be necessary to ultimately arrange for the construction of the Sewer District Improvements.

RESOLUTION NO. 227 OF 2002

AUTHORIZING COMMENCEMENT OF EMINENT DOMAIN PROCEEDING IN CONNECTION WITH THE WARREN COUNTY SEWER PROJECT-TOWN OF HAGUE AND AUTHORIZING STIPULATION AND AGREEMENT WITH JAMES W. O'TOOLE AND MADELINE O'TOOLE

WHEREAS, Wastewater Facilities are planned in connection with the Warren County Sewer Project - Town of Hague and said Town has established a Sewer District titled The Town of Hague Sewer District #1 in which the same will be located, and

WHEREAS, in connection with the construction and placement of Wastewater Facilities in the aforementioned Town of Hague Sewer District, it is necessary to acquire certain lands for a sewer pump station on the corner of certain property owned by James W. O'Toole and Madeline O'Toole, (hereinafter referred to as "the O'Tooles"), and adjacent to Route 9N and Dodd Hill Road in the Town of Hague, and

WHEREAS, representatives of Warren County, (hereinafter referred to as "the County"), have previously heretofore made an offer to purchase the property from the O'Tooles and have furnished an appraisal substantiating the offering price, and

WHEREAS, the O'Tooles feel the price is inadequate and have obtained an appraisal reporting a higher value to the property but, in the meantime, it has been learned that 1) part of the property to be acquired consists of the former road bed of Dodd Hill Road and part of the property appears to be under the jurisdiction of the New York State Department of Transportation; 2) there is a mortgage on the property that needs to be addressed; and 3) the County's appraiser is out of his office and will not return until March of 2002 so the County is unable to review and revise its offer, to whatever extent is necessary based on the new information, and

WHEREAS, the County currently has bid certain improvements for the project and has not awarded the bids pending the acquisition of the property, and

WHEREAS, in view of the circumstances outlined above, the parties have not been able to reach agreement concerning the price of the property but, the O'Tooles, nevertheless, are desirous of conveying the property to the County and continuing to negotiate concerning the price of the property and ultimately allow a court of law to establish the value of the property in accordance with the procedures set forth under the Eminent Domain Law of the State of New York, and

WHEREAS, in view of the foregoing, the County Attorney has recommended that the parties enter into an agreement, pursuant to which the County will petition the Supreme Court of the State of New York for the County of Warren, for an Order authorizing the acquisition of the subject property and permitting the filing of an acquisition map vesting title in the County with the understanding that the matter will then be under the jurisdiction of the Court, and that the parties will later work to resolve the purchase price and, if necessary, litigate the same, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Chairman of the Warren County Board of Supervisors be, and he hereby is, authorized to enter into a Stipulation and Agreement with the O'Tooles as identified in the preambles of this resolution, and in a form approved by the County Attorney, and, be it further

RESOLVED, that the County Attorney is hereby authorized to commence an Eminent Domain proceeding to acquire the aforementioned O'Toole property, and the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors and/or William Lamy, as Deputy Superintendent of Public Works/Director of Engineering/Sewer Administrator be, and hereby is, authorized to execute a petition and any other papers that may be necessary to commence, maintain and, ultimately, settle, an Eminent Domain proceeding with the understanding that should the price payable for the property be in excess of what the Federal Environmental Protection Agency will pay in accordance with grant provisions, the same will be subject to further Board approval prior to any settlement of the Eminent Domain proceeding.

WHEREAS, the aforesaid Legislation would amend the tax law to provide that if Warren County enters into an agreement with the City of Glens Falls to allocate and distribute a portion of net collections due to the County from its sales and compensating use taxes, that the agreement could be for a term not to exceed forty (40) years and the State Comptroller shall not disapprove the agreement based on such a term and further, the said Legislation also provides that if Warren County shall pledge all or a portion of the net collections from sales and compensating use taxes pursuant to previously enacted Sales Tax Intercept Legislation that any obligation the County has to allocate and distribute net collections to the City under the aforementioned agreement with the City shall be satisfied if amounts due the City are instead paid by such County for moneys returned to the County by the Counties of Warren and Washington Industrial Development Agency or trustee, or in the event there are not sufficient funds to allow the County to pay the City in any month as required by the agreement, the County shall make such payments to the City in the amounts and in such manner as set forth in such agreement, now, therefore be it

Privilege of the floor was extended to Barbara Bennett of Queensbury, who addressed Mr. Brower regarding the meetings going on between the City and the Town. She asked him to please announce to the public the time and place of these meetings, if these meetings are open to the public. Mr. Brower replied that these meetings have not been open to the public and the sewer negotiating teams from the Town and City have been meeting.

Mrs. Bennett asked when the next Board of Supervisors meeting would be scheduled. Chairman Thomas replied that it was the third Wednesday. He acknowledged that this new schedule has not worked out too well as yet, but added he was hoping it would from now on.

Mr. Brower referred to Mrs. Bennett's earlier question, and noted that on February 28th at 7:00 p.m., a Queensbury Town Board meeting was scheduled and the purpose was to discuss and potentially ratify the contract with the City of Glens Falls.

Chairman Thomas declared a five-minute recess, noting that an executive session would be called upon the board reconvening. Mr. Monroe noted the purpose of the executive

session was to brief the board members on further discussion had with Washington County and new developments between Foster-Wheeler and Casella.

Recess was declared from 10:30 a.m. to 10:40 a.m.

Board reconvened, and motion was made by Mr. Champagne, seconded by Mr. Bentley and carried unanimously to declare executive session pursuant to Section 105(h) of the Public Officers Law.

Executive session was declared from 10:40 a.m. to 11:35 a.m.

Board reconvened, and there being no further business, on motion by Mr. Caimano, seconded by Mr. O'Neill the meeting adjourned at 11:35 a.m.

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WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING WEDNESDAY, MARCH 20, 2002

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren convened at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center, Lake George, New York, at 10:04 a.m.

Mr. William Thomas presiding.

Salute to the flag was led by Supervisor Monroe.

Roll called, the following members present:

Supervisors Gabriels, Monroe, Mallison, Sheehan, Moynihan, O'Connor, Belden, Bentley, Thomas, Tessier, Bennett, Brower, Morrell, Champagne, Montesi, O'Neill, Haskell and Quintal - 18.

Absent: Supervisors Kenny and Caimano - 2.

Motion was made by Mr. Belden, seconded by Mr. Tessier and carried unanimously to approve the minutes of the February 22, 2002, Board Meeting, subject to correction by the Clerk.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Attorney John Poklemba, who reported on CSEA union contract negotiations. He indicated, as he had previously presented to the Finance & Personnel Committee, that the CSEA has proposed a one-year extension to their collective bargaining agreement, with a three percent salary increase for the one year. Due to the organizational problems at the union level, and the fact that the Memorandum of Understanding extending the health care provisions of the agreement have already been entered into and is effective until December 31, 2002, he said he would recommend that the one year extension be granted and they continue negotiations regarding the other issues that have been mentioned.

Mr. Poklemba said the only other item discussed was a request for a waiver of the sixmonth waiting period for new employees to receive health insurance benefits. He noted this was recommended to him by people who work for the County to help out with the recruiting, especially with respect to the health care workers. He said he recommended that this waiver also be given through the end of the year and taken up again with the negotiations for a new contract.

Chairman Thomas asked if the supervisors needed to declare an executive session to discuss any of this proposal. Mr. Dusek noted this was up to the supervisors at this point since the offer has been proposed, and it was a question whether there needed to be any further discussion. If so, he suggested an executive session be called.

Chairman Thomas reiterated that this information has been reported to the Finance & Personnel Committee. Mr. Montesi indicated this was the direction the counsel had been given, and Chairman Thomas concurred.

Mr. Robillard asked if the union had signed off on this agreement, and Mr. Poklemba replied yes. Mr. Robillard noted in that event, the County needed a resolution to put this into effect. Mr. Dusek asked if the union had actually voted, and Mr. Poklemba replied he was informed the union has voted and it was their proposal.

Motion was made by Mr. Montesi, seconded by Mr. O'Neill and carried unanimously to authorize an extension agreement with the CSEA General Bargaining Unit through December 31, 2002, providing for a three percent salary increase for employees and a waiver of the six-month waiting period for health insurance benefits. (Please note, this later became Resolution No. 292 for the record.)

Chairman dispensed with committee reports due to the lengthy agenda. Mr. Monroe, Chairman of the Solid Waste & Recycling Committee, requested an executive session at the end of the meeting to report on the purchase offers received on the trash plant. He noted the supervisors have seen two proposals and he had a third one to present.

Chairman called for reading of communications.

Clerk read communications, including the following:

Warren County Economic Development Corporation, 2001 Annual Report.

Capital District Off-Track Betting Corporation, Financial Report as of December 31, 2001.

Warren County Treasurer, lists of unpaid taxes for the years 1999 through 2001, as of October 31, 2001, not including parcels in bankruptcy, beyond redemption, and in installments.

Warren County Soil & Water Conservation District, 2001 Annual Report.

Annual Report: County Clerk

Communications, resolutions and reports ordered placed on file.

Chairman called for reading of resolutions.

Clerk announced that Resolution Nos. 234 through 272 were mailed to the supervisors, and a motion to bring Resolution Nos. 233, and 273 through 291 to the floor was necessary. Motion was made by Mr. Mallison, seconded by Mr. Bentley and carried unanimously to bring Resolution Nos. 233 and 275 through 291 to the floor.

Clerk noted that thanks to Supervisor Gabriel's input, resolutions requiring roll call votes were so noted on the index.

Mr. O'Connor moved to introduce a resolution supporting Washington County and the Town of Fort Edward and asking the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to reconsider, or continue to consider, the area around Fort Edward and that part of the Hudson River that is to be dredged for its field office, as opposed to locating in Saratoga County. Mr. Quintal seconded the motion, and it was carried by unanimous vote. The Rules of the Board requiring the resolution to be presented in writing was unanimously waived, and the Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 293 for the record.

Mr. O'Neill moved to waive the Rules of the Board requiring a resolution to be presented in writing and introduced a resolution asking the State Legislature to rescind Section 502 of the Racing, Wagering & Breeding Law so it would allow directors of off-track betting corporations who were appointed after January 1, 1990 to receive the same pay as other directors are receiving (\$250 per day that OTB meets). Mr. O'Neill said this was his seventh year as a member of OTB and he has not drawn any pay. He said he felt he had done as much work as any of the other directors there who are collecting pay. Mr. Belden seconded the motion.

Mr. Montesi noted that Mr. O'Neill has been involved in OTB as long as he had been on the board, and he complimented his work on behalf of Warren County. He recalled there was a time when there were all kinds of problems with OTB and noted he was one of the few directors that maintained their status on the board, and he recognized the fact that Mr. O'Neill was now vice-chairman of OTB. Mr. Belden echoed Mr. Montesi's remarks, and he said he felt he should be paid as a director.

Mr. Tessier recalled this issue has come up in the past and he said he felt it was important for the County to pass the requested resolution. Mr. O'Neill added that OTB staff suggested that the counties pay their supervisors rather than the corporation; however, when they looked into it, according to Section 200 of the County Law, this cannot be done as it is not allowed.

Chairman Thomas asked where the money would come from if this was approved, and Mr. O'Neill replied it would come from OTB revenue as part of a business expense.

Chairman Thomas called the motion, and the introduction of the resolution was carried by unanimous vote. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 294 for the record.

Mr. Brower requested a roll call vote on Resolution No. 272, authorizing transfer of surplus Warren County Sheriff's Department car to the City of Glens Falls. He remarked that he had consistently contended that this board should put its vehicles that are used to auction, and the money derived should go back to the General Fund or at least a department fund for vehicles. He said he felt the board continued to take vehicles that had useful life and transfer them to other communities within the county. He noted in this particular case, a 1998 Ford

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was involved, and he stressed it was not this particular community (Glens Falls) that he was talking about. One of the reasons he indicated he had asked that the County have a policy on either purchasing or leasing vehicles in the future was because the debate between leasing and purchasing resulted in the big question of what is the residual value of a vehicle if it is purchased. Continuing, he said, the residual value was fairly substantial, and yet, if the County gives the vehicles away the argument of purchasing over leasing goes away. In that event, he suggested it would be cheaper to lease all vehicles in the County as opposed to purchasing because if they are not going to get anything for them at the end of the purchase period, why purchase them.

Mr. O'Connor pointed out that they were talking about Sheriff patrol vehicles (red and whites) and not vehicles used by other organizations. All of them have in excess of 100,000 miles, he said, and may or may not have resale value on the open market.

Mr. Brower talked about the last two vehicles he personally purchased, and noted one was a 1992 with 95,000 miles, and he paid \$5,500 for it; the other was a 1989 vehicles with 65,000 miles on it, and he said he paid \$8,500. He suggested a 1998 vehicle, even with 100,000 miles, was projected to have a great deal of residual value. He said these vehicles are built to go 250,000 miles, and he thought it was important for the board to consider a future vehicle policy on leasing versus purchasing vehicles.

Mr. Mallison also spoke concerning Resolution No. 272, and thanked the members of the board who were considering voting yes, for their contribution to the City of Glens Falls. Mr. Belden noted this was not the first time this item has been discussed, and DPW vehicles and equipment were sold to the towns for fair prices. He reminded that all of the taxpayers in the County help pay for the equipment and vehicles purchased, and he thought if the County can help out the City or the towns with a piece of equipment, he was 100% in favor of the idea. Mr. Quintal and Mr. Haskell agreed with the remarks. Mr. Brower concluded his remarks and pointed out that not all of these taxpayers were paying 40 percent of the cost of the vehicles like the Queensbury taxpayers were.

Mr. Tessier pointed out that these road patrol vehicles may have 135,000 miles on them, but those car engines run constantly around the clock. Therefore, he suggested there was a lot more than 135,000 miles on the engines. He also mentioned that the County does not give all of its vehicles away because the Town of Lake George paid \$25,000 for the last vehicle the County sold to the Town.

Mr. Bennett mentioned he had been able to attend the County auctions in the past and watched the sale. He said the Sheriff's Department vehicles do not bring any money as they are worn out. If other communities can find a use for them, he said he felt that it was the best use of the taxpayers' money to provide the vehicle to them.

Motion was made by Mr. Montesi, seconded by Mr. Champagne to introduce Resolution No. 290, providing direction concerning study of increased occupancy tax (bed tax) and/or increase in sales tax. Mr. Montesi read the resolution in full, and he said the purpose of the resolution was to understand that there are many questions with regard to bed tax and/or increase of sales tax. If the County were to move ahead with either, he indicated the public has said the County needs a plan in terms of how the money will be spent. He said he felt there was more study that was needed on the subject, and the Revenue Enhancement Committee needed to get more input in a rounded source so that all sections of the County were represented. He commented he felt this made sense and would allow the supervisors to move ahead as a board with one plan or another - or no plan at all.

Mr. Mallison stated his agreement with the resolution and said he felt there were a number of things the board members needed to learn on how to implement a bed tax if they were going to do it. He asked for an explanation of the time line involved with the budget adoption for 2003, and Chairman Thomas responded that the process usually begins in July or August and goes through budget adoption, usually in November. During this time, he said the proposals will be discussed by the Budget Officer and Budget Committee and they should be able to come to a conclusion during that time if the County was going to include anything in the 2003 budget.

Mr. Mallison asked if this meant that some sort of implementation would take place during the end of 2002. Mr. Dusek replied and said it what was important to understand that although this will be considered and developed during the 2003 budget process this fall, and that the board would take action no later than November, the only thing the County can do if it wants to move ahead with a tax, is to make a request to the State Legislature. If that happens in the fall, he said the State Legislature, unless it is conducting a special session, most likely will not be in session, which means the earliest this could be heard would be between January and June of 2003. Based on past experience, he said if everything went through for the County, they might see legislation in June, 2003, and most likely if the bed tax were implemented or even if there was a sales tax change, it would not be implemented until much later, during 2003, or more likely 2004. Mr. Montesi clarified that sales tax increases also take State legislative approval, and Mr. Dusek replied that was correct.

Mr. Moynihan said he did not think anyone had to worry about either tax, because if it was not done this year, he did not feel it would get implemented next year. Mr. Monroe asked if the legislation referred to by Mr. Dusek was just implementing legislation and the County still has the option to proceed after it is passed. Mr. Dusek replied that was usually the way it was set up on the bed tax and sales tax both. Mr. Monroe concluded if the County asked for implementation ability on the increasing of sales tax, they would not have to necessarily implement it, but it would be in place if they decided to go forward. Mr. Dusek said that was correct.

Mr. Mallison suggested that the Revenue Enhancement Committee members take into consideration that people will be looking for some testimony from hotel and motel owners. Specifically on the issue of the bed tax, he asked that the committee keep in mind that their busy season for these operators is summer. In all honesty, he said he felt these were the folks the committee needed to hear from. He suggested the committee be careful how it schedules meetings.

Chairman Thomas recognized Jason Sherry, Executive Director of the Lake George/ Adirondack Regional Convention and Visitors Bureau, who indicated his board would definitely support this resolution. He said they agree the County needs more time to look at the different options and present a plan that has the support of the entire tourism community.

Privilege of the floor was extended to John Salvador of Lake George, who suggested the resolution incorporate some kind of time requirement that the committee works under. He said he felt the committee had a monumental task and it was not like they can go to sleep between now and any time. He suggested a date be incorporated as to when the Board of Supervisors expects to receive the recommendation of the committee. Mr. Dusek addressed the comments, and said in developing this resolution with Mr. Montesi that was exactly why the wording was included that said "...and present findings or a plan of action to the Warren County Board of Supervisors at a future date so that the same may be considered by the board at the time the 2003 budget is proposed, reviewed and ultimately adopted." He said the thought was that this was the time frame in which they must have their findings and plan back to the board. Rather than giving a specifically defined date, he said they realized that some flexibility would be needed in order to have discussions with people who own businesses and are here only in the summer months. He said he felt this resolution gave direction, and added he thought the supervisors could give additional feedback at some later date if they were so inclined.

Motion was made by Mr. Gabriels, seconded by Mr. Bennett and carried unanimously to introduce Resolution No. 291, urging revisions to the proposed redistricting of the Assembly and Senatorial Districts. Mr. Gabriels read the resolution for the information of the board members.

Mr. Robillard requested a correction to Resolution No. 240, appointing member of Warren County Planning Board, changing the appointees name from "Sandy" to "Sandra." The board members unanimously approved the correction.

Chairman called for vote on the resolutions.

Resolution Nos. 233 through 294 were approved. Certificates of Appointments, naming members of the Local Conditional Release Commission; and naming member of Warren County Youth Board, were submitted.

SECTION 1. Local Law No. 4 of 2001 Amended and/or Superseded. Pursuant to the requirements of Section 963 of the General Municipal Law, the <u>Director of the Warren County Planning & Community Development Department Administrative and Fiscal Services Commissioner of the County of Warren, New York shall serve as the Local Empire Zone Certification Officer of the Warren County Empire Zone, and shall perform the following duty, to wit: certify, jointly with the New York State Commissioner of Economic Development and the New York State Commissioner of Labor, those business enterprises that are eligible to receive benefits referred to in Section 966 of the General Municipal Law, and any other applicable statutes.</u>

SECTION 3. Addition of ten (10) Parcels to the Existing Empire Zone. Application is hereby authorized for the inclusion of the following areas in the empire zone and if approved by the New York State Commissioner of Economic Development the areas to be included in the Empire Zone located in the Towns of Lake George and Queensbury shall include the following additional ten (10) parcels:

WHEREAS, the Warren County Board of Supervisors has adopted resolutions recognizing the Warren County Chapter of the Civil Service Employees Association, Inc., (CSEA) as the sole bargaining representative for County employees in the General Unit, and as a result of collective bargaining, a proposed agreement has been reached establishing the terms and conditions of employment and compensation of employees in the General Unit for a term to commence January 1, 2002, and to terminate December 31, 2002, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the proposed agreement between the County of Warren and CSEA negotiated by the County's representatives is hereby approved subject to the understanding that the agreement will essentially be an extension of the existing contract upon the following terms:

- 1) a three percent (3%) salary increase;
- 2) an incorporation of the Memorandum of Understanding previously approved to increase the County's contribution toward health insurance premiums; and
- a waiver of the six (6) month waiting period for a new employee to receive health insurance benefits
 and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors be, and he hereby is, authorized to execute an agreement on behalf of the County of Warren with the General Unit of the CSEA which incorporates the above-mentioned terms, for a term commencing January 1, 2002, and terminating December 31, 2002, and in the form approved by the County Attorney.

RESOLUTION NO. 293 OF 2002 Resolution introduced by Supervisors O'Connor and Quintal

SUPPORTING WASHINGTON COUNTY AND THE TOWN OF FORT EDWARD AND REQUESTING THE ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY TO LOCATE ITS FIELD OFFICE FOR THE HUDSON RIVER PCB CLEANUP IN THE AREA OF THE TOWN OF FORT EDWARD

WHEREAS, the Environmental Protection Agency (the "EPA") has proposed to locate the field office for the Hudson River PCB cleanup in Saratoga, and the County of Washington and the Town of Fort Edward are requesting that the field office be located in or near the Town of Fort Edward, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Warren County Board of Supervisors hereby indicates its support of the efforts of the County of Washington and the Town of Fort Edward to relocate the EPA field office, and further requests that the EPA consider locating the field office for the Hudson River PCB cleanup in or near the area of the cleanup and more specifically in an area in or near the Town of Fort Edward, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors be, and he hereby is, authorized and directed to forward copies of this resolution to the New York State Association of Counties; Governor George E. Pataki; Senator Ronald B. Stafford; and Assemblywoman Elizabeth Little; Inter-County Legislative Committee of the Adirondacks; Environmental Protection Agency; Federal Legislators; County of Washington; and Town of Fort Edward.

RESOLUTION NO. 294 OF 2002 Resolution introduced by Supervisors O'Neill and Belden

URGING THE NEW YORK STATE LEGISLATURE TO AMEND THE RACING, PARI-MUTUEL WAGERING AND BREEDING LAW §502 TO PROVIDE FOR SUMS TO BE PAID TO DIRECTORS OF OFF-TRACK BETTING CORPORATIONS WHO ARE MEMBERS OF A GOVERNING BOARD

WHEREAS, New York State Racing, Pari-Mutuel Wagering and Breeding Law §502 provides that a member of a governing board who is appointed a director after July 1, 1990 shall not be compensated by a regional off-track betting corporation while a subsequent paragraph of said section provides that directors may receive a sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) for each day or part thereof spent in attendance at meetings held in accordance with the law (not to exceed Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) per year), and

WHEREAS, County Law §200 provides that each supervisor shall be entitled to an equal amount of pay except for the chairman and the majority and minority leaders of the board, and that the annual salaries shall be in lieu of all other fees, charges or compensation for all services rendered to the county, and

WHEREAS, the provision providing for the lack of payment to a member of a governing board therefore creates an inequitable situation when all other directors of an off-track betting corporation are receiving compensation, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Warren County Board of Supervisors hereby urges the State Legislature to amend Racing, Pari-Mutuel Wagering and Breeding Law §502 to remove the prohibition against payment to a director who is a member of a governing board thereby creating a uniform situation where all directors are paid pursuant to the provisions of the Racing, Pari-Mutuel Wagering and Breeding Law, and further rectifying an inequitable situation which allows for some directors to be compensated while others, based on their membership on a governing board, are not paid, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors be, and he hereby is, authorized and directed to forward copies of this resolution to the New York State Association of Counties; Governor George E. Pataki; Senator Ronald B. Stafford; and Assemblywoman Elizabeth Little; and Inter-County Legislative Committee of the Adirondacks.

Mr. Montesi thanked the board members for the transfer of the Hudson Park Property to the Town of Queensbury (Resolution No. 287).

Mr. Quintal provided a short update on the Public Safety Building Project, and noted everything was progressing well and Sheriff Cleveland was doing a good job keeping up with any problems. He noted that the bid has gone out for timbering of the site so they can do the test borings. He noted that MRB Group was the architect of record, and BBL Construction was chosen as the clerk of the works for the project. He said they were pleased with the choice of BBL as they were a local company and added he felt they would do a great job for the County. He concluded, noting the project should break ground this Spring.

Mr. O'Neill noted that 2001 highlights from the Warren County Soil & Water Conservation District and Greater Adirondack Resource Conservation and Development Council had been distributed on each supervisor's desk. He urged review of the information on the district accomplishments. Mr. Montesi added that Soil & Water Conservation District would like to attend next month's board meeting and review the information with the supervisors. He asked they be included in the agenda, and Chairman Thomas acknowledged the request.

Mr. Mallison referred to Resolution No. 290, providing direction concerning study of increased occupancy tax (bed tax) and/or increase in sales tax, and urged anyone interested in the revenue enhancement options that the board was looking at to please come and talk to the Revenue Enhancement Committee. He said he was sure the people in his district could not handle a continuation of the large property tax increases that the County has seen over the past few years. He said he hoped whatever the County does, that it is done with the most possible information from the most possible number of people.

Sheriff Cleveland announced that following the board meeting, at Supervisor Moynihan's request, they were going to visit the Washington County construction site and see the modular construction of jail cells. He invited any interested supervisors to accompany them.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Barbara Bennett, of Queensbury, who discussed the resolutions passed at the board meeting with regard to the railroad project. She recalled there were some funds which former Congressman Solomon had obtained for the scenic railway to North Creek project and she said she heard the funds have not been used and the federal government wants to use part of it for buses. Chairman Thomas explained there was a commuter rail project that started and was going to go from Albany to Saratoga, and that portion of the line has not come to fruition, so the money was not being used for that. He noted that change did not affect anything to do with the railway from Saratoga to North Creek, and they have \$10 million for it. Some of the money taken back, as Mrs. Bennett mentioned, was used for improvement of the line in the Saratoga to North Creek railway area.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Cameron Tessier of Glens Falls, who asked if there would be adequate notice of the Revenue Enhancement Committee meetings. Chairman Thomas assured there would be several meetings and there would be plenty of notice.

Mr. Brower apprised the board members that at this stage in time, the City of Glens Falls and Town of Queensbury have agreed (they still need to see the final document) to language in a contract that would establish a sewer agreement between the City and the Town. He said this would enable both communities to move forward and hopefully, the City will take action Thursday evening and the Town, early next week to solidify this contract.

Mr. Mallison left the meeting at 10:55 a.m.

Privilege of the floor was extended to John Salvador, who commented he felt if revenue enhancement dies, it would not be a peaceful death. He said he believed the Revenue Enhancement Committee had to take the leadership roll in this regard. Holding public hearings and having people come in and tell the supervisors why they do not want to be taxed is pretty much what is to be expected, he said.

Mr. Salvador suggested there had to be a time line put together on the activities the committee has to undertake, and the various methods of revenue enhancement, combined with budget control, should be prioritized so people know what to expect. He reiterated that this has to be properly managed and it will not be "pulled off" the way it has been in the past. He said the shouting matches with people telling the board how they cannot stand to be taxed is something the supervisors have already heard. He suggested that with a proper management approach and convincing the people that it is needed, where it is going to be used, how it is going to be used, etc. is something that can be professionally undertaken.

Mr. Salvador contended that the people on the committee have a pre-conceived notion of where the County will raise this revenue, and he said he felt this was grossly unfair. He said he felt the committee members should have open minds and listen to all pros and cons. The way it was going now, he suggested the County can expect the same performance that has happened in the past, and it will not solve the problems.

Mr. Champagne thanked Mr. Salvador for his confidence. He said he felt this was exactly what the strategy appears to be, and he suggested there may be another alternative for the County to do what needs to get done.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Michael White, of Lake George Park Commission, who expressed thanks on behalf of the Commission for the various resolutions passed in support of the sonar demonstration project. He also thanked the Inter-County Legislative Committee of the Adirondacks and the Warren County Soil & Water District for their support.

Mr. White explained that when the Commission asked that the hearing resume, it was about the same time that the Administrative Law Judge assigned to the hearing had a baby and went on maternity leave. He said they also asked that a new judge be assigned, but delays in identifying someone freed up to do that and the leave time involved for the current judge resulted in about the same delay. Therefore, he said the judge originally assigned will continue to preside, and the hearing will commence April 25th. He said it will continue on dates in May and June, and the last date scheduled for a hearing is June 21st.He said he would keep the supervisors updated.

Chairman Thomas declared a brief recess, noting that an executive session would be called upon the board reconvening to discuss trash plant issues as previously identified by Mr. Monroe. He noted there would be no resolutions coming out of the executive session, and adjournment of the board would follow.

Recess was declared from 10:58 a.m. to 11:12 a.m.

Board reconvened, and motion was made by Mr. Monroe, seconded by Mr. Montesi and carried unanimously to declare executive session pursuant to Section 105(h) of the Public Officers Law.

Executive session was declared from 11:12 a.m. to 12:06 p.m.

Board reconvened, and there being no further business, on motion by Mr. Belden, seconded by Mr. Gabriels the meeting adjourned at 12:06 p.m.

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WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING WEDNESDAY, APRIL 17, 2002

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren convened at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center, Lake George, New York, at 10:06 a.m.

Mr. William Thomas presiding.

Salute to the flag was led by Supervisor Mallison.

Roll called, the following members present:

Supervisors Gabriels, Monroe, Mallison, Sheehan, O'Connor, Kenny, Belden, Bentley, Thomas, Tessier, Brower, Caimano, Morrell, Champagne, Montesi, O'Neill, Haskell and Quintal - 18. Absent: Supervisors Moynihan and Bennett - 2.

Motion was made by Mr. Mallison, seconded by Mr. Tessier and carried unanimously to approve the minutes of the March 20, 2002 board meeting, subject to correction by the clerk.

Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing on Proposed Local Law No. 2 of 2002 open at 10:07 a.m., and requested the Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

Deputy Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Mr. O'Neill, who asked specifically where the parcels of lands being included in the existing Empire Zone pursuant to this local law were located. Chairman Thomas recalled this was brought before a Regional Economic Development Committee meeting and reviewed and approved. Mr. Bentley noted that the parcel numbers in Lake George and Queensbury were listed on the resolution proposing enactment of the local law. (Please see Regional Economic Development Committee minutes of March 28th for details.)

Mr. Champagne stated that most of the parcels were in Queensbury and were formerly part of the Earltown property off Quaker Road. He said many of the parcels were wetlands, and the committee spent some time trying to determine if any of those particular lots would be conducive to any type of industrial development and there was nothing there. In addition, he said they talked with Queensbury Planning Department and there was nothing there, and it seemed like the right thing to do to get the properties off the tax rolls.

Chairman Thomas stated that the boundaries of the Empire Zone can be adjusted once per year, and this was the opportunity to do so. Mr. Bentley mentioned he tried to contact the Warren County Regional Economic Development Corporation (WCREDC) regarding a couple of properties in the Town of Horicon, but he never got a call back and he tried for three weeks. Mr. Brower mentioned that this is one year where they will have **two** opportunities to add parcels to the Empire Zone, and the second opportunity will take place in the fall.

Mr. Monroe asked how many acres were left to designate in the Empire Zone after this designation. Chairman Thomas replied that they have a banked number of acres and he did not know the total. He noted they were allowed to either shift zones from where they are to new sites, or use the acreage in the bank. He mentioned that following the board meeting, the WCREDC will be making a presentation on the Empire Zone. Mr. Monroe clarified if nothing is developed in Empire Zone areas, then they can be moved the following year to new sites, and Chairman Thomas concurred. He said he felt there was a lot of flexibility in the program.

Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing would remain open for a short time in the event anyone further wishing to speak might appear.

The meeting continued and Supervisor O'Neill introduced David Wick, District Manager of the Warren County Soil & Water Conservation District, who gave a report on the activities of the District. Mr. O'Neill said he was very proud of the job Mr. Wick and his staff do for the District. He added he felt Warren County had one of the outstanding Districts in New York State and the United States, and suggested after the supervisors view the presen-

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tation they would agree. Mr. Belden also thanked Mr. Wick and the District for assistance provided to the Town of Hague.

Mr. Wick presented a PowerPoint demonstration on current projects, training, and funding, and stressed the partnering with municipalities, cost effectiveness and services provided to the communities. A printed copy of the presentation slides is on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors with Warren County Soil & Water Conservation District records.

The public hearing on Proposed Local Law No. 2 of 2002 resumed, and there being no one further wishing to speak, Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing closed at 10:31 a.m.

Chairman Thomas recognized Lee Pollock of Rose & Kiernan, Inc., who was present to answer any questions from the supervisors regarding proposed Resolution No. 342, authorizing execution of notices of placement for general, professional and excess liability insurance coverage for Westmount Health Facility and Residential Hall, with Columbia Casualty Company, an insurer not authorized to do business in New York State and, therefore, was not subject to the supervision by New York State.

Mr. Champagne indicated he was present for part of the Westmount Health Facility Committee meeting, and he queried how the issue was resolved and what increase was necessary for the insurance. Mr. Robillard noted the problem was not so much the increase, it was the fact that the County would be contracting with insurance carriers outside of New York State. Mr. Pollock indicated that Columbia Casualty Company was licensed by New York State for surplus lines. Mr. Robillard asked why the County had to sign off on this item if there was not a certain problem. Mr. Pollock said there was a New York State requirement.

Mr. Dusek pointed out what he felt the important information for the supervisors to be aware of, is that when the County has a policy with an unauthorized insurer, they may not be subject to all of the regulations of the Superintendent of Insurance, and in the event of an insolvency, the losses will not be covered by the New York State Insolvency Fund. He mentioned that normally the County would not have these risks if they were able to do business with a carrier in New York State.

Mr. Dusek said according to his understanding, the reason why this is being done was because Rose & Kiernan was not able to secure coverage within New York State. Mr. Pollock concurred. Mr. Dusek asked if Mr. Pollock knew the rating of the aforementioned insurance company. Mr. Pollock replied it was CNA and it was an A+ rating. He added they were one of the largest insurance companies in the United States. Mr. Dusek suggested the supervisors weigh that information against the risks just mentioned.

Mr. Champagne asked Mr. Quintal (who had offered considerable information in this regard at the March 26th Insurance Committee meeting where it was discussed) if he was comfortable with this idea. Mr. Quintal replied yes. He reviewed information from the committee meeting for the information of the supervisors. Please see the March 26th Insurance Committee minutes for details.

Mr. Monroe asked Mr. Pollock if there was any reason why this company was not an authorized insurer in New York State. Mr. Pollock replied they were talking about the nursing home and right now that world was very stressed out. He said the reason the company was not authorized in New York State was to be free of forms and rates, and it gives the company more flexibility to offer coverage where other insurance companies could not offer it.

Chairman Thomas called for committee reports for April.

The following committee chairmen or vice-chairmen presented verbal reports on April meetings or activities:

Supervisor Quintal, Parks & Recreation and County Facilities; Supervisor Haskell, Westmount Health Facility; Supervisor O'Neill, Health Services; Supervisor Bentley (via DPW Deputy Superintendent William Lamy) Warren County Sewer; Supervisor Belden, DPW and Real Property Tax Services; Supervisor Kenny, (via County Clerk Caryl Clark and Records Center Manager Pam Vogel) County Clerk-Motor Vehicles; and Supervisor Monroe, Finance

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& Personnel and Solid Waste & Recycling.

In conjunction with the County Facilities Committee report, Chairman Thomas noted that the resolution authorizing the \$23 million in bonding for the Public Safety Building (PSB) and the Communications Upgrade Project, was being held pending completion of the State Environmental Quality Review (SEQR) process. He suggested this resolution may be forthcoming at the next board meeting.

Mr. Quintal noted that pursuant to proposed Resolution No. 341, the Rules of the Board were being amended to change the name of the Parks & Recreation Committee to the Parks, Recreation & Railroad Committee, and the membership was being increased from seven to nine. Chairman Thomas said he felt it was important to add the railroad to the Parks & Recreation Committee because in certain meetings, people who were very much involved in the project needed to be included. He noted based on approval of this recommendation, he would add Supervisor Haskell and Supervisor Monroe to the committee.

In conjunction with the Westmount Health Facility Committee report, Mr. Dusek commented on the committee's request for New York State Energy Research Development Authority NYSERDA to do an energy audit. He said that because of the DPW's involvement with NYSERDA, they were farther ahead than they anticipated. He said the County will need to hire an architect and a Request for Proposal (RFP) format would be presented at the next committee meeting. As a result of the aforementioned meeting, he said they now have clarification on the type of RFP that was needed, and he felt the committee will be able to move ahead.

In conjunction with the Health Services Committee report, Mr. O'Neill apprised that Greater Adirondack Home Aides (GAHA), who does most of the County's home care work was in financial straits and he felt they would be back asking for an increase before the end of the year. Mr. Caimano recalled that this was discussed last year when GAHA came to the County asking for an increase and it was approved. At that time, he recalled, they were asked to look at how they were administering their business. He said there were questions over some very high salaries paid to people who were not working out in the field. Mr. O'Neill concurred and said the committee also asked for financial records which disclosed these salaries. Mr. Robillard noted the information has been received, it was confidential information and it would be brought to the committee at its next meeting.

At Mr. Bentley's request, Mr. William Lamy presented information on the Warren County Sewer Project. He noted that they were under construction on the Hague portion of the project. He said they met their time schedule, contracts were signed and delivered, and a Notice to Proceed was issued for March 29th. As he reviewed the other activities involved with the bid letting and permit process on the project, he predicted the earth would be broken early next week.

Regarding the Queensbury project, Mr. Lamy said Stu Speigel (O'Brien & Gere) and he met with the Queensbury Town Board and brought them up to date on where they were with the SEQR process. He noted the process was slowly moving, and there was still much work to be done in analyzing alternatives before they settle on a preferred alternative.

Mr. Belden commended the job Mr. Lamy did for Hague, and he acknowledged that this was not an easy project. Mr. Brower also complimented the way Mr. Lamy has expedited work, which resulted in over a \$1 million savings in construction costs in the Town of Hague. He said he felt this savings would benefit Lake George tremendously.

Mr. Lamy responded that he could not take the credit for what has been accomplished in Hague. He pointed out that this was a team effort from the start of the project, and he mentioned the several county departments that contributed to this success, including department heads and staff from the following offices: County Attorney, Clerk of the Board, County Treasurer, Real Property Tax Services, Auditor and the DPW. He also acknowledged the efforts of Chairman Thomas, the former District Attorney, Sterling Goodspeed, and the former Sheriff, Fred Lamy, and highlighted examples of the assistance they provided which in-

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cluded notarizing signatures and acting as a courier to expedite paperwork.

Mr. Lamy said that more significantly, in all the years he worked in wastewater, this project was special as it was a major municipal undertaking in the Adirondack Park. He noted that all of the projects he previously worked on have been to "remove the Charmin" from either a lake or a stream. In this project, he noted, it was more about a vision and the purpose is to protect the future of Lake George. He commented that most of the time a treatment plant is built because there is a visible problem and it is easier for people to accept that the money has to be spent, and often it is accompanied by a Consent Order or some kind of compliance action. He said the Hague Project was to protect the lake and the people realize what they have to do to keep the water quality of Lake George pure, and it is a strong testament to the efforts of the Board of Supervisors and the Town Board in Hague. He complimented the commitments on the part of the town board and the supervisors and said he felt without this leadership and guidance he did not feel they would be under construction in Hague. He thanked everyone for their perseverance in moving the project along.

Mr. Champagne commented he felt Mr. Lamy "had perseverance that would not stop." He complimented his "tiger attitude". He thanked Mr. Lamy and acknowledged it was not an easy task to work with the regulatory agencies. He concluded by expressing his hopes and anticipations that someday Mr. Lamy would stand in the board room and talk about Queensbury being where Hague is today. The board members responded with applause.

Chairman Thomas acknowledged the Town of Queensbury for putting off their project and letting the other projects go forward and realizing the project needs more money. Mr. Brower responded that the whole concept is to benefit Lake George as best they can, and it seems they have taken the most expeditious route in doing so. Hopefully, he said, there will be enough money to handle North Queensbury's problems.

In conjunction with the DPW Committee report, Mr. Belden noted the committee approved a four-day work week for the summer for paving. He said he reviewed last year's program with Mr. Remington and there was a savings in overtime. Mr. Robillard interjected that this program was in jeopardy because it was not done as part of the original union contract, but rather by a resolution which says the board has to reconsider it this year.

Chairman Thomas said he thought Mr. Remington was under the impression this will be happening again and the crews are aware also. Motion was made by Mr. Belden, seconded by Mr. Bentley to introduce a resolution to approve this provision pursuant to the request presented by Mr. Remington.

Mr. Quintal mentioned that the ten-hour workday was totally voluntary, and Chairman Thomas concurred. He mentioned that a lot of the crew members do take advantage of the program.

Chairman Thomas called the question, and the motion was carried by unanimous vote. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 349 for the record.

At Supervisor Kenny's request, Caryl Clark, County Clerk and Pam Vogel, Records Center Manager, presented background information regarding proposed Resolution No. 339, opposing the proposed increase in the Local Government Records Management Improvement Fund. Mrs. Clark noted that somewhere in the Proposed 2002-2003 State Budget it was discovered that the Governor has a proposal to remove State Archives, State Library, State Museum and Public Broadcasting from under the New York State Education Department and put them into a new State entity to be known as the Institute for Cultural Education.

Mrs. Clark noted that the Local Government Management Improvement Fund was created in 1989, and as a result, \$5 was added to every civil indexing cost (starting of a civil action or matrimonial) and on every recording. This was created to support grants and technical assistance to local governments in order to improve and enhance the management of records and information, she said. She acknowledged the accomplishments of Mrs. Vogel applying for grants under this program, noting she has been approved for over \$550,000 in funding (please note, this number was later corrected by Mrs. Vogel to \$511,000). During the

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time period since this program started, Mrs. Clark estimated Warren County has given the State \$681,000 in records management fees. She noted of the \$5 collected, the County retains 25 cents. In 2001, she said that about \$60,000 went to the State and about \$3,200 stayed with the County.

Under the new proposal, she noted the fees would be increased to \$20 from \$5, and the counties would still keep 25 cents. She apprised that the County Clerks' Association, New York State Association of Counties, and various other counties have passed resolutions in opposition to the proposal because no improvement of services to the taxpayers have been demonstrated, nor any benefits to local governments. She concluded that according to the State Archives, this proposal will probably go through in some form because of the need for additional money in the State Budget. She urged the supervisors to pass the resolution, as proposed.

Mrs. Vogel added to the presentation, and reiterated the concerns mentioned by Mrs. Clark. She remarked that although the proposal may have some merit, they have had no information about it, nor have they been asked for any input. She added at this time they have no information that the programs they know and use involving State Archives will remain in tact under the proposal.

Regarding the grant funding, Mrs. Vogel indicated they have been successful in the past, and they were facing a very difficult year and it will be difficult for all governments applying this year to receive funding because of the competitiveness.

Mr. Montesi asked why Mrs. Vogel felt the Governor proposed changing this program from under the Department of Education to a separate entity. Mrs. Vogel indicated she attended a meeting last week where this was discussed and there was some concern in terms of the Board of Regents, and how they like it administered. She said she did not think it was a problem with the State Archives or State Museum.

Mr. Mallison asked how much Warren County has received in grants under this program, and Mrs. Vogel estimated Warren County (not including the municipalities who also received grants) received \$511,000. Mr. Kenny said they did know that the impact of this proposal on the taxpayers would be about \$200,000 per year added in filing fees. He said he sent a very long e-mail to Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver opposing the program.

Chairman Thomas acknowledged the successes of the Records Management Program for Warren County, and assured Mrs. Clark and Mrs. Vogel that the board would act upon their request.

In conjunction with the Solid Waste and Recycling Committee report, Mr. Monroe announced a meeting of the Inter-County Solid Waste Negotiating Team was scheduled for April 23rd in Washington County, starting at 9:00 a.m. He said that the purpose of the meeting was to have discussion with the two companies interested in the waste-to-energy plant, and Casella Waste Management would be addressing the committee at 9:00 a.m. and Wheelabrator at 10:30 a.m. He said the committee has been requested to give exclusive negotiation privileges by one of the two companies. He indicated he hoped that by the end of the meeting the committee will decide to do this with one of the two companies.

Chairman called for reading of communications.

Clerk read communications, including the following:

Capital District Regional Off-Track Betting Corporation, Financial Report as of January 31, 2002, and February 28, 2002.

Queensbury Regional Chamber of Commerce, Inc., and Trout Lake Club, letters of opposition to a proposed hotel/motel occupancy tax.

Lake George/Adirondack Regional Convention and Visitors Bureau, supporting continued examination of an occupancy tax, and providing a document entitled, "A Plan to Enhance Sales and Promotion of Tourism in Warren County: A Public-Private Partnership."

Warren County Local Development Corporation, Annual Report for 2001.

Crandall Public Library, 2001 Annual Report.

Annual Reports: Historian

Communications, resolutions and reports ordered placed on file.

Chairman called for reading of resolutions.

Mr. Gabriels requested a roll call on Resolution No. 306. He said this resolution proposed a modest fee increase to the programs and parking at Up Yonda Farm, which is run by the County in the Town of Bolton. He said he planned to vote in favor of the resolution recommended by the County Clerk opposing fee increases, and he planned to vote in opposition to the Lake George Park Commission fee increases. He said by voting against Resolution No. 306, he felt he was acting consistently.

Mr. Quintal requested a roll call on Resolution No. 348, which authorized a contract with Environmental Capital LLC to act as financial advisory counsel to Warren County relative to the Public Safety Building Project. Mr. Kenny commented on the resolution and said he felt sometimes the supervisors were "penny wise and pound foolish." He suggested to save a couple of thousand dollars the supervisors come up with alternatives that do not work. He urged the supervisors to reconsider their vote on this resolution, and pointed out that in very tough economic times, the County has had very good luck with the company recommended by the County Treasurer, Fiscal Advisors.

Mr. Caimano discussed Resolution No. 331, authorizing agreement with the City of Glens Falls for capital improvements to various recreational facilities, and asked if the funds allocated pursuant to the resolution were budgeted. Mr. Monroe replied yes, and the committee has attempted to clarify how the money was to be used for capital projects.

Mr. Caimano then discussed Resolution No. 319, adopting policies protecting individuals engaged in nonviolent civil rights demonstrations - Planning & Community Development, and asked for an explanation. Discussion ensued briefly, and Sheriff Cleveland and Mr. Quintal explained that in an audit recently by the federal government it was discovered the County does not have this policy stated and recognized as a policy. At the conclusion of further discussion as to the context of the resolution, Mr. Quintal moved to table the resolution for one month.

Mr. Belden suggested the idea of tabling the resolution be re-examined. He said it was his understanding that this resolution has to be passed before any grants are awarded this year, and not acting may jeopardize the County's grants. He mentioned that the Town of Hague also had to pass a similar resolution to state its compliance with these Federal guidelines.

Mr. Dusek explained that every time the Planning & Community Development Department puts in for grants through the Federal Government there is a check list of items that they must certify to, and one of the items they have to certify to is that the County has adopted a policy, as stated in Resolution No. 319. He further explained that the policy is driven by a Federal Law on the books that says if the County is to get any money from the Federal Government, it must adopt the policy. He concurred with Mr. Belden's remarks, noting it was important for the supervisors to move on this resolution right away so as not to jeopardize any future grants.

Dialogue ensued between Mr. Caimano and Mr. Dusek concerning the definition of "excessive force," and Mr. Dusek explained it was the same type of excessive force that one could be sued for in a civil rights action. He added that excessive force does have a legal definition that has been developed through the context of case law, which he said he was sure the Sheriff was aware of.

At the conclusion of the discussion, Mr. Quintal withdrew his motion to table Resolution No. 319, and Mr. Caimano requested a roll call vote on the resolution.

Mr. Caimano also spoke concerning Resolution No. 305, authorizing implementation and funding in the first instance of the Multi-Modal 2000 Program - aid eligible costs of a capital project, and appropriating funds therefor - Parks & Recreation. He referred to page

two of the resolution and said his interpretation was that it was saying if the funding for the whole railroad program fails, the county is responsible. He said he did not know that was what the County wanted to say.

Mr. Champagne recalled when the project first started, there was discussion over what would happen if everything failed. He noted one of the rationale discussed by Fred Austin (former Superintendent of DPW) was if everything "went south," the tracks, the timber, and the value of what was in the ground was more than enough salvage to cover what the County had put into the project. He said those were words he recalled very distinctly that caused him to move in the direction he moved in.

Mr. Dusek explained this was a grant funding program and the resolution was supplied as a "standard form resolution" and the county was requested to adopt it. He explained that the County has presented to the Federal Government a program and a total project cost. In return, he said, the Federal Government has agreed to provide a certain amount of money and the County is agreeing to put so much money into the project. What the resolution is saying, he continued, is if for some reason the project goes over the funding allowance (which will happen only with the County's authorization since they control the project), the County is agreeing to convene and put up either the County share of the overage, or the whole overage if the changes which resulted in additional funding costs were not agreed to by the Federal Government.

In reply to questioning, Chairman Thomas clarified the funding for the railroad for the information of the supervisors. Mr. Mallison asked if the resolution could be amended to say if the appropriation for the project was exceed that the supervisors would convene and "consider" appropriating such excess amounts. Mr. Dusek responded that the County would not fall short unless the supervisors authorize exceeding the project limit. He pointed out that the supervisors have control over the project. Mr. Dusek replied the primary purpose of the resolution is for the County to agree to advance the money up front.

Mr. Lamy indicated he had not been involved in the railroad project, but he thought this worked pretty much as the highway and bridge projects through DOT in that it is a reimbursement process. He explained that the County incurs the costs and submits for reimbursement. Any action that would cause the County to incur a cost was done through the committee, he continued, and through a resolution and contract. He said he felt this was where the control of the costs comes from.

Mr. Kenny requested a roll call vote on Resolution No. 305. Discussion was reiterated on the process and the procedures required through the committee system and the Board of Supervisors to change a contract. Mr. Dusek noted that Resolution No. 305 was no different than any bridge or highway resolution that has been done in the past.

Mr. Kenny spoke concerning Resolution No. 306, amending fee schedule for Up Yonda, and mentioned since he did not have an old fee schedule, he did not see how he could justify if the increases were legitimate or not. Mr. Gabriel said he did not recall all of the numbers, but one example was that last year it cost \$2 to park a car for all day, and the new fee proposal is for \$3 per day for parking. He said the percentage of increases across the board seem to be about 50 percent.

Mr. Haskell commented that Up Yonda is funded through a trust, and he said he imagined that Trust was hit by the financial changes which occurred recently. He said he thought the fee increases were needed to give the services currently provided. Mr. Tessier added that no county dollars are used for this site, and in order to maintain the service without getting into the principal of the trust fund, the costs have to be maintained. Mr. Belden added that these increases were recommended by the trustees. (Please refer to Parks & Recreation Committee meeting minutes of March 27th for details.)

Mr. Brower discussed Resolution Nos. 333 Bond Resolution for \$1,000,000 for renovation or replacement of the Municipal Center Roof, and Resolution No. 334, increasing the capital reserve project for Exterior Rehabilitation and Repair - Municipal Center. He noted he

read in the newspaper that the County received \$729,000 in non-securitized tobacco funds, and asked the County Treasurer if that was correct. Mr. O'Keefe replied that he did not see the news article, but he has received some e-mails. He noted nothing definite was received as yet.

Mr. Brower noted at the Finance & Personnel Committee on April 3rd, the repair of the roof was discussed, as was the source of funding. He noted Resolution No. 333 was to bond \$1,000,000 for the project, and he said he was concerned over bonding for a period of years to replace a roof. He asked if the non-securitized tobacco money could be used for this project. Mr. O'Keefe said he had nothing to reply at this point, but it could be discussed with the County Attorney. Mr. Champagne said he felt there was nothing wrong with a plan to do a five-year bonding to pay for renovation of a 20-year roof. At the conclusion of the discussion, Chairman Thomas said he felt this could be worked through, and he urged proceeding with the resolution as presented.

Mr. Robillard noted that Resolution No. 296 through 341 were mailed, and a motion was needed to bring Resolution Nos. 295 and 342 through 348 to the floor. Motion was made by Mr. Montesi, seconded by Mr. Belden and carried unanimously to bring Resolution Nos. 295 and 342 through 348 to the floor.

Chairman called for vote on the resolutions.

Resolution Nos. 295 through 349 were approved. Proclamations declaring Homes for the Aging Week, and Older Americans Month, were submitted.

WHEREAS, since 1986, the Warren County Sheriff's Department has maintained a closest car policy for the dispatching of the closest available law enforcement agency to police related calls for public safety services without regard to agency affiliation, and

WHEREAS, since 1978, Warren County has handled the receipt, handling and dispatch of all wireline 911 calls in the county through the Public Safety Answering Point, and

WHEREAS, Warren County passed Local Law No. 2 of 2001, recognizing the paramount importance of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Warren County and further recognizing that when the lives or property of its citizens are in imminent danger that appropriate assistance must be rendered as expeditiously as possible, and

WHEREAS, the Warren County Board of Supervisors recognizes that public safety assistance is increasingly summoned by wireless communications and that unintentional, though avoidable, delays in reaching the Public Safety Answering Point can and do occur to the detriment and jeopardy of life and property when such wireless 911 calls from within Warren County are rerouted to anywhere other than the single countywide Warren County Public Safety Answering Point which is under the jurisdiction of the Warren County Sheriff's Department, and

WHEREAS, Warren County bears all of the expenses for the maintenance, operation and functions of the Public Safety Answering Point, and

WHEREAS, the New York State Police receive all of the surcharges paid by wireless subscribers in Warren County, but does not have the expense of maintaining and operating the Warren County Public Safety Answering Point, now, therefore, be it,

RESOLVED, that the Warren County Board of Supervisors requests that the Governor and the New York State Legislature immediately enact legislation so that wireless 911 calls in New York state are routed to the Public Safety Answering Points across this state that are equipped to directly and without delay receive, dispatch and handle such calls, and be it further

BOND RESOLUTION DATED APRIL 17, 2002: A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF SERIAL BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WARREN, NEW YORK, IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,000,000.00 FOR THE RENOVATION AND/OR REPLACEMENT OF THE WARREN COUNTY MUNICIPAL CENTER ROOF

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren, New York, as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> For the object or purpose of the renovation and/or replacement of the Warren County Municipal Center Roof, as an unspecified betterment or improvement as the same is defined within New York State Finance Law §11.00, and any necessary and allowable preliminary costs associated therewith (all of which is hereinafter referred to as the "Capital Project") and to provide funds to defray the costs thereof, One Million Dollars (\$1,000,00.00) of general obligation serial bonds of the County of Warren, New York, shall be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law or the State of New York.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such Capital Project is One Million Forty-One Thousand One Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$1,041,180.00), and the plan for the financing of such maximum estimated cost of such Capital Project consists of the issuance of Serial Bonds in the amount of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,00.00), and the use of Forty-One Thousand One Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$41,180.00) available in Capital Reserve Project No. H.9551 42 280 (HR890-142) - Exterior Rehabilitation and Repair - Municipal Center as a result of prior resolutions adopted by the Board of Supervisors.

<u>Section 3.</u> It is hereby determined that subdivision 35 of subdivision (a) of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law applies to the aforesaid Capital Project or object or purpose, and that the lowest period of the probable usefulness thereof is five (5) years which in any event shall be the maximum period for which Bonds are authorized.

<u>Section 4.</u> The proposed improvement is a Type II Action under the State Environmental Quality Review Act and specifically SEQRA Regulation 617.5 and therefore not subject to review under said State Environmental Quality Review Act.

<u>Section 5.</u> The faith and credit of said County of Warren, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal and interest on such bonds, as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. There shall be annually levied on all of the taxable real property within said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as they become due and payable.

<u>Section 6.</u> Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in the anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the County Treasurer, the chief fiscal officer. 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RESOLUTION NO. 349 OF 2002 Resolution sponsored by Supervisors Belden and Bentley

AUTHORIZING MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN WARREN COUNTY AND WARREN COUNTY GENERAL UNIT OF WARREN COUNTY LOCAL 857 OF THE CIVIL SERVICE EMPLOYEES ASSOCIATION, INC. APPROVING FOUR-DAY WORK WEEK FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT AND AIRPORT DEPARTMENTS

RESOLVED, that Warren County enter into an agreement with Warren County General Unit of Warren County Local 857 of the Civil Service Employees Association, Inc., approving a four-day work week for certain Department of Public Works and Airport employees, for a term commencing June 3, 2002, and terminating September 8, 2002, and the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors be, and he hereby is authorized to execute a memorandum of understanding and such other documents that may be necessary to carry out the terms of this resolution, in the form approved by the County Attorney.

Adopted by unanimous vote.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Mrs. Clark, who mentioned last month she handed in the Annual Report of the County Clerk, but was unable to be present at the meeting. She pointed out that thanks to the good mortgage rates, in the year 2000 they took in \$493,000 for the county as a result of the increase in mortgage tax by one-quarter of a percent, and in the year 2001 they took in \$695,000. She acknowledged that this represents not only a lot of money, but a lot of work, and she commended her staff.

Mr. Mallison thanked Mrs. Clark for the terrific job she does, and he also thanked her and Mr. Kenny for bring the resolution forward to fight the State on a considerable tax increase.

Mr. Belden reported he attended the National Conference on Main Street Revitalization with Patricia Tatich, Director of Planning & Community Development. He said he had been in office 31 years, and this was one of the best organized conferences he ever attended, with the most information. He indicated he thought Ms. Tatich brought back a lot of information. He acknowledged the efforts of Ms. Tatich in getting the bests prices for the hotel and transportation, and said he felt she did an outstanding job. He added he was very impressed with Ms. Tatich at the conference and noted out of 50 states, 45 were represented. He concluded that at the next committee meeting he was going to recommend that Ms. Tatich be the County's planner for this conference. He said there was money to apply for and he urged the supervisors "to do their homework."

There being no further business, on motion by Mr. Belden, seconded by Mr. O'Neill the meeting adjourned at 12:00 noon.

WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING WEDNESDAY, MAY 15, 2002

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren convened at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center, Lake George, New York, at 10:01 a.m.

Mr. William Thomas presiding.

Salute to the flag was led by Supervisor Sheehan.

Roll called, the following members present:

Supervisors Gabriels, Monroe, Mallison, Sheehan, O'Connor, Kenny, Belden, Bentley, Thomas, Tessier, Bennett, Brower, Caimano, Morrell, Montesi, O'Neill, Haskell and Quintal - 18.

Absent: Supervisors Moynihan and Champagne - 2.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Supervisor Belden, who introduced Gerhard (Gary) Boyd, of the Town of Hague, who was being recognized as Warren County's Senior Citizen of the Year. He highlighted the accomplishments of Mr. Boyd and relayed stories which emphasized Mr. Boyd's altruistic nature. The New York State Special Achievement Award was presented and the board members responded with applause in recognition of the honoree.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Supervisor Gabriels, who introduced Frank Leonbruno, of the Town of Bolton, who was being recognized for the Warren County Outstanding Contribution by a Senior Award. He said it was a great honor to present this award on behalf of the citizens of the Town of Bolton and Warren County. He commented on his long acquaintance and friendship with Mr. Leonbruno and fondly referred to him as "Mr. Bolton Landing." He remarked on the many accomplishments by Mr. Leonbruno and encouraged him to keep writing and sharing his knowledge of the area with the residents. He presented the New York State Special Achievement Award to Mr. Leonbruno, and the board members responded with applause in recognition of his accomplishments.

Motion was made by Mr. Tessier, seconded by Mr. Belden and carried unanimously to approve the minutes of the April 17, 2002 board meeting, subject to correction by the clerk.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Anthony Cerro of Washington County, who distributed information on the Hudson Falls Trash Plant and his projected results relative to options the counties had before them for consideration. A copy is on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors with Solid Waste and Recycling Committee records. He recalled that last month, the supervisors listened to two presentations from two possible buyers, and since, then, have decided to hold contract talks with Wheelabrator. He explained that was why there was a column denoting issues relative to Wheelabrator only, and not the second interested buyer, Casella.

Mr. Cerro reviewed each of the issues he identified in the handout relative to the trash plant, and then reviewed his suggested impact under three scenarios, e.g., (1) Status Quo; (2) Selling to Wheelabrator; and (3) Buy Out by Warren/Washington Counties. He recommended, based on the presentation, that the counties should buy the trash plant.

The board members asked various questions during the presentation. Mr. Montesi referred to the \$8 million escrow shown under the "Buyout by the Counties" column entitled "Source of Funds for New Bond." He asked Mr. Dusek if this was not part of the bonding agreement whereby the bonding institutions say the counties need to have one year backup, and was it true this was not touchable unless all the bonds were paid off. Mr. Dusek replied currently, that is the way it is set up. He asked Mr. Monroe if under the new proposals would that need to be put into place. Mr. Monroe replied the financial advisors said they would probably have to have a debt service reserve even with the new financing. Mr. Monroe added, if the counties used the sales tax intercept concept and went with general obligation bonds, the debt service reserve might be able to be avoided. He pointed out, however, that it was just a function of when the money was paid, since the reserve is traditionally used to

pay the final year of a debt. Mr. Cerro pointed out he left the \$8 million out of the final calculation of benefits because of this, but he thought it was something for the supervisors to think about.

Mr. Cerro contended if the counties sold the trash plant to Wheelabrator, they would be doing the same exact thing they are currently doing with Foster-Wheeler, which is paying \$3 - \$4 million per year. He pointed out that the contracts would not change under the sale to Wheelabrator and no responsibilities would be taken away from the counties, so there would be no benefit whatsoever. He paraphrased remarks made by Mr. Tessier at the last meeting he attended, wherein Mr. Tessier said he regretted that he went along with the supervisors when they voted on the trash plant without investigating it. He stressed if the counties do not buy the plant and instead sell it to Wheelabrator, they are doing exactly the same thing the supervisors did ten years ago. He said the only difference is that now the supervisors know better and they know what is going to happen.

Mr. Cerro credited others for the ideas shown and indicated he was able to put them together to present to the supervisors. He recalled that Mr. Monroe said these same things a couple years ago and no one listened. He noted that next Friday he would present this same thinking to the Washington County supervisors, and hopefully someone would listen. In conclusion, Mr. Cerro acknowledged that the citizens work hard for their taxes and they were talking about serious money. He reiterated his recommendation for the counties to buy the trash plant, and said the counties would have all of the control from then forward.

Chairman Thomas thanked Mr. Cerro for his thoughtful presentation. He extended privilege of the floor to Supervisor Monroe to respond. Mr. Monroe asked Mr. Cerro who he would propose would operate the trash plant under the counties buying out the plant scenario, the counties or a contractor. Mr. Cerro responded they could do both. He said there were crews operating it now, or the operation could be put out to bid to see what comes up. He said he felt this procedure would certainly not cost as much as the counties are giving Foster Wheeler right now for profits.

Mr. Monroe recalled he proposed this four years ago, however, there are a number of problems. First, he noted that the counties do not know if the number that Wheelabrator would pay Foster-Wheeler is \$12 million. Secondly, Mr. Monroe referred to Mr. Cerro's handout concerning estimated deficits per year, and questioned where Mr. Cerro came up with the figures that the deficit if the counties sold to Wheelabrator would be \$3,334,000, and the deficit if the counties bought the plant was \$1,834,000. He asked if the difference represented the profits that Foster Wheeler would have made. Mr. Cerro said yes. Mr. Monroe replied he did not feel it was at all clear that the counties were capable of operating the plant, particularly with the way they have to operate with two solid waste committees, and two full boards of supervisors. He noted they have discussed with Energy Answers, Casella, and Wheelabrator whether they would be willing to be just an operator, and no one is interested in just being the operator. Mr. Cerro acknowledged that was because the counties would be cutting their profits. He pointed out that the counties are operating a \$100 million+ corporation now, and they are operating the trash plant whether they like it or not as they are involved every day. Mr. Monroe countered the counties are not involved in the day-to-day operations, just the big picture with items such as negotiating waste contracts. Mr. Cerro suggested the only thing the counties would have to do is hire an engineer and pay him a salary to take care of all of the crew and problems at the trash plant.

Mr. Monroe also addressed the projections relating to total equity in 2010, and said they believed total profits were closer to \$15 million, not the \$30 million projected over ten years. Mr. Cerro said he based this estimate on the money paid by the counties, and said if the counties give Foster Wheeler \$3 million per year, times ten years is \$30 million, plus they are paid for the operation. Mr. Monroe said they know Foster Wheeler gets \$1 million per year on the electric revenue and believe they make about \$.5 million on the operation and maintenance. Mr. Cerro countered he was using the counties' numbers and had estimated conservatively.

Regarding preventive maintenance, Mr. Monroe said all of the engineers they have asked to look at the operation, with the exception of this past year, said Foster Wheeler has been an excellent operator, and they have been in the 90 - 95 percent range. He noted the industry standard was about 85 percent. Mr. Cerro said he felt there were always ways to improve, and Mr. Monroe acknowledged that Wheelabrator had some ideas on how to improve the operation.

Mr. Monroe said the other major problem with county ownership is the tax issue. He noted if Warren County owns the plant in Washington County, or has interest in the plant, it appears they will be obligated to pay real property taxes. He said the estimated amount using current assessments could be as much as \$2 million per year. He said there were also procurement issues that do not exist if there is Industrial Development Agency (IDA) ownership instead of county ownership; and there are contract issues since the existing contracts are with the IDA, and if they are taken out of it, they have to be renegotiated. He reiterated that Wheelabrator is not willing to be just the operator, and they are willing to take the downside risks. He pointed out that all of Mr. Cerro's numbers were variable depending on what happens with tip fees and electricity revenues.

Mr. Cerro commented that right now, the plant is paying \$450,000 in PILOTS (payments in lieu of taxes). He said he did not feel there was any reason to change that, and the taxpayers were charged already \$6 million per year as a result of the deficit. He suggested even if the county had to pay the taxes on the plant, it would pay \$1.5 million based on a current appraisal, versus the \$6 million now being paid. He suggested the taxpayers were even paying more than \$6 million, because the breakeven point on trash fees is \$92 per ton, and the fee charged is \$69. He suggested the taxpayers were currently subsidizing outside counties.

Mr. Monroe pointed out that the biggest problem is that Washington County will never agree to county ownership, and they have made it clear. Mr. Cerro urged the county supervisors to do what is best for the taxpayers, not private companies.

Chairman Thomas pointed out that Warren County has had a lot of discussions about county ownership through the last year or so, and the issues mentioned by Mr. Monroe have come up. He said he felt Warren County had seriously considered what Mr. Cerro has presented today, but Warren County does not want to be the sole owner of a plant located in another county. Mr. Cerro replied he did not want Warren County to own the plant on its own. He said Warren County has had a problem from the beginning and if there was a way the taxpayers can get something back, he felt it was worth a try.

Chairman Thomas said that unfortunately, Mr. Cerro had to convince two county boards. Mr. Cerro said he would try harder in Washington County since that was his county. In conclusion, he presented a copy of case law to Mr. Dusek to review, noting it had to do with exactly what the counties have been doing in the past two years. He thanked the supervisors for listening, and Chairman Thomas thanked him again for his presentation.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Donald Sipp, President of Courthouse Estates Residents Association, who addressed the board members regarding the building projects proposed for the Warren County Municipal Center site. He said when the Public Safety Building (PSB) was announced, he started to receive a lot of inquiries and since then, there have been a lot of rumors, maybe some founded and maybe some unfounded. He said they were happy to say that Sheriff Cleveland was going to meet with the Association next Tuesday evening to explain how the PSB will fit into the property north of the Municipal Center, and how it will affect Courthouse Estates.

Mr. Sipp said the obvious concern was that the PSB will affect property values. He noted he discussed this with Sheriff Cleveland and the Sheriff had convinced him otherwise. He said they currently live across the street from the jail, and this is just going to be a little bigger. He said there has also been concern over the amount of trees that need to be cut, and some residents feel this will allow more noise from the Northway to penetrate into Courthouse Estates. He mentioned they currently have considerable noise because of the way the Northway is constructed.

Mr. Sipp remarked there have also been rumors that because the PSB will eliminate the present storage used by the buildings and grounds staff that there will be a need for some temporary, or possibly permanent, storage buildings to be built closer to Courthouse Estates. Again, he said the property value issue comes into account. He added there have also been rumors that the supervisors intend to possibly close off the Glen Lake Road entrance to the rear of the county complex. He said this was used by a lot of Courthouse Estate residents and Glen Lake residents as a way to get out onto Route 9, particularly during the season when The Great Escape was in operation. He pointed out that the line of sight to the south of Glen Lake Road is terrible and there is very little time for drivers to make a decision as to when to pull out of Glen Lake Road. He mentioned there was one fatality at that intersection and numerous accidents.

Mr. Sipp apprised that he and several residents petitioned the Town Board of Queensbury to ask the State to put up a light at that intersection, which the Town Board did. He said he has had correspondence with Mr. Olson of the State Department of Transportation (DOT) and DOT feels there are not enough accidents there to justify a light and they denied the request. If the County closes off the back entrance to the Municipal Center, he suggested that all traffic will have to go out Glen Lake Road, and he added he did not feel it was a safe corner, no matter what the State says. He indicated the residents were in hopes if this occurs, the County will have more leverage with the State than the residents and get this light installed

Mr. O'Neill mentioned as Chairman of the Traffic Safety Board that they also asked for a traffic light at that intersection and referred it to the Town of Queensbury. He said they got the same response. Mr. Sipp said if The Great Escape does their planned expansion, eventually they will be responsible for putting a traffic light at that intersection, because their entrance would be where The Samoset Motel is now.

Mr. Sipp presented considerations requested by the residents. One was if it was possible because of the way the PSB was situated next to Courthouse Drive, could the complex be moved closer to Route 9, therefore, giving a bigger buffer zone and allowing the height of the building to serve as a prevention of noise coming into the complex. Also, he asked the supervisors to consider the planting of conifers, arborvitae or pines of some kind on the east side of the proposed fire road which goes around the PSB to give the residents a "shield." He noted in the summertime, they would not be able to see the PSB, however, in the winter, the building will stand out very well, because what is left of the white pines that are there have no branches lower than 30 feet.

Mr. Sipp said he felt the building itself was a needed addition to the County and will be nice looking, but it does bother people that live in \$200,000-\$300,000 houses as to what effect this will have on their resale value. He reiterated they were concerned over the closing of the Municipal Center entrance off Glen Lake Road, and the possibility of a storage shed being temporarily or permanently built closer to Courthouse Estates than it already is.

Chairman Thomas thanked Mr. Sipp for his remarks, and asked Sheriff Cleveland if he had any comments.

Sheriff Cleveland assured that he and Mr. Sipp have been working together to make sure there was a complete open communication line between Courthouse Estates and the Sheriff's Department because they are the County's only real neighbors. He confirmed there was a meeting with this group on Tuesday night. He referred to Mr. Sipp's comments on the planting of trees on the eastern line of the property, and mentioned that two MRB Group people were present at the meeting and he was sure they would take note of the recommendation. He said it was a good idea and they would try to get it into the plan.

Dialogue ensued between Chairman Thomas and Sheriff Cleveland regarding the possibility of getting the State to agree to allow the County to move the Glen Lake Road entrance onto Route 9 further north, using County property, and thereby improving the line of sight south on Route 9. Chairman Thomas said he thought it was very difficult to get the State to agree to curb cuts, and he suggested a letter be written to the State asking for their review. Sheriff Cleveland said he felt someone needed to be specifically assigned to the task of finding out about the traffic patterns and specifically to talk to DOT regarding the issues.

Mr. Quintal asked if this discussion was a result of the County Facilities Committee studying that area as a possible site for the Buildings & Grounds Facility. Sheriff Cleveland said that was just a small piece, and the Courthouse Estates Residents Association was also concerned about having a traffic light at the corner of Route 9 and Glen Lake Road in the event the roadway is closed. Mr. Quintal noted the Buildings and Grounds Facility had to go up before September or they will not have anywhere to put machinery. He said he had a proposal to go to the County Facilities Committee on an alternate location, which if approved, would not affect the Glen Lake Road entrance to the Municipal Center. He said he was hesitant to present it today since he had not presented it to the County Facilities Committee. He said they physically went out and looked at the site, and because the buffer area is so poor in that area, they did not feel it was a good location for the facility. He said there was an area to put the facility in which would allow them to stay on the campus, and it will not affect the Courthouse Estates area. At the conclusion of brief discussion, it was the consensus of the supervisors that Mr. Quintal should bring his recommendation to the County Facilities Committee first.

Mr. Brower mentioned that the subject of the Glen Lake Road traffic light was discussed at the DPW Committee, and he asked Mr. Remington to address the issue. Mr. Remington acknowledged that the light has been a problem and it apparently does not meet the justification the State requires for lights because there have not been enough accidents. He said another issue is that the road through the Municipal Center is heavily used as an alternate path. He said it is clear if the back entrance is blocked off there will be more traffic at the intersection and it could be a problem. He said he gave something to DOT and he has been working up the ladder to try to get someone to listen. He assured they would get a response from DOT.

Sheriff Cleveland suggested that the Glen Lake light, the traffic light at the Municipal Center entrance/exit on Route 9 and the new traffic light proposed for the Tourism Building were one big picture. He said he felt if the County could come up with the right scenario, DOT would approve the request. He said he has talked with DOT and they want a plan to fix everything, and they do not want to talk about the lights individually. Chairman Thomas asked if the County was actually approaching DOT with a plan for all three lights. Mr. Montesi said he did not think so, because they have not even agreed on if there would be a Tourism Building, and if so, where.

Mr. Montesi asked where the meeting with Courthouse Estates Residents Association was next Tuesday night, and Sheriff Cleveland replied, in the downstairs classroom (beneath the Jail).

Chairman Thomas asked where the County should go from here to discuss the traffic light situation. Mr. Belden said he felt it should be done through the DPW Committee and the Traffic Safety Board. Chairman Thomas agreed, and referred the item to the DPW Committee. Mr. Belden asked Mr. Remington to get things moving by drawing up a Master Plan for the campus and getting it to the State. Mr. Brower urged that the plan include something to make sure the lights are timed properly so traffic would keep flowing.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Thomas Wade of Queensbury, who revisited the discussion Mr. Monroe and Mr. Cerro had relative to the trash plant. He said he felt Mr. Monroe seemed to be a little reluctant to look beyond what has already been experienced. He said he was on the board when people from both Warren and Washington Counties came and made alternate proposals and they had looked into the direction the counties were taking at that time and protested it. He said as he recalled the counties "got rid of them" and they were told to keep quiet and were given a SLAPP (strategic litigation against public participation) lawsuit. He suggested had the board members listened to the people more carefully, they would never have been in the "mess" they were in now. He said he would appreciate it if the supervisors would give a little more deep consideration to what Mr. Cerro was proposing. He pointed out that all the experts were not for hire, and there are some that are very sincere, decent people, and they are intelligent and willing to share their knowledge.

Mr. Caimano responded to Mr. Wade, and said as much as he admired him and liked what he did as a member of the Board of Supervisors, he could not be further wrong. He said the people Mr. Wade referred to were coming to the board meetings and he recalled meeting after meeting Mr. Cerro was telling the supervisors to stop paying and abandon the trash plant. All this while, he continued, Mr. Monroe was looking at one way after another to try to rescue the taxpayers. He suggested Mr. Wade was "way behind the curve."

The discussion returned to the facility plans for the Municipal Center campus, and Mr. Remington clarified that the subject of actual building locations would go through the County Facilities Committee, and once that was established, then the road work associated with the plan would go through the DPW. The supervisors concurred with the outline of responsibilities as stated by Mr. Remington.

Mr. Cerro returned to the dias and responded to Mr. Caimano's remarks. He clarified that he did not say anything was wrong with Mr. Monroe and he gave him credit for his thoughts and work. He also said he did not feel Mr. Caimano was correct when he said that he (Mr. Cerro) was in favor of stopping the payments on the trash plant. He added he was only in favor of stopping the payments because the supervisors did not know what they were supposed to be paying.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Sheriff Cleveland, who noted that Resolution No. 389 before the supervisors today would, if approved, determine that the Warren County Jail/Public Safety Facility Project would not have a significant impact on the environment and authorize a negative declaration to be prepared under the New York State SEQRA (State Environmental Quality Review Act). He introduced representatives from MRB Group, Pat Nicoletta, Civil Engineer, and Wayne Skala, Project Manager, who were in attendance to make a brief presentation on the Project.

Mr. Dusek noted that this is a "Proposed" Negative Declaration under SEQRA and the Board of Supervisors do not have to adopt it if they feel it is inappropriate. He noted the supervisors needed to look at the building project and the environmental issues, and, he noted, the supervisors also received a memorandum from his office which enclosed various forms and noting that certain information was on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors. As the third phase, he continued, MRB Group was present to go over those documents so that the members of the board, since Warren County is the lead agent for SEQRA purposes, can make decisions as to whether or not they feel there will be or will not be an impact. He stressed that the resolution which the supervisors had was a Proposed Negative Declaration, but it is the decision of the board to make after hearing from the MRB Group.

A schematic of the Municipal Center campus was displayed and privilege of the floor was extended to Mr. Nicoletta who proceeded with a review of the SEQRA documentation on the Warren County Jail/Public Safety Building (PSB). A copy of the information he reviewed is in writing and on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors with Sheriff & Communications Committee records.

As Mr. Nicoletta commenced his review, he noted that he would be giving an overview of the project, and particularly noting the revisions made in Part I from November 2001, when the document was originally submitted, to May 2002. He made mention of the fact that there is currently a DPW facility in the area where the PSB construction is proposed and it will be vacated and relocated. He noted that the new PSB parcel was approximately 20.5 acres, and they will be using about 10.4 acres to construct the facility.

Pursuant to Part 1 of the SEQRA Declaration, Project Information (page two of the Document), Mr. Nicoletta noted the PSB would be approximately 116,000 square feet in size and will include inmate housing units for a minimum of 145 inmates. Referring to the schematic, he pointed out that the upper portion of the building will be for Sheriff operations, emergency services, and communications, and the lower portion would be for inmate population. He said the proposal also provided for utility improvements, and a new sub-surface disposal system to handle the sanitary sewage.

Mr. O'Neill commented that the supervisors were in hopes that the sewage will be hooked into the Queensbury sewer line when it is built. Mr. Nicoletta concurred, noting they were currently looking at an individual system, but if the Queensbury sewer lines become available by the time the project is completed, they would definitely tie into it. Mr. Skala interjected there have been discussions with the construction manager about pushing that part of the project off and giving the greatest amount of time possible to take advantage of using the Queensbury line.

Mr. Montesi asked the location of the tanks and leach fields as presently proposed, and Mr. Nicoletta replied on the north side of the site, and he identified it more particularly using the schematic. If the new sewer line becomes available, he noted it may be necessary to pump the sewage to it. Mr. Brower asked if MRB Group has spoken to the Queensbury Sewer Department, and Mr. Nicoletta said he talked with Mr. VanDusen about the water, but he has not discussed the sewer completely yet. Mr. Brower said one of the Town of Queensbury's goals is to extend the sewer to enable tie-ins along Route 9, up to Route 149. He said they were aggressively pursuing it.

Mr. Nicoletta next outlined the roadways and parking plan, noting the site was planned for accommodation of approximately 204 spaces.

As Mr. Nicoletta continued his review of Part 1, he highlighted the changes made in the project as a result of its evolution from November 2001, to present. Originally, he noted they had 19.7 acres for the site and it was refined to 20.5 acres.

Mr. Montesi asked if the site will require a sedimentation pond, and Mr. Nicoletta replied yes, and he described the plan. He assured the site will be protected during construction per DEC requirements. Mr. Montesi asked if afterwards, would there be a pond on the site. Mr. Nicoletta replied yes. He said there was an existing pond now that services the county complex, and the upper portion of the PSB will be able to drain to that pond, as it will be expanded to accommodate that. He noted the lower portion of the structure will not be able to drain to that pond by gravity, so they are proposing that another retention area be made in the northeast corner. He pointed out that this would mean there would be no peak drainage off-site after construction. Mr. Montesi said the northeast corner of the parcel was closer to Courthouse Estates, and Mr. Nicoletta concurred. He said this was preliminary right now, and they will try to keep the site as far from Courthouse Drive as they can. He noted that after construction, the area would be a retention pond in a grassed area, similar to what is already located on the Municipal Center property. He said he could not comment on depth right now because the project has not gone that far yet in the design. Mr. Montesi said he felt the County needed to know something about this in preparation for next Tuesday's meeting with the Courthouse Estates residents.

Mr. Nicoletta continued his review. Referring to pages three and four of Part 1, he reiterated the Project Description for the information of the supervisors. He noted that the parking spaces changed from 150 to 204 based on needs. He said originally, the maximum vehicle trips per hour were estimated at 100, however, they actually determined (based on a traffic study) it was 67 vehicle trips per hour. He said that is basically a 11-trip increase at peak hours based on the current facility. Another change he noted, was the building dimension, which was just due to the programming and development. He apprised the building went from 100,000 square feet initially, to 116,000 square feet of floor area. He said part of that is due to the split-level. He noted another change was that approximately 8.4 acres of vegetation will be disturbed (previously was 6.4 acres). He said they also originally estimated this would be a single phase project, but it will be a multi-phase project as it was MRB's understanding that there would be some preliminary site work done before actual construction of the building starts. He added, however, that the time frame for the project was still 18 months. Lastly, Mr. Nicoletta noted that the water usage per day was slightly changed from 15,000 gallons per day, originally, to 18,000 gallons per day.

Mr. Nicoletta proceeded with a review of Part 2 - Project Impacts and Their Magnitude (page seven). Mr. Nicoletta referred to Part 3 Attachment under this Section, entitled "Evaluation of the Importance of Impacts," and outlined in detail the sections where the answers on effect were yes. This information is included in writing and is part of the Documentation Report.

Mr. Brower questioned the fact that although the building increased 16,000 square feet, the parking spaces increased from 150 spaces to 204. He asked the reason for such a large increase in parking spaces. Sheriff Cleveland responded to the question, noting that they came up with a need for 150 spaces until they completed Part 1 of the SEQRA Form. He noted they have four visitations, and they bring in four people at once to visit. He said the new facility has 24 visitations, which means they will bring in a potential of 48 people at once to visit on a particular day. Mr. Caimano asked if it was prescribed by law that the County has to provide this amount of parking space. Sheriff Cleveland replied it was not a legal statute, and it was done by a study to determine the number of people that would be needing parking spaces at any given time.

Mr. Brower pointed out that Resolution No. 389 provides for 200 parking spaces, and Mr. Dusek suggested that at the appropriate time, the resolution be amended to reflect the SEORA Document.

In reply to further questioning, Mr. Nicoletta explained the planning process which resulted in the parking recommendations as discussed. He noted the parking areas were located north and west of the facility. Mr. Caimano asked if because of the land terrain and possibly the need for fill, was this increase in parking space adding to the cost of the project. Sheriff Cleveland pointed out the natural contour of the land at the site is to go down about 15 feet, and that was why parking spaces were placed down 15 feet at the lower level. He said the space projections were also based on the number of employees in the department, and the number coming to work that are crossing shifts at the same time, the number of people coming in to visit inmates, and the number of spaces needed for parking vehicles, such as trailers, etc.

Mr. Belden asked how much it would cost to increase the parking from 150 spaces to 204. Sheriff Cleveland said he did not think the numbers were ever developed on 150 spaces, except for the initial needs survey. He assured they have stayed within the budget originally proposed.

Mr. Belden asked for an explanation of the funding for this project and the \$23 million in bonding authorized in Resolution No. 390. Mr. Robillard noted that \$3 million of the bonding was for communications and \$20 million was for the PSB. In addition, he noted the supervisors put \$4 million in a capital project from tobacco securitization money. Sheriff Cleveland added that the resolution cites the project totals, but the bond number is \$23 million. Mr. Belden asked if overruns and extras were built into this bonding, and Sheriff Cleveland replied yes. He said the design contingency built in was eight percent, and the construction contingency figure was ten percent.

Mr. Caimano suggested that this change from 150 parking spaces to 200 spaces was the kind of thinking that takes a \$23 million project and makes it a \$30 million project. He urged the supervisors to be careful about what they do incrementally.

Mr. Mallison asked what was the cost of separate pods, and referred to the potential to add the fifth pod that was being provided for under this project. He asked if it might make sense for the County to bond now to buy that pod, and then rent it out to someone so the County would have it if they reach capacity sooner than anticipated, which they could according to Sheriff Cleveland's numbers.

Sheriff Cleveland replied that the cells cost between \$16,000 and \$18,000 to build, but that would not be reflective and it could not be multiplied by 32 (number of cells in a pod) to come up with a cost of a pod. Mr. Skala noted Sheriff Cleveland had provided the cost of a prefabricated shell, but to put it in the housing unit of a pod with all of the necessary backup, the cost would be \$3.5 to \$4 million, which would add to the cost of the project. He noted that the project was being developed with all of the infrastructure, i.e., a kitchen, medical and whatever is needed for backup for the fifth pod. He concluded that the fifth pod could be added today without any design change to the infrastructure.

Sheriff Cleveland referred to the discussion on parking spaces, and said he would check it again and get back to his committee. Mr. Skala outlined the proposed parking portion of the design in detail for the information of the supervisors. He also explained the

thought process involved with the building design and noted they developed the split-level concept to take advantage of the site contours that exist. Mr. Montesi raised questions regarding information that there would be a covered area for some cars, and he asked the size of that area. Mr. Skala noted they would be providing about 30 spaces for patrol cars so that they would be ready to go during inclement weather. He noted it was an open canopy similar to what would be found at a parking building, and assured it was very economical.

Mr. Morrell asked about the paved area where the Sheriff's Department currently exists and would that be torn up. Sheriff Cleveland said he thought when the County Facilities Committee met, they had plans for that area.

Chairman Thomas referred to Mr. Mallison's previous question on the idea of bonding more right now to do the additional pod, and said he did not feel his question was answered. Mr. Mallison said the reason he brought it up was because he thought the pod was a mobile unit, and it was something that could be rented out to other people to make money. Now that he said he knew it was something that has to be constructed, he said the idea made sense not to build it.

Mr. Monroe recalled when he first came on the board, the county was receiving revenue of about \$300,000 per year for boarding prisoners, and now the County is paying out about \$600,000 per year to board its own prisoners. He said every time he hears about a jail being built in some county, they are talking about building on extra space to board inmates, and he wondered if there were any projections on the need for boarding in. Sheriff Cleveland said they have not planned on boarding anyone in because they did not want to give figures that they cannot produce later. He said he suspected they would be boarding in prisoners, but he did not want to include it in the numbers. Sheriff Cleveland said if it came to the floor, his recommendation would not be to build the fifth pod yet, because it may sit empty and the County would still have to pay the bond.

Mr. Gabriels referred to comments made by Mr. Sipp earlier in the meeting and recalled he had wondered if the facility could be shifted closer to Route 9. Mr. Gabriels queried whether that alternative had been looked at. Sheriff Cleveland said originally, the plan had been to put the Tourism Building at Exit 20 of the Northway on the county property. If the PSB is shifted forward, he said there would not be room for it. Secondly, he noted they have gotten to the point now that it would be expensive to redesign the building and move it.

Mr. Gabriels asked if adoption of the SEQRA Declaration today meant the County was fixed into the specific configuration being described. Chairman Thomas said he thought it meant the County was quite a way down the road on the project. Sheriff Cleveland indicated he felt the County was locked in as the SEQRA has been performed on a particular design. If this is changed, he said the County would be back to SEQRA again. Mr. Mallison asked if the addition of smaller trees to block the line of sight between the PSB and Courthouse Estates change the SEQRA Determination. Sheriff Cleveland replied no.

Mr. Caimano said he felt they were making a major change in the permeability of this land with all the parking spaces and a new building. He asked for confirmation that there was more than adequate arrangements for that. Mr. Nicoletta replied yes. He added that they considered what is existing at the site now and what actually will be developed. He said the decisions to increase the existing pond and add the other one have been made to accommodate this plan. Mr. Skala also made a point that Mr. Nicoletta and Mr. Remington visited the sites a few months ago and they did some tests to see the permeability of the land. He said the land is so granular it actually sucks water in quicker than they wanted to happen. He concluded that he did not see it happening very much that there would be a pond with standing water because of this percolation rate.

Sheriff Cleveland commended Mr. Remington and the DPW staff for their assistance at the site, and he noted they have saved the County a lot of money. He described the services they performed, including digging pits, cutting down trees and digging for the soil borings. He added that Mr. Remington planned for the DPW to take the buildings down, and although he said he could not estimate the amount they saved, it was a lot. He also acknowledged Mr. Quintal's efforts (Chairman of County Facilities Committee) to keep the project moving and not hold up anything for the PSB project.

Mr. Nicoletta continued with the review of Part 2 of the SEQRA Declaration, noting under Impact on Water, there was no impact noted on Item Numbers 3 and 4. Relative to Item Numbers 5 and 6, he explained the effects of the project on surface or ground water quality or quantity. This information is set forth in writing under "Part 3 Attachment - Project Impact and their Magnitude."

Mr. Nicoletta noted there was no impact on air (Item No. 7), plants and animal (Item No. 8 and 9), agriculture land resources (Item No. 10), aesthetic resources (Item No. 11), historic and archaeological resources (Item No. 12), open space and recreation (Item No. 13), critical environmental areas (Item No. 14), transportation (Item No. 15), and energy (Item No. 16). Regarding noise and order impacts (Item No. 17), Mr. Nicoletta explained the effects, noting the only time there would be any impact was during construction for an eighteen-month period. (Please refer to Part 3 Attachment for details.) Also, he noted there was no impact on public health (Item No. 18). Regarding impact on growth and character of community or neighborhood (Item No. 19), Mr. Nicoletta explained the proposed action will create a requirement for additional staff and it was anticipated that 10 new staff members will be needed at the facility. (Please refer to Part 3 Attachments for details.)

Sheriff Cleveland interjected that this did not include the need for security positions. Mr. Monroe asked how many construction jobs were anticipated, and Mr. Nicoletta estimated 100.

Referring to page 12 of Part 2 of the Declaration, Mr. Nicoletta reviewed Item Number 20 and noted the evaluation of the importance of impacts. He pointed out they were not aware of any public controversy.

Mr. Brower said the County was told there would be considerable cost savings if they were able to connect the PSB to a municipal sewer system and eliminate the need for a septic system and fields. He asked when the construction phase of this portion of the project has to occur, and said he hoped it would be one of the last things constructed, other than the pipes coming out of the facility. Sheriff Cleveland confirmed this has been put as the last thing they will do. Mr. Brower asked for the time frame for the project, and Sheriff Cleveland replied they hope to open the facility on June 2, 2004.

Mr. Skala added that based on the finish date for the project, they could back off by about six or seven months to the "drop dead" date when they could do a tap out and construct the sewage field. Mr. Brower confirmed they were really talking November or December of 2003 as the latest date, then, and Sheriff Cleveland concurred it would be the fall of 2003.

Mr. Skala commented that they have no idea as to how deep underneath the street the sewer line will run because there is a lot of contour to the land. He said if the line is 30 feet down, they could probably do a gravity flow from the PSB; however, if it was higher, they will have to pump. Mr. Brower said he did not think they would be 30 feet down as it was excessive in his opinion. Mr. Nicoletta said that was why they indicated the need for a pump station to pump solids up to the street and into the main line.

Mr. Brower asked what was the estimated savings for the project if they go to a municipal sewer. Sheriff Cleveland said they have heard numbers between \$100,000 and \$250,000, but they will not know for sure until they go to bid. Sheriff Cleveland said the last he heard, there was no reasonable expectation that the Town of Queensbury would do this line by the fall of 2003, and he asked Mr. Brower if that had changed. Mr. Brower replied they have never stopped moving forward, even during negotiations (with the City).

Mr. Montesi asked if the need for a pump station eliminated the savings involved in going to a municipal sewer, and Mr. Nicoletta replied no. He estimated the cost for a pumping station at \$60,000. Mr. Quintal said the total cost that was estimated for the leach fields, etc. was \$560,000-\$580,000. He said that there would be longer piping to go to a municipal sewer and a pumping station, but other than that, the rest would be savings.

Mr. Brower said he acknowledged that delays could happen, but he was taking the optimistic view that there would be municipal sewer service available for the PSB. Mr. Skala asked Mr. Brower to keep the design team informed of any progress made and any target dates. Mr. Brower reiterated his suggestion that MRB Group meet with the Queensbury Waste Water Department. Mr. Skala acknowledged the request and said they would love to do that.

Mr. Quintal suggested it may be a good idea to put in a pumping station, because then the sewer and leach field on the north side of the property will need a pumping station to get to the municipal sewer also.

Chairman Thomas said if Queensbury is close to having the sewer line available and the County needs a system in order to open their facility, how will the two be combined to make it work. Mr. Quintal asked if the existing facility could be expanded to incorporate, rather than building a new field. Mr. Nicoletta said the only concern now is they have been told the existing system was at capacity and could not handle any additional flow, and that was why the new system was proposed. He said they would need to know fairly quickly in order to construct a joint pump station for both facilities.

Mr. Gabriel referred to the impact of traffic as cited in the Declaration. He pointed out the discussion earlier in this meeting looked upon the campus question. He noted the traffic question was something the County was going to study, and he wondered if the answer to the question should be changed. He suggested that, based on the fact that there was a meeting next Tuesday with the Courthouse Estates residents, the County was not completely out of the controversy per se, and wondered if the answer to that item should be yes, pending a final agreement between Sheriff Cleveland and the Association. Chairman Thomas said he felt the meeting would resolve questions, and thought the item could better be answered as no, rather than changing it to yes. Sheriff Cleveland said there has not been any controversy at Courthouse Estates and he did not think there was going to be.

Mr. Dusek interjected that controversy means that the County has opposition, basically. He said right now, he felt there were concerns and people who want more information, which they are going to get. He said at this point, in terms of the best answer at the moment, it would seem the County would not predict controversy unless the board disagrees. Therefore, he said he thought the best answer right now was no. He added he felt the issue was whether the board members felt they have enough information to move ahead with the SEQRA document. He said if the supervisors felt uncomfortable with answering no to that question, the better option might be to delay the SEQRA.

Chairman Thomas asked Mr. Sipp if he viewed Tuesday's meeting as a discussion with Sheriff Cleveland to see what he can do to handle some of the concerns of the Courthouse Estates residents. For example, he said the residents wondered about moving the building closer to the road; however, it appears if the County goes forward, that will not happen. He asked if that created a controversy. Mr. Sipp replied no. He said he did not feel there was much controversy associated with the PSB. He said he lived across from one of the pods, and in the summer, he will not even be able to see the building. He said he was hoping the plan could be tweaked to handle the problem in the winter when the leaves from the trees will not be blocking the view. He added there were people further south than him in the development, and they hear the thump of the basketball court and the shouts and screams. He said it was his understanding that the building would be sealed and this problem, as well as people calling out the windows would be alleviated. He also remarked there were people in the rear portion of the Courthouse Estates on McCormick Drive who could care less and they will never see or drive by the PSB. He suggested the DPW storage building be moved where it was not in plain sight of the residents and that it be situated so that the noise at 4:00 a.m. when the plows are coming out is not a disturbing factor. Mr. Remington mentioned they have another location for the salt storage building to be presented at the next County Facilities Committee meeting and if approved, it would minimize some of that 4:00 a.m. problem being discussed. He assured they were trying to address the concerns.

Mr. Quintal referred to discussion on the current septic system and noted discussion wherein it was said it was at capacity. He pointed out that 80 percent of the capacity in that system is because of the Jail and when the new facility is built, they are taking that away. He suggested if they designed and built to pump to the current facility, they would still pick up that 80 percent capacity of the system. He suggested it be looked into so they could pump from the PSB to the current facility until the sewer lines are completed. Mr. Brower agreed, and said he also felt the county's current system could be pumped more frequently until a connection could be made.

Mr. Gabriels said according to his understanding, if the PSB were shifted more toward Route 9, none of the SEQRA answers would change on the site. He said piping would change and designs would change. Mr. Caimano said he thought that would require a new SEQRA, however, Mr. Dusek said he did not necessarily agree with that. Sheriff Cleveland responded that they were told they would have to do a SEQRA when they added the fifth pod. Mr. Dusek said he thought that was different, and right now they were talking about moving a building slightly over. He said he felt they would need to take a look at how much they were talking and whether or not it would have an impact. If and when the supervisors decided this, he said they would have to go back and revisit SEQRA.

Mr. Quintal pointed out that MRB Group would have to redesign the whole building to move it, and the cost of the design was more than \$1 million to begin with.

Chairman Thomas referred to Resolution No. 389, page two, and noted the resolution needed to be amended to indicate 204 parking spaces, instead of 200, as is currently stated. Mr. Caimano said it was his understanding that the Sheriff was going to revisit that part of the project, and he suggested, therefore, that the resolution be amended to leave this out until he has an answer. Mr. Dusek explained all that part of the resolution did was characterize the two Environmental Assessment Forms, as there was a first form that said 150 parking spaces, and a second form that said 204. He recommended correcting the 100 to 150 and correct the 200 to 204. He said that did not preclude the supervisors from eliminating parking spots later on if they are able to do so.

Motion was made by Mr. Caimano, seconded by Mr. Morrell to amend Resolution No. 389, as stated by the County Attorney and Chairman of the Board. Clerk noted amendment for the record.

Motion was made by Mr. Montesi, seconded by Mr. Bentley and carried unanimously to bring Resolution No. 389 to the floor.

Chairman called for a vote on the resolution.

Resolution No. 389 was approved.

RESOLUTION NO. 389 OF 2002

Resolution introduced by Supervisors Monroe, O'Neill, Belden, Morrell, Bennett, Brower, O'Connor, Bentley and Tessier

DETERMINING THAT THE WARREN COUNTY JAIL/PUBLIC SAFETY FACILITY PROJECT WILL NOT HAVE A SIGNIFICANT IMPACT ON THE ENVIRONMENT AND PROVIDING THAT A NEGATIVE DECLARATION SHALL BE PREPARED, FILED AND TRANSMITTED AS PROVIDED FOR UNDER NEW YORK STATE SEQRA REGULATIONS

WHEREAS, it is proposed that the Warren County Board of Supervisors authorize the construction of a Warren County Jail/Public Safety Facility, and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 645 of 2001, the Warren County Board of Supervisors, among other things, preliminarily classified the project as a Type I Action, identified involved agencies and determined that it desired to assume lead agency status, and

WHEREAS, by letter dated November 16, 2001, the Warren County Sheriff transmitted Part 1 of a Full Environmental Assessment Form (EAF), a location map, a response form and cover letter to the involved agencies, and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 148 of 2002, the Warren County Board of Supervisors declared itself as lead agent and directed the Sheriff to notify all involved agencies of the declaration, arrange for the completion of the EAF and present the same to the Board of Supervisors for consideration and such action as may be appropriate, and

WHEREAS, there has now been filed with the Clerk of the Warren County Board of Supervisors a document titled "SEQRA documentation for Warren County Jail/Public Safety

Facility New York State Route 9 Town of Queensbury dated May 1, 2002 and identifying the Warren County Board of Supervisors as the lead agency" which documentation contains a revised EAF Part 1 setting forth, among other things, an increase in size of the building, (from one hundred thousand (100,000) square feet to one hundred sixteen thousand (116,000) square feet) and increased parking spaces, (from one hundred fifty (150) to two hundred four (204)), increasing/changing acres of land effected and revising certain other information in the original EAF based on better information now available, and

WHEREAS, by way of memo dated May 2, 2002, the revised EAF together with proposed responses, a proposed EAF Part 2 and a proposed Part 3 attachment, a proposed negative declaration and a proposed negative declaration attachment, a list of involved agencies, a location map were forwarded to the members of the Warren County Board of Supervisors, which memo also advised that the appendices were on file with the Clerk of the Warren County Board of Supervisors for their review, and

WHEREAS, a representative of the MRB Group, Inc. has on this date, made a presentation to the Warren County Board of Supervisors concerning the SEQRA documentation, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that upon consideration of the revisions to the project and original EAF as set forth in the revised EAF and with the understanding that the proposed SEQRA documentation has been developed and/or drafted based upon the revised information and considering the nature of the revisions, it is hereby determined that the revisions to the project and/or EAF same are minor and do not significantly change the character of the project as was previously reported to the other involved agencies, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the: 1) proposed responses in the EAF Part 2 (project impacts and their magnitude) are hereby approved and adopted; 2) proposed EAF Part 3 is hereby approved and adopted; and 3) proposed negative declaration and reasons supporting such determination (negative declaration attachment are hereby approved and adopted, and be it further

RESOLVED, that it is determined that the project will not result in any large or important impacts and, therefore, is one which will not have a significant impact on the environment, therefore a negative declaration shall be prepared and forwarded by the Sheriff to the involved agencies and placed on file with the Clerk of the Warren County Board of Supervisors.

Due to the lengthy agenda, Chairman Thomas dispensed with committee reports for May. However, he extended privilege of the floor to Supervisor Caimano to speak concerning the Revenue Enhancement Committee meeting.

Mr. Caimano apologized for not attending the meeting, noting he was unavoidably taken somewhere else. He said it was his intent to ask the board members to put onto the floor a resolution asking the intent on what the supervisors should be doing. He said it was his feeling this was a very deliberative board and they needed to be talking about the bed tax and to refine ways to increase the County's revenue through the vehicle known as the bed tax.

Chairman Thomas added the last discussion the supervisors had was to include the bed tax in next year's budget. He said he felt they needed some preparation if they were going to do so.

Motion was made by Mr. Caimano, seconded by Mr. Kenny to introduce a resolution pursuant to Mr. Caimano's comments.

Mr. Tessier said he felt it was premature to do this, as there was a private group who has scheduled eight meetings to talk to the people about the bed tax. He said the supervisors agreed previously that they would pursue the bed tax with the people involved in it over the summer months to get an opinion. He said there have been two meetings and six more

are scheduled, and he thought it was premature for the board members to take a position until they know what the public has said. Mr. Caimano said he thought Mr. Tessier was misunderstanding him. He said he had no intention of not listening to what those meetings have to say. He remarked his feeling has been that there is some dissension and concern on the part of board members over moving forward. He said all he was asking is a sense as to whether they keep moving.

Mr. Bennet said that Mr. Kenny asked for a resolution from the Revenue Enhancement Committee to bring the question before the full board. He said because he felt it was inappropriate for the committee to ask for that, he voted no. However, he added he did not think it was inappropriate for Mr. Kenny or Mr. Caimano to propose it to all of the supervisors. He said there was a major concern over a plan, and in his attendance at the forums (held by the private group) up to this point, this has been a major issue. He discussed how this fits into the supervisors' decision today on whether to go forward, and said he was unsure if this would create problems with public perception of the intention of the board members in regard to listening and then making decisions.

Mr. Tessier said he was not opposed to a bed tax, but there was no plan and he felt the committee should move forward, and that was what they were doing. He said he did not know why another resolution was needed to move forward. Chairman Thomas said that the discussion has been that during this time period should they come up with a plan for the use of the money if a bed tax was enacted. He said that has not been decided yet, and they need to move forward. He said they have not moved far and he thought the purpose of the resolution was to see what the perception of the board was. Mr. Tessier said he felt the committee should continue to look at the bed tax and come up with a plan. Right now the public proposals are outrageous, he said. Chairman Thomas replied that was what they wanted to correct by establishing a plan and get it out to the public.

Mr. Kenny said he supported going forward with the bed tax, and added he has always supported the concept. He said that this was year five of discussing various revenue enhancements for Warren County. After five years, he said it was frustrating that he did not know what direction they were heading in. He said all he wanted to know is if the supervisors wanted to proceed with the bed tax. If it is the will of the board to proceed, he said then it should be incumbent upon the Revenue Enhancement Committee to come back with a plan.

Mr. Brower said he supported Mr. Caimano's motion. He said he felt the committee needed a sense of what the board wanted to do. Mr. Brower said he felt the critical point was who was paying that tax, and it is the tourists who have benefitted by coming to this area and benefitted by the services provided by the County, and this tax would be used to increase tourism promotion in hopes of drawing more people to the region.

Mr. Caimano said he received a memorandum from Essex County showing that not only did they gain on the bed tax, but they did so quicker than they thought. He said he felt by Essex County doing the advertising, they probably took people from Warren County. He added he felt there was a certain disingenuous about the plan. He recalled he asked a small group of up-county supervisors to sit with him, and he remembered Mr. Gabriels, Mr. Tessier and Mr. Thomas being there. He said at that time he read a four-page document about the outline of what he thought should be done with the money, and it seems to be forgotten. He acknowledged that did not mean everyone agreed with it, but to say there was no plan was wrong. He said they know where they are going to spend the money, for more advertising of this County, and to hire a professional to work with the Tourism Department to do those things. He said there was also talk that some of that money might be used for the Tourism Center.

Chairman Thomas pointed out that was Mr. Caimano's plan coming from the Revenue Enhancement Committee, which has not been adopted by the Board of Supervisors, and he said he thought what Mr. Kenny was looking for was an opinion from the board members on where they were going on this issue.

Mr. Bennett said he was disappointed by supervisor attendance at the forums being held on the bed tax. He noted that three supervisors were at the Bolton forum, and he was the only one at the Lake George forum. He said he was disappointed that the supervisors could not come and listen to people talk about their concerns. He said he felt in this room it was very hard to hear the people and get a sense of where everyone is at. He commended the people who are doing the forum and said they were learning what it was like to be a politician as they seek information from the public. He commented he hoped that for the remaining six forums scheduled there will be other supervisors that will make an effort to be present. He said he recognized everyone had a busy schedule, but pointed out it was very enlightening to listen to the people on their home turf.

Mr. Bennett said he thought another major concern was not only the dedication of the funds from an occupancy tax for the purpose of promoting county tourism, but also that the County would not move in and do what the State did in relation to the education and the lottery. He noted on the State level, for each \$1 put into education, they took one away. He said he found there was a great concern that the budget for tourism in the County would only go up to the extent of the occupancy monies raised, and what the County currently puts into the budget would be taken out and redirected. He said he thought that needed to be part of the stated plan.

Mr. Kenny agreed that this needed to be part of the plan. He said he felt there needed to be a clear distinction made between Visitors and Convention Bureau meetings currently going on and the County Board meetings, as they were two separate entities. He remarked that the County had its own Revenue Enhancement meetings and they opened hearings to the public, and this is year five of the process. He suggested to simply drag on and on accomplished nothing. He said he listened to the Visitors and Convention Bureau and was supportive of that organization; however, he added that there were members of the board who were not. He concluded that he did not feel that the County needed to wait for the Visitors and Convention Bureau to tell the County what to do.

Mr. Monroe said that one concern he has had was that when the Revenue Enhancement Committee got started, what he was hoping was that the County would find a way to take part of the burden off the real property taxes, avoid future increases in real property taxes, and preferably reduce them. He said it seemed to him that what came out of the study was that this would be possible with a sales tax increase, but would not be possible with a bed tax increase. He concluded he was not totally opposed to the bed tax idea, but he did not feel it did what the committee was originally formed to do. He said that many of his constituents have said to him if he could show them where they will reduce property taxes by one-third, they would support a one percent sales tax increase. He asked what was happening with the sales tax.

Mr. Caimano said he felt the issue was whether the committee keeps going. He responded to Mr. Monroe's remarks and apprised it was the consensus of many who spoke, that by raising the sales tax, the County would not do what the supervisors said. He suggested if the sales tax is raised one percent, to knock off one-third of the real property tax, the amount of what the County gained almost equals what they would get on the bed tax anyway, without the danger of people leaving the County to shop somewhere else. He suggested this could be argued by the supervisors as reasonable people, and he acknowledged that there are people who have those concerns on the board and the concept should be argued. He said his point was that this should be handled on a vigorous schedule and the supervisors should come to a compromising conclusion on what to do.

Chairman Thomas acknowledged that the two items were certainly connected, however, he noted that today's discussion was whether to proceed with study of a bed tax and come up with a plan. Mr. Caimano also noted to Mr. Monroe that discussion of the sales tax would be defacto if they were discussing the bed tax and there are serious arguments against it.

Mr. Montesi commented he felt the bed tax issue was an important issue for the County, because it revolves around the major industry - Tourism. He said he understood Mr. Monroe's

points and it was well taken since the committee started out looking at revenue enhancement and where they could get some more dollars to help offset property taxes. He stated his concerns involve the fact that Turning Stone Casino, built a golf course two years ago and now they are building two more, and Buffalo is now going to get a casino. He commented he felt Warren County was going to be in a very competitive market for people to come here, and although right now there is an argument being made by some of the facilities that they are full during June, July and August and they do not need any more business, he suggested that they did need more business, and they needed another Americade or possibly a convention center. He said he wanted to at least give the Revenue Enhancement Committee the opportunity to put together a plan. He acknowledged the concerns that have been voiced by some of the supervisors, but he urged the supervisors to give an opportunity for the process to move along.

Mr. Tessier said he thought the committee should move ahead and look at the bed tax, but suggested it not be put into mind that the 20 supervisors will "shove this down somebody else's throat." He said there were 158 businesses in Lake George that will have to collect a bed tax, if imposed, and he had to convince them to do so. He said part of the plan originally was to include the campgrounds and housekeeping cottages. He noted he talked with the State of New York and was told not to try to break any new ground, and therefore, now they are only talking about motel accommodations which, at three percent, will generate \$1.8 million from a bed tax. He said no one had a problem with that going into the tourism budget, but stressed the supervisors should not think there will be any money above that. He suggested that the bed tax and the sales tax be separated, as they are two separate issues. He said he did not want to see it come from this board that they are moving to pass a bed tax at this time. He suggested, instead, that the board say they are looking at it and will review it. He said he felt the board members needed to know what the public was thinking about a plan before moving forward.

Chairman Thomas said he felt the point that needed to be decided is whether the bed tax is truly a revenue enhancer for the County or is it an enhancer to the tourism budget, which will in the long run, be a revenue enhancer to the County because of the fact that once the County is promoted more, the County will get more money back. Mr. Tessier said he felt part of the money has to be considered for the infrastructure, and police services if more people were going to be brought here.

Mr. Bennett said the only thing he really objected to was if the occupancy tax was the sole program then certainly the County can no longer call the committee that works on this the Revenue Enhancement Committee, because it does not enhance the revenues of the County at all, except in the tourism area. He said he did not feel this would do anything for the property taxes. Mr. Caimano, Mr. Kenny and Mr. Brower disagreed with Mr. Bennett's remarks, and Mr. Gabriels agreed with the remarks.

Mr. Brower supported Mr. Caimano's motion and asked for a roll call vote on the motion. Mr. Mallison called the question.

Mr. Kenny said certainly if the plan included giving back the \$1 million to the taxpayers of Warren County, if the bed tax is passed, it would become a revenue enhancement. Mr. Kenny said he did not feel this was an insignificant amount. Mr. Monroe responded that it was insignificant when talking about a substantial reduction in property taxes.

Mr. Gabriels said without this motion in writing, he was unclear as to what was involved.

Chairman Thomas noted that based on the fact that the Revenue Enhancement Committee was tied on this issue, no resolution was prepared for today's meeting. He explained that the board members would have to define the resolution, and waive the rule of the board to allow the resolution to be presented without being in writing.

Mr. Caimano said it was his understanding that this resolution was simply to get a sense of this board as to whether or not they want to continue to discuss the bed tax as a revenue enhancement device for Warren County, knowing full well that by discussing it, there will be other vehicles discussed within that framework. Secondly, he said, if the County intends to have this bed tax as a vehicle, that the committee comes up with a workable plan to present to the public.

Mr. Kenny said his understanding was the resolution would make it incumbent upon the committee to come back with a plan for a bed tax, and then it would be up to the Board of Supervisors to either accept it or vote it down.

Mr. Caimano suggested the reference of occupancy tax be used instead of bed tax, and the board members concurred. He also noted he was willing to yield to Mr. Kenny's version of the motion.

Mr. Kenny worded the motion as follows: That this board requests the Revenue Enhancement Committee to come forward with an occupancy tax plan for the entire board to consider. Mr. Caimano seconded the reworded motion.

Chairman Thomas asked the board members' desire regarding the idea of voting on this motion without it going through the committee first. Mr. Bennett said it was never his intention when he voted no at the committee level for this question not to be presented to the full board today. He said it was merely that he felt it was not up to the committee to suggest to the board.

Chairman Thomas clarified that per the County Attorney the board members needed to waive the rule that the resolution be in writing. He noted that the board members can decide to do so, or the County Attorney can have someone prepare the resolution for a vote later in the meeting.

Mr. Montesi mentioned the board members also are on a time frame, since there was a previous resolution passed by this board that said something about before the budget process they would investigate this question. He asked if there was a time line that should be on this, and Mr. Kenny said he thought it already was there, and the plan should be prepared before budget time.

Mr. Monroe said it appeared to him that the committee was totally abandoning looking at sales tax, and was just drafting a plan on the bed tax. He moved an amendment to the motion to instruct the Revenue Enhancement Committee to come back with a plan for the use of sales tax revenues to reduce property taxes in Warren County, thereby dealing with the revenue enhancement and a plan on the sales tax also, and then the full board could compare both plans. Mr. Gabriels seconded the motion to amend the original motion on the floor (which was to make it incumbent upon the Revenue Enhancement Committee to come back with a plan for an occupancy tax).

Chairman Thomas asked to hold the amendment in abeyance and talk about the first motion first. Mr. Kenny said it was his opinion when the board discussed this in February and he was of the mind that the board members decided not to pursue the sales tax at this time. He suggested perhaps the board members should vote on that today, too, and make it very clear which avenue the committee was going to take. Mr. Brower concurred with the comments.

Chairman Thomas said per the County Attorney, the amendment to the resolution supercedes the original resolution, which needs to be voted on before the board members can vote on the original motion.

Mr. Caimano said he thought what Mr. Kenny offered, which several supervisors supported, was rather than an amendment, that the board members distinctly have two resolutions, one for bed tax and one for sales tax, and vote on them. Mr. Monroe said he would like to see a plan on both subjects, and Mr. Quintal said some people may not be in favor of both sales tax and bed tax reviews, and therefore, he felt there needed to be two votes.

Mr. Monroe said he would keep his amendment as he wanted to see a plan on both items and compare them. Mr. Tessier suggested the amendment should not only say sales tax as there are other avenues the committee was looking at, and there are other taxes not being collected that would enhance the revenue.

Mr. Mallison said he felt this was exactly the kind of frustration that people are trying to voice, and the supervisors have been talking about this for far too long, and he said he felt today, the supervisors have been talking about it far too long. He called the question on the amendment

Chairman Thomas clarified the vote would be on the amendment presented by Mr. Monroe and Mr. Gabriels, to add creation of a sales tax plan to the motion to create a plan on the bed tax.

A roll call vote on the motion resulted as follows:

Motion failed for lack of a majority vote.

Mr. O'Connor noted he had not attended any Revenue Enhancement Meetings put together by the Visitors and Convention Bureau, and according to his understanding there have been two. He asked the people who attended the meetings what was the consensus that came out of these. He said in his opinion, if the County passes an occupancy tax at the County level, it still has to be done in Albany, and the hotel/motel lobby is very powerful, so if they do not want it, it will not happen. He said from what he is gathering the County is not even talking about a sales tax increase. He said he would love to see what the County would generate on a one-half percent increase in sales tax, or a full percent, instead of arbitrarily throwing this down today because the supervisors feel that an occupancy tax is the salvation. He concluded that he frankly felt the bed tax would never come to pass.

Mr. Caimano said the evidence was there, and that was why the supervisors were doing what they were doing. Mr. Tessier noted he did not make the Visitors and Convention Bureau meeting Monday because he had a Town Board Meeting, but he received a report. He noted that people at that meeting were not 100 percent opposed to a bed tax. He also said according to his understanding, they were opposed to replacing the County's money in the budget with bed tax money, because they feel more than \$2 million is needed to promote the area. Lastly, he noted the people did not want to see any money collected by this County going outside of this County to be handled by anyone else.

Chairman Thomas noted the first motion to be voted on was to waive the writing of the resolution, which needed a two-thirds vote to pass. Motion was made by Mr. Montesi, seconded by Mr. Caimano, to waive the writing of the proposed resolution.

Chairman Thomas called for a roll call vote on the motion, which resulted as follows:

Motion failed for lack of a two-thirds vote.

The County Attorney left the meeting to provide for the resolution to be prepared in writing. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 391 for the record.

At Chairman Thomas' request, Mr. Monroe updated the board members on Solid Waste & Recycling issues. He noted that a meeting was held with Wheelabrator last Wednesday and there has been some movement by Wheelabrator. He noted on the option to buy at the end, Wheelabrator has gone from the original option of \$2 million to \$2.5 million plus the consumer price index, which they estimate right now to be about \$3.2 million. On the lease payments, he said they asked for more money for annual lease payments from the \$450,000 offered, and Wheelabrator agreed to go to \$600,000, but that would include the PILOT payment. He said they still did not have a final answer on the fact that Wheelabrator was a subsidiary of Waste Management and Waste Management brings waste to the plant. He noted they agreed the trash would have to come in at market value, and the counties would have the final determination whether the waste comes in or not. He said this ultimately would give the counties control over the price, but they are still trying to work out exact language on that guarantee. He said they also talked about additional throughput guarantees and electrical generation guarantees, and Wheelabrator was not willing to change those until they had some experience operating the plant. He noted another meeting with Wheelabrator was scheduled for next Tuesday, May 21st in Warren County, at 10:00 a.m., and supervisors from

both counties were urged to attend, because it is felt at some point in the near future this will come to a vote.

Mr. Monroe said they have had discussion with bond counsel on the exact issues raised by Mr. Cerro earlier this morning. He reiterated his earlier comments on the problems associated with the counties' ownership of the plant.

Mr. Monroe said he felt all the companies they have been dealing with believe the plant is going to be very valuable at the end, but they all know they are taking a risk and they could be wrong if the tip fees and electric revenues are very low. Wheelabrator is willing to take that risk, he concluded.

Mr. Monroe thanked Mr. Gabriels for bringing to his attention information on a class action lawsuit brought against Wheelabrator which started in 1998 and was settled in March of this year. He noted they settled for just under a half-a-billion dollars. Mr. Tessier said this was against Waste Management, and Mr. Monroe agreed, noting that was the parent company. He said he talked with the financial advisors and they were aware of the suit and refer to it as "old news," and do not feel it will impact the bond rating. He said that Wheelabrator will be prepared to talk about this and answer questions next week when they meet with the counties. He said they have asked that the Letter of Intent from Wheelabrator be prepared by Friday with the idea that it will be disseminated to all supervisors to review prior to the meeting on Tuesday.

Chairman Thomas said they were proceeding slowly because it does involve the two counties, and they do not want Warren County to vote today, or Washington County to vote next Friday, without having full information.

Mr. Tessier asked about the exit provision in 2012, and what will the counties have for options. Mr. Monroe said because Washington County would not consider the deal in any other way, it was proposed that the agreement include a provision so that the counties can put the plant to Wheelabrator in 2012 for \$1, and Wheelabrator agreed. He said they also talked about an option of buyout using the fair market value, less whatever Wheelabrator paid for the plant, and they were not willing to do that. He said Wheelabrator indicated if the counties want them to take the risk on the downside, then they do not want a cap on the upside.

Mr. Tessier said he favored selling the plant to Wheelabrator in 2012 for the fair market value, less the amount they have paid for the purchase. He said he felt the counties have suffered for the last ten years and they will be paying for the next ten years because the shortfall is not going to go away. He said Warren County will end up paying \$24 million, they will be paying off the bonds at \$70 million, which means Warren County has paid more than \$100 million over the next ten years for something they will gamble on selling to someone for \$3.2 million. Mr. Monroe noted Wheelabrator was already paying some number which they believe is in the \$8 to \$12 million range, and then they will pay another \$3 million at the end. He said they know the county will save \$15 million by refinancing if interest rates stay where they are now, and they know they will get \$3 million at the end of the contract, so the County will be \$18 million better off. He acknowledged this does not totally eliminate the shortfall, but it makes the County \$18 million better off. Mr. Tessier said the money saved on refinancing will be the same whether the plant is sold or not. Mr. Monroe replied that previously Foster Wheeler had been totally unwilling to agree to a refinancing.

Mr. Brower said he felt the value of the plant at the end was going to be the business value to a company that has a waste stream, and it may have a greater value to Wheelabrator potentially. He noted that HDR Engineering at one time about a year ago told the county they would not recommend paying more than \$5 million for the plant, because they were concerned about the value at the end. He said he felt this was the only way that Warren and Washington Counties seem to be able to go together, and he said he appreciated Mr. Monroe's efforts.

The County Attorney returned to the meeting and presented proposed Resolution No. 391, which was distributed to board members. Mr. Montesi said what was being asked of the supervisors is to vote yes on this resolution so that a plan on an occupancy tax for Warren County can be presented. He pointed out that the supervisors will get another chance to vote

yes or no on whether the plan is workable.

Mr. Thomas asked if Mr. Caimano and Mr. Kenny agreed that Resolution No. 391 reflects the intent of their motion. Both supervisors stated yes.

Chairman requested a roll call vote on the motion to introduce proposed Resolution No. 391 which resulted as follows:

Chairman then called for a vote on Resolution No. 391.

Resolution No. 391 was approved.

RESOLVED, that the Warren County Board of Supervisors hereby directs the Revenue Enhancement Committee to come forth with a plan for an occupancy tax.

Chairman called for reading of communications.

Clerk read communications, including the following:

Capital District Regional Off-Track Betting Corporation, Financial Report as of December 31, 2001.

New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services, notifying of Enhanced Prosecution Grant award (Edward Byrne Memorial formula grant funds) in the amount of \$50,000.

Bolton Landing Chamber of Commerce, opposing the proposed Lake George Park Commission fee increases.

Annual Reports: Treasurer

Communications, resolutions and reports ordered placed on file.

Chairman called for reading of resolutions.

Mr. Robillard noted that Resolution Nos. 351 through 384 were mailed, and a motion was needed to bring Resolution Numbers 350 and 385 through 388 and 390 to the floor. (Note, Resolution Nos. 389 and 391 have already been voted on.) Motion was made by Mr. Montesi, seconded by Mr. Belden and carried unanimously to bring Resolution Numbers 350 and 385 through 388 and 390 to the floor.

Chairman noted a meeting of the Criminal Justice Committee was scheduled immediately following the board meeting. Mr. Tessier noted he cancelled the meeting because of the lateness of the board meeting.

Mr. Mallison referred to Resolution No. 370, amending the Table of Organization and Warren County Salary and Compensation Plan for 2002. He noted the resolution removed the position of Tobacco Control Educator and he asked why. Mr. Quintal indicated the services were being contracted out. Mr. Mallison asked why that was being done. Mr. O'Neill indicated that the county did not need the position because the job was exposing the county to excess liability and the County did not want to be in the program in that manner. He further explained the concept of sharing a coordinator with several counties. (Please refer to May 1st minutes of the Health Services Committee for further details.) Mr. Mallison confirmed that the services were still being offered, and Mr. O'Neill replied yes.

Mr. Kenny also spoke concerning the evolution of the aforementioned position, and said he wanted to be sure before he voted on the resolution that the County was not sacrificing any services. Secondly, he said he thought there was grant money attached to the position which was established. Mr. O'Neill requested that Mrs. Auer, Public Health Director, be asked to come to the meeting and explain the program.

Mr. Bennett and Mr. Caimano left the meeting at 1:00 p.m.

Mr. Tessier requested a resolution authorizing signing of an agreement for computer maintenance with New World Systems Corporation for the District Attorney's Office. Sheriff Cleveland explained that without his realizing it, the former District Attorney had made a request to New World to have the contract split and to have the D.A. business kept separate from the Sheriff's. He noted when Ms. Hogan came in as District Attorney, she was not aware this had happened, and therefore, there was no agreement in place and as of February 1, 2002 it expired. He said the cost is \$9,520 per year, and because he was unaware of the change made by the former District Attorney, he budgeted the money in his budget for the contract, which he can transfer to the District Attorney.

Mr. Montesi asked if the original intent of the previous District Attorney was that there could be a potential conflict of interest with those that are prosecuting and those that are arresting having that same pool of information. Sheriff Cleveland replied he thought Mr. Goodspeed was always wary of having the two agencies connected in any fashion.

Motion was made by Mr. Tessier, seconded by Mr. Bentley and carried unanimously to introduce a resolution to approve the aforementioned contract, authorize the Chairman of the Board to execute the same, and authorizing a transfer of funds for \$9,520 from the Sheriff's Department to the District Attorney's Office, as presented. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 392 for the record.

Chairman Thomas extended privilege of the floor to Mr. O'Neill who outlined questions on the Tobacco Coordinator position as previously posed, and requested Mrs. Auer address the board members concerning the same.

Mrs. Auer explained that the position was still in place, and it is just that the person is currently doing the full-time job at the Council for Prevention, because that was where the program was contracted out to. In order to be able to pay the coordinator in that position, she explained it was necessary to delete the title in the County's Salary Plan, and move the money into the contract code of the budget.

Mr. Kenny asked if this was going to result in any sacrifice in services, and Mrs. Auer replied no. Mr. Kenny asked if the County will lose any control over fashioning what will be done, and Mrs. Auer replied no. Mrs. Auer said that part of the information that went into the subcontract was that the Office of Prevention Services would give the County quarterly reports. She said because this was a youth empowerment grant, the County, as a government, was not able to do some of the activities that they demanded. She said the County administrates the grant fiscally, but in order to do the activity delivery, they had to go outside the County, because there was a potential for a lot of liability based on the activities they wanted to do.

Mr. Brower discussed Resolution No. 382, authorizing transfer of Warren County Department of Public Works diesel generator to the Town of Chester, and requested a roll call vote. He said in thinking about this further, if the item had gone out to bid and there were no responses, he would not object to the resolution, but he would prefer to see these items go out to bid first.

Mr. Brower also spoke concerning Resolution No. 370, and noted it combines several departments in amending the Salary and Compensation Plan. He said he objected to the first part of the resolution, changing a tourism specialist from part-time to full time, but he was in favor of the health services changes in the resolution since Mrs. Auer explained it. He asked how this could be handled.

Mr. Dusek said the board members would have to either amend the resolution and create two resolutions, or vote down the resolution. Mr. Brower requested two resolutions.

Motion was made by Mr. Brower, seconded by Mr. Mallison to amend Resolution No. 370, removing the tourism specialist item to a separate resolution, which would be numbered

393, and to bring the same to the floor. The motion was carried unanimously and clerk noted amendment for the record. Clerk noted the new Resolution would be Number 393.

Discussion ensued between Mr. Brower, Mr. Mallison and Mrs. Auer, wherein Mrs. Auer explained further programmatic details of the Tobacco Control Program in reply to his question concerning what the program does for kids that already smoke and would like to quit.

Mr. Morrell asked if a two-thirds majority was required on any of the resolutions, and noted that four members of the board were not present. Mr. Robillard replied that a two-thirds vote was required for the bond issue.

Mr. Monroe noted it was 1:20 p.m., and estimated the board members have spent oneand-a-half hours discussing things that should be discussed in committee meetings. Chairman Thomas concurred.

Mr. Montesi suggested since the meeting was losing attendance, that a vote be called first on Resolution No. 390, Bond Resolution dated May 15, 2002 for \$23,000,000 for the Jail/Public Safety Facility.

Chairman called for a vote on Resolution No. 390.

Resolution No. 390 was approved.

BOND RESOLUTION DATED MAY 15, 2002.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CONSTRUCTION OF A COUNTY JAIL/PUBLIC SAFETY FACILITY IN AND FOR THE COUNTY OF WARREN, NEW YORK, AT A MAXIMUM ESTIMATED COST OF \$27,000,000; AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF NOT EXCEEDING \$23,000,000 SERIAL BONDS AND THE APPROPRIATION AND EXPENDITURE OF \$4,000,000 AVAILABLE CURRENT FUNDS OF SAID COUNTY TO PAY THE COST THEREOF; AND ALSO AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY TREASURER TO MAKE TEMPORARY ADVANCES OF LEGALLY AVAILABLE FUNDS THEREFOR

BE IT RESOLVED, by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the total voting strength of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The construction of a County Jail/Public Safety Facility (the "Capital Project") in and for the County of Warren, New York, including grading and/or improvement of the site thereof, original furnishings, equipment, machinery and/or apparatus required for the purposes for which such building is to be used, is hereby authorized at a maximum estimated cost of \$27,000,000.

Section 2. SEQR DETERMINATION: The proposed improvement is a Type I Action under the State Environmental Quality Review Act and has been the subject of review under said State Environmental Quality Review Act, with the Warren County Board of Supervisors heretofore having determined that the Capital Project will not result in any large and important impacts and, therefore, is one which will not have a significant impact on the environment, therefore authorizing that a negative declaration be prepared.

Section 3. The plan for the financing of such maximum estimated amount shall be as follows:

- a) By the issuance of not exceeding \$23,000,000 serial bonds of said County hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the provi sions of the Local Finance Law; and
- b) By the appropriation and expenditure of \$4,000,000 available current funds of said County hereby authorized therefor.

Section 4. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is thirty years, pursuant to subdivision 11(a) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 5. The faith and credit of said County of Warren, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County, a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable.

Section 6. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the County Treasurer, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said County Treasurer, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 7. In accordance with the provisions of Section 165.10 of the Local Finance Law and/or Section 9-a of the General Municipal Law, the Treasurer of said County is hereby authorized to temporarily advance legally available funds of said County in the manner provided by law up to and including the amount of \$10,000,000 for the aforesaid specific object or purpose.

Section 8. All other matters except as provided herein relating to the serial bonds herein authorized including the date, denominations, maturities and interest payment dates, within the limitations prescribed herein and the manner of execution of the same, including the consolidation with other issues, and also the ability to issue serial bonds with substantially level or declining annual debt service, shall be determined by the County Treasurer, the chief fiscal officer of such County. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 51.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the County Treasurer shall determine consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 9. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- 1. Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or
- Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

<u>Section 10.</u> This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the object or purpose described herein.

<u>Section 11.</u> This resolution, which takes effect immediately, shall be published in full in The Post Star and The North Creek News Enterprise, the official newspapers of such County, together with a notice of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Paul Dusek, County Attorney, distributed a proposed resolution for consideration by the supervisors. Privilege of the floor was extended to Supervisor Monroe, who explained the supervisors would be voting on approving a Letter of Intent with Wheelabrator Technologies. He said he received a copy of the Letter of Intent last Thursday with final revisions, and it was mailed to all supervisors last Friday. A copy of the Letter of Intent is on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors with Solid Waste & Recycling Committee records.

Mr. Monroe stated he has been working on this project for 8 years and he highly recommended approval of the proposal before the supervisors. He said the Letter of Intent contained the basic terms of the transaction. If approved, he noted the next step would be to prepare final documents and then there would be a final vote.

Chairman Thomas asked the County Attorney to clarify the resolution. He read and explained the resolution paragraph by paragraph. He noted the first paragraph described the Letter of Intent which sets forth general terms and conditions under which Wheelabrator Technologies would be willing to operate and lease the plant. He said the second paragraph clarified that the Letter of Intent was not intended to and does not create a binding legal obligation, except that it does provide Wheelabrator a 60-day exclusive period to complete due diligence with respect to the facility and negotiate agreements with Foster Wheeler,

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Washington County, Warren County, and the Warren and Washington Counties Industrial Development Agency (IDA) with regard to the waste-to-energy facility. (Mr. Dusek requested at the proper time that this paragraph of the resolution be amended to include the reference to the IDA which was inadvertently omitted.)

Mr. Dusek noted the third paragraph of the resolution stated that it was anticipated that any proposed agreement concerning the waste-to-energy facility will provide for ownership by the IDA. He said he included this verbiage because he felt that was what everyone was assuming so far, although the Letter of Intent does not state that. He also noted that particular paragraph stated if everything comes to fruition and the IDA were to become the owner, Warren County's service agreement with Washington County would still remain in tact, however, there would be modifications made, which are attached to the Letter of Intent.

Lastly, Mr. Dusek explained that the RESOLVED paragraph provided approval and consent to the Letter of Intent with Wheelabrator Technologies, with the understanding that additional signatories to the agreement would be the Bi-County Ad Hoc Negotiating Committee, Washington County and the IDA.

In conjunction with the information being presented, Mr. Monroe reviewed a listing of the Benefits of Wheelabrator Technologies' business proposal. A copy of this and other summary information setting for purchase and operation proposals as prepared by Wheelabrator Technologies was presented to the Bi-County Solid Waste Committee on May 21, 2002, and is on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors with Solid Waste & Recycling Committee information. He pointed out that he felt all of these points of the transaction were favorable to the counties and he recommended proceeding.

Chairman Thomas recognized Jack Riston of Wheelabrator Technologies, Inc., who was present at the meeting to answer any questions the supervisors might have.

Mr. Montesi asked for clarification that this transaction is for the purchase of the waste-to-energy plant, and Mr. Monroe replied that was correct. Mr. Montesi asked if the refinancing of the bonds would happen at a later date, and Mr. Monroe concurred. Mr. Montesi further clarified that those bonds would be issued through the IDA, with the counties guaranteeing them. Mr. Monroe replied according to his understanding, if the counties approve the Letter of Intent, the financial advisors (Steve Lynch acting on behalf of both counties and the IDA and Rick McCarthy acing on behalf of Warren County) plan to approach the bond rating agencies to see if it was possible to do this transaction without the sales tax intercept, which he noted might be possible at a higher interest rate. If that is feasible, he said the counties would not have to go forward with the sales tax intercept. He asked Mr. Dusek to also comment on the question.

Mr. Dusek clarified that right now the way the transaction was anticipated was that the IDA would issue revenue bonds. He noted these would basically be the same bonds that are out there now, and there would be no county guarantees and the full faith and credit of the county would not be used for the bonds. However, he said, the service agreements and payments would be an obligation, so the county would still show some deficits even if everything went ideally because there was not enough money in the trash business to cover all of the costs. If that is the nature of the bonds, he continued, the question then became whether the IDA can simply issue new bonds based on this new transaction at a high enough rating so the county will see the interest reductions and hence, the financial savings desired, or do the counties have to go back to the sales tax intercept approach. He said this sales tax intercept approach still would not render the full faith and credit of the county, but diverts sales tax revenues to pay the service fees owed under the contract. He said that was a relatively complex process and public hearings were involved. He estimated if that process were taken, it would be another two or three months to completion. He said the recommendations being circulated right now are in favor of avoiding this process, if possible.

Mr. O'Neill entered the meeting at 8:47 a.m.

Mr. Montesi recalled when he previously served on the IDA and went through an audit with the State Comptroller's Office, there were some shadows about who got a fee for recom-

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mending bond counsel and the bond market, etc. He said he hoped that the county "was on its toes" and whoever was doing this counsel work is not also getting a special fee that happens because of the bonding market situation. Mr. Monroe explained that they went through a Request for Proposals (RFP) process to select an underwriter and there were several interested companies. He said they ended up with Merrill Lynch and First Bank of Albany, and there was an agreement with them that they would not charge anything for all of the preliminary work, and there was an agreed fee if they wound up being the underwriter when the bond issue was done.

Mr. Dusek mentioned if the transaction was structured as anticipated, the IDA would be the agency primarily in charge of the revenue bonds, and hence, choosing the counsel. He suggested the county supervisors keep in touch with the IDA on any of these issues of concern. He added that he, as County Attorney, would not get anything other than his normal salary.

Chairman Thomas commented he had followed Mr. Monroe's efforts very closely on this project and acknowledged the amount of research Mr. Monroe had done. He said if Mr. Monroe says he completely supports this resolution, then he (Chairman Thomas) was comfortable and supported his position based on the amount of time he has put into this endeavor.

Mr. Tessier said he understood the Letter of Intent, but wanted to make it clear that in no way does the Letter of Intent reflect all of the things the supervisors have concerns about. He said those things were to be addressed in the next 60 days of negotiations. He commented he did not feel everything in the Letter of Intent was agreed upon by the supervisors, and he noted he had discussed some of those concerns with Mr. Dusek. Referring to the opening paragraph of the Letter of Intent, Chairman Thomas said he felt Mr. Tessier's concerns would be addressed in the next 60 days.

Mr. Mallison referred to and asked for clarification of a portion of the Letter of Intent, specifically verbiage in Item No. 2 which said ..."At the closing of transfer of the Facilities to the Counties the Counties and Foster Wheeler shall dismiss any pending litigation regarding the Facility and release one another from any claims thereunder, in consideration for a payment to be agreed upon by the Counties and Foster Wheeler." Mr. Monroe clarified that represents a payment from Foster Wheeler to the Counties. He added the Counties have had an offer from Foster Wheeler and they intend to go back with a counteroffer.

Mr. Mallison commented this transaction had been a quick move for him since he has been on the board for such a short time and he was trying to bring himself up to speed. He said he spoke to a number of people in his area and asked them whether they felt the county should try to capitalize on the potential value of the plant at the end of 2012, which could be substantial compared to the \$2.5 million that is being offered, or if they thought the County should take the money now and not gamble on what the State Government could do regarding things needed at the plant, thus forcing more expenditures. He said the people he spoke to said "Take the money and run considering what the County has been through." He addressed the supervisors who might think the County might be making a mistake and was being too conservative by getting into this agreement process, and said it was a good point the County may lose in potential value, but since they have had such a tough time with the plant, he was inclined to follow Mr. Monroe's lead and vote yes.

Mr. Bennett said he has voiced grave concerns over moving along on the 60 days. He added he never thought he would have to say no to something Mr. Monroe would recommend because he noted he was so appreciative of the work that he had done all of these years. Even though this is better, he commented it was not what he would be able to support. He acknowledged and stated his appreciation for Mr. Monroe's hard work, and said he hoped Mr. Monroe did not feel he was letting him down.

Mr. Brower said he believed that Warren and Washington Counties would be the best off if they bought the waste-to-energy plant; however, he said he was quite sure that Washington County would never agree to do that. As a result, he said he felt the 60-day agreement

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with Wheelabrator Technologies was probably the best thing the counties will achieve. He said he felt it was extremely important to iron out the final payments from Foster Wheeler, and that they iron out how the transaction at the end of 2012 will work. Chairman Thomas and Mr. Haskell agreed with Mr. Brower's remarks. Mr. Haskell added he felt the alternative before the supervisors seemed to be best they have seen and he felt the supervisors would be very foolish not to go with Mr. Monroe's recommendations.

Mr. Monroe recalled the discussion on the option of Warren and Washington Counties ownership, and noted that several years ago that was what he supported. He reviewed the reasons why this was not possible. (Please refer to board minutes of May 15, 2002 for details.)

Mr. Gabriels referred to Mr. Tessier's comments, and said the only detail he was concerned with was the valuation of the purchase price at the end of 2012. He asked if his approving the Letter of Intent would be giving approval of the final price for the plant, or would he get another opportunity to express his concern and say he feels this is undervalued.

Mr. Dusek replied that normally when a Letter of intent is entered into to the extent that it sets forth some basic general term, such as \$2.5 million as a purchase price in 2012, that essentially says that the parties have had a meeting of the mind generally on that concept or amount. He said as he understands it, the purpose of this is to negotiate all of those items around those items, because the county has an obligation by virtue of this Letter of Intent to proceed in good faith. He said to him, good faith means essentially the supervisors are saying the terms look about right and they understand there is a lot of issues left to discuss. He noted that he felt Mr. Tessier's remarks may have been referring to the waste. Clearly, he noted, this Letter of Intent states that the parties need to reach an agreement on how they will handle waste from Waste Management for those times it is needed at the plant under various circumstances. He said that was an element in the Letter of Intent that says basically this needs to be negotiated and agreed to. Another example he mentioned was on the 85 percent capacity of the plant in terms of operations and he pointed out the Letter of Intent clearly says this needs to be negotiated.

Regarding the \$2.5 million price for the plant in 2012, Mr. Dusek said he felt Wheelabrator Technologies could come back in negotiations and say the counties agreed to negotiate in good faith and they have already reached a number of \$2.5 million plus consumer price index. He advised the board members if they felt uncomfortable with a basic term like that in the agreement, then they should not approve the agreement. On the other hand, he said if the supervisors feel comfortable with the basic terms, realizing such of the issues like solid waste will have to be negotiated, then he thought they would be in favor of the agreement. Mr. Gabriels addressed Mr. Monroe and said he hoped he understood his vote on the resolution.

Mr. O'Connor recalled the history of the trash plant, and noted the counties have lived with this for years. He said while he was not considering the proposal a bad deal, he said he agreed with Mr. Tessier that there were some things that needed to be ironed out. He acknowledged the work put into this project by Mr. Monroe and said he would vote yes on the resolution because he felt right now it was the best the county can put on the table. He said he also appreciated everything Mr. Monroe has done for the county.

Mr. Caimano said he was astounded because the county was willing previously to give this plant away for nothing, and \$2.5 million is \$2.5 beyond nothing. He addressed Mr. Gabriels' remarks, and pointed out that Item No. 1 of the Letter of Intent says that the only thing not negotiable is the 60 days. He pointed out that when everything is said and done, the counties have to sign the contract, and if they get to the contract and they do not like the price, then he thought Mr. Gabriels or anyone else, had a perfect opportunity to make that point. Mr. Dusek addressed Mr. Caimano's point, and clarified he agreed with Mr. Caimano to the extent that the county was not signing an agreement today that they are bound to. What he said he was trying to indicate to Supervisor Gabriels is the fact that in negotiations, when basic terms are set out, it was very difficult to change them. He said of course the county could try to change

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the terms, but they will have arguments thrown against them pointing out the basic terms were presented and it was bad faith to try to change them. If there was a part of the agreement to be negotiated, he continued, and it was not as successful or did not work out as well as expected, and in lieu of that there was an adjustment on the price, he said he could see negotiations going in that fashion. However, he said, if everything in the agreement worked out perfectly and the only thing the board was dissatisfied with was the \$2.5 million, then he felt they will be hit with arguments of bad faith. Discussion ensued regarding other scenarios where negotiating might be appropriate.

Mr. Quintal said he felt there was one basic factor the county was overlooking regarding the purchase price of the plant at the end of the agreement. He commented all of his constituents have said get rid of the plant any way possible. He said right now the counties were giving it to Foster Wheeler at the end of the agreement for nothing, and there is an offer of \$2.5 million being made. He said he felt into that calculations was a possible \$12 million buyout by Wheelabrator to Foster Wheeler, that also does not cost the counties anything. He suggested, therefore the \$12 million and \$2.5 million be added together for a \$14.5 million total of what the counties were getting for the plant. He added that his constituents do not care if the plant might be worth \$30 million at the end of the contract, they just want the County out of it.

Mr. Tessier commented he did not feel this would happen, and said he felt the only savings the counties could guarantee was from refinancing. Mr. Quintal disagreed, and pointed out for example, the counties would not be paying for lawyers (theirs or Foster Wheeler's) anymore. Mr. Tessier replied he thought that was minimal when they were looking at \$4 million per year. General discussion continued.

Mr. Tessier suggested that the things that need to be addressed in negotiations included the pass through, the PILOT (payment in lieu of taxes) Program which expires in 2012, and he said he was hoping to see negotiated a put-or-pay contract for a fixed amount. He pointed out if Waste Management brings in trash at a lower rate than market, then the counties will have a higher shortfall. Additionally, he said he was uncomfortable when some questions were asked of Wheelabrator negotiators and they said they had to go back to their board and Waste Management to get answers. Chairman Thomas said he agreed with Mr. Tessier's concerns over the negotiators having to go back to ask questions.

Mr. Brower said he saw a buy out figure of \$2.6 million plus consumer price index in a previous presentation and asked what was the correct number. Mr. Riston replied that this was his error in the slide presentation, and the documents all had \$2.5 million. Mr. Brower said he felt the \$2.5 million plus the consumer price index was a good figure. He added that he felt the real key was refinancing and that was the major savings. He said he felt the longer the negotiations go the less likely the counties were to maintain the savings they were getting because the interest rates were at 40 year lows. He urged the supervisors to move along.

Mr. Mallison asked if Wheelabrator decided to buy the plant at \$2.5 million, and the counties feel the plant was operating well and prefer to lease it to them, what would happen. Mr. Dusek replied he thought the agreement provided that Wheelabrator has the right to purchase the facility at \$2.5 million, so the counties could not block that, just like Wheelabrator could not block the counties' put of \$1.00. Mr. Monroe added that there was discussion on whether Wheelabrator would be willing to sign a contract now whereby they would be obligated to purchase in 2012, and the answer was yes, but the final proposal negotiated was the put and the call.

The meeting continued, and motion was made by Mr. Montesi, seconded by Mr. Caimano and carried unanimously to bring the proposed resolution to the floor. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 394 for the record.

Mr. Kenny said in looking at the alternatives, he felt Wheelabrator had the most attractive offer. He also said he felt that the option to do nothing was certainly not acceptable to anyone, and the option to walk away from the plant, has been legally explored and found not acceptable. He agreed with Mr. Tessier, however, that waste was a major issue and certainly

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Wheelabrator should be aware unless the county can reach an agreement with them, it could be a deal-breaker.

Mr. Monroe acknowledged the importance of the waste issue, and said there was no question that those on the negotiating committee identified the price that waste comes in from an entity that is a subsidiary of another entity was a very important issue. He reiterated if the waste comes in below market, then the counties haven't changed anything, and they could lose. He said he was sure the attorneys knew that issue, and Wheelabrator was aware of the concerns and the fact that Waste Management must come in at market value. He said there was a general agreement that the counties and the IDA have the final say, so if they do not approve the price, it will not come in. As far as the savings on the refinancing, he said they were concerned that interest rates would be going up, but whether they do or do not refinance, they know every month they delay costs them over \$100,000 in savings they could otherwise have.

Mr. Morrell said he assumed Washington County was also acting on this resolution, and Mr. Robillard replied yes, on June 3rd. Mr. Thomas added that the IDA will also be acting.

Mr. Moynihan reiterated that approval of this resolution does not lock the counties into a contract and it just means they will proceed forward with due diligence. He said in his tenure on the board he had attended several bi-county meetings and from what he could see, he believed this was the best deal that has come down the road.

Mr. Robillard requested approval of the amendment requested by Mr. Dusek to add the IDA to paragraph two of Resolution No. 394. Motion was made by Mr. Mallison, seconded by Mr. Quintal and carried unanimously to amend the resolution as stated. Clerk noted amendment for the record.

Chairman called for vote on the resolution. Resolution No. 394 was approved.

RESOLUTION NO. 394 OF 2002 Resolution introduced by Supervisors Montesi and Caimano

APPROVING AND CONSENTING TO LETTER OF INTENT WITH WHEELABRATOR TECHNOLOGIES, INC.

WHEREAS, a Letter of Intent that sets forth the General Terms and Conditions under which Wheelabrator Technologies, Inc., or its affiliates would be willing to operate and lease the Waste-to-Energy Facility located in Hudson Falls, New York, has been presented to the Warren County Board of Supervisors, and

WHEREAS, it is understood that the Letter of Intent is not intended to and shall not create a binding legal obligation on any party except to the extent of the agreement set forth in paragraph "1" providing Wheelabrator Technologies, Inc., a sixty (60) day exclusive period to complete due diligence with respect to the facility and negotiate agreements with Foster Wheeler, Washington County, Warren County and the Counties of Warren and Washington Industrial Development Agency with regard to the Waste-to-Energy Facility, and

WHEREAS, it is also understood that it is anticipated that any proposed agreement concerning the Waste-to-Energy Facility will provide for ownership by the Warren and Washington County Industrial Development Agency and that while revisions to existing service agreements are anticipated to be part of the agreement, the same will not result in a shift of any ownership or title interest to Warren County but rather ownership and title interest insofar as Warren County is concerned, will essentially remain the same as set forth in current agreements, now, therefore, be it

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RESOLVED, that the Warren County Board of Supervisors hereby approves and consents to the Letter of Intent with Wheelabrator Technologies, Inc. with the understanding that additional

signatories to the agreement will be the Bi-County Ad Hoc Negotiating Committee, Washington County and the Counties of Warren and Washington Industrial Development Agency.

Adopted.

Chairman Thomas stated he wished to create a new committee to replace the Revenue Enhancement Committee, to be called the Occupancy Tax Committee. He said he would appoint the following supervisors as committee members: Supervisors Caimano, Tessier, Morrell, Kenny, Monroe and Bennett. He also said he would like the committee to meet as soon as possible to discuss some plans for the occupancy tax.

Motion was made by Mr. Montesi, seconded by Mr. Caimano and carried unanimously to introduce a resolution amending the rules of the board authorizing the Chairman to appoint standing and special committees (Resolution No.4 of 2002) to create the Occupancy Tax Committee. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 395 for the record.

Chairman called for vote on the resolution. Resolution No. 395 was approved.

RESOLUTION NO. 395 OF 2002 Resolution introduced by Supervisors Montesi and Caimano

AMENDING RESOLUTION NO. 1 OF 2002 - TO CREATE AN OCCUPANCY TAX COMMITTEE

RESOLVED, that Resolution No. 1 of 2002 which authorized the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors to appoint standing and special committees is hereby amended to include the creation of an Occupancy Tax Committee with a membership of six (6) under Special Committees.

Adopted by unanimous vote.

Motion was made by Mr. Bentley, seconded by Mr. O'Connor to introduce a resolution amending the rules of the board authorizing the Chairman to appoint standing and special committees to delete the Revenue Enhancement Committee. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 396 for the record.

Mr. Monroe said he thought the purpose of the Revenue Enhancement Committee was to try to find other revenues and reduce property taxes. He said he thought this should be pursued in some way. Mr. Caimano replied that the committee would do this. He suggested this action was appropriate inasmuch as the board was going down the road to look at occupancy tax. He said this could be redone if they decide not to do it. Chairman Thomas agreed that after the discussion on occupancy tax, the board could always go back to the other committee

Mr. Tessier said he agreed with Mr. Monroe, and added that other than sales tax there were other ways to enhance revenues. He mentioned, for example, that he had lunch in Rutland, Vermont recently and was charged an "eat in tax" of 10 percent. Mr. Caimano said he felt there was no reason that these things cannot be talked about at the ensuing committee meetings.

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Chairman Thomas asked if the board members would rather name the committee Occupancy Tax/Revenue Enhancement Committee. Mr. Kenny pointed out that the board members are just a short distance away from budget hearings and maybe that would be the appropriate spot to enhancement revenues. The consensus of the board members was to leave the actions as stated. Chairman Thomas said he tended to agree with Mr. Monroe that the supervisors needed to keep all of the options open in the future.

Chairman called for vote on the resolution. Resolution No. 396 was approved.

RESOLUTION NO. 396 OF 2002 Resolution introduced by Supervisors Bentley and O'Connor

AMENDING RESOLUTION NO. 1 OF 2002 - TO DELETE THE REVENUE ENHANCEMENT COMMITTEE

RESOLVED, that Resolution No. 1 of 2002 which authorized the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors to appoint standing and special committees is hereby amended to delete the Revenue Enhancement Committee under Special Committees.

Adopted by unanimous vote.

There being no further business, on motion by Mr. O'Neill, seconded by Mr. Montesi, the meeting adjourned the meeting at 9:26 a.m.

WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING WEDNESDAY, JUNE 19, 2002

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren convened at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center, Lake George, New York, at 10:02 a.m.

Mr. William Thomas presiding.

Salute to the flag was led by Supervisor Moynihan.

Roll called, the following members present:

Supervisors Gabriels, Monroe, Mallison, Sheehan, Moynihan, O'Connor, Kenny, Belden, Bentley, Thomas, Tessier, Bennett, Brower, Caimano, Morrell, Champagne, Montesi, O'Neill, Haskell, and Quintal - 20.

Motion was made by Mr. Mallison, seconded by Mr. Gabriels and carried unanimously to approve the minutes of the May 15, 2002 board meeting, and the May 30, 2002, special board meeting, subject to correction by the clerk.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Supervisor Morrell, who recognized the services of the Warren County Cooperative Extension by reading a proclamation designating "2002 the Year of 4-H."

Chairman Thomas noted that a Local Development Corporation (LDC) meeting was scheduled following the board meeting, but in the interest of time, he suggested that the County Attorney address the LDC issue now.

Mr. Dusek, County Attorney, explained that the LDC meeting was called so that the corporation could adopt a resolution that would authorize the hiring of Camoin Associates for services to assist in conjunction with the HUD visit that was coming up, and to go over the Micro-Enterprise Program and various activities associated with that. He said the amount of the contract as proposed, was not to exceed \$2,000 and it was arranged for by the Planning & Community Development Department Director, Patricia Tatich. He apprised that in order to avoid the need for a meeting on this one matter, by law the LDC members are allowed to sign off on a consent for that resolution. He said if this was acceptable to the members of the board, who are also the members of the LDC, he would circulate the consent form regarding the same.

It was questioned whether it was required for the supervisors to technically go in and out of one board meeting into another. Mr. Dusek indicated not in this case, because the LDC signatures could be done outside of a meeting altogether. The consensus was to do away with the LDC meeting and have the members sign the consent form as described by the County Attorney.

Chairman Thomas dispensed with committee reports for June, due to a lengthy agenda. He extended privilege of the floor to any supervisors wishing to report on a specific committee item.

Supervisor Tessier, Chairman of the Airport Committee, noted there has been a lot of discussion about the tree clearing project at the Airport. He indicated he met with Attorney Krantz and several of the residents in the area affected, and he reported the County also has talked with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regarding the concerns, and are awaiting a response. He noted he planned to fly over the area with Attorney Krantz next week to show him exactly what the supervisors are discussing. He stressed that everything regarding this project is currently on hold.

Mr. Tessier also mentioned that there was a meeting at the Airport next week with the FAA, and contrary to some people's opinion, he noted that the meeting had nothing to do with the tree clearing project. He apprised the meeting was between Albany and Warren County Airports.

Mr. Caimano added to the report, noting he made a call to the Washington DC arm of the FAA, who in turn, called the region. He said the FAA was surprised about what was going on, because they thought it was a very simple project. He said he reported this information to Supervisor Tessier and it was part of his records.

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Mr. Montesi noted that he and Mr. Caimano visited some of the residents in the area of the project. He noted that one lady that had a lot of information on the project updated them on the feelings of the residents. He said it appears that they should be on a holding pattern because the supervisors really need to understand what FAA wants, how it will affect the county adversely if they do not do what the FAA wants, and they also need to take into consideration the concerns of the residents who have trees that are 150 years old. He said that it appeared prior to this time the county was marching along at a pretty fast pace and under the next step, the engineering firm was supposed to go out and get easements. He assured they were no where near that phase of the project.

Chairman Thomas summarized that people who have concerns regarding the tree cutting project should just stay with the supervisors as there was nothing going to happen eminently. Mr. Montesi agreed, and said he felt it was a team effort to figure out if some things need to be done, such as trimming, and maybe that is the most they will get out of the project.

Mr. Haskell announced that one of the county workers, Mrs. Carol Persons, who works at Westmount Health Facility and is a 30-year + employee, has been chosen to be the long term employee of the year. He noted she was picked by a person from the Governor's Office, a member of the Senate, and a member of the Assembly. He said the presentation will be next Tuesday (June 25th) at Westmount Health Facility at 2:00 p.m. Chairman Thomas encouraged all supervisors to attend the ceremony.

Supervisor Bennett, Chairman of the Planning & Community Development Committee, discussed proposed Resolution No. 451 regarding reactivation of the county's Micro-Enterprise Program. He reiterated information from the Planning & Community Development Committee meeting of May 30th wherein this subject was discussed and the committee moved to support the resolution. (Please see May 30th minutes for further details.) He spoke in support of reactivating the Micro-Enterprise Program and possibly expanding it, as well as creating the position needed by the department to provide the technical assistance for this endeavor.

Mr. Bennett also spoke concerning the last Regional Economic Development Committee meeting, which was held May 30th, and noted that discussion took place regarding the Empire Zone and the benefits of new construction. He noted the question was whether the county would be willing to change the sales tax requirements on new construction materials, eliminating the three percent tax for purchases made within the county. Chairman Thomas noted according to his understanding, the committee had decided to bring this question to the full board for a decision on whether to waive the three percent sales tax (county portion) on construction materials purchased within the county for new construction.

Mr. Brower said he appreciated the fact that the Empire Zone has and will encourage light industrial businesses to either expand locally or to hopefully locate in the region. In light of that, he said the State has come up with the program whereby it exempts the four percent of state sales tax, provides electric credit on any new electricity needs generated by the businesses, provides job credits as a direct deduction off New York State taxes, and provides other incentives that are very beneficial and makes New York State more competitive with the nation. He said he was thankful for the State's exemption of the four percent portion of the seven percent sales tax, but added he still had concerns over the County eliminating their three percent portion of the tax. He pointed out they have had revenue enhancement meetings at the County and they have realized there are unfunded mandates still coming forth from the State. He said the County has tried to resist property tax increases whenever possible, and in light of the commitment the County has made to help the City and Town of Queensbury to work out a sewer agreement, as well as other factors, he did not feel the County could afford to drop the three percent sales tax that is obtained on building materials. He said if they get hundreds of thousands of new construction over the next five to ten years, the County of Warren will benefit by that three percent, with one-half of it going to the County and one-half going to the Towns.

Mr. Caimano stated he agreed with Mr. Brower only because of the financial situation that the County could be in. He noted the Empire Zone is here because of the work of the Warren County Regional Economic Development Corporation (WCREDC), and the WCREDC is here because the County funds it thanks to the foresight of former Chairman of the Board, Louis Tessier. He said the County has shown its willingness to go way beyond what normally is done by Counties.

Mr. Montesi also agreed with Mr. Brower. He recalled there was a time when the County considered dropping sales tax on clothing. He said they did a pretty good analysis and study and ended up looking at how many dollars the County would lose and they had to weigh that. He wondered if the County should do the same kind of study in this regard, but he said he felt these were appreciably more dollars, and the County does not even know what it is facing this coming year as a result of unfunded mandates.

Chairman Thomas summarized that it appeared to be the consensus of the supervisors not to waive the three percent sales tax on new construction materials. No objection was expressed, and Chairman Thomas requested Mr. Bennett to take the information back to his committee.

Chairman Thomas recognized the school children present to receive awards for the anti-smoking art works ("World No Tobacco Day"). He also recognized Supervisor O'Neill, Chairman of the Health Insurance Committee, who would be making the awards, and Patricia Auer, Director of Public Health Services, whose department undertook the program.

Mrs. Auer credited Laura Saffer, Health Educator, for coordinating all of the activities. She explained the activity in detail for the information of the supervisors and said they had participation from 100 percent of the Warren County schools. The opportunity to compete was offered to all fourth graders, she noted, and the art work was displayed in the hallways by the Motor Vehicle Department for a couple of weeks. She noted all of the employees of the County were invited to vote on the posters, and as a result, the winners were present today to receive awards. She also pointed out that the winning posters were on display at the front of the board room.

Mrs. Saffer also spoke on the program, noting that World Health Organization has traditionally on May 31st every year had a "World No Tobacco Day." She apprised that 191 countries participate in the program, and this year, Warren County participated by having a fourth grade poster contest. She said the title for the posters was "Tobacco Free Sports - Play it Clean." She reiterated Mrs. Auer's remarks about the 100 percent participation from the schools, noting it would not have been successful without this cooperation. She credited every school nurse, every school principal and every school art teacher for assisting in the event. She concluded that statistical information proves if a child starts using a substance such as tobacco, at a young age, chances are they will be a user of this substance as an adult. If a health behavior method can be created for the students, she said, and they choose to choose this behavior when they become adults, then they have met one of the goals of public health.

Supervisor O'Neill announced the winners of the art contest, and each came forward and accepted a certificate for themselves and their schools. The supervisors acknowledged each winner with a round of applause. A list of the contest winners is in writing and on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors with Health Services Committee records.

Chairman Thomas thanked the children and parents for attending the meeting. Mr. Kenny said he wanted to recognize all of the young people who became involved in this project. He said certainly if there is going to be a pay-off to the anti-smoking campaign it will come from peer pressure from these young people who have recognized the dangers of smoking.

The meeting continued, and Supervisor Monroe, Chairman of the Solid Waste & Recycling Committee, presented a committee report of activities to date. He noted that both Washington County and the Warren and Washington Counties Industrial Development Agency (IDA) have passed resolutions to move forward with the letter of intent with Wheelabrator.

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He reported they had another meeting last Thursday and progress was being made both on negotiations with Wheelabrator and the settlement negotiations with Foster-Wheeler.

Chairman called for reading of communications.

Clerk read communications, including the following:

Capital District Regional Off-Track Betting Corporation, Financial Reports as of March 31, 2002, and April 30, 2002.

Urbach Kahn & Werlin LLP, Certified Public Accountants, audited financial statements of Westmount Health Facility for the year ended December 31, 2001.

Copy of letter from Janet Talley to Michael Homenick, Ph.D., Chair, Warren County Community Services Board, wherein Mrs. Talley submits her resignation as Director of Community Services for Warren and Washington Counties, effective June 26, 2002.

Communications, resolutions and reports ordered placed on file.

Chairman called for reading of resolutions.

Mr. Mallison requested a roll call vote on Resolution Nos. 400 and 436.

Mr. Brower requested a roll call vote on Resolution No. 453, and added he was very supportive of the boundary changes proposed in the resolution for the Empire Zone. He added there was detailed discussion at the Queensbury Town Board meeting recently and they ratified Queensbury's additions and subtractions to the zone. Mr. Mallison asked if Great Escape was included in the revisions, and Mr. Brower replied yes.

Mr. Monroe said it was his understanding that Patricia Tatich, Director of the Planning & Community Development Department, was supposed to make a presentation on the Micro-Enterprise Program. Chairman Thomas said he thought he saw her upstairs, but since there was not going to be an LDC meeting, she may have gone back to her office. He said the issue was that she wanted to hire a person to facilitate the program, and he thought her committee decided to go forth with it and the extra money to hire the person would come from the Micro-Enterprise Program itself. Mr. Tessier added this idea was also approved by the Finance & Personnel Committee.

Mr. Mallison said he thought the Micro-Enterprise Program was terrific, but he recalled a month or two ago there was discussion on this program wherein Mr. Caimano had suggested the county find a volunteer, possibly a retired accountant, to go out and assist the businesses. He wondered what happened to that discussion. Mr. Caimano added he also recalled the discussion, however, there was no answer.

Mr. Champagne noted that in the past this activity was contracted to the WCREDC. He said he felt without someone directly responsible, the program would fail. He supported Mr. Bennett's suggestion that the county follow through and hire a professional with some real background and knowledge.

Mr. Caimano replied he was in favor of the program, but there is evidence that there are people around that do exactly as Mr. Champagne describes, and do a great job on the program, and they do not have to be full time employees. Mr. Tessier disagreed, and said he felt in order to make this program fly they needed a funded position. He suggested getting a volunteer to assist, but added he felt they were very scarce.

Mr. Brower also agreed that volunteers could be used in the program, but said he felt the program needed a full time coordinator to coordinate those efforts, along with their own efforts. He mentioned he proctored a series of seven classes conducted at Adirondack Community College that dealt with marketing, advertising, financing, dealing with bankers, lawyers, etc. He said those efforts were very productive because as a result of the classes, many decided not to go into business because they realized with their business plans they could not make the money they needed to survive. Also, he continued, of the others that did go into business, they are still in business today and they are paying back their loans. He said he felt the Micro-Enterprise Program was a great program and if a majority of those entrepreneurs succeed, then the county has done a good job.

Mr. Monroe recalled discussion from the Finance & Personnel Committee on the financing of the aforementioned position, and the additional funds needed for this position could come from the Micro-Enterprise Program. (Please refer to Finance & Personnel Committee minutes of June 7th for details.)

Mr. Robillard noted that Resolution Nos. 398 through 445 were mailed, and a motion was needed to bring Resolution Numbers 397 and 446 through 453 to the floor. Motion was made by Mr. Belden, seconded by Mr. Caimano and carried unanimously to bring Resolution Numbers 397 and 446 through 453 to the floor.

Clerk noted corrections to Resolution No. 408, authorizing agreements with various organizations for the Summer Youth Employment & Training Program, to correct a date, and Resolution No. 424, authorizing applications under the Airport Capital Improvement Program for grant assistance for various projects, to eliminate a duplication of projects listed. Board members unanimously agreed to the aforementioned corrections being made.

Chairman called for a vote on the resolutions.

Resolution Numbers 397 through 453 were approved. Proclamation recognizing National 4-H Centennial Celebration, was submitted.

COUNTY OF WARREN PROPOSED LOCAL LAW NO. 3 OF 2002

A LOCAL LAW AUTHORIZING REVISIONS OF BOUNDARIES TO THE EMPIRE ZONE

BE IT ENACTED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren, New York, as follows:

SECTION 1. <u>Purpose.</u> The purpose of this Local Law is to provide for the revision of the boundaries of the Empire Zone previously authorized by Local Law Nos. 2 of 2001 and 2 of 2002 and to authorize application to the New York State Commissioner of Economic Development for revision of said Empire Zone boarders.

SECTION 2. Application for Revisions Authorized. The submission to the Commissioner shall revise the boundaries of the existing Empire Zone to add certain parcels, delete certain parcels, or reduce certain parcels to the size of the building footprint with the proposed Empire Zone boundaries to be, if approved, as shown on certain maps prepared by the Warren County Planning Department prior to or on dated June 19, 2002 and more specifically described as follows:

A. Map entitled "Town of Bolton" prepared by the Warren County Planning Depart ment and dated June 14, 2002. (Total Area of Selected Buildings: 6.95 Acres)

- B. Map entitled "Town of Chester" prepared by the Warren County Planning Depart ment and dated June 16, 2002. (Approximate Acreage of Selected Parcels: 101 Acres; and Approximate Acreage of Selected Building: 0.7 Acre)
- C. Map entitled "City of Glens Falls Economic Development Zone" prepared by the Warren County Planning Department and dated June 16, 2002. (Approximate Acre age of Selected Parcels: 354 Acres*; and Approximate Acreage of Selected Build ings: 6 Acres** - *Acreage for parcels was calculated using the GIS and does not necessarily represent the taxes, deeded or surveyed acreage for each parcel - ** Acreage for building footprints was calculated using square footage information from the assessor's database)
- D. Map entitled "Town of Johnsburg" prepared by the Warren County Planning De partment and dated June 16, 2002. (Approximate Area of Buildings: 1 Acre; Ap proximate Area of Parcel: 5.5 Acres; and Approximate Area of Development Area: 2 Acres)
- E. Map entitled "Town and Village of Lake George" prepared by the Warren County Planning Department and dated June 14, 2002. (Approximate Area of Existing Buildings: 1.8 Acres; Approximate Area of Proposed Building: .3 Acre; and Ap proximate Area of Selected Parcels: 24.7 Acres)
- F. Map entitled "Town of Queensbury" prepared by the Warren County Planning De partment and dated June 17, 2002. (Approximate Area of Proposed Building: .45 Acre; Approximate Area of Selected Building: 2.5 Acres; Approximate Area of Selected Parcels: 365 Acres; Development Sites: 15.52 Acres; and Approximate Total Area: 383.47 Acres)
- G. Map entitled "Town of Warrensburg" prepared by the Warren County Planning Department and dated June 17, 2002. (Approximate Area of Selected Buildings: 2.4 Acres; and Approximate Area of Selected Parcels: 25 Acres)

The aforesaid maps shall be placed on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervi sors of the County of Warren and shall not be further revised except by Local Law duly adopted by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren.

SECTION 3. Tax Map Identification Numbers for Parcels and Building Footprints in the Empire Zone. Schedule "A" is hereby made a part of this Local Law and incorporated herein for all purposes which Schedule sets forth the tax map identification numbers of all parcels and parcels with only building footprints that would be a part of the Empire Zone if the New York State Commissioner of Economic Development approves of the proposed revisions. The annexed Schedule, therefore, is the Empire Zone as proposed to be revised and where appropriate, reflects new tax map identification numbers and shall supercede the Schedule that was adopted and contained within Local Law No. 2 of 2001. Proposed revisions shall be determined by comparing the previously authorized Empire Zone with the additions authorized by Local Law No. 2 of 2002 with this new Schedule "A" and the previously referred to maps.

SECTION 4. <u>Public Notice and Hearing.</u> The Municipal Home Rule Law of the State of New York provides for notice and public hearing prior to the adoption of this Local Law and such public notice shall be sufficient to also advise the public of the proposed revision to the Empire Zone and said public hearing shall also constitute of the public hearing necessary under General Municipal Law §969.

SECTION 5. Effect on Previously Adopted Local Law No. 2 of 2001 and Local Law No. 2 of 2002. Previously adopted Local Law No. 2 of 2001 authorized and empowered the County of Warren to submit an application for designation of certain areas within the County of Warren as an Empire Zone. Local Law No. 2 of 2002 provided for the addition of ten (10) parcels to the existing Empire Zone. In addition, both Local Laws contain provisions applicable to certain administrative aspects of the Empire Zone. This Local Law shall not effect

any of the administrative provisions or repeal or otherwise effect the previous authorization to submit an application for designation of certain areas within the County as an Empire Zone. Rather, this Local Law shall amend and/or supercede the previous Local Laws only to the extent that the areas designated as empire zones are added to, deleted or the size thereof reduced to the building footprints to the extent shown of the maps previously referred to in Section 2 hereof, and to the extent that said particular revisions are approved by the New York State Commissioner of Economic Development. In the event that any particular addition, deletion or reduction in size is not approved by the Commissioner, the area designated or not designated as an Empire Zone shall remain as set forth in the previous Local Law.

SECTION 6. <u>Effective Date.</u> This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing in the Office of the Secretary of State.

Regarding Resolution No. 453, introducing Proposed Local Law No. 3 of 2002, authorizing revisions of boundaries to the Empire Zone, Mr. Monroe indicated there had been an error in the Town of Chester, and he asked Mr. Fosbrook if the tax map parcel numbers being presented were correct. Mr. Fosbrook, Chairman of the WCREDC, replied those were the numbers Mr. Monroe gave them originally, and they need to be reviewed and changed, and can be put into the next boundary amendments.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Elizabeth Morgan, who addressed the supervisors regarding the preservation of the Monarch Butterfly. She requested the supervisors to go back to their various DPWs and request them to ask the people doing the mowing along the side of the roads to moderate their mowing practices and avoid mowing down as much milkweed as possible. She explained milkweed was essential to the life cycle of the Monarch Butterfly.

Ms. Morgan stated she had witnessed a sharp decrease in the number of Monarchs in this area in the generation between her children and her grandchildren. In addition, she noted that the Monarch population suffered a severe kill in a freak ice storm last year in Mexico, where they spend the winter.

In addition to being legislators, Ms. Morgan said she felt most of the supervisors were parents, and as such, she said it was wonderful to be able to identify a problem before it gets to be a problem. She urged the minor modification being requested, and said it would help keep the situation from becoming a problem with the Monarch Butterfly.

Ms. Morgan recalled the Karner Blue Butterflies faced extinction a few years ago in Ballston Spa, and it got to be a big problem. Karner Blues are as dependent on Lupine, she said, as Monarchs are on milkweed. As a result of the problem in Ballston Spa, she said, they had to spend money, they had to pass laws, and private landowners are limited in their utilization of their own land if there is a stand of Lupine on it. She urged not letting something like this happen with the Monarch Butterflies.

Ms. Morgan said that the public works employees are now required by laws to lift their sickle bars to avoid mowing what little Lupine there is left in the area. She noted these are intelligent people, and she felt they could be asked to see and identify milkweed as well as Lupine. Moderating the mowing practices was not magic and it will not solve the whole problem, she added. Fortunately, she said they had Up Yonda which already has in place a program to increase the Monarch Butterfly population, and Cornell Cooperative Extension Service and the Washington County Master Gardeners have supported butterfly programs in the past. In addition, she said the local gardening clubs and schools are supportive of the

idea, and the schools raise and release Monarch Butterflies as part of their fall science classes.

Ms. Morgan noted that although she was not an expert, she has presented butterfly programs for Cooperative Extension Services, for the Master Gardeners of Washington County and several of the local garden clubs. She said she was willing to put in her time to assist in this endeavor. Last year she said she raised and released 50 Monarch Butterflies, and this year she plans to raise and release 200. She offered to talk to the Department of Parks & Recreation about raising Monarch Butterflies, and if she can be of any other help, she would be happy to do so. She distributed her business card, offered her services also to the towns, and thanked the supervisors for their time. Chairman Thomas thanked Ms. Morgan for the presentation.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Donald Sipp, President of the Courthouse Residents' Association, who spoke concerning the Public Safety Building (PSB) project. He acknowledged that a number of Courthouse Estates residents were present at today's meeting and they were interested in the PSB construction project. Since he last spoke to the supervisors, he acknowledged that Sheriff Cleveland met with the residents on May 19th and about 50 people attended, including Supervisor Brower. Several days later, he noted Supervisor Caimano visited the site, and during the past week or so Sheriff Cleveland has visited the architect in Rochester and transmitted to him the residents' concerns about the positioning of the PSB. He noted the residents were concerned about the light on the back of the PSB, and that the lights would not shine towards Courthouse Estates; he said they were concerned about the drainage pond being created to take the runoff from the parking lots; that there be a buffer planted in order to protect the view of the Courthouse residents; and a better color for the portion of the PSB facing Courthouse Estates.

Mr. Sipp said the architect was very positive about the requests, and indicated the lighting can be faced toward the ground, the building can be colored block in an earth tone, and the movement of the drainage ditch can be done so it will not be necessary to cut trees right along Courthouse Drive. He said the most positive thing in their estimation was that in order to move this facility 100 feet closer to Route 9, to the west, would cost \$250,000. Because the grade is pretty steady at this point, he said they feel there is very little need for any excavation and this figure is not something that cannot be handled. Figuring on the 20-30 year bond issue with the current rates, he said this would amount to pennies per day and would conserve the property values of Courthouse Estates, and allow them to be screened from the PSB. Mr. Sipp thanked Supervisor Bennett for his contribution of some trees from his property to begin the screening. In conclusion, Mr. Sipp requested the residents of Courthouse Estates who were present at the meeting to raise their hands so they could be identified by the supervisors.

Mr. John Crawford of Courthouse Estates also addressed the board members. He acknowledged the fact that Courthouse Estates was an upscale community composed of at least 72 houses and growing. He said they make up over \$14,000,000 in real estate value, and there are a lot of tax dollars involved. He said the residents were very concerned with maintaining the quality of life of the community and they want to maintain it. He said it has to be advantageous to the County to maintain this high community value and not let it deteriorate to a lower value. Having a PSB located as close as possible to Courthouse Drive and further from Route 9 will have a significant negative impact on the housing value, he suggested. He said it seemed to be more important to hide the PSB from Route 9 and make it more visible to Courthouse, when it should be the opposite. He suggested the building should be turned around. He said the Jail will be very conspicuous, and it will look like a Jail and it will look out of place to the Courthouse residents. Aesthetically, he continued, it will affect the neighborhood, and the removal of trees will affect the sound barrier and increase the traffic noise, thus affecting the quality of life and the property values. He urged the supervisors to listen to Mr. Sipp's request, and move the PSB closer to Route 9, give it the visual and noise barriers needed to maintain the quality of life and maintain the property values and tax values to the County.

The Courthouse Estates residents recognized those speaking on their behalf with a round of applause.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Howard Krantz, Attorney at Law, who addressed the supervisors on behalf of the neighborhood concerned with the Obstruction Analysis/ Easement Acquisition Project at the Floyd Bennett Memorial Airport. He noted this involved residents of Chestnut Ridge Road, County Line Road, and Sanford Ridge Road that are impacted by the proposed avigation easements. He said this involves taking down trees that it was felt were a difficulty for the Airport. He noted that the neighborhood is comprised of about 50 families, and there are another 20 to 30 families that are not directly impacted but live right next door to where trees are proposed to be taken down, and therefore, they feel impacted as well. He said they have spoken with many pilots and asked if there was a problem with the trees, and the general response has been a "dull stare" and they have asked "what problem with the trees?" He noted that one pilot said that any pilot that has a problem with the trees at the Warren County Airport should not be flying.

Mr. Krantz acknowledged that while there may be a technical violation of a FAA resolution going back to the 1970's, there was no practical problem that they can perceive. He noted that occasionally airplanes fly over his home and they are a minimum of 400 feet above his tallest trees, and the FAA wants to literally clear cut acres of trees on his property. He said there have been meetings among the residents, many of whom were present today, and there was no anti-government sentiment, and no ranting and raving against politicians. He said these were decent, reasonable people, that just do not want their trees cut down. He said they would be civil in their opposition, seriously respectful at all times, but not a single person here will agree to the aviation avigation easement.

Mr. Krantz said he had spoken with Mr. Tessier and Mr. Caimano and they were both optimistic that some other solution can be made. Chairman Thomas asked if Mr. Krantz had spoken with these supervisors recently, and Mr. Krantz replied he talked with Mr. Caimano about a week ago, and about two weeks ago with Mr. Tessier.

Mr. Caimano explained that the technical violation is that the red and white lights used as a glide slope at the Airport have been turned off because the trees are too high on the slope. He said he was told by the Washington, DC, FAA, (who is talking to the Regional FAA), that their desire was to simply top the trees to make sure that those red and white lights can work. He said Washington FAA was kind of shocked that it had gone as far as it had. He said he has not had any answers back from Washington as yet.

Mr. Tessier added that Mr. Stevens, Assistant Airport Manager, has been in touch with FAA, and they are setting up a meeting. He reiterated that everything was on hold and the engineers have been told not to do anything else.

Mr. Krantz said he felt to a large extent, many of the supervisors did not know what had happened. While maybe the wheels were put into motion by the supervisors to pursue this, the extent and the manner in which the engineering firm that was hired went about it, was unknown to them. He said that was why the reaction was so strong from the neighbors. Chairman Thomas assured that the residents would be kept advised from now on.

Mr. Brower mentioned that former supervisor John Webster came in to meet with Chairman Thomas, the County Attorney and him. He reiterated Mr. Webster's comments that years ago lightening strikes were common on Chestnut Ridge, and when the County Airport decided to put up the light towers, all those strikes ceased because the towers took the lightening strikes. He noted according to Mr. Webster this had a very positive impact. Further, he noted, Mr. Webster was concerned over the removal of trees, and they had a productive conversation. Chairman Thomas concurred with Mr. Brower's remarks, noting that Mr. Webster had a wealth of knowledge of that area.

Mr. Montesi suggested any supervisors not familiar with the area, take time to travel through the neighborhoods, as it was very unique. He said by visiting the area, it will become evident there is a great deal of pride and oneness of this area. He mentioned that all of the people building homes in this area have recognized they are in harm's way, and the supervisors have not ever had anyone complain about noise or the amount of airplanes landing at

the Airport. He said he hoped there was some degree of trimming that can be done with these trees without harming them and it would hopefully satisfy all parties.

Mr. Krantz mentioned in closing that not a single neighbor has ever called and complained about the noise or airplanes. He said the neighbors understand they are near an airport, and that was not the issue at all. He said they just do not perceive a genuine safety problem, and what they do see is a technical violation that apparently has been around for 30 years and has not caused a problem. He said they just wanted to find the least obtrusive solution.

The members of the neighborhood present in support of Mr. Krantz' comments responded with a round of applause.

Chairman Thomas referred to earlier comments made on the PSB by Courthouse Estate residents, and asked Sheriff Cleveland if he had any comments. Sheriff Cleveland replied these issues were brought to the committee and answers will be brought back at the next meeting. He noted he was in contact with Mr. Sipp and would advise him when the meeting has been scheduled.

Chairman Thomas welcomed Joan Hague Smith, former Assembly woman to the meeting, and the supervisors recognized her with a round of applause.

Privilege of the floor was extended to John Salvador of Queensbury, who spoke first on the PSB. He recalled that some ten years ago there was some thought about expanding the Jail and the location of the expansion was to be the rear area of the building adjacent to the Jail, where the communications tower has since been erected. He asked why that area could not be utilized.

Supervisor Quintal, Chairman of the County Facilities Committee, noted they never looked at that area. He said they looked at the area across the road, which would be closer to Courthouse Estates. He also noted that they moved it to the current location so there would be a better buffer, and he added he could see no problem with working with the residents concerning their requests on the project.

Mr. Salvador asked if the location he described WAS viable for the PSB location. Mr. Quintal replied no, because there is a DPW facilities building that has to go there. He explained that the facilities building presently located where the PSB is going will have to be moved, and it will be relocated to the area described by Mr. Salvador. He added the facilities building is smaller than the PSB.

Mr. Salvador said he had hoped there would be discussion that would have resulted from the first Occupancy Tax Committee meeting, however, he added, it did not happen. He said he felt the first meeting was held on relatively short notice and it was poorly attended. He suggested it was a violation of the "gentlemen's agreement" they had that this would not be aired during the season when most of the people affected by the tax would be impacted by trying to attend. In any case, he said, the meeting took place, and added he felt some positive aspects have come out of it.

Mr. Salvador mentioned first, that there was the realization that the time has come for the supervisors to address the problem of the taxpayers of the county supporting one sector of the economy, namely tourism. At the present time, he said, the county expends \$1 million (approximately) of taxpayers' money to support and advertise tourism. He said he personally never agreed with that approach, and now Mr. O'Connor is bringing that into focus.

Mr. Salvador said he felt the important thing that came out of the committee meeting was the fact that in the event there would be an occupancy tax in the County, then that \$1 million (currently in the budget) would come back to the County treasury and be used for other purposes. In effect, he acknowledged that was revenue enhancement, and said indirectly he felt an occupancy tax did solve the problem of revenue enhancement.

Mr. Salvador said another thing that came out of the meeting was that there was a difference between an occupancy tax and a bed tax. He said he felt it was very important that the supervisors know that what they are talking about is an occupancy tax because if this tax is to be an outgrowth of a sales tax, the sales tax code as it defines hotel occupancy requires they are only obligated to collect a tax if the occupancy charge is greater than \$2 per night.

He stressed there were many components to the charge for a hotel or a motel room, occupancy being one of them, and if it is less than \$2, there is no tax to be collected. He said he would hate to see the County go through the rigors of a regulatory program that resulted in licensing and collecting an occupancy tax wherein they were anticipating getting millions of dollars, and then they wind up with less than 20 cents per room per night. He concluded he felt there needed to be a clear cut definition of terms.

Mr. Salvador said the other thing talked about in the meeting was the fact that this occupancy tax money collected in effect would be used for tourism promotion only and would remain in the control of the County. He said that those who would be impacted by this tax would insist on a locked box approach. He said the supervisors talked about distribution of the money from this locked box and each of the town supervisors were concerned about how their towns would benefit. He said those technicalities had to be resolved.

Mr. Salvador also spoke concerning the Empire Zone and the resolution passed today regarding boundaries. He said he commented at the Queensbury Town Board meeting last Monday and his comments were centered around the fact that the legislative program which was put into place for the Empire Zone was dedicated to two specific items. He said he felt the legislative intent for the land put into an Empire Zone was that the land would be vacant, essentially useless and where there was pervasive poverty. Secondly, he said under the law, a corporation is a person, and the law says the person qualified for these benefits has to have a minority characteristic, and there is no other definition in the law for those who can qualify for the tax benefits than minorities. Unless the stockholders of these companies that are going to benefit from the empire zone (and he added that Great Escape was not the only one) are able to show that a majority of their stockholders are owners and are minorities, they may not qualify for these benefits. He said he thought if the county decides to put this type of land in the empire zone, then they are violating the law.

Regarding The Great Escape and the issue of the admission tax, Mr. Salvador noted there has been a lot of reporting in the local newspaper (*The Post-Star*). He complimented the efforts of the newspaper in their recent story where they laid out the wording of the regulations regarding sales tax collection, and they canvassed other amusement parks in the State of New York. He concurred with Mr. Tessier's remarks that this was a state-wide problem. He noted that Sunday's editorial in *The Post-Star* talked about a loophole, and he acknowledged there was a loophole, but The Great Escape was not taking advantage of it. He noted the law states that admissions, regardless of what type, was taxable. He also noted that amusements were taxable, however, even though rides were a form of amusements, the regulations say they are tax exempt, providing certain things were done, and these things were not being done by The Great Escape.

Mr. Salvador said he wrote to the New York State Taxation and Finance Department on May 13, 2002, but has not received an answer. He indicated he would continue to pursue it. He said he felt there were millions of dollars involved. The public responded with applause.

Chairman Thomas noted the meeting had for the Occupancy Tax Committee was legally advertised. He said he recognized Mr. Salvador's comments that the time of the year was not appropriate for having the meetings, however, they were getting to budget time and they have to start discussing the issues. He said it appeared Mr. Salvador felt the content of the meeting was good, and he assured the supervisors were not trying to do anything in haste, nor were they trying to avoid anyone.

Mr. Salvador said his point was that it was on short notice. He noted Mr. Robillard puts out a schedule of committee meetings every month and they happened to hear Friday that there would be a meeting on Tuesday. He said the first notice many people got was reading the newspaper that morning of the 9:30 a.m. meeting. He acknowledged it was legal because the supervisors make the laws, but said he felt it was grossly unfair.

Mr. Montesi apprised Mr. Salvador that Frank O'Keefe, County Treasurer has sent a letter to the Deputy Commissioner of Tax Policy with his concerns about The Great Escape. He said that Mr. O'Keefe requested that their office contact him to arrange a meeting with Warren County. Mr. O'Keefe added he wrote the same letter on June 21, 2001, and still has not received an answer. Copies of the aforementioned letters are on file in the Office of the

Clerk of the Board of Supervisors with County Treasurer records.

Chairman Thomas noted that by next week the meeting schedule for the supervisors meetings would be prepared and he urged the public to either pick up the schedule or call Mr. Robillard's Office.

Mr. Brower thanked Mr. O'Keefe for his diligence in following up with the State Sales Tax Department.

Mr. Kenny said he agreed with Mr. Salvador on The Great Escape sales tax issue. He said that the supervisors have been involved in this situation for at least five years and probably closer to 10 years. He noted the issue of The Great Escape was discussed five years ago, and Treasurer O'Keefe has called State Taxation and Finance before he sent the letters to ask them to come to a supervisor meeting to explain how the formula was derived for The Great Escape. He suggested that maybe with *The Post-Star* article, the supervisors will get a response.

Mr. Kenny referred to Mr. Salavador's remarks about a "gentlemen's agreement" not to hold meetings during the summer months. He said if there was such an agreement, it had eluded him somehow. He recalled that two or three years ago they held meetings during the winter and spring months and there was discussion from some of the motel owners that it was not fair that they were not here in Warren County when the meetings were being held, because they are only open June, July and August and are not here during the other months. He said he did not know how the supervisors could win when they schedule these meetings.

Mr. Mallison thanked Mr. Salvador for coming to the meeting and expressing his concerns. He complimented the efforts of Treasurer O'Keefe for being out in front on this issue. He said that in reading the minutes of the Occupancy Tax Committee meeting, he noted that one of the concerns being expressed is that the supervisors try to reduce property taxes in the County, and acknowledged Mr. Monroe for bringing up this issue. Bringing in new revenues from The Great Escape, he said, was one way they can start to do this.

Mr. Mallison also suggested that a letter be sent to the state legislators representing Warren County asking them for assistance in setting up a meeting with the Department of Taxation and Finance. Chairman Thomas agreed this was a good idea.

Mr. Gabriels said this was the first time he ever heard about regulations on occupancy taxes that say if occupancy is less than \$2 no tax is to be collected. He asked if the County Attorney could research the validity and describe the parameters of this information. If this is true, Mr. Gabriels said he could see the possibility of people charging less for occupancy and more for other services that were tax exempt. Mr. Dusek said he would research the information.

Discussion returned to the holding of meetings on short notice. Mr. Monroe suggested maybe the notices could be put on the county's web site.

Mr. Champagne asked Mr. Kenny if anywhere along his research over the last five years had he found anything in the regulations like what Mr. Salvador was discussing. He said he would hate to waste Mr. Dusek's time looking up something that was already known. Mr. Kenny replied he would certainly have Mr. Dusek research this, but from his research, he had not discovered this information. He said they requested different counties to fax their occupancy tax laws and 20 - 25 responses were received. He said they are all pretty boiler plate information.

Chairman Thomas asked Ms. Bernstein, who was present at the meeting representing *The Post-Star*, if when the newspaper receives meeting notices could they run the notices earlier, rather than running them the day of the meeting. He suggested maybe the newspaper could also run a reminder on the day of the meeting. Ms. Bernstein said she would check

Regarding the discussion on the regulations on occupancy taxes that say if occupancy is less than \$2 no tax is to be collected, Mr. Salvador explained that the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance promulgated these regulations as a result of the legislative re-enactment.

At the conclusion of brief discussion, there being no further business, on motion by Mr. Montesi, seconded by Mr. O'Neill the meeting adjourned at 11:40 a.m.

WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING WEDNESDAY, JULY 17, 2002

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren convened at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center, Lake George, New York, at 10:05 a.m.

Mr. William Thomas presiding.

Salute to the flag was led by Supervisor O'Connor.

Roll called, the following members present:

Supervisors Gabriels, Monroe, Mallison, Sheehan, O'Connor, Kenny, Belden, Bentley, Thomas, Tessier, Bennett, Brower, Caimano, Morrell, Champagne, Montesi, O'Neill, Haskell, and Quintal - 19.

Absent: Supervisor Moynihan - 1.

Motion was made by Mr. Caimano, seconded by Mr. Montesi and carried unanimously to approve the minutes of the June 17, 2002, board meeting, subject to correction by the clark

Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing relating to real property tax exemption for eligible veterans to exempt disability income from their eligible income for the over age 65 property exemptions open at 10:07 a.m., and requested the Clerk to read the Notice of Public Hearing.

Deputy Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak on the proposed local law, Chairman extended privilege to the floor to any supervisor wishing to speak on the subject.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Mr. Kenny, who explained the provision being proposed for the information of the public and the supervisors. He noted that up until a couple of years ago, the income from veterans disability was tax exempt, until someone in New York State came up with the idea to give the option to the communities and the counties whether they wanted to include this income in determining tax rates. He said this option provided a minimal impact on the County, because to be eligible under this provision, the person had to be over 65, be low income, and receiving a veteran's disability.

Mr. Kenny noted that veteran's disability income was paid to a veteran who suffered a disability while on active duty, and the income was tax exempt under federal law, and it was considered so sovereign that it cannot be attached for bankruptcy, divorce proceedings or for any other reason. He said he felt for communities and counties to include this income under the Real Property Law was an effort to circumvent the intention of the United States Code. He noted that many veterans came back from serving their country in a physical capacity that was less than when they left home, and many were unable to resume their professions due to their injuries.

Mr. Kenny explained that the legislation being proposed today would reinstate the rights of those disabled veterans to exclude this disability income, as they have done in the past until a couple of years ago. While it affected a very small number of people in the county, he said he felt this small number is representative of those in the greatest need for the exemption. He said he certainly was supportive of the legislation.

There being no further comments relating to the public hearing, Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing closed 10:12 a.m.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Teresa Sayward, Supervisor of the Town of Willsboro, who thanked the Board of Supervisors for its majority endorsement in support of her candidacy for the Assembly seat (109th District representing Warren County being vacated by Assemblywoman Little, who was running for New York State Senator). She said she felt the County's support, coupled with the support from Hamilton County and Warren County Republican Committees, has begun to bring unity to the new 113th District.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Donald Sipp, President of the Courthouse Residents' Association, however, he requested to defer his comments until after other business was transacted by the Board of Supervisors.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Mr. Bennett, who discussed a proposed resolution which he had distributed to the supervisors and which, if approved, would express support of the Woolworth Theater Project request for assistance from the New York State Empire Opportunity Fund. He stressed it was not requiring any funds to be provided in a matching manner or otherwise, and it was merely supporting the effort to seek funds.

Mr. Bennett moved approval to introduce the aforesaid resolution, seconded by Mr. Montesi.

Mr. Mallison seconded Mr. Bennett's comments and introduction of the resolution. He said he felt the Woolworth Project was a tremendous asset to the downtown area of Glens Falls. He thanked Mr. Bennett for introducing the resolution of support.

The motion to introduce the resolution was carried by unanimous vote. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 508 for the record.

Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing on Proposed Local Law No. 3 of 2002 open at 10:13 a.m., and requested the Clerk to read the Notice of Public Hearing.

Deputy Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak on the proposed local law, Chairman extended privilege of the floor to any supervisor wishing to speak on the subject.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Mr. Bennett, who informed the supervisors that the revisions within the proposed local law have been reviewed in each of the respective communities. He noted that a lot of thought had gone into approving these revisions and they were approved by each of the communities that had an interest. He explained the need for a number of the revisions was that the information wound up including municipal parcels that were not available for development, and they needed to be taken out since they had no value in the community as a development parcel. He said that there were other parcels that, for one reason or another, had been left out, and this provides an opportunity (and there is only one opportunity per year) to make revisions. He noted that the Board of Supervisors was the last body to look at this document after all of the other communities have looked at it.

Mr. Montesi said he knew that the Queensbury Town Supervisor, Dennis Brower, had reviewed the document. He asked Mr. Brower if the parcel list included The Great Escape. Mr. Brower replied yes. Mr. Montesi asked if the list included the "old" Great Escape, or the "proposed new" Great Escape. Mr. Brower replied it included a few parcels of The Great Escape property. He noted their original request was reduced significantly. He noted this process will enable them to build their new hotel footprint as part of the Empire Zone, and they will be able to reconfigure their power needs, which was essential for them. He also commented this effort would enable them to have year-around employment for many new employees, and additional seasonal employment, both for retirees and youth.

Mr. Brower said he was thankful for the Empire Zone that the Warren County Regional Economic Development Corporation (WCREDC) had worked very hard and diligently to obtain. He said he felt this now made Warren County competitive in New York, if not in the entire Nation. He said he felt the zone was essential, particularly in light of the closings of International Paper Company in Corinth and Decora in Fort Edward. He said citizens of Warren County work in these facilities that have been closed, and added he felt any time the County can bring in employment or encourage new business to come in, or an existing business to expand, he felt it was positive for the community.

Mr. Kenny asked Mr. Brower to clarify if the parcel listing included all of the present Great Escape property. Mr. Brower replied no. Mr. Bennett estimated it included about one-third of the property. Mr. Kenny said he certainly was supportive of The Great Escape, as it was a wonderful attraction and brings a lot of people to Warren County. He said, however, he was not sure that was the intent of the Empire Zone legislation, and added he was concerned that the incentives The Great Escape receives will be passed along to their home office, and

will not remain in Warren County. He said he was in favor of all expansion proposed for The Great Escape to be included in the Empire Zone. Chairman Thomas pointed out that the Empire Zone was awarded to Warren County for the creation of jobs within Warren County, and the business is not as important as the creation of jobs within the County. Mr. Kenny said he understood job retention, and Chairman Thomas pointed out that was what they were trying to do through The Great Escape by getting this designation.

Mr. Mallison commented he had read through the entire package on the website that WCREDC created on the Empire Zone. He said that Mr. Kenny was correct, and the original intention of the legislation was to create more industrial or production jobs. He said he was very appreciative of the fact that the County can manipulate those rules to allow for expansion of jobs that are available, because the County did not have a lot of industrial or production jobs coming to the area.

Mr. Mallison also noted that about a month ago, the supervisors were sitting in the Board Room and there were two discussions about The Great Escape, one about sales tax and one about its inclusion in the Empire Zone. He asked whether any resolution has come to the issue of the sales tax being collected from The Great Escape. Chairman Thomas noted there was going to be a meeting in the Board Room on August 14th at 10:00 a.m. to discuss this with the NYS Sales Tax Division.

Mr. Mallison asked if he was correct that Proposed Local Law No. 3 allows the County to include all of the parcels listed in the Empire Zone for one year, and it can be amended every year. Mrs. Donovan, of WCREDC replied, and noted that the boundary limits are allowed to be changed one time annually. She said that the parcels that are going in on this boundary amendment have come before the Zone Administrative Board and the plans have been explained. She said the plans would be reviewed semiannually by the Board to make sure the companies were putting their plans in place as they said. If not, she said the companies would simply not get the tax credits and they would be decertified from the zone.

Mr. Mallison commented that he felt he would like to see The Great Escape be a little bit more forthcoming with sales tax dollars, and suggested the County use the "carrot and stick" approach, to say that a year from now the county would have a bit more of a skeptical approach as to whether or not they should be maintained within the Empire Zone if they are unwilling to be fully contributing members of the sales tax population. Chairman Thomas suggested waiting for the outcome of the meeting on August 14th with NYS Sales Tax. Mr. Caimano agreed, and pointed out The Great Escape may very well be as forthcoming as they need to be for the State, and the County will find that out on August 14th. He added he did not feel it was right to impugn their integrity at this point. (Please note, subsequent to the board meeting, this meeting was canceled.)

Discussion returned to the Empire Zone, and Mr. Caimano reminded the supervisors that this represents the letter and the spirit of the law, and that was why the zone was changed every year. He said this was a fluid type of operation and a fluid type of a law. He said the whole purpose was to create jobs. He said in his other job (representing Congressman Sweeney) he worked in counties that do not have an empire zone as yet and they are very sorry that they do not and they are trying to get it as not having one puts them at a disadvantage.

Mr. Montesi addressed Mr. Mallison's remarks, and said there were some industries that were already located within the County, and they were noticing that the County was doing a lot to get new people into the County, and they wanted to know what was being done for the existing businesses already providing jobs. He said he thought that was one of the reasons why some of the existing businesses, such as Finch Pruyn and The Sagamore, are included in the Empire Zone. He commented he felt the County was looking for new development and new industries to come in, but they are also taking care of the people already here providing jobs, and this is what the Empire Zone does.

Mr. Brower remarked that another positive benefit of the Empire Zone was the expansion of AngioDynamics, which is located near the Floyd Bennett Memorial Airport. He noted

the company has announced a 32,000 square foot building expansion and the hiring of 200 additional people over a course of five years. He noted they were borrowing \$4.5 million to expand their facilities, and this has all been enabled through the Empire Zone.

Mr. Bennett commented he felt the revisions (of property boundaries) was important to all of the communities involved, and to all of the communities of Warren County. He added he also felt moving this along would certainly benefit the employment field.

There being no one further wishing to speak on Proposed Local Law No. 3 of 2002, Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing closed at 10:26 a.m.

Chairman Thomas dispensed with committee reports for July, due to a lengthy agenda. He extended privilege of the floor to any supervisors wishing to report on a specific committee item.

Supervisor Monroe, Chairman of the Solid Waste & Recycling Committee, presented a committee report of activities to date. He reported that a tentative agreement has been reached with Wheelabrator to purchase Foster-Wheeler's interest and transfer it to the counties. He noted that Wheelabrator, Warren County, Washington County and Warren and Washington Counties Industrial Development Agency (IDA) signed a Letter of Intent on June 4th, based on an agreement between Wheelabrator and Foster-Wheeler for a purchase price for the plant.

Mr. Monroe noted that subsequently, Foster-Wheeler reneged on the agreement and requested 70 percent more on the purchase price. He said that he was pleased to report that Wheelabrator did not walk away in disgust, and continued to negotiate. He said that Wheelabrator made a condition of any additional payments that Foster-Wheeler settle the litigation with the IDA and Washington County. He noted there had been discussion back and forth on settling the litigation, and Foster-Wheeler and Wheelabrator has arrived at an agreement on a revised purchase price, and part of the agreement is that Wheelabrator would actually pay the money to settle with the counties on the lawsuits. He said it is assumed they would then pay that much less to Foster-Wheeler. He said there was originally an offer made by Foster-Wheeler; the counties came back with a revised offer, and then Wheelabrator made an increased offer. At the meeting yesterday, he noted, the counties rejected the increased offer and asked for additional money, and finally they arrived at an agreed upon amount of \$650,000 to settle all outstanding litigation. He noted the Inter-County Solid Waste Coordinating Committee unanimously recommends to the Warren and Washington Counties Boards of Supervisors and the IDA its approval.

Mr. Monroe also noted that the aforementioned settlement would be conditioned upon releases between the parties, and that Foster-Wheeler and Wheelabrator actually conclude the transactions that have been agreed to in the June 4th Letter of Intent, with any additional terms that are not covered in that agreement to be negotiated within what was a 60-day period that began on June 4th. Because of what Foster-Wheeler did, he noted that everything was stopped, and it has delayed a minimum of three weeks. He recommended that the exclusive period of negotiations be extended 30 days. He noted there was some discussion at the Inter-County Solid Waste Committee meeting to extend it by the amount of time that Foster-Wheeler cost, which has been about 2 1/2 weeks now. He said they still do not have a final letter signed by Foster-Wheeler, but the County does have a letter confirming that they have agreed, so they have something saying they agree to the revised number with Wheelabrator. He noted the items he proposed were set forth in proposed Resolution No. 507, and he urged the supervisors to pass the resolution at the appropriate time.

Chairman Thomas added that he felt this was an important step in getting to the refinancing and saving the taxpayers considerable dollars. Mr. Monroe agreed, and noted one of the next steps on the due diligence was to meet with the bond rating agencies, because they have met twice with them but they did not have a firm agreement with the buyer at that point. He said they have tentative bond ratings for the new bonds, but now they need to get new ratings based on the aforementioned agreements.

Mr. Caimano recalled at the joint county meeting held yesterday, it was agreed that the counties would not go forward until they had something signed by someone of authority in both companies (Foster-Wheeler and Wheelabrator) saying that they have reached agreement. He noted now that this has been received, he felt all impediments have been removed.

Mr. Kenny asked Mr. Monroe if it was his opinion that this settlement of the litigation was acceptable to the supervisors of Washington County. Mr. Monroe said yes. He added that before the final number was available, he said he had spoken with Don Cummings, the Chairman of the Washington County Board of Supervisors. He said they reviewed what the litigation was about and what they thought was a fair settlement. He noted they arrived at a number, agreeing if the offer came to that number, they would recommend acceptance. He noted that the number arrived at actually exceeds the number agreed upon as acceptable. Mr. Caimano added that Washington County Board of Supervisors was well represented at yesterday's meeting, and besides the vote of the committee, Chairman Monroe asked everyone in attendance whether they approved, and everyone present approved, provided the letters were received from Wheelabrator and Foster-Wheeler, as previously stated. Chairman Thomas mentioned that 11 of the 17 supervisors from Washington County were present at the meeting.

For the information of the supervisors, Mr. Monroe explained the litigation being proposed for settlement. He said the first one was by Washington County to void the lawsuits, but there have been numerous Decisions and they have not been successful. The IDA lawsuit, he added, was basically over money, and some of the issues were already resolved in court. He said the ones still alive and major, according to the IDA attorney, were the legal fees, where the counties and IDA objected to Foster-Wheeler passing legal fees through the Project, which totaled about \$825,000. He said that Mr. Morris, IDA Attorney, agreed that some of the fees were justified, but some were not, and in some cases, there seemed to be double-billing and multiple law firms looking at the same issue. He said that Foster-Wheeler's argument was that they had to spend that money to defend the contracts to protect the bondholders. He said according to Mr. Morris, it was not completely clear that they have that authority in the contract, so that was an issue the counties might win or lose in court. He said the other issues were stronger, and included the cost of billing customers, wherein the counties and IDA believe that Foster Wheeler has overcharged for billing customers (approximately \$100,000 in excess charges were believed involved); and there was an issue of interest on some money, which involved approximately \$48,000. He said the settlement of \$650,000 was recommended by Mr. Morris, Mr. Dusek, the chairmen of Warren and Washington Counties Boards of Supervisors, and himself.

Chairman Thomas noted that Mr. Monroe came onto the board in 1992 and has been tie up in the Trash Plant issues almost from the moment he arrived. He recalled history of the Trash Plant, including meetings and negotiations, and said he felt Mr. Monroe deserved all of the credit for making things happen.

Mr. Champagne asked how the \$650,000 settlement would be divided among the two counties. Mr. Monroe replied he felt that was something yet to be decided. He said even though the litigation was brought by the IDA, the counties actually paid the legal bills for the litigation. Mr. Caimano interjected that he thought this has been settled. He said there was a meeting and he thought a split was determined based upon the current split of expenses.

There being no further questions, or comments, the meeting continued. Supervisor Tessier, Chairman of the Airport Committee, presented a report on the recent Airport Committee meeting.

Supervisor Haskell, Chairman of the Westmount Health Facility Committee, mentioned the statewide award presented to Carol Persons of the Westmount Health Facility by New York State Association of Homes and Services for the Aging. He noted that out of all of the people in New York State, Warren County's employees received the award, and he said he felt it was worth mentioning again.

Chairman called for reading of communications.

Clerk read communications, including the following:

Letter from Adirondack Regional Chambers of Commerce Chairman, George Ferone, announcing that Jim Berg was resigning as president and chief executive officer on August 31, 2002.

Annual Report: Veterans' Service Agency

Communications, resolutions and reports ordered placed on file.

Chairman called for reading of resolutions.

Mr. Morrell moved to introduce a resolution which originated in the Sheriff & Communications Committee, recommending that the PSB location be 50 feet west of the previously proposed site, and also to approve an increase in the architectural and engineering contract with MRB Group for \$20,000. All the Queensbury supervisors seconded the motion together.

Mr. Mallison asked for clarification of the \$20,000 expenditure with the architect, and also for clarification of information he heard that the expenditure for this move would be \$100,000 - \$200,000. Mr. Morrell noted the \$20,000 was for the architect to make the adjustment in the PSB plans. Mr. Quintal noted the \$20,000 figure was included in the \$100,000 estimate for the cost of the move, and the \$80,000 remaining was for extra site clearing, and excavation which was required to move the PSB. He added that these numbers needed to be scrutinized further in his opinion. He noted the architect was being paid \$1.5 million for the project, and he felt the item could be negotiated.

Mr. Tessier thought the number agreed upon for the move was not to exceed \$75,000, and the supervisors would still continue to negotiate the costs to try to get the number down further. Chairman Thomas concurred. Chairman Thomas suggested that a resolution be passed to authorize the \$20,000 increase in the architectural contract, only. He apprised that Sheriff Cleveland has monies in the PSB project money to cover the balance of the costs, which would be difficult to determine right now. He said that Sheriff Cleveland had indicated he was very comfortable that this change would come in under the budget projected.

Mr. Kenny pointed out that this change would mean a one-month delay in the project, and he asked Sheriff Cleveland if he had the extra money in his budget to cover the cost of boarding prisoners. Sheriff Cleveland replied that there was a lag between the design phase (which ends in December) and the construction phase (which starts in April). He noted, therefore, this change would not make the final project any longer. Mr. Kenny clarified that the PSB would be occupied according to the original projections, and Sheriff Cleveland replied yes.

Mr. Haskell recalled the original proposal on this move was for 100 feet west at a cost of \$400,000 (plus). He said he could not support the proposal at that time; however, he said he had no problem supporting this proposed 50-foot move to give the neighbors a little bit more clearance. Based on the total project, he said he felt this was a very small amount of money, and that the supervisors should approve the request. Mr. Quintal echoed Mr. Haskell's remarks and said he was also in favor of the move.

Mr. Bennett acknowledged that he was probably the longest standing "no" on the matter, and he noted he felt it very interesting that some supervisors were willing to write him off and believe that no is no. He said if through this 50-foot move, the county will be able to provide the dense plantings that will provide the screening for visual and sound barriers and it allows the county to get on with the use of the balance of the property, then it was an investment that was worthwhile. He said while he had said no, he found he would be able to vote yes on the proposal. Mr. Brower and Mr. Morrell made similar comments regarding the advantages of this move.

Mr. Mallison said he felt it was terrific that the supervisors from Queensbury had done such a good job alleviating the concerns of the Courthouse Estates residents, and noted he would also like to be sure he was representing the people from the ward he represents. He asked for clarification that the money \$75,000 (or less) will come out of an existing budget

and will not require any additional expenditures. Chairman Thomas said they could not guarantee that, but the money will come out of the project budget and they will know how much that is further into the process. He noted it will not be the original "over \$100,000."

Mr. Champagne pointed out that Queensbury does pay 66-67 percent of the bill, and he thought that information needed to be known.

Chairman Thomas suggested since there were so many people in the room for this meeting to hear about this subject, that the supervisors waive the writing of the resolution, which would require passage by a two-thirds vote.

Motion was made by Mr. Quintal, seconded by Mr. Gabriels and carried unanimously to approve sponsorship of this resolution, and to waive the Rules of the Board requiring its submission in writing.

Motion was made by Mr. Morrell, seconded by Mr. Montesi and carried unanimously to bring the resolution to the floor. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 509 for the record.

Mr. O'Neill asked for clarification on the resolution and asked what the expenditure was that was being authorized. Chairman Thomas replied \$20,000 for the architect/engineering. Mr. O'Neill said the supervisors should be aware that the cost will be several thousand dollars to follow, and Mr. Caimano said maybe, but it could be less.

Chairman called for a vote on the resolution.

Resolution No. 509 was approved. The interested public present responded to the vote with a round of applause.

RESOLVED, that the Warren County Sheriff is authorized and directed to take such actions as may be necessary to carry out the relocation of the Public Safety Building and the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors be, and he hereby is authorized to execute any agreements or such other documents that may be necessary to carry out the terms of this resolution, in the form approved by the County Attorney.

The process of reading resolutions continued, and Mr. Robillard noted that Resolution Nos. 455 through 489 were mailed, and a motion was needed to bring Resolution Numbers 454 and 490 through 507 to the floor. Motion was made by Mr. Belden, seconded by Mr. Caimano and carried unanimously to bring Resolution Numbers 454 and 490 through 507 to the floor. (Resolution No. 508 had previously been brought to the floor.)

Privilege of the floor was extended to Donald Sipp, President of the Courthouse Estates Residents' Association, who thanked the Chairman of the Board for listening to the group's

concerns over the past two months. He said they realized there were restraints (basically money), and therefore, they were happy to settle on the 50-foot move. He also thanked Sheriff Cleveland for providing the residents with a lot of information, and for keeping them abreast of what was going on. Mr. Sipp thanked the residents for attending meetings and backing him over the past few months. He also recognized Mr. Crawford for his efforts in organizing the people and making everyone aware of what was going on. He thanked the Queensbury Supervisors for the work they did on the change, also.

In closing, Mr. Sipp addressed the issue of the editorial which appeared in *The Post-Star* last Friday. He said he called the newspaper editor and spoke with him about it. He noted that in the editorial, it said that the present jail and the future jail would be the same distance from Courthouse Drive. He said nothing was further from the truth. He apprised that the present jail was 334 feet from Courthouse Drive. Last Friday morning, he said he and another individual measured it out accurately. He noted the proposed jail to begin with was 160 feet from Courthouse Drive, which is 174 feet closer to Courthouse Drive than the present jail. By moving it back 50 feet, to 210 feet, he said it was still 124 feet closer to Courthouse Drive than the present jail. He noted he invited the editor of *The Post-Star* to come up and see him measure this footage, but he declined.

Chairman Thomas recognized Tom Scozzafava, a candidate for the NYS Assembly, and extended privilege of the floor. Mr. Scozzafava indicated he was present to observe.

The meeting continued, and Mr. Quintal requested a roll call vote on Resolution No. 481, election not to participate in the voluntary retirement incentive plan offered by New York State. He noted that the reason he requested a roll call vote was because he had attended the Finance & Personnel Committee when this was discussed and this was one of several options available. He said the committee voted against this because the county was afraid of losing key employees and also of having to pay health insurance benefits for these people as retirees. He said he felt these people should have the option to retire if they wanted to. He said the county would be losing a lot of high-end people in the next few years anyway, and even though benefits will have to be paid to new people, the salaries would be lower.

Chairman called for a vote on the resolutions.

Resolution Numbers 454 through 508 were approved.

RESOLVED, that said Intermunicipal Agreement shall be deemed executory only to the extent of moneys available to the County for the performance of the terms hereof and no liability on account thereof shall be incurred by the County beyond moneys available to or appropriated by the County for the purpose of said Intermunicipal Agreement and that said Intermunicipal Agreement shall automatically terminate upon the termination of State or Federal funding available for such contract purpose.

RESOLUTION NO. 496 OF 2002

Resolution introduced by Supervisors Bennett, Champagne, Quintal, Brower and Moynihan

TO ENACT LOCAL LAW NO. 3 OF 2002

WHEREAS, a proposed local law was duly presented to the Board of Supervisors and considered by them, said proposed local law being entitled, "A Local Law Authorizing Revisions of Boundaries to the Empire Zone", and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors adopted Resolution No. 453 on June 19, 2002, authorizing a public hearing to be held by the Board of Supervisors on the 17th day of July, 2002, at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center on the matter of the proposed local law, and notice of such public hearing having been duly published and posted as required by law, and said public hearing having been held and all persons appearing at said public hearing desiring to be heard, having been heard, and

WHEREAS, a Short Environmental Assessment Form with Part I and proposed Parts II and III completed thereon is being presented at this meeting of the Board of Supervisors, and

WHEREAS, certain minor revisions have been made to the aforesaid Local Law which revisions consist of 1) clarifying in Section 1, that Local Law No. 2 of 2001 is actually the number assigned by the Secretary of State and Local Law No. 4 is the Warren County designation for said Local Law, 2) revising the approximate area of buildings set forth in Section 2 for the Town of Johnsburg from 1 acre to 0.6 acres and for the Town of Queensbury from 2.5 acres to 2.6 acres, 3) deleting the word "of" in Section 4 where it is indicated that the public hearing shall also constitute "of" the Public Hearing, 4) deleting the word "dated" in Section 2 in the last sentence of the last paragraph just before the date of June 19, 2002, 5) correcting certain misspellings, and 6) in the Schedule "A" Empire Zone Parcels placing certain existing Tax Map Identification Number shown under Town of Queensbury Building Footprints Only in chronological as opposed to random order, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Warren County Board of Supervisors hereby determines that the changes to the Local Law are minor and not material and do not change the intent or the effect of the Local Law, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren, after considering the Short Environmental Assessment Form presented at this meeting and particularly the proposed responses provided by Maureen Donovan, from the Warren County Regional Economic Development Corp., hereby determines that considering the nature of the action about to be undertaken such action will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts and the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors is hereby authorized and directed to execute Part III of the Short Environmental Assessment Form indicating this determination of the Board, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren, New York, on this 17th day of July, 2002, does hereby enact and adopt Local Law No. 3 of 2002 as set forth in Schedule "A" annexed hereto.

SCHEDULE "A"
COUNTY OF WARREN, NEW YORK
LOCAL LAW NO. 3 OF 2002
A LOCAL LAW AUTHORIZING REVISIONS OF BOUNDARIES TO THE
EMPIRE ZONE

BE IT ENACTED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren, New York, as follows:

SECTION 1. <u>Purpose.</u> The purpose of this Local Law is to provide for the revision of the boundaries of the Empire Zone previously authorized by Local Law No. 2 of 2001 (indexed as Local Law No. 4 of 2001in Warren County records) and Warren County Local Law No. 2 of 2002 and to authorize application to the New York State Commissioner of Economic Development for revision of said Empire Zone borders.

SECTION 2. Application for Revisions Authorized. As authorized by General Municipal Law §969, the Warren County Board of Supervisors shall submit to the New York State Commissioner of Economic Development a request to revise the boundaries of the existing Empire Zone situate in Warren County and previously authorized by Section 2 of Warren County Local Law No. 4 of 2001 (which was filed with the Secretary of State as Local Law No. 2 of 2001) and Section 3 of Warren County Local Law No. 2 of 2002. The submission to the Commissioner shall revise the boundaries of the existing Empire Zone to add certain parcels, delete certain parcels, or reduce certain parcels to the size of the building footprint with the proposed Empire Zone boundaries to be, if approved, as shown on certain maps prepared by the Warren County Planning Department prior to or on June 19, 2002 and more specifically described as follows:

- A. Map entitled "Town of Bolton" prepared by the Warren County Planning Depart ment and dated June 14, 2002. (Total Area of Selected Buildings: 6.95 Acres)
- B. Map entitled "Town of Chester" prepared by the Warren County Planning Depart ment and dated June 16, 2002. (Approximate Acreage of Selected Parcels: 101 Acres; and Approximate Acreage of Selected Building: 0.7 Acre)
- C. Map entitled "City of Glens Falls Economic Development Zone" prepared by the Warren County Planning Department and dated June 16, 2002. (Approximate Acre age of Selected Parcels: 354 Acres*; and Approximate Acreage of Selected Build ings: 6 Acres** - *Acreage for parcels was calculated using the GIS and does not necessarily represent the taxes, deeded or surveyed acreage for each parcel - ** Acreage for building footprints was calculated using square footage information from the assessor's database)
- D. Map entitled "Town of Johnsburg" prepared by the Warren County Planning De partment and dated June 16, 2002. (Approximate Area of Buildings: 0.6 Acre; Ap proximate Area of Parcel: 5.5 Acres; and Approximate Area of Development Area: 2 Acres)
- E. Map entitled "Town and Village of Lake George" prepared by the Warren County Planning Department and dated June 14, 2002. (Approximate Area of Existing Buildings: 1.8 Acres; Approximate Area of Proposed Building: .3 Acre; and Ap proximate Area of Selected Parcels: 24.7 Acres)
- F. Map entitled "Town of Queensbury" prepared by the Warren County Planning De partment and dated June 17, 2002. (Approximate Area of Proposed Building: .45 Acre; Approximate Area of Selected Building: 2.6 Acres; Approximate Area of Selected Parcels: 365 Acres; Development Sites: 15.52 Acres; and Approximate To tal Area: 383.47 Acres)
- G. Map entitled "Town of Warrensburg" prepared by the Warren County Planning Department and dated June 17, 2002. (Approximate Area of Selected Buildings: 2.4 Acres; and Approximate Area of Selected Parcels: 25 Acres)

The aforesaid maps shall be placed on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren and shall not be further revised except by Local Law duly adopted by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren.

SECTION 3. Tax Map Identification Numbers for Parcels and Building Footprints in the Empire Zone. Schedule "A" is hereby made a part of this Local Law and incorporated herein for all purposes which Schedule sets forth the tax map identification numbers of all parcels and parcels with only building footprints that would be a part of the Empire Zone if the New York State Commissioner of Economic Development approves of the proposed revisions. The annexed Schedule, therefore, is the Empire Zone as proposed to be revised and where appropriate, reflects new tax map identification numbers and shall supercede the Schedule that was adopted and contained within Warren County Local Law No. 4 of 2001 (which was filed with the Secretary of State as Local Law No. 2 of 2001). Proposed revisions shall be determined by comparing the previously authorized Empire Zone with the additions authorized by Warren County Local Law No. 2 of 2002 with this new Schedule "A" and the previously referred to maps.

SECTION 4. <u>Public Notice and Hearing.</u> The Municipal Home Rule Law of the State of New York provides for notice and public hearing prior to the adoption of this Local Law and such public notice shall be sufficient to also advise the public of the proposed revision to the Empire Zone and said public hearing shall also constitute the public hearing necessary under General Municipal Law §969.

SECTION 5. Effect on Previously Adopted Warren County Local Law No. 4 of 2001 (which was filed with the Secretary of State as Local Law No. 2 of 2001) and Warren County Local Law No. 2 of 2002. Previously adopted Warren County Local Law No. 4 of 2001 (which was filed with the Secretary of State as Local Law No. 2 of 2001) authorized and empowered the County of Warren to submit an application for designation of certain areas within the County of Warren as an Empire Zone. Warren County Local Law No. 2 of 2002 provided for the addition of ten (10) parcels to the existing Empire Zone. In addition, both Local Laws contain provisions applicable to certain administrative aspects of the Empire Zone. This Local Law shall not affect any of the administrative provisions or repeal or otherwise affect the previous authorization to submit an application for designation of certain areas within the County as an Empire Zone. Rather, this Local Law shall amend and/or supercede the previous Local Laws only to the extent that the areas designated as empire zones are added to, deleted or the size thereof reduced to the building footprints to the extent shown on the maps previously referred to in Section 2 hereof, and to the extent that said particular revisions are approved by the New York State Commissioner of Economic Development. In the event that any particular addition, deletion or reduction in size is not approved by the Commissioner, the area designated or not designated as an Empire Zone shall remain as set forth in the previous Local Law.

SECTION 6. <u>Effective Date.</u> This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing in the Office of the Secretary of State.

WHEREAS, the Counties of Warren and Washington Industrial Development Agency (the "Agency") on or about the 21st day of September, 1999 initiated a lawsuit against Foster Wheeler Corporation, Foster Wheeler Hudson Falls, Inc., and Adirondack Resource Recovery Associates ("ARRA") (collectively "Foster Wheeler") seeking to recover improper and excessive costs passed through to the Agency pursuant to the terms of the Amended and Restated Service Agreement between the Agency and ARRA dated as of October 28, 1988 and as amended through January 20, 1989; and

WHEREAS, the Agency, together with Washington County, Warren County, and the Bi-County Ad Hoc Negotiating Committee entered into a Letter of Intent with Wheelabrator Technologies, Inc. as of June 4, 2002, which Letter of Intent outlined the terms of an agreement to buy out Foster Wheeler, amend the Service Agreement and other necessary documents; and provided for an exclusive period of sixty (60) days for the parties to perform due diligence and negotiate the terms of a Definitive Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Wheelabrator Technologies, Inc. has informed the Agency and the Counties that it has reached an agreement with Foster Wheeler on the purchase price of the Hudson Falls Waste to Energy Facility, and as part of that agreement Wheelabrator will propose and pay to the Agency at closing, a settlement amount to conclude all outstanding legal disputes that may currently exist between the Counties, the Agency and Foster Wheeler; and

WHEREAS, Wheelabrator has offered to pay to the Agency the sum of Six Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$650,000) to settle all outstanding legal disputes that may currently exist between the Counties, the Agency and Foster Wheeler, it is hereby

WHEREAS, the Woolworth Theater Project is renovating the former Woolworth's building in the City of Glens Falls to create a multi-purpose performing arts center which will provide space for community-based arts groups to perform and entertain area residents, serve as a tourism attraction, educational resource and benefit to residents of Warren County and surrounding area, and

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WHEREAS, the Empire Opportunity Fund of New York State provides financial assistance to projects involving the development of capital facilities or infrastructure that will help create or retain jobs or business activity within a municipality or region of New York State, and

WHEREAS, the Warren County Board of Supervisors wishes to adopt a Resolution in support of the Woolworth Theater Project request for assistance from the New York State Empire Opportunity Fund, now therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors be, and he hereby is, authorized and directed to forward copies of this Resolution to the Woolworth Theater Project c/o Andrea Lyons at 234 Glen Street, Glens Falls, New York 12801 and the City of Glens Falls Common Council.

Chairman Thomas announced a luncheon meeting for elected officials from local municipalities that make up the Watershed Conference. He said it was at 12:30 p.m. today at the Town of Queensbury Senior Center, and following that will be a monthly meeting of the committee.

Mr. Caimano noted he sent a letter to the Board of Supervisors as Budget Officer talking about a topic that has come up many times regarding how raises are given to non-bargaining unit people. He asked the supervisors to review the letter and suggested it be discussed at the next Finance & Personnel Committee meeting so they can either move ahead or put it to rest once and for all.

Mr. Monroe discussed the Trash Plant negotiations, and noted in connection with their due diligence, he had asked the Office of the Clerk of the Board to prepare a comparison of the amount of tax rates raised over the past five years (per town) to the amount of that tax that was used to support the Trash Plant. He urged the supervisors to review the numbers and said he thought it provided interesting figures. He added this information would be used when they talk to the State and Federal Governments about funding requests.

Chairman Thomas announced a meeting next Tuesday (July 23rd) at 1:00 p.m. which would involve a review of the Airport Master Plan. He urged all supervisors to attend. Mr. Quintal announced he had tickets to the Saratoga County Fair for interested supervisors. He said the Parks, Recreation & Railroad Committee was working on a Master Plan on the Warren County Fairgrounds, and they would like everyone to look at the site in Saratoga County while the fair was in operation.

Mr. O'Connor welcomed Kathy Parker to the meeting, and recalled she had worked as a news reporter for many years. Mrs. Parker noted she was representing *The Chronicle*.

Mr. O'Neill discussed the fact that Warren County contributes \$4,500 per year to Lower Adirondack Regional Arts Council (LARAC) for its Decentralization Program for arts programs throughout the county. He said in addition to being a supervisor, he was also a band leader. He asked the County Attorney to research if this band played a show sponsored through LARAC and they were paid, would there be a conflict of interest for him.

Mr. Monroe announced that the Scaroon Manor Unit Management Plan was brought to the Adirondack Park Agency (APA) last week. He said all the APA Commissioners seemed to be in favor of the plan. He noted there were a number of environmental groups represented there, and no one said anything bad. Mr. Monroe said there would be one more meeting before final approval.

Mr. Dusek mentioned there was a story in *The Post-Star* today regarding the Warren County Regional Economic Development Corporation (WCREDC) and the county overpayment situation for contract services. He said that while the County Attorney's Office was very much involved in going through the contracts and ascertaining these amounts and working with the Treasurer's Office, he felt it should be noted and recognized that in the first instance it was Mr. Robillard, Clerk of the Board, who picked up on the discrepancy when a \$13,000 bill came in as a request for overage on the contract with the Micro-Enterprise Program, and it was Mr. Robillard who pointed out there seemed to be some similarities in billings, and referred it to the County Attorney's Office. He said he felt it was important to note that Mr. Robillard was certainly watching over the county funds, and it was not pointed out in the newspaper.

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Chairman Thomas said he was the one quoted in the news article, and said everyone knows Mr. Robillard, and they know he does not take credit for most of what he does.

Mr. Champagne said he was on the WCREDC at the time that this may have happened. He recalled that all of the bills were going through Mr. Robillard's Office, and questioned how WCREDC got through the Treasurer's Office for payments. Mr. Robillard explained that WCREDC was billing Planning & Community Development Department for the Micro-Enterprise Program, and they were billing Ms. White's salary through WCREDC Contract. He noted, therefore, the numbers were not exactly the same. Chairman Thomas also recalled at that time there had been discussion on whether WCREDC should be doing the Micro-Enterprise Program, or should it be in the Planning & Community Development Department. He pointed out that the County has since decided that the program should be in the Planning & Community Development Department.

Mr. Robillard pointed out that this in no way was casting any shadows on the current WCREDC leaders. He said they were doing a wonderful job and they were being very cooperative.

Mr. Kenny asked if it would be safe to assume that when everything was done, the County would know where those funds eventually went. Chairman Thomas said he believed that would be resolved. He added that WCREDC was doing an internal audit of their books over that time span, and the County Treasurer's Office was also looking at it. He said he was sure the supervisors would have an opportunity to review this at some point.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Leonard Fosbrook of WCREDC, who concurred with the acknowledgment by Mr. Robillard that there was new management at WCREDC. He commented that they were not taking this situation lightly. He commented that certainly when several different accounts are being administered, an issue can arise, but at this period of time, there was an accountant employed by WCREDC that did most of this work. He said he felt the supervision of that accountant was a little bit lax. In this administration, he noted the WCREDC has decided to focus on Warren County business, so they were not in a situation where they were administering other grant monies or other funds, other than the Empire Zone funds. He said he appreciated the County's indulgence in giving WCREDC the opportunity to examine this situation thoroughly, and added he felt they would find that this money was spent on County business, and it was not spent on additional salaries. He said he did not feel they would find any maliciousness or misuse of these funds.

Chairman Thomas reiterated that the County had concerns at that time over the Micro-Enterprise Program and who should administer it. Discussion ensued on the matter. Mr. Caimano suggested because there was an investigation going on this should not be discussed in public.

At the conclusion of brief discussion, there being no further business, on motion by Mr. Monroe, seconded by Mr. Gabriels, the meeting adjourned at 11:26 a.m.

WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 21, 2002

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren convened at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center, Lake George, New York, at 10:03 a.m.

Mr. Frederick H. Monroe, Vice Chairman, presiding.

Salute to the flag was led by Supervisor Kenny.

The board members remained standing, and Supervisor O'Connor, Chaplain, offered the following remarks:

"Recently, since the last meeting where we gathered as a board, we have been hit with two terrible tragedies, the untimely death of one of our own, Jack Moynihan, and the sudden passing of the wife of the Chairman of the Board, Carol Thomas.

"If we could now, each in his or her own way, bow our heads for just a moment in respect and remembrance of these two people, Carol and Jack."

The board members and others in attendance observed a moment of silence in memory of Supervisor Moynihan and Carol Thomas.

Roll called, the following members present:

Supervisors Gabriels, Monroe, Mallison, Sheehan, O'Connor, Kenny, Belden, Bentley, Tessier, Bennett, Brower, Caimano, Morrell, Champagne, Montesi, O'Neill, Haskell, and Quintal - 18.

Absent: Supervisor Thomas - 1.

Vacant: 1.

Motion was made by Mr. Kenny, seconded by Mr. Caimano and carried unanimously to approve the minutes of the July 17, 2002, board meeting, subject to correction by the clerk.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Mr. Caimano, who addressed the board members regarding a proposal for a feasibility study for location of The Last of the Mohicans, an outdoor theater presentation presented by a non-profit arts and education organization. He prefaced his remarks, noting that, as Budget Officer, he was not asking to spend from the budget more money. If the request is granted, he said it was for Warren County to front an amount of money (\$16,500) to fund a feasibility study for a tourism-related project. He noted he attended a meeting in this regard and was assured by the Towns of Lake George and Queensbury, one of whom will be denoted as the approved location for the theater, that should it be approved, they will repay the County the \$16,500. Mr. Caimano indicated he was asking the County Attorney if this was legal, and if so, how it could be done.

Explaining the program, Mr. Caimano noted this area has been approached to put on an annual, summer-long presentation providing family entertainment and great economic benefits. He said the show was The Last of the Mohicans, and every night for a period of six to eight weeks at a pre-determined location, an historical drama would be presented. He said he felt this obviously presented another opportunity for tourism in this area, and he was told that 60 percent of the daily visitors were from out of the area, and this would present another reason for them to possibly stay another night in the area.

Mr. Caimano apprised there were four of these historical dramas being presented throughout the country, and the longest running one is in Manteo, North Carolina, which has been in operation since 1937, and each has a significant financial impact on the communities. He provided additional information on the potential audience base and economic value of other sites where similar projects have been undertaken. The information is in writing and on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors with Tourism Committee records.

Mr. Caimano noted if approved, the \$16,500 would be paid to the Institute of Outdoor Drama from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He explained this group goes around the country at different venues and investigates whether or not a community or area can actually support such a drama. Mr. Caimano said that the Tourism Committee, under its

chairman Mr. Morrell, and the Towns of Lake George and Queensbury were very interested in having this company come and find out if this is something that will help Warren County to grow tourism-wise.

Mr. Caimano said if this can be done, he would bring forth a resolution to loan \$16,500 to the Towns of Queensbury and Lake George and the money will be returned once the Institute of Outdoor Drama decides where a good site for the project would be. He added, however, if they decide that there is not a good site, the county would be responsible for the funds. He noted he felt that the potential for this seemed to be relatively slight.

Mr. Montesi commented if in fact the study says there could be a project here, he felt the county would then be into where to have it. He asked what would be the physical building involved, noting the programs usually happen in amphitheater-type facilities and wondered if the county would have to then move into a building program. Mr. Caimano noted the company would be into a building program (not the county). Mr. Tessier added it was not an amphitheater and he described the structure for the information of the supervisors, noting it was a stage with permanent props. He estimated the stage is about 200 feet long and is dirt.

Mr. Tessier said he felt it was a good production. He added that the project will take \$2 - \$3 million, which the group says they can raise. He said everything is put together by the production company when and if they raise the money to put the project together.

Mr. Dusek commented on the discussion. First, he said with respect to the loan, that a loan of money is clearly not allowed under the Constitution of New York State. He clarified that the county cannot even loan to another municipality. Secondly, he said he felt the county needed to consider whether the expenditure of funds was eligible for a tourism or publicizing of Warren County type of expense. He said it seemed to him that this was a study and the purpose was to ascertain whether the county would be able to sponsor such a program. Then, he noted, the county would seek out interested production companies, not necessarily this company, but anyone else who would be interested. If that is the purpose of the study, he said it seemed to him that this would qualify under the expenditure of funds for tourism promotions. Unfortunately, he said, that means the county would have to spend the money as a county. Whether or not a town voluntarily reimburses or contributes money at some point was another issue, and he noted he could not lock into that point legally.

Mr. Caimano said when the meeting was held, they agreed the reason it was a good idea to bring this up was because it was another area for the county to continue to grow in tourism. Rather than reject it, he said he felt it should come to the supervisors. He commented he was not suggesting doing anything that would break the law, nor to come up with \$16,500 out of the budget because they do not have it, but he said he was suggesting the supervisors were the leaders for the growth in this area of tourism. He said he felt this was a great opportunity and should be explored.

Mr. Bennett said when he heard of the potential for such a production for this area, he felt it was a golden opportunity because of the setting of the story and the fact it is so well known internationally as well as nationally. He noted at his own expense he went to Chillicothe, Ohio and looked at the production "Tecumseh" to see what the setting was and what the needs were for doing such an outdoor drama. He said he also looked at the community and its funding sources, and noted he was very pleased at what he saw. He noted also at his own expense, he looked at the Manteo, North Carolina production of "The Lost Colony", which was the oldest production, and looked at the same things in the community. He noted he also intended (at his own expense) to go to Xenia, Ohio to look at "Blue Jacket," and to Cherokee, North Carolina to look at "Unto These Hills."

Mr. Bennett commented that there are several of these productions around the country and all have been long-standing and very successful. He pointed out the Northeast U.S. does not have one, and this was an opportunity to put one into the area. He urged approval of the feasibility study and said he felt it would yield information that would make this a very successful destination for those who have an interest in the French and Indian War and The Last of the Mohicans.

Mr. Bennett mentioned in Lake Luzerne they have an outdoor production, the rodeo, which has been going on since 1951, and it is done three nights per week. He said it was well attended. At the same time, he noted that other activities are going on around the area and they all enhance one another. At the same time, too, he said in Castleton, Vermont, there is another outside drama, the rodeo, which takes place on a Saturday, and in Malta, there is a third one, which takes place on Friday. He said they are all similar productions done on the same night as the one in Lake Luzerne, and these others have survived for many many years in competition for the same population. He said the production of "The Last of the Mohicans" was not in competition because there was no similar one in the area.

Mr. Caimano said that since there obviously a legal hurdle, he suggested maybe the resolution today should be a resolution of interest on the part of the supervisors to pursue an avenue which they legally could find a way to fund this study. Mr. Monroe agreed with the idea, and suggested it could also be referred to whatever committee that was appropriate. Mr. Caimano said he had planned to discuss this at that last Finance & Personnel Committee meeting, but the meeting was very long and they did not get to it. Mr. Monroe suggested the appropriate committee was Tourism Committee.

Mr. Montesi asked if there was some expediency required, or could this be part of the budget process. Mr. Caimano said there was an sense of expediency if it was going to happen for next year. If it was not going to happen for two years, then there was no urgency, he said.

Mr. Belden said it was discussed in Tourism and he thought the committee was behind the recommendation, but did not know where to send it. Mr. Kenny said he would be anxious for this to come back to the Tourism Committee. He said he was very supportive of the idea and discussed the committees he had been involved with in the study of tourism and occupancy tax. He indicated he felt the county may be on the threshold of some very exciting times in changing the whole way the county markets itself in the tourism world. He said he felt this production fit perfectly into that mold of becoming a destination event for Warren County. Mr. Monroe agreed and recalled he had discussed the idea if occupancy tax is passed, that some percentage of the revenue be used to produce events that will bring in more tourism dollars.

Mr. Champagne recalled he had read somewhere that Queensbury had a serious interest in placing this production on West Mountain. He asked if there had been any action by the town in this regard. Mr. Brower noted that three sites were under consideration, and one site was in Queensbury and two were in Lake George. Because this is of benefit to the county no matter where it is placed, he said they thought it would be appropriate to have the study generated from the county. He said he has had indication from several town board members that they would support reimbursement to the county if the production is sited at West Mountain. He said Mr. Tessier also indicated his town board would reimburse if one of their two sites were selected. Although he said he viewed this as a county obligation, that was the indication he had so far, although there has been no official action about it. He agreed with Mr. Bennett that this was a very exciting concept.

Mr. Monroe said there appeared to be quite a bit of interest on the part of the supervisors and suggested the item could be referred to the Tourism Committee without a board resolution at this time.

Mr. Morrell asked if this would mean this was a project which would be delayed until next year and not done this year. He said if the committee recommended it, they would have to seek the funding.

Mr. Tessier mentioned that Glens Falls was also involved originally and the idea of each community involved (Glens Falls, Lake George and Queensbury) paying \$5,000 was discussed. He noted that some communities said they did not have money in the budget and it would have to wait until next year, and so the thought came up to see if the county would up-front the money. He said he did not feel the whole \$16,000 would be spent because if the study gets to a certain point and they decide the project was not feasible, it gets cut off. He

estimated the cost would be about one-half if the production does not fly. He mentioned he received a letter from Mayor Blais saying if the production went on Village property, he was looking for extended help to maintain and take care of the property. He noted that was not part of the original agreement and his understanding was if the community provided the land, the production company would raise the funds for the event.

Mr. Monroe pointed out it appeared it was not legal for the county to loan money to the towns, and suggested the item go to the Tourism Committee. Mr. Tessier suggested if the loan was not legal, then the towns that want to pursue it will have to fund it. He said he did not have a problem with that.

General discussion continued. Mr. Champagne said this was the first time he heard of the county entering into a study of this nature. He said he was not against it, but felt it was setting a precedent in the future when other towns come forth for studies to be funded. He said it appeared to him that this was a perfect example of inter-municipal agreements and the towns in his opinion needed to go forward at their own expense.

Mr. Monroe indicated the consensus was to move the discussion to the Tourism Committee.

Vice Chairman Monroe dispensed with committee reports for August and extended privilege of the floor to any supervisors wishing to report on a specific committee item.

The following committee chairmen or vice-chairmen presented verbal reports on August meetings or activities:

Supervisor O'Neill, Sheriff & Communications; Supervisor Belden, Real Property Tax Services; and Supervisor Tessier, Airport.

Regarding the Airport Committee report, Mr. Tessier noted they were still waiting for a response from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) on the tree clearance project. He said there was no reason to have a meeting on this until they get that response and know what the FAA was looking for.

Vice Chairman called for reading of communications.

Clerk read communications, including the following:

Capital District Regional Off-Track Betting Corporation, Financial Report as of May 31, 2002 and June 30, 2002.

Communications, resolutions and reports ordered placed on file.

Chairman called for reading of resolutions.

Mr. Robillard noted that Resolution No. 535 was being pulled (authorizing contract with Scherrer Auctions for auction of county surplus equipment) because they did not receive the proper paperwork. He noted that a resolution authorizing amendment of agreement with Poklemba, Hobbs & Ulasewicz, for labor counsel services would be the new Resolution numbered 535. He also noted that Resolution No. 521 was being amended to note that the chargebacks list was on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors.

Mr. Montesi asked why the county needed to hire legal counsel for labor counsel services as he thought the county already had counsel. Mr. Robillard noted the contract was over.

Mr. Robillard noted that Resolution Nos. 511 through 557 were mailed, and a motion was needed to bring Resolution Numbers 510, 535, and 558 through 562 to the floor. Motion was made by Mr. Mallison, seconded by Mr. Belden and carried unanimously to bring Resolution Numbers 510, 535, and 558 through 562 to the floor.

Mr. Kenny requested a roll call vote on Resolution No. 516. Mr. Caimano requested a roll call vote on Resolution No. 535. Mr. Morrell requested a roll call vote on Resolution No. 560.

Mr. Mallison spoke concerning Resolution No. 547, amending the Table of Organization and Warren County Salary and Compensation Plan for 2002. He said although he felt the raises were not excessive, he felt based on discussions concerning watching the county's bottom line, the changes should be dealt with during the budget process. He said he would vote against the resolution. Mr. Monroe explained the creation of positions under District

Attorney and Health Services related to acceptance of grants. Mr. Mallison withdrew his remarks.

Mr. Champagne requested that Resolution No. 535 be discussed in executive session prior to voting on it. Mr. Dusek indicated that this could be discussed in executive session, and Mr. Monroe suggested holding the vote on Resolution No. 535 until after executive session.

Mr. Caimano discussed Resolution No. 516, approving the tentative budget for ACC and providing for a public hearing. He said he intended to vote no on the resolution. He said he was very appreciative of the ACC representatives making a presentation on the tentative budget, and added he felt there was no greater asset to the community than ACC. However, he indicated he did not get an answer to his basic question of why the college was going up 20 percent in expenditures, but the college is flat to losing in terms of full time equivalent students. He said he wanted ACC to know how seriously he took this institution and he wanted it to be an institution that teaches and does not simply pay salaries. He said he would like to know what the college was doing in terms of course curriculum. He stressed he was very pro ACC, but wanted to send a message.

Mr. Monroe commented that in all fairness it was brought up at the meeting that three years ago there was a survey done to compare the salaries and pay scales at ACC with other community colleges in the State, and they were near the bottom of the scale. He noted there were increases made to get the staff more towards the middle. Mr. Caimano agreed, and added he also understood that there have been retirements of higher paid people. He stated he still felt the basic problem has not gone away in 14 years.

Mr. Montesi said he was concerned that there was a million dollar increase in administrative payroll, and that was an incredible amount of money. He said he wondered if the supervisors should be looking at this a little closer. In 1991, the college had 2500 full time equivalent students, he noted, and now they have 2250. Obviously, he said the trustees need to have answers on whether it is the curriculum that is wrong and not drawing students, were students going to four-year schools versus two-year, or was there something that needs to be offered that would better suit students. He said he did not have the answer, but he did not feel the college did either and he was concerned. He said he would also vote no on the budget.

Mr. Monroe extended the floor to Dr. Olson of ACC to address the questions. Dr. Olson suggested he could talk with Mr. Caimano one-on-one and answer his questions, and invited any other supervisors to contact him with questions.

Vice Chairman called for a vote on the resolutions.

Resolution Numbers 510 through 534 and 536 through 562 were approved.

(\$31,812) were not interviewed or considered further as not meeting the County desired services since Gates, Moore & Company based in Atlanta offered a training and approach whereby Warren County would do the HIPAA assessment with limited visits by company representatives (unless the cost of return trips are paid as additional amounts), and TM Floyd & Co. based in South Carolina offered a team effort approach and analysis conducted in partnership with Warren County personnel, provided no further services after the assessment, gap analysis and recommendations as part of the price quote and further stated the proposed payment amounts and trip expenses were estimates, and

WHEREAS, the Department Heads of those departments that would most likely be affected by the HIPAA requirements, met with Urbach, Kahn & Werlin Advisors, Inc. and HIPAA Complete and have recommended that HIPAA Complete be retained, and

WHEREAS, the determination was based upon the belief that HIPAA Complete, could provide satisfactory services at a lower cost but also provide delivery of an assessment, gap analysis and risk remediation and compliance plan reports, along with revised policies, procedures and training, now, therefore, be it

AMENDING RESOLUTION NO. 234 OF 2001, CHANGING COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS PERMIT LIMITS OF LIABILITY OF INSURANCE COVERAGE REQUIREMENTS TO REFLECT THE TYPE AND USE - PARKS & RECREATION DEPARTMENT

RESOLVED, that Resolution No. 234 of 2001 be, and hereby is, amended to provide for revisions to the County Fairgrounds Use Permit and more specifically to provide that paragraph "1(b)" shall be revised to now read as follows:

"1. Insurance:

b. The Permittee shall furnish with this application a certificate of insurance showing liability insurance issued to and covering the Permittee as "named insured" and adding the County of Warren as additional insured with respect liability arising out of operations of the named insured or any employee, agent or invitee thereof. Insurance coverage provided hereby for Warren County shall be primary coverage. The limits of liability for use of the Fairgrounds for parking purposes shall be not less than the amount of \$1,000,000 and the limits of liability for all other uses in such policy shall be not less than the aggregate amount of \$2,000,000 combined single limit for all damages arising out of bodily injury, including death and/or property damage. The certificate shall state that it will not be cancelled or non-renewed without 10 days notice to the Superintendent of Public Works. The enumeration in this permit of the kind and amount of insurance shall not abridge, diminish or affect the Permittee's legal responsibilities for the consequences of accidents arising out of or resulting from the operations of the permittee under the permit."

Adopted by unanimous vote.

Mr. Monroe presented a brief report on the Waste-to-Energy Plant activities and noted the negotiations were going along well in most areas. He stated there had been an inspection of the plant by the engineers for Wheelabrator, and the counties' engineers, and there appears to be no problems. He reported that contract language was also being discussed and drafted. He said that two issues were not resolved as yet and the Inter-County Solid Waste Committee discussed them in executive session at yesterday's meeting. He indicated the supervisors may want to discuss these items of negotiations in executive session also. He noted one item involves the trustees consent to a refinancing without bondholder consent. He noted a request has been made and there has been no answer vet, but they are expecting an answer in the near future. The second item, he continued, related to contract language which would require Wheelabrator's parent company, Waste Management, to continue to bring waste to the plant at market value. He said a proposal was created by the committee yesterday to go back to Wheelabrator and Waste Management for a mechanism to do that. He asked if these items could be discussed in executive session. He said the final contracts are tentatively to be ready for presentation to the Inter-County Committee on September 10th, and a public information meeting is tentatively scheduled for September 12th. Continuing with the proposed agenda, he noted that September 16th was the Warren - Washington Counties IDA meeting, September 18th is Warren County Board of Supervisors meeting, and September 20th is Washington County Board of Supervisors.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Barbara Bennett of Queensbury, who indicated she supported what the supervisors said about ACC, and said she felt there was a lack of coordinated information on the operation of ACC. Secondly, she addressed the presentation made on "The Last of the Mohicans" and said she felt it was a wonderful opportunity to capitalize on this. She recalled when she was in elementary school, the class visited Cooper's Cave, and this area is identified with The Last of the Mohicans and Coopers Cave. She said this would affect three generations and she thought the idea could go into a lot of directions.

Privilege of the floor was extended to George Weinschenk of Diamond Point, who said he felt "The Last of the Mohicans" was probably a good idea. He asked if that idea should go to the Regional Economic Development Committee as a sub-committee of tourism. Mr. Monroe suggested maybe it should be a joint meeting.

Mr. Weinschenk said he felt the supervisors discussing ACC were right. He said he had worked 10 years at a community college, and one of the things that is done all of the time is comparison of salaries. He suggested there was more to the idea than where the teachers are on a pay scale, and he suggested other considerations such as economic factors of the area be looked at. He pointed out there was a big difference between living in New York City and teaching and living in Warren County.

Mr. Weinschenk said he has commented for years that he felt ACC was a waste, and not because education was a waste, but because there were no jobs for the people when they graduated. He suggested looking at the curriculum to see if what is being taught is good for the area. He said the community was paying for the college and they may have to revise the curriculum to suit the area.

Mr. Weinschenk commented on a newspaper article concerning public hearings held on the bed tax, and he said he was not aware that the private tourism bureau (Adirondack Regional Convention and Visitors Bureau) was representing the county, which was inferred in the news article. He said he felt the organization could hold as many public hearings as it wanted to, but it had nothing to do with the county.

Mr. Monroe said there were tentative plans for the county to have hearings on the occupancy tax before there is any vote. He added he would definitely support this idea.

Privilege of the floor was extended to John Salvador of Queensbury, who addressed the ACC discussion. He said he felt the 18 year olds have not been born in enough numbers to sustain the programs the college has put into place. He added this was not just a problem with ACC, it was going on all over the country. He discussed examples supporting his remark. He recommended that retrenchment was required, however, he noted that every time a budget comes up to be reviewed it is always based on bigger numbers.

Mr. Salvador then discussed the sewer for the Public Safety Building (PSB), and said he hoped the county was prepared to pay the sewer tax on it. He referred to the fact that the county facilities do not pay Queensbury fire tax because it is exempt. He said he would not want to see this same thing occur with the sewer district in Queensbury.

Mr. Salvador then remarked he was very surprised that the Board of Supervisors did not receive a report from the Occupancy Tax Committee. He said it seemed that the information was coming from the newspapers. He said he did not feel there was any direction and once the county "gets there", it will be lost. He recalled he made a presentation to the board members wherein he said he did not think they could rely on the \$700,000 in revenue as was being projected. He suggested the tax base was not there and he did not think it was defined who was going to pay. He said he felt a better job could be done with the numbers than in the Pinnacle Report.

Next, Mr. Salvador spoke concerning the canceled meeting between Warren County and NYS Taxation & Finance regarding sales tax charged The Great Escape. He said he did not feel it was surprising, and reiterated the experience of the We The People group with the Federal Government and requested meetings on the federal codes. He mentioned there were many other activities, besides The Great Escape, that fall into the same category. He agreed there should be a meeting between the tax people and the supervisors without public

participation, but pointed out there would come a time when the people need to be involved. He gave examples of how he felt this had taken on county-wide, state-wide and nation-wide significance. He concurred this was a complex subject, but suggested the county had to come to grips with it. He mentioned that NYS Taxation & Finance do issue opinions and technical services bulletins on the internet and they address all subjects. He suggested the supervisors read these publications and insist on some kind of enforcement.

Mr. Montesi acknowledged that the County Treasurer was in attendance, and asked for some clarifications. He noted that according to his understanding, the August 14th meeting with Taxation & Finance was postponed, and it was not postponed because NYS Taxation & Finance was not going to come to the meeting, but because the supervisors felt that perhaps there needed to be some homework that needed to be done with the Treasurer's Office and the Taxation Department. He asked Mr. O'Keefe for his interpretation, and commented he felt there was a major industry in Warren County that was being beaten up badly, and maybe it was unjustified. He said he would give Premier Parks the benefit of the doubt until a meeting is held with the Treasurer's Office and NYS Taxation & Finance. He said he felt the county was doing the right thing in allowing the Treasurer's Office and a supervisor representative to review this issue on sales tax with NYS Taxation & Finance.

Mr. O'Keefe responded to the remarks. He said he had no knowledge that the supervisors wanted to discuss this item in private. He said he was trying to get a meeting with NYS Taxation & Finance (at the request of the supervisors) for a year-and-a-half, and suddenly New York State canceled the meeting that was scheduled for August 14th.

Mr. O'Keefe announced that he was sorry to say that his valued Deputy, Anne Dressel, was going to retire in January or February of 2003. He said he would hate to see Mrs. Dressel go. Mr. Monroe agreed, and remarked that this will be a great loss to the county.

Mr. Monroe requested executive session to discuss the retention or termination of a particular law firm, and to discuss negotiations with Foster-Wheeler, Wheelabrator and the bond trustee in connection with the waste-to-energy plant.

Motion was made by Mr. Montesi, seconded by Mr. Caimano and carried unanimously to declare executive session pursuant to Section 105((f) and (h) of the Public Officers Law.

Vice Chairman declared a recess from 11:15 a.m. to 11:25 a.m. The board reconvened, and executive session was held from 11:25 a.m. to 11:54 a.m.

Vice Chairman called for a vote on Resolution No. 535.

Resolution No. 535 was defeated.

RESOLUTION NO. 535 OF 2002

AUTHORIZING AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT WITH POKLEMBA, HOBBS & ULASEWICZ, LLC FOR LABOR COUNSEL SERVICES

WHEREAS, in 2001, Warren County solicited requests for proposals to provide labor counsel services to the County in connection with collective bargaining negotiations and agreements with one or two separate employee organizations or units, and

WHEREAS, at the time the request for proposal was made, it was anticipated that a three (3) year contract would be negotiated with the effected collective bargaining units and that legal services would then continue thereafter for the term of the collective bargaining agreement, and

WHEREAS, the manner in which it was anticipated labor matters would proceed has changed and an agreement has been entered into for one (1) year (2002) and negotiations are planned for a three (3) year agreement for the term commencing January 1, 2003, and

WHEREAS, under the circumstances, Poklemba, Hobbs & Ulasewicz, LLC have agreed to continue the lower fee that was originally proposed for only one (1) year and have agreed that they will attempt not to exceed the Six Thousand Three Hundred Seventy Dollar (\$6,370) amount for each contract, but have requested that if the amount is exceeded, that they be paid for their services, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that due to the unanticipated events that have occurred in connection with the collective bargaining negotiations, the Warren County Board of Supervisors hereby determines it would be appropriate to continue with Poklemba, Hobbs & Ulasewicz, LLC at a fee of Ninety-One Dollars (\$91) per hour at a rate not to exceed Four Hundred Fifty-Five Dollars (\$455) per day with, however, the exception that the total contract amount for each contract may exceed Six Thousand Three Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$6,370) if circumstances warrant and with the further understanding that the cap never applied to fact-finding procedures, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors be, and he hereby is authorized and directed to execute an amended agreement with Poklemba, Hobbs & Ulasewicz, LLC, 358 Broadway, Suite 307, Saratoga Springs, New York 12866, consistent with the terms of this resolution and in a form approved by the County Attorney.

Motion was made by Mr. Montesi, seconded by Mr. Caimano and carried unanimously to introduce a resolution to (1) cancel the county's contract for legal counsel services with Poklemba, Hobbs & Ulasewicz, LLC.; (2) to authorize a Request for Proposal for legal counsel services; and (3) to authorize a Request for Proposal for a study on the salary structure of union and non-union employees. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 563 for the record.

Mr. Gabriels asked if there would be a deadline for preparation of a study on revised salary schedules, and Mr. Dusek replied there would have to be, because they want it for part of union negotiations. He said he would include a deadline in the Request for Proposals.

Mr. Mallison asked if the county had the money to move forward with these proposals. Mr. Monroe estimated there was about \$3,000-\$4,000 left. Mr. Robillard added that he had a purchase order for \$3,500, and \$1,740 was sent to Poklemba, Hobbs & Ulasewicz already, and he did not know what they would be owed to date. Mr. Monroe indicated there probably would not be enough money to pay for the aforementioned proposals.

Vice Chairman called for a vote on Resolution No. 563.

Resolution No. 563 was approved.

At the conclusion of brief discussion, there being no further business, on motion by Mr. Morrell, seconded by Mr. O'Connor, the meeting adjourned at 12:00 noon.

WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 18, 2002

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren convened at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center, Lake George, New York, at 10:05 a.m.

Mr. William Thomas presiding.

Salute to the flag was led by Supervisor Belden.

Roll called, the following members present:

Supervisors Gabriels, Monroe, Mallison, Mason, O'Connor, Kenny, Belden, Bentley, Thomas, Tessier, Bennett, Brower, Caimano, Morrell, Champagne, Montesi, O'Neill, Haskell, and Quintal - 19.

Absent: Supervisor Sheehan - 1.

Motion was made by Mr. Belden, seconded by Mr. Mallison and carried unanimously to approve the minutes of the August 21, 2002, board meeting, subject to correction by the clerk.

Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing relating to approval of the Adirondack Community College Budget for fiscal year 2002-2003 open at 10:07 a.m., and requested the Clerk to read the Notice of Public Hearing.

Deputy Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak on the proposed local law, Chairman extended privilege to the floor to any supervisor wishing to speak on the subject.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Mr. Bennett, who commented that the College budget has been presented and thoroughly reviewed by the Community College and Finance & Personnel Committees. He said he felt a budget has been put together to meet the needs of the College and keeping in mind the financial aspects at this time.

There being no further comments relating to the public hearing, Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing closed 10:09 a.m.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Supervisor Morrell, Chairman of the Extension Service Committee, who read a Proclamation declaring 2002 Cornell Cooperative Extension Week and Nation 4-H Week from October 6, through October 12, 2002.

The Proclamation was presented to Laurel Gailor of Cornell Cooperative Extension by Chairman Thomas, and the supervisors responded with applause.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Supervisor Caimano, Budget Officer, who discussed the meeting of Finance & Personnel Committee scheduled for Monday, September 23rd. He said he would be unable to attend the meeting, but said he wanted to remind the supervisors that there were two items on the agenda: (1) a decision on the question of giving flat raises to Outside Bargaining Unit personnel; and (2) 2003 personnel requests.

Mr. Caimano provided information on the formulation of the 2003 budget, and noted that those of the supervisors who have attended the budget meetings so far know there is a significant increase in appropriations requested for 2003 and a significant decrease in estimated revenues, and at best they will have a marginal increase in sales tax. Also, he noted the county has authorized Budget Notes totaling \$1,225,000.00, which have to be put into the budget, plus the principal and interest on the Municipal Center Roof Project and the Public Safety Building. In addition, he stated there will be expenses in the 2003 budget for boarding out prisoners.

Mr. Caimano asked the supervisors to also think about the fact that the County still has future union negotiations that have not been completed, the cost of the new DPW shop is yet to be bonded, the trash plant shortfall is not known at this point, the Westmount Health Facility Day Care Facility has a study underway, there is a 15 percent increase in health care premiums predicted, and there is a Social Services shortfall in MMIS that has been predicted at \$1 million.

Mr. Caimano stated he received a letter from Commissioner Phelps and he indicated that the following medical services areas were experiencing significant increases: Personal Care Services - 31 percent increase; Hospice - 200 percent increase; Dental - 144 percent increase; Home and Community Based Waivered Services - 21 percent increase; Drug and Supplies - 21 percent increase; and Pre-Paid Managed Care Premiums - 60 percent increase. He said they would work on these items through the budget cycle, but he suggested when the supervisors meet on Monday, that they keep this information in mind.

Chairman Thomas acknowledged a request by Supervisor Kenny to address the board members regarding the Occupancy Tax. He noted there was a resolution before the supervisors today to come to the floor on the subject. He asked the County Attorney to describe the resolution, and Mr. Kenny yielded the floor to Mr. Dusek prior to his making comments.

Mr. Dusek referred to the resolution being discussed entitled, "Home Rule Request by Warren County for the Enactment of Hotel/Motel Legislation in the County of Warren." He explained the resolution, if passed, would send down to the Assembly person, and Senator proposed state legislation. He said the request would go down with a request and this resolution, asking them if they would introduce and have drafted legislation in the State Legislature which would allow Warren County to have a Hotel/Motel Tax. If that occurs, he continued, the next step would involve another resolution which would come before this board called Municipal Home Rule Request Resolution. This would actually have the proposed state legislation which would, in theory, look like what is being sent down, although it is possible it would get changed in the State Legislature, he continued. At that point, he said, the supervisors would have another resolution to vote on. If the supervisors pass this resolution, he said, this would give the go-ahead to the State to enact the legislation, if they are so inclined. Once that happens, he continued, it goes to the Governor for signature, and once it becomes signed into law, the supervisors then have authority to implement the Hotel/Motel Tax, but it does not yet become in effect. He noted the next step needs to be taken, which is for the board to enact a proposed local law, which would be subject to a public hearing. Following that public hearing, he said, the supervisors could enact that local law and impose

Mr. Dusek summarized the explanation, noting there is a process to go through and this resolution today is only the first step in the process. He guessed that this would probably not happen until the next session of the State Legislature in 2003. He said that usually the legislative sessions run from January to June and based on his past experience with bills the supervisors have requested in the past, typically they get acted upon late in the session, which means June, 2003. He added that any number of things could change that time estimate, and this was not hard and fast.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Mr. Kenny, who said he was excited by the prospects of Warren County taking a major step forward by instituting a proven economic stimulus - the Hotel/Motel Tax. He noted that the supervisors have completed another year of study, research, committee meetings, sub-committee meetings, public meetings, public comment and debate both pro and con. He noted there had been five long years in this process, and said they appear to be poised to take positive action.

Mr. Kenny commented that the supervisors have listened to a few nay sayers, who have become self-anointed government watchdogs. He said the supervisors have listened to what he considers the short sited and long-suffering attitudes of some area motel owners. He said he had listened to worn out phrases like "you will kill the goose that lays the golden egg." He said he had listened that Warren County does not have an ocean or a convention center or a casino or Warren County is not New York City or Chicago. He said he was bewildered by the supposed visions of the future for Warren County without the necessary funding mechanisms.

Mr. Kenny said he was excited because he truly believed that an occupancy tax was not only healthy for the businesses of Warren County and absolutely necessary for future growth, but he also said he truly believed it was inevitable. He said that some people ask if it does not happen this year, when will it happen, and he responded that maybe it will be next year or the year after, or maybe Warren County will wait until the tourists grow tired of the same old thing and decide to go elsewhere, much like what happened in Wildwood, New Jersey, and much closer to home, in the Catskills. He said if the supervisors wait until then, it very well may be too late. He said it was a commonly accepted marketing fact that once the exodus begins, it becomes very difficult to stop, and will require considerably more funds to regain that lost business.

Before the issue was brought to the floor, Mr. Kenny said he wished to examine the arguments both pro and con on an occupancy tax for Warren County. He said he probably had not covered every argument, but he indicated he felt he had attempted to address the most frequently raised arguments. He assured he had listened very closely over the last five years to the people who have concerns. He enumerated the arguments and responded as follows:

Argument (1): You will kill the goose that laid the golden egg. Mr. Kenny said there was absolutely no evidence that an occupancy tax will hurt tourist-related businesses as long as the proceeds of such a tax are devoted to promoting tourism. He noted that Warren County's law devotes 100 percent to tourism. He added that there was evidence that such a tax will increase business, and this evidence is so well documented by respected national study groups, and these groups have compiled such extensive data on this matter, that they have determined a formula that reveals that for ever 10 percent promotion is increased, an increase of 2.1 percent is expected in tourist traffic. He pointed out that in the proposed spending plan, Warren County would increase its promotion by 150 percent, and all monies collected will be devoted to tourism promotion, minus administrative expenses.

Argument (2): Warren County does not have a plan in place to disburse money collected from an occupancy tax. Mr. Kenny said that may be that was true in the year 2000, but it was certainly not true now. He said the county has a plan that is extensive and it infuses tourism promotion dollars into each town in the county, plus more than doubles county-wide promotion. Currently, he noted, there are towns that receive very little promotion, and most have not budgeted any funds for promotion. He pointed out the County would not be voting today on a proposed spending plan, and that plan is subject to change. He said the proposed law they are voting on states that all monies collected for an occupancy tax will be used for tourism. He noted that was cast in stone.

Argument (3): Lake George will collect the most occupancy tax, yet the funds will be distributed county-wide. Mr. Kenny reiterated that a percentage of funds would go back to the towns under the spending plan. One-quarter of the tax collected would go back to the towns, he said, and three-quarters of the tax collected would be used for county-wide promotion. He said this promotion in all likelihood would be distributed proportionately as it is now, with a large portion devoted to the Lake George Region. Incidentally, he added, under the distribution plan proposed, the amount returned to Lake George Village and Town would allow them to increase their advertising budgets or implement new capital projects that are tourism-related, more than twenty-fold over their current budgets.

Argument (4): Some motel owners argue that they don't need more business. Mr. Kenny said these same owners at public forums have stated the old twelve-week season is now a six-week season. Therefore, he said, the supervisors are expected to believe that these same owners who are open for Americade in early June do not want any more business until July 4th, or the owners who are open for the Classic Car Show and/or the Balloon Fest do not want business between Labor Day and the Balloon Fest. Mr. Kenny added he heard one owner say that he did not need any more business, yet he also said he spent up to \$10,000 per month to advertise. He questioned if he did not want more business, what was the purpose of advertising. He asked what about the businesses that want off-season business, and asked if they were to be ignored.

Argument (5): Some motel owners argue that before school closes and after school reopens, you cannot get tourists here; and if you did, you cannot get help to work. Mr. Kenny

said everyone seems to solve this problem when Americade is here, or the Classic Car Show, or the Balloon Fest. He said these same owners who say they cannot get people here during these times, are the same people who said at the hearings about a week ago that Americade Week was their best week of the year. He said one owner said he was 98 percent full the week after children returned to school, and for the second week of September, he was 97 percent booked. He suggested the owners could not have it both ways, as it simply did not compute.

Argument (6): Motel owners have told the supervisors that their computer systems will not accommodate the bed tax. Mr. Kenny said a simple software modification is all that is necessary to accomplish this. He asked what do the motels in the 35 other counties of New York State do, or should the supervisors assume their computers cannot accommodate an occupancy tax, or maybe they do not use computers.

Argument (7): The members of the Occupancy Tax Committee are trying to shove the occupancy tax down the throats of motel owners. Mr. Kenny said in the nearly five years he has had the privilege of serving on the board, he said he only saw one issue other than occupancy tax have more public meetings scheduled for discussion, and that issue was the burn plant. He noted there have been a number of occupancy tax meetings over the past five years, both in the Municipal Center, and a few years ago, the committee traveled to Bolton Landing to meet with interested parties. During the same time period, he continued, Mayor Blais invited him to a meeting in Lake George where occupancy tax was discussed at great length. If this issue is being shoved down anyone's throat, Mr. Kenny suggested it was with an eye dropper, one drop at a time over a five-year period.

Argument (8): An increase in sales tax would be a fairer method of raising revenue for Warren County. Mr. Kenny said he would not discuss this argument, as this board had clearly decided it does not desire to increase sales tax for Warren County. He said he failed to grasp how a tax for all the residents of Warren County could be fairer than a tax that is paid only by visitors to the county.

Argument (9): If Warren County institutes an occupancy tax, tourists will choose to go elsewhere. Mr. Kenny questioned where was elsewhere. He said no one seems to have an answer. He said no where he knew of that was even remotely considered a tourist attraction was without an occupancy tax. He said that occupancy tax has become an accepted part of a room rate, because it is paid nearly everywhere.

Argument (10): The only places that have a bed tax are large cities or places on the ocean or with convention centers or casinos. Mr. Kenny asked about places like Saranac Lake, New York, Madison, Wisconsin, Ocala, Florida, or any city any where in Florida, or any of the other 22 states or 35 counties in New York State that currently have an occupancy tax in place.

Argument (11): Warren County has no mechanism in place to collect the tax. Mr. Kenny said that Treasurer O'Keefe has spent a considerable amount of time investigating the issue. He noted that Mr. O'Keefe has contacted a number of counties to inquire about collecting methods and mechanisms, and he was prepared to collect this tax with no increase in his staff. Of course, Mr. Kenny added, there would still be expenses such as equipment, postage, travel, etc. Incidentally, he added, Treasurer O'Keefe has also contacted a number of counties to inquire if they had any compliance problems, and found that none he contacted had any.

Argument (12): This tax is not fair because it taxes only motels, hotels, bed and breakfasts, inns and cottages, but does not tax attractions, restaurants, campgrounds, time shares, etc. Mr. Kenny noted that New York State currently does not have a tourist tax in place that would allow the county to tax attractions or restaurants. He said if the county attempted to be the first to get this legislation he felt in all likelihood they would fail, and they would have wasted a couple more years in the process. He said the supervisors have not ruled out expanding the tax to campgrounds and others in the future, but they decided at this time they would go with the proposed language as it most closely resembles the language and the laws of most other counties that have an occupancy tax in place.

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Argument (13); If Warren County passes this legislation here, it will be defeated in Albany, unless it passes with an overwhelming majority. Mr. Kenny said he knew very little about state-level politics, but added he could not imagine they were much different than any other level. He said if they examined closely who supports the legislation on this board, and also the voting public that elects the state representatives, he felt the owners would see his point. One of the Assembly Republican candidates told *The Post-Star* that he wanted to see a referendum ballot on this issue. Personally, Mr. Kenny said he would be delighted to see such a referendum, but apparently that is not legally possible. He said he believed a referendum ballot would expose at least a 10 to 1 in favor of such a tax for Warren County. He said he further believed it would pass easily in the resort towns that are offering the most resistance. He noted if he was a business owner in a resort town and researched this tax and found it would bring 20 - 30 percent more traffic to the area, he would be mad if the supervisors did not support it. He said he felt the resistence was a very small number when compared to the 62.000 people in Warren County -probably less than one percent. He said it would not make sense for the state representatives not to support this legislation. Even if they do, he suggested the supervisors should do their jobs and get the legislation to them and let happen what may in Albany.

Mr. Kenny suggested that petitions of support be made available in the Municipal Center for residents to sign and encourage all town supervisors to make the same petitions available in the town halls. He suggested the petitions could also be made available at public events. If need be, he said he was prepared to take the issue to the streets and go door-todoor asking for signatures. In closing, he thanked all the residents who have taken the time to appear at the various meetings over the past five years. He said, personally, he listened to the discussion very closely, and while he did not agree with the people who are against the tax, he said he was happy to be living in the USA where people do not always have to agree. He said this country's government bodies were founded with the right of freedom of speech foremost in the ancestors' minds. He said he felt this great country was a democracy and one of the principals of democracy is when a unanimous agreement cannot be reached, there is a simple way to settle the dispute - majority rules. He said that 35 counties in New York State and 22 other complete states have an occupancy tax. He said that was not a reason to do it, but an illustration of how well the principle works. He said he felt the supervisors had a responsibility to the constituents to enact legislation to economically enrich the county, and he said he felt this proposal will certainly do that. He said the supervisors have ignored their responsibility too long, and it was time they stepped up to the plate and began to reap the benefits that so many others already enjoy. He said he felt it was time to take a positive step forward and relieve the burden of promoting tourism off the backs of the Warren County taxpayers, and shift that burden to the hundreds of thousands of visitors who enjoy Warren County as a vacation destination. In closing, he quoted a radio commercial - "Now's the time, this is the place and we're the guys." He urged the supervisors to send the legislation to Albany.

Chairman Thomas noted he received a letter from Scott Wood of Lake George Chamber, and he asked Mr. Tessier to address it. Mr. Tessier noted they have a petition that had about 150-165 signatures of business people who are opposed to the occupancy tax. He said he was not putting his personal opinion into this, however, he pointed out that he represented those 160 people. He said this represented people who were 100 percent opposed to the tax and those are the people who are supposed to collect this tax. He said another 35 businesses in Bolton have contacted him and questioned the board members making this decision since they have never been in the occupancy business (other than himself).

Mr. Tessier said the people have had only a week to look at the proposal and there was confusion. He acknowledged that Mr. Kenny cleared up a couple of questions today on how the money was being spent, but some people still have the old version of the plan that does not show what Mr. Kenny said. He indicated he could not see how the supervisors could totally ignore 165 business who have a petition they want to present. He added they were

only out for three days since the last meeting to get the petition signed. He recalled that 10 or 15 years ago they went through this and 225 businesses signed a petition in opposition to a bed tax. He commented he was not saying whether the bed tax was good or bad, but he said he represented those people, and another supervisor here represents the Bolton people who will be responsible for collecting the tax, and he suggested the supervisors had to listen.

Mr. Tessier recalled a couple of weeks ago there was an article in *The Post-Star* about how the supervisors needed to listen to their constituents. He said the supervisors have listened lately on two concerns and now all of a sudden he questioned why the supervisors were not listening to 165 people that have a big concern about the occupancy tax. He said Warren County has promoted tourism and the budget has gone from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000 over the last few years. He suggested that the budget should be funded where the money comes from, and that is from sales tax. He said that was how the money got into this county and he did not see any problem with funding tourism with it. He said if this was not what the people of Lake George wanted, then it was not up to him to push it through.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Tom Wessling of Blue Lagoon Resort, Lake George, who said he disagreed with the Mr. Kenny's remark that the supervisors were just looking at a small percentage of people who were in opposition to the occupancy tax. He acknowledged the opposition was from the hotel/motel owners and said they are the ones out there with the guests and the ones that know what effect a price increase will have on businesses and tourism in the county. He acknowledged that he increases his prices at his business yearly, as most businesses do, but that money is invested into the motel. He said the guests respond by acknowledging they are paying more, but that they are appreciative of what has been fixed and what has been done to the property. He said a lot of people come back year after year, and he suggested it was unfair to tax those that are already here and already guests, having come here since childhood. He said the supervisors are looking at these people to fund bringing more people in, and he suggested the supervisors look at a different way to do that. In conclusion, Mr. Wessling presented a petition with 142 signatures, noting these signatures have been collected since September 5th.

Mr. Caimano asked Mr. Dusek for clarification on the timing of the State Legislature and the fact that there was nothing in his opinion that the Legislature would do on the occupancy tax request, if approved. Mr. Dusek replied that was correct, unless they set up a special session, but even then he questioned if they would take it up. Mr. Caimano said he also received a letter from Mr. Wood. He noted the resolution had been distributed to the board members and noted it must come from the floor. He noted this has been discussed for five years, Mr. Wood has made a reasonable request, and he said he would be more than willing to wait until the next meeting, provided this resolution comes up as a numbered resolution which the supervisors are prepared to vote on. He echoed Mr. Kenny's remark that the supervisors have not forced this down anyone's throat, and he recalled the discussions had on this subject. He said he would be willing to wait until the next meeting to take up the resolution.

Mr. Gabriels noted that yesterday, after one day's worth of work, he was presented with a similar petition on the subject, which has collected all the hotel/motel facilities in Bolton, except for four listed. He said one listed was the Sagamore Hotel, and he recalled he had sent Chairman Thomas a copy of comments received from them. He said that The Sagamore was probably the largest hotel-motel facility in Warren County and they have a great deal of knowledge going back 100 years on how to run a tourist business, and they were not in favor of the tax.

Chairman Thomas said there was a proposed resolution on the supervisor's desks, and Mr. Kenny said he did not have a problem with putting this resolution off until next month if the majority of the board feels they want to do that. He said he had a bit of a problem with what he phrased as selective expertise. He said he was expected to sit and vote on budgets for people who drive snow plows, people who arrest drunk drivers, people who assist those in need of social services, and people who providing nursing care, but all of a sudden he was

not a motel owner and did not know what he was talking about. To him, he said., this did not make sense.

As a result Chairman Thomas' question, several supervisors indicating they wished to hold action on this resolution until next month. Mr. Caimano reiterated his request that it come up as a numbered resolution.

Mr. Bennett recalled that the board members had asked some time ago for a plan to be submitted and charged the Occupancy Tax Committee to devise the same. He said that perhaps he missed that meeting because he missed a couple, but the committee did not vote to forward this back to the board. He said he would hope that would be the first step in the process. Mr. Kenny pointed out the plan was not what the supervisors were voting on anyway, and it can be molded as time goes by to fit the needs of the communities.

Mr. Mallison thanked Mr. Kenny for his efforts. He said he could tell from the speech he gave today that he has thoroughly reviewed and thought through this proposal. He said that Mr. Kenny has put a tremendous amount of work into this project and he said Mr. Kenny had talked to him more times than he could count about the positives and negatives of a bed tax, and he was sure he had similar discussions with other supervisors. He said Mr. Kenny has worked tirelessly on this issue and he personally thanked him for all of the work he has done. Chairman Thomas agreed.

Chairman Thomas summarized the actions taken by the board and apprised that the resolution relating to the occupancy tax would not come forward today. He said it would be further discussed and come back for discussion at the next meeting.

The meeting continued, and Chairman Thomas dispensed with committee reports for September due to a lengthy agenda. He extended privilege of the floor to any supervisors wishing to report on a specific committee item.

Mr. Haskell discussed actions which occurred at the Real Property Tax Committee meeting, and noted he made a bid at a public auction on a piece of property. He said he would like to withdraw that bid. He said that never did he think that paying the highest price on a piece of property would be considered a conflict, nor did he intend to break any laws. He said if he extracted funds from the county, he could see that as a conflict, but paying the highest price, he said he never dreamed it would be a conflict. He said he researched the Real Property Tax Law and there was nothing that forbids him from purchasing the property through that law, however, he said he did not check the General Municipal Law which Mr. Dusek did. He said it appears the bid may be illegal, so he requested to withdraw the bid.

Mr. Mallison said that since he had been here on the board he had met a number of people who have incredible dedication to their jobs and carry themself and work with an incredible level of integrity. He said he was honored to be here and to work with all of the supervisors. He particularly said to Mr. Haskell that he felt he has an incredible level of integrity and he felt it was an unfortunate situation that arose. He said he wanted the public to understand that Supervisor Haskell works very hard and does his best to do the right thing.

Mr. Belden said he talked with Mr. Haskell after he received a call from *The Post-Star*. He addressed Mr. Haskell, and echoed Mr. Mallison's remarks and noted Mr. Haskell contacted him as chairman of the committee as soon as he knew the situation. He also acknowledged Mr. Haskell for his integrity on the issue.

In conjunction with the aforementioned discussion, Mr. Belden asked the County Attorney if a county employee can buy property at a public auction. Mr. Dusek said under these circumstances yes, because the particular employee who bids does not have any authority whatsoever to set the manner in which the County sells the property, they cannot approve the sale, and they are not even involved in the policy-making. He said in that particular case, that was the difference and there was no conflict.

Committee reports continued, and Mr. Tessier reported on Airport Committee activities. He acknowledged he missed the last meeting of the committee, and there was some talk about the cutting of the trees. He said he thought he had made it clear the day before that nothing was going to happen at the Airport. He said the following day was the Airport Committee meeting and the subject came up again.

Mr. Tessier recalled at the last board meeting he said they were waiting for a letter from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and they had not received it. He noted that on the following Friday at 3:00 p.m. Mr. Stevens called and said the letter from FAA was received, and he read it over the telephone. Mr. Tessier noted within five minutes of receiving this message, he called the attorney that lives in that area and owns property that was part of the tree-clearing project and let him know he had received the letter. He noted the letter has been obtained under a Freedom of Information Request since then, so he said he was sure that everyone interested has a copy of it.

Mr. Tessier said he met with the engineers and went over the letter from FAA. He reported as follows: On May, 2002, the Airport Committee stopped progress on this project until they received clarification from FAA regarding the extent of the obstructions and the potential impact of these obstructions to the Airport. On September 15th, 2002, they received a letter from FAA Eastern Region, summarizing their review of the obstruction analysis. Their letter indicates there are numerous obstructions that could potentially affect the Airport's instrument approaches. Since the FAA does not have the property lines or the mapping that the consultant prepared, they were not able to identify on which properties these obstructions exist. The FAA indicated they would be willing to meet with us, however, verbally they are unable to meet before October. With this information in mind, Mr. Tessier noted the following steps were being taken: The FAA letter has been forwarded to the consultant, C & S Engineers; they have been asked to map out all obstructions that FAA has identified. Once that information is available, there will be a meeting with the FAA to discuss the maps and the determination of potential impact of not removing the obstructions. This information will be brought back to the Airport Committee for additional discussion. As stated in the past, there will no further attempts to purchase easements until these steps have been taken.

Mr. Tessier summarized that the FAA was looking at a different angle at the Airport. He reiterated a discussion he had with the engineer over the fact if they remove the threshold, it will actually widen out the wedge. If FAA narrows this down to a different classification, Mr. Tessier said it will pull the lines in and the obstructions will be a lot less. He said the revisions were being drawn up and then they would meet with FAA in October. At that time, he said they would have a definite idea of what the obstructions are. From his initial look at what was proposed and what they are looking at now, he said there was a tremendous difference. He reassured the public that nothing would be done at the Airport as far as easements, treecutting, etc., until the Airport Committee gets answers.

Mr. Belden mentioned he would be out of town for the Finance & Personnel Committee meeting next Monday. He said he had attended the budget meetings, and he said he felt the Budget Officer had a tough job. He said he has been with the County 11 years and has worked on the budgets, and this was the toughest budget he has seen to put together. He said he felt the supervisors had to take a look at it. He said he knew everyone was not going to get what they want, but he complimented Mr. Caimano, and the staff for their efforts. He said it was tough for the supervisors that represent the taxpayers in the small towns when taxes go up. He recalled the tax increases seen by the small towns in the past couple of years and said if the budget stands the way it is now, the towns will be looking at 45-50% tax increases. Mr. Belden pointed out that the budget proposals do not include any union settlement, so that has to be added also. He also remarked on the increases projected for retirement and hospitalization. He urged the supervisors to take a good look at the budget requests.

Mr. Tessier said he sat through the Social Services budget review and Mr. Caimano tried his best to find some cuts. He said it was a difficult budget to cut and he added he did not think the people in the community and on the board realize where those numbers are. He said they are trying to break that down to show what portion of the county budget is dedicated to Social Services. He noted the total MMIS budget was about \$46 million, and the County's share is around \$11 million.

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Mr. Caimano added to the remarks about the Social Services budget, and noted Commissioner Phelps brought out at the budget meeting that something like \$45-\$46 million is brought back into our community from the federal government and the state government under these programs and it goes back into the community to pharmacies, doctors, dentists, health services, etc. He said he was not excusing the costs, but he said he wanted to point that it was not all "doom and gloom."

Mr. O'Neill pointed out that Warren County pays 25% of the new State programs that are being advertised on television, Health Now and Child Health Plus. Mr. Caimano said the worse increase in the budget in his opinion was the 6 percent surcharge being placed on Westmount by the State of New York for all income coming into the facility. Mr. Tessier said the Persons In Need of Supervision (PINS) Program has raised the age from 16 years to 18 years, and he felt that was going to be costly. Also, he said, the Family Health Plan has a potential of 1300 clients participating (600 have already applied) and that costs \$285 per month per client for premiums. Chairman Thomas urged all supervisors to attend Monday's Finance & Personnel Committee meeting, and echoed that the county was facing a very serious budget year.

With Mr. Quintal's permission, Mr. Bennett reported on a specific item regarding Parks & Recreation Committee. He noted that a major step forward was taken this past Thursday and Friday at the Adirondack Park Agency (APA) level in the issuance of the permit for going ahead with the Railroad Project. He said he wanted to report on the meeting to supervisors who were not able to be at the APA meeting with Chairman Thomas, Mr. Beland, Mr. LaMothe and himself, when the APA staff presented their views, thoughts and recommendations regarding the issuance of the permits for vegetation control and for the railway rehabilitation. Mr. Bennett said he had never been at an APA session where he heard such positive support for a county project or any other project presented to the Agency. He said that time and time again Warren County was pointed out in an extremely positive manner as being the kind of County and involved in a project that they could be supportive of. He mentioned that the project permit was approved by the Commissioners with no nos or absentions. He concluded, noting he felt it was important that everyone knew how positive this was, and he said he wished to thank the various departments who worked so very hard to make this possible, Parks & Recreation, DPW, and Planning & Community Development. He said the work done through the First Wilderness Heritage Corridor has received tremendous state-wide publication, but it was also used on several occasions at the Agency meetings as an example of what was needed for the Adirondacks. Chairman Thomas mentioned that the Regional Economic Development Corporation has also been very active in this process and very helpful with the APA process.

Mr. Monroe also reported that at the August meeting of APA, they approved the Scaroon Manor Development Plan and construction was supposed to start next year. He said the State has over a \$1 million budget to move forward with that plan. He thanked all the supervisors for supporting the process, especially Parks & Recreation and Planning & Community Development

Mr. Gabriels recalled discussion earlier this summer regarding the County requesting a meeting with NYS Department of Taxation & Finance to discuss a sales tax question, and the meeting was postponed. He asked if there were any developments or updates. Chairman Thomas said there was no official meeting since the one was cancelled. He said there has been discussions with The Great Escape regarding this situation and there will probably be a report back to the County within the next few months. He said The Great Escape was working on the issue.

Mr. Montesi noted that he and Mr. O'Neill serve as representatives of Warren County on the Warren County Soil Conservation District. He said there was an interesting project they were proceeding with and he described the same. He noted that some neighbors in Glen Lake were concerned and went to the Town Board (Queensbury) with an issue of the sedimentation building up at the lower end of the lake. He said Soil & Water got involved in a

helping hand process, and it appears that with Queensbury's support that a dredging process will be started and completed there. He said the interesting thing is that Soil & Water Conservation was able to get the Army Corps of Engineers to sign off on the project because of their involvement. He noted they met with the neighbors, and the whole Association was in favor of the project, so much so, that one of the land owners offered some of his land as a temporary de-watering site for the project. He said this was just one of the great projects the District was working on. Chairman Thomas concurred, and noted they were also working on a project in Johnsburg right now and they also got through the process with the Army Corps of Engineers.

Mr. Tessier noted that the District has also purchased and made available a hydro seeder, and he relayed information regarding a water line project Lake George they had worked on, and how the use of the hydro seeder had solved the problem with re-seeding the church's property they had to go through. He noted there was a wedding scheduled the day after the project was completed and Soil & Water came down and seeded the property and solved the problem. Chairman Thomas mentioned the District has offered the equipment to all the towns for use. Mr. Belden added that the hydro seeder was bought through a State Grant for the District at no cost to the County.

Chairman called for reading of communications.

Clerk read communications, including the following:

Adirondack Park Agency, 2001 Annual Report.

Annual Report:Social Services

Communications, resolutions and reports ordered placed on file.

Chairman called for reading of resolutions.

Mr. Dusek discussed proposed Resolution No. 606, awarding bid and authorizing contract with William P. Brown, Inc. for roof reconstruction for the Warren County Municipal Center. He noted that the second-to-lowest bidder has communicated with Mr. Remington, his office, and according to his understanding, the engineer, and raised a question whether or not the lowest bidder does in fact meet the specifications. From communications with Mr. Remington this morning, he said he confirmed that there was apparently an issue in this regard that needs to be further discussed. He said it would not be advisable to award the bid until they were sure the lowest bidder can meet the specifications. On the other hand, he continued, there is the predicament that the desire is to get the roofing project done and accomplished before winter. Certainly delaying it for another month while they sort out this issue and get back to the board, may cause a serious delay, he noted.

Mr. Dusek proposed for consideration of the board that the item be referred back to the DPW Committee with authority given to the DPW Committee to determine who is the low bidder meeting the specifications, and then the board would ultimately authorize an award to that bidder. That would expedite this process and get this project going before the next board meeting. He said at this point, his recommendation was not to award the bid, and as an alternative, it could be steered back to DPW Committee with authority.

Motion was made by Mr. Caimano, seconded by Mr. Montesi to approve the County Attorney's recommendation.

Mr. Montesi asked if this item would specifically go to County Facilities Committee, not DPW, and Mr. Dusek said yes.

Mr. Kenny asked who would normally determine whether or not the low bidder meets the specifications of a bid, and Mr Dusek replied the county engineer. He added that a separate engineer was hired in relation to this project. Mr. Kenny asked if the resolution could be passed contingent upon the fact if they meet the specifications they are awarded the bid, and if they do not, the bid will go the next bidder. Mr. Dusek said that was essentially what he was suggesting, but because of what he was hearing, there was some gray area here and it was important in his opinion that the committee be involved and have some supervisors in agreement.

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Mr. Caimano asked if the engineer would be invited to the committee meeting so he can be asked questions, and Mr. Dusek said yes. Mr. Mallison asked what the difference was between the lowest bidder and the next lowest bidder. Mr. Robillard estimated \$12,000.

Chairman Thomas called the question and the motion was carried unanimously. Clerk noted that Resolution No. 606 was withdrawn.

Reading of resolutions continued, and Mr. Robillard noted that Resolution Nos. 565 through 600 were mailed, and a motion was needed to bring Resolution Numbers 564, 601 through 605 and 607 through 609 to the floor. Motion was made by Mr. Gabriels, seconded by Mr. Monroe and carried unanimously to bring Resolution Numbers 564, 601 through 605 and 607 through 609 to the floor.

Chairman called for a vote on the resolutions.

Resolution Numbers 564 through 605 and 607 through 609 were approved. Proclamation declaring 2002 Cornell Cooperative Extension Week and National 4-H Week was submitted.

RESOLUTION NO. 609 OF 2002

Resolution introduced by Supervisors Belden, Monroe, Champagne, Mallison, Quintal, Haskell and Bentley

AWARDING PROPOSAL AND AUTHORIZING AGREEMENT BETWEEN COUNTY OF WARREN AND MAPLE ABSTRACT & REALTY CORPORATION FOR THE PREPARATION OF ABSTRACTS OF TITLE AND CONTINUATIONS OF TITLE FOR DELINQUENT TAX PARCELS (WC 74-02) - REAL PROPERTY TAX SERVICES DEPARTMENT

RESOLVED, that Warren County enter into an agreement with Maple Abstract & Realty Corporation, 470 Glen Street, Glens Falls, New York 12801, for the preparation of abstracts of title and continuations of title for delinquent tax parcels for the years 2000 and 2001, for an amount of One Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars (\$125) per abstract, Forty Dollars (\$40) per continuation of existing abstract prepared by another source, and Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25) per continuation of abstract prepared by Maple Abstract & Realty Corporation, for a term commencing September 18, 2002 and terminating December 31, 2002, and with the agreement that the contract, as written may be extended for purposes of obtaining additional abstracting services needed by the County commencing in January of 2003 at the option of Warren County, and the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors be, and he hereby is, authorized to execute said agreement and/or agreements in the form approved by the County Attorney.

Adopted by unanimous vote.

Mr. Montesi reminded the supervisors that the Adirondack Balloon Festival was being held at the Floyd Bennett Memorial Airport this weekend. He noted the biggest change to the Festival was that Friday night's events would be at the Airport instead of at Adirondack Community College campus. He said no longer will they have the traffic concerns on Bay Road or concerns over fire and EMS access. He invited all of the supervisors to attend.

Chairman Thomas acknowledged the presence of Dr. Joseph Olson and Ms. Betsy Rabida from Adirondack Community College at the meeting. They indicated they were happy to be at the meeting and thanked the board members for approving the college budget.

Mr. Dusek discussed the Glens Falls Sales Tax Agreement, and noted it was not in the supervisors packet for review, as planned because the Comptroller's Office was recommending some changes to the agreement. He said he spoke to the Attorney for the City yesterday and Mr. Dusek said he needed time to study them further to make sure that they do not impact the agreement in any negative ways. He added that although the changes were substantial, he did not feel they would cause any problems. He said both he and the City Attorney agreed discussion would be held until October. He said his plan was to bring this back to the Finance & Personnel Committee at its next meeting to review that agreement

Mr. Dusek said at the last Finance & Personnel Committee meeting where this agreement was discussed there was a question over the length of the agreement between Queensbury and City of Glens Falls on the Wastewater Agreement. He recalled there had been discussion over whether the Sales Tax Agreement should be 20 or 40 years, or something in between. He said the supervisors were interested in what the City and Town agreement length was, and he reported it was a 20 year agreement, but has a provision in it that says that if the sales tax agreement (between the City and the County) essentially becomes longer, then the City and Town agreement automatically becomes longer.

Mr. Caimano noted he did not think the supervisors voted on passage of the Adirondack Community College budget. Discussion ensued, and it was noted the resolution was not passed. Mr. Robillard left the meeting to retrieve the resolution for action by the supervisors.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Caryl Clark, County Clerk, who addressed the issues of the Warren County Municipal Roof Replacement Project. She said she was hoping this project was going to be finished, because they have a terrible problem in the County Clerk's Office everytime it rains. She said the problem has existed for two or three years and she said she hoped it would be addressed. Chairman Thomas acknowledged the need and reiterated earlier board discussion regarding accomplishing this project in a timely fashion.

Mr. O'Connor referred to discussion on the Occupancy Tax, and recalled the supervisors agreed to discuss this next month and it would be in the form of a resolution. He asked if this board has the authority to bring something out of a committee that does not exist to the floor, or should this recommendation (for the aforesaid resolution) come from some committee, such as the Finance & Personnel Committee, or Occupancy Tax Committee. He said he did not want to come to the meeting next month and find out that this resolution would still have to come from the floor.

Mr. Dusek explained there were two ways to get this resolution before the Board of Supervisors. The first he described was going through a committee, which in turn would cause the resolution to be mailed out to the supervisors and it would automatically be part of all of the resolutions the supervisors are scheduled to vote on. The second way he described was under the Rules of the Board, and he noted there was the ability to bring a resolution from the floor, but it would require a floor vote with someone introducing it from the floor. He said it was just a matter of which way the supervisors wanted to handle it, however, he noted he was under the impression from today's discussion that the supervisors wanted to run this resolution through a committee and have it formally sent as part of the mailed resolutions. Mr. O'Connor said he wanted to make sure the resolution went through the proper channels, so the supervisors do not get to next month's meeting and the resolution again has to come from the floor. Mr. Dusek replied he was going to make sure it came through a committee.

Chairman Thomas suggested the supervisors decide which committee this resolution was coming from, so the public will be advised and able to attend the meeting if they would like. Chairman Thomas suggested that the resolution should go through the Finance & Personnel Committee, and Mr. Caimano interjected it has never been discussed in that committee

Mr. Brower mentioned the passing of H. Russell Harris, who was a former town and county supervisor for the Town of Queensbury. He noted that Mr. Harris, in his 12 years of being supervisor for the town, was very instrumental in developing the Queensbury Union Free School, the Airport at its current location, and the Pine View Cemetery, among many other achievements. As he mentioned other accomplishments of Mr. Harris, he said he wanted to honor his memory by mentioning his death for the record.

Discussion returned to the Occupancy Tax resolution, and Mr. O'Connor asked for clarification as to what committee the resolution would be coming from. Mr. Dusek said at this point it was his understanding the matter would be run through the Finance & Personnel Committee, and he added in his opinion, if it does and the committee sends it though and votes on it, that would entitle it to be part of the numbered resolutions that are mailed out, and it would be automatically on the floor before the supervisors.

Mr. Gabriels thanked the board members for unanimously passing Resolution No. 589, recognizing John McGilvray, a resident of Bolton, for serving 20 years on the Warren County Planning Board. He said not only was his service to the county well appreciated, but he recognized his volunteering in many other capacities throughout the county. He mentioned Mr. McGilvray was recuperating in the hospital right now, and he said he appreciated the recognition.

Discussion returned to the Occupancy Tax resolution, and Mr. Montesi asked if the resolution went through the Finance & Personnel Committee and does not pass to come to the board members as a numbered resolution, would there be an opportunity then for those advocates for the occupancy tax to pursue it as a floor vote. Mr. Dusek said yes, adding the supervisors always have a right to bring a resolution to the floor.

Mr. Monroe announced that an upcoming 5K-10K race in the Town of Chester this Saturday. He invited participation.

Discussion returned to the Occupancy Tax resolution, and Mr. Kenny asked if the resolution should come from the floor at the next board meeting, would it require a two-thirds vote to pass it, or would it be the same as a numbered resolution. Mr. Dusek responded he would have to check, and Mr. Monroe interjected he thought it was two-thirds vote to bring the resolution to the floor, and if that passes, then it would require a majority vote to pass the resolution.

Mr. O'Neill mentioned that H. Russell Harris was one of the founding fathers of the Warren County Soil & Water Conservation District back in the 1950's. He noted that Mr. McGilvray currently serves as a director on the District Board, and he commended his efforts as a volunteer and a director.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Barbara Weinschenk, of Bolton Landing, who asked for clarification that the Finance & Personnel Committee meeting on Monday will <u>not</u> entertain the occupancy tax issue. Mr. Monroe said that was correct, and it would be addressed at the regular meeting, which would be around October 4th. He noted the schedule would be available next Monday, and he suggested Mrs. Weinschenk call the Supervisors' Office to check the date.

Secondly, Mrs. Weinschenk asked before the supervisors vote to go into executive session, that there be more particulars on the purpose. Chairman Thomas agreed.

Mr. Bennett commented on the passing of Dr. George Wiswall, noting he was a great person and a great part of the County. He said that Dr. Wiswall has long served in many capacities, and he mentioned his important connection with the county through the work he did for the Warren County SPCA. He mentioned Dr. Wiswall also served as one of the original Warren County Sheriff's Mounted Patrol. He noted that Dr. Wiswall had many facets to his life and was a person of enormous knowledge and compassion. He acknowledged that Dr. Wiswall served in many different ways the county's interest and asked that the acknowledgment of Dr. Wiswall's death be entered into the record.

Mr. Mallison apprised he was at a recent meeting in another county and he heard a county legislator stand up and say he was very frustrated by the State Legislature. In this county, he continued, they were trying to push a sales tax increase and his state legislators were opposed to it. He said this legislator's frustration led him to point out to the room that he was campaigning in his district and people were asking for information on what the county legislature does and he was talking about appropriations and how county and town and city taxes work, the difference between a property tax, a school tax and what happens at the state level. He said the legislator pointed out that it was often brought up that the state did not levy a property tax. He referred to Mr. Caimano's earlier information on the increases that are handed down to the County as a result of State mandates. He said he wished to put that on the record so the public knows in fact because of everything that has happened at the State level recently with all of the increased State mandates on the County the State does in fact levy a property tax - and they were doing it by making the County impose that property tax. He said the amount of the budget that the County has control over was minimal. He said he was excited about the fact that the voters had a chance in November to choose two new representatives, both an Assembly member and a Senator. He said he hoped these people hear what the counties are saying, and these state mandates must stop, because the State is in fact the one responsible for imposing the property taxes on the people of Warren County.

Mr. Monroe requested an executive session to discuss the waste-to-energy plant negotiations with Foster-Wheeler, Wheelabrator, Waste Management, and the bondholders.

Mr. Brower thanked Supervisor Bennett for mentioning Dr. Wiswall's untimely death. He said that certainly Dr. Wiswall in addition to his county involvement, was very influential in assisting the YMCA with their expansions over the years. He recalled that Dr. Wiswall donated property for the Independent Living Center and also for the Barrier-Free Playground in the Town of Queensbury, known as Freedom Park. He noted the park was the only barrier-free playground he was aware of in the County. He described the facilities and noted it was available to all residents of the county, particularly those people with handicapped or other impairments. He said he felt Dr. Wiswall was a real pillar in the community, a philanthropist, and added he felt the County would sorely miss him.

Referring to earlier discussion regarding the need to pass a resolution adopting the ACC budget, Chairman Thomas read the resolution for the information of the supervisors.

Motion was made by Mr. Montesi, seconded by Mr. Bennett to introduce the resolution adopting the ACC budget. Mr. Robillard noted it would be Resolution No. 606 for the record.

Chairman called for vote on the resolution.

Resolution No. 606 was approved.

RESOLUTION NO. 606 OF 2002

Resolution introduced by Supervisors Bennett, Montesi, Brower, Champagne and Tessier

ADOPTING AND APPROVING ADIRONDACK COMMUNITY COLLEGE BUDGET

WHEREAS, the Trustees of Adirondack Community College have presented to the Board of Supervisors a tentative operating budget for the college fiscal year from September 1, 2002 to August 31, 2003, which was approved by Resolution No. 516 of 2002, and

WHEREAS, a public hearing on said tentative budget was held by the Board of Supervisors on the 18th day of September, 2002, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the tentative operating budget in the amount of Twenty One Million Three Hundred Eight Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy-Seven Dollars (\$21,308,877) be, and it hereby is, adopted and approved as the budget for Adirondack Community College for the fiscal year from September 1, 2002 to August 31, 2003, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the sum of One Million Four Hundred Fifty-Eight Thousand Three Hundred Fifty-Three Dollars (\$1,458,353) be raised by taxation as a part of the County budget for the year commencing January 1, 2003 as Warren County's share of operational costs as one of the sponsors of Adirondack Community College.

Adopted by unanimous vote.

Privilege of the floor was extended to George Greene, Roaring Brook Ranch, Lake George, who noted he had been in business for about 40 years, and mentioned the businesses which he had owned and/or managed for the information of the supervisors. He said if the supervisors analyzed the bed tax and where the county was headed with it, he felt it would eventually deplete the hotels'/motels' ability to bring back new guests. He said most of their advertisement was done word-of-mouth. He said in the 1970's the Holiday Inn analyzed the different points people think about when they choose a hotel. He outlined how the priorities ranked of first time visitors and repeat visitors, and pointed out that convenience was number one with first visitors, but after people become accustomed to the area, convenience moves to number three in the list of priorities. He suggested the supervisors look at affordability and look at what has happened in the 1960's and 1970's, and noted the majority of the business was in July, and that was the high income month, and that was based upon

the fact that the County had Canadian business. By the increase in the exchange rate, he noted, they found a decrease in Canadian business to the point where it is nearly non-existent at this time. He said if the county goes to the mass advertising that is being proposed through the Finance & Personnel Committee, he agreed at first they would get a great influx of people, but he added he felt over the next five years, people would be looking for cheaper places to go. He responded to earlier remarks by Mr. Kenny which asked where would the people go, and he suggested Canada. He noted people are already going there for medical services. He suggested the situation would not be quite as fast as "killing the goose that laid the golden egg," but said that tourism was Lake George's one horse, because Lake George was a one-horse town. He said he felt the supervisors would suck the marrow out of that horse if they pass a bed tax.

Mr. Quintal addressed Mr. Greene and asked if in all the years he was in tourism, had he ever promoted that he did not have a bed tax. Mr. Greene said it was a good point, and that was common sense. He outlined briefly his and his wife's qualifications and described the studies they have performed on this area, and offered his and his wife's assistance if the supervisors wished.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Martha Coughlin, of Queensbury, who recalled that at the August 29th Airport Committee meeting she asked the acting chairman, on behalf of herself and neighbors, to ask the chairman of the committee to schedule a meeting to be held within 45 days. She asked what was the status of organizing that meeting. Mr. Tessier mentioned he read a letter at the beginning of the meeting on the status of the tree cutting project at the Airport, and he wondered if she was not present at the time. Mrs. Coughlin said she believed he noted they were waiting for the FAA response. She said she had made it clear at the August meeting that the report from the FAA was not necessary to hold the requested meeting, and they wanted it within 45 days even if that report was not there, because there were many other questions to be asked. She asked that Mr. Tessier proceed with the request.

Mr. Tessier noted there was a regular committee meeting once per month for the Airport Committee, and questions could be raised at that time. He said he did not feel they needed a special meeting. Mrs. Coughlin said the problem was that the Airport Committee meetings, and all the meetings were held during the day, making it very difficult for those that go to business. She said the committee has held the people at bay for 4 1/2 months, and they are asking the courtesy of a meeting.

At Chairman Thomas' request, Mrs. Coughlin repeated the request presented on August 29th, which was for the Airport Committee to schedule a meeting with all of the neighbors on Hicks Road, Chestnut Ridge Road, County Line Road and Queensbury Avenue, being asked for easements, and their neighbors who are not. She said they asked that the meeting be scheduled within 45 days of August 29th, and that those people be notified by mail. She said she provided a mailing list in case the engineers did not have all the non-easement people. She said they asked that the meeting be so business people could attend, and that at least the Airport Committee and the Assistant Manager of the Airport be present to answer questions that were not available for answer on May 1st (first meeting). She noted they have been asking these questions for 4 1/2 months and only told, it's on hold. She said the FAA report was due first in July, then August, then September, then October, and that does not have to be available for the residents to ask a number of questions they have.

Dialogue ensued between Chairman Thomas and Mrs. Coughlin, wherein she reiterated her request, and said the residents had a lot of other questions besides those relating to the FAA report. Mr. Tessier indicated he would be available any time for a meeting. Mrs. Coughlin said her request was that all of the residents be notified by mail. She said they were notified six weeks ahead of the May 1st meeting, and these people need proper notification, she noted, so they can attend. Chairman Thomas confirmed that the county had a mailing list, and Mrs. Coughlin said she provided it to Mr. Caimano. She said she would provide a duplicate list to the Clerk of the Board.

Mr. Haskell said he had a problem mailing to everyone not included in the easement issue. He said he could see spending tax dollars to mail to the people who have been requested to issue easements, but he wondered about mailing to just anybody. Chairman Thomas asked Mrs. Coughlin to respond to the remarks, and she said they were asking that those asked for avigation easements and all of their neighbors. Mr. Tessier clarified that everyone that attended the May meeting was not included in the area. Mrs. Coughlin explained they were requesting this was because this is a neighborhood problem, not just for the individuals.

Chairman Thomas suggested the County notify the affected people with this process, but he said as far as the other neighbors they would like at that meeting, he thought it might be Mrs. Coughlin's responsibility to notify them. Mrs. Coughlin said she was not being asked for an easement, so she would not be on the mailing list from C & S Engineering. Chairman Thomas reiterated that Mrs. Coughlin could invite the other neighbors to the meeting herself. Mrs. Coughlin said this process has to do with taking down a number of trees, affecting the entire neighborhood. She said it happens today that the County was not asking her for an avigation easement, but it was a potential for her. She said that actually she did not receive an avagation easement, but a light pole on her property was marked.

Mr. Montesi said there were 47 affected property owners that the original mailing went out to. He asked what Mrs. Coughlin was asking for in total. Mrs. Coughlin replied the total was between 100 and 107 property owners. Chairman Thomas reiterated he did not feel the County was responsible for notifying other than the affected property owners in the neighborhood. Mr. Montesi agreed, and asked in all honesty, how far should the County go. He said he felt a meeting should be held for the people with easement concerns to address the committee, and the rest of the neighbors who wish to come, should be able to come.

Mrs. Coughlin requested for at least enough notification time, so she could notify those whom the County was not notifying. She asked for at least two weeks notice, and reiterated she wished for it to be held within the 45 day period originally requested.

Discussion ensued over meeting the 45-day request, and it was noted that October 13th was the last day of the 45-day period discussed. Chairman Thomas asked that Mrs. Coughlin bring the list of addressees in, and he said that she would have two weeks to notify the others.

Mr. Tessier noted that the list would change. He reiterated his earlier remarks, and noted the people that were originally asked for easements may no longer be asked. Chairman Thomas suggested notifying the original people involved in the situation so they can get an update. Mr. Tessier said until they meet with FAA, the update will be the same as he gave this morning. Chairman Thomas asked Mrs. Coughlin to talk with the Clerk's Office when she brought in the list of names and hopefully, a date will be set, which can be given to her.

In reply to Mr. Robillard's request, Chairman Thomas asked Mrs. Coughlin if she could prepare the envelopes for the mailing. He noted there was a staff shortage in the Clerk's Office and everyone was very busy, and he asked for her help. Mr. Robillard cautioned that the board was setting a pattern with this practice, and Mr. Tessier agreed. He recalled the board has been requested many times in the past for special meetings and special notices of meetings on a lot of issues over the years.

 $\dot{\text{Mr}}$. Robillard also requested Mrs. Coughlin supply the format for the letter she would like sent to the residents, and Mrs. Coughlin stated she would.

Discussion returned to the occupancy tax, and Mrs. Weinschenk referred to Mr. Quintal's previous suggestion that the hotels and motels should positively state that Warren County has no bed tax. She said when that question was brought up a few years ago, Mr. Salvador tried to put an ad in the county tourism booklet on clean water and no bed tax, and actually it had to go to the County Attorney because it was going to be rejected. She said she thought that meant it was the county's position that they did not want that advertised. Mr. Caimano clarified that related only to the issue of water.

Motion was made by Mr. Monroe, seconded by Mr. Montesi to declare an executive session. Mr. Dusek outlined the reasons for executive session as follows: (1) to discuss current negotiations concerning the sale transaction on the burn plant; (2) to discuss litigation of Schultz and Salvador v. Warren County involving the burn plant; (3) matters leading to the potential hiring of an individual or law firm to represent the county in collective bargaining negotiations; and (4) collective bargaining negotiations.

The motion to declare executive session was carried by unanimous vote. Chairman Thomas declared a recess from 11:51 a.m. to 12:03 p.m. Board reconvened, and executive session was held from 12:03 p.m. to 12:27 p.m. Supervisors Belden, Caimano and Montesi left during executive session.

Board reconvened. Motion was made by Mr. Quintal, seconded by Mr. Morrell and carried unanimously to introduce two resolutions as follows: (1) authorizing agreement with Bartlett, Pontiff, Stewart & Rhodes, PC, to provide legal services for legal matters for Warren County; and (2) authorizing agreement with Poklemba, Hobbs & Ulasewicz, LLC to provide legal services for legal matters. Mr. Robillard noted these resolutions would be numbers 610 and 611 for the record.

Chairman call for a vote on the resolutions. Resolution Nos. 610 and 611 were approved.

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WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 16, 2002

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren convened at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center, Lake George, New York, at 10:00 a.m.

Mr. William Thomas presiding.

Salute to the flag was led by Supervisor Bentley.

Roll called, the following members present:

Supervisors Gabriels, , Mallison (entered during the executive session), Sheehan, Mason, O'Connor, Kenny, Belden, Bentley, Thomas, Tessier, Bennett, Brower, Morrell, Champagne, Montesi, O'Neill, Haskell and Quintal - 19.

Absent: Supervisor Caimano - 1.

Motion was made by Mr. Belden, seconded by Mr. Mason, and carried unanimously, to approve the minutes of the September 18, 2002, Board Meeting, subject to correction by the Clerk.

Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing on the Warren County Sewer District (Industrial Park) Assessment Roll open at 10:03 a.m., and requested the Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

Second Deputy Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

There being no questions or comments, Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing on the Warren County Sewer District (Industrial Park) Assessment Roll closed at 10:04 a.m.

Chairman Thomas called for committee reports for October.

The following committee chairmen or vice-chairmen presented verbal reports on October meetings or activities:

Supervisor Bennett, Vice-Chairman of Sheriff & Communications; Supervisor Morrell, Tourism; and Supervisor O'Neill, Health Services.

In connection with the Health Services Committee report, Mr. O'Neill mentioned there were two resolutions that arose following the meeting. He noted one related to Early Intervention (Resolution No. 657) and the second had to do with a grant that needed to be applied for right away relative to BOCES (Resolution No. 655).

Mr. O'Neill apprised most of the new health insurance rates for next year were in now and there would be open enrollment throughout the County for the employees in the month of November. If anyone wanted to make any changes, he requested they check with Amy Clute, Self-Insurance Administrator, for the dates and times.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Paul Dusek, County Attorney, who stated he had sign-off resolutions for the supervisors' membership on the LDC (Local Development Corporation). Rather than call a LDC meeting and do all that formality, he said he thought they could handle it this way.

One resolution authorized the repayment of interest earned to the United States Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD), Mr. Dusek said. Apparently, he stated, the regulations in 1997 were changed and require that HUD be repaid interest earned on Federal monies that were held in accounts by the counties. In the case of Warren County, he explained there was a CD 7 - Jobs Bill account that they have to pay interest on. He added there was a question as to whether there was enough money in that account to pay that interest back. He apprised in the case of the LDC there were savings and checking accounts that interest must also be paid on. He noted there was enough money in the LDC accounts. He indicated the Director of the Planning Department informed him she thought there was enough money in the LDC account to also assist the County in the repayment of its CD 7 interest monies. Therefore, he explained this resolution by the Local Development Corpora-

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tion will authorize the payment of the interest it owes but it also will assist the County's repayment of interest so long as HUD authorizes it and it was approved by the Federal Law Regulations.

The second LDC resolution, Mr. Dusek apprised, was to authorize an agreement with the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill for the Institute of Outdoor Drama for a feasibility study for the "Last of the Mohicans" Outdoor Theater Project. He explained this resolution also came to him from the Planning & Community Development Committee; and upon review with Patricia Tatich, Director of the Planning Department, he stated he was informed that the preferred source of Federal funds would seem to be the Local Development Corporation funds. Based on that plus the legal analysis he did as far as the proper entity that should be doing these type of contracts, he said it was his opinion that the LDC was the better entity. Under County Law, he remarked he has previously expressed some concerns about the County entering into a project of this nature since it was really a more business related matter (versus public government) and seemed appropriate to come out of the LDC, which has more authority to do these type of things than the County.

Regarding the interest matter, Mr. Bennett remarked after the nine years that transpired in the HUD Audit they said the interest monies earned on any of those accounts needed to be refunded back to HUD. He added this was the way in which that can be accomplished. In the other issue as to where should the funds come from to do the study, Mr. Bennett said it had been thought at one point to do it next year as a budget item in Tourism. However, he explained the monies may be available, although final word has not come back yet from HUD on the application of those funds for this purpose. He noted this would make it possible to do two things, i.e., (1) get it out of the County Budget and (2) allow it to get done this year.

Chairman Thomas acknowledged the original of each resolution would go around and should be signed by the supervisors. Mr. Tessier mentioned if it was done this way then the County would own the document.

Chairman called for reading of communications.

Clerk read communications, including the following:

Washington County Resolutions, adopting the Adirondack Community College Budget and approving issuance of bonds by the Counties of Warren and Washington Industrial Development Agency (Prospect School Project).

Warren County Department of Social Services Public Home Inspection Report, which has been submitted to the New York State Department of Health.

Chairman Thomas acknowledged the Inter-County Legislative Committee of the Adirondacks meets tomorrow in Essex County. If anyone wanted information on the meeting, he indicated they had the information available.

Chairman called for reading of resolutions.

Clerk announced the replacement for Resolution No. 631 was distributed this morning. He said Resolution Nos. 613 through 654 were mailed to the supervisors, and a motion to bring Resolution Nos. 612 and 655 through 661 to the floor was necessary. Motion was made by Mr. Montesi, seconded by Mr. Brower, and carried unanimously, to bring Resolution Nos. 612 and 655 through 661 to the floor.

Mr. Montesi acknowledged there was a resolution included in the packet asking the State to look at liability insurance for snowmobile clubs (Resolution No. 630). He remarked this matter should be part of the discussion at the Inter-County Legislative Committee of the Adirondacks meeting tomorrow. Mr. Quintal noted they sent a letter to them, and he added

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since then an insurance company stepped forward so the Clubs have coverage. However, he stated there was only one company so they were still passing that letter on.

Mr. Brower requested a roll call vote on Resolution No. 615, authorizing sale of surplus equipment.

WHEREAS, counties have minimal authority to manage, control or reduce their Medicaid costs, and therefore serve primarily as a means to transfer a portion of the State's share of Medicaid from the statewide tax base to local property tax bases; and

WHEREAS, in 2001 local taxpayers paid over \$4.3 billion in net Medicaid costs through their local budgets and it is estimated that the net Medicaid local share will increase to \$4.8 billion in 2002 and exceed \$5.4 billion in 2003; and

WHEREAS, for counties outside New York City, the Medicaid local share has doubled between 1990-2001, making Medicaid the largest and most volatile single expense in county budgets; and

WHEREAS, recent actions by the state, including shifting of Medicaid managed care costs to counties, the shifting of state mental health costs to counties, the expansion of various Medicaid payment rates, the creation of the Family Health Plus Program and expanded funding for healthcare worker recruitment and retention, has compounded the local Medicaid problem and added to the fiscal crisis currently facing counties; and

WHEREAS, the resurgence of Medicaid growth reflects the underlying problems and funding inequities of the Medicaid program which place unique burdens on counties, jeopardize the long-term fiscal stability of county governments, and add to the burden or regressive local property taxes; and

WHEREAS, it is imperative that the Governor and State Legislature take responsibility for the growth of New York State's program by capping the Medicaid local share at 2001 base levels; and

WHEREAS, this cap would provide local governments significant budgetary relief; and WHEREAS, this cap would provide county taxpayers with real property tax relief in 2003; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, the Warren County Board of Supervisors call upon the Governor and the State Legislature to make fundamental structural reform to the Medicaid program and provide real property taxpayers with relief by *capping Medicaid now*; and be it further

WHEREAS, Medicaid has become the largest single appropriation in every county budget and with the reemergence of double-digit annual growth rates is siphoning away the limited resources needed to fund other critical budgetary needs at the county level; and

WHEREAS, the National Governor's Association (NGA), including Governor Pataki, have supported a proposal for a temporary increase in the federal medical assistance percentage (FMAP) as an economic stimulus option that would provide more federal funding for state Medicaid programs; and

WHEREAS, the NGA has indicated that it would both help to stimulate the nation's economy and shore up the safety net for low-income families; and

WHEREAS, on January 16, 2002 the Governor and New York State Legislature enacted legislation that provides for a multi-billion, three-year plan to address New York's shortage of health care workers, to financially strengthen New York's hospitals, nursing homes and other health care facilities and increase funding for other important health care programs; and

WHEREAS, this new plan will increase the local Medicaid burden, currently over \$4.3 billion annually, by approximately \$300 million over the next three years from increased reimbursement to hospitals, nursing homes, and home care facilities; and

WHEREAS, this legislation also integrates the funding from an increase in the FMAP of 3% for the next three years and relies on this increased federal funding as a major offset to the new local costs; and

WHEREAS, without the increased FMAP, property taxpayers across the state that fund county budgets, will be forced to absorb the resulting increased Medicaid burden in their local tax bill; and

WHEREAS, the United States Senate has supported a temporary FMAP increase via the Rockefeller-Collins-Nelson-Smith amendment to the Greater Access to Affordable Pharmaceuticals Act of 2001, which would provide counties and New York City with one time Medicaid relief of approximately \$100 million and \$200 million, respectively; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, the Warren County Board of Supervisors call upon the President and the United States House of Representatives to support an increase in the federal medical assistance percentage (FMAP) to provide New York's local taxpayers with relief from the crushing financial burden of the Medicaid program; and be it further

<u>Section 3.</u> That said Note shall be sold at private sale by the County Treasurer at a price of not less than par value and accrued interest, if any, and upon the due execution and sale of said Note the same shall be delivered to the purchaser upon the payment by him/her to the County Treasurer of the purchase price in cash, and the receipt of the County Treasurer shall be a full acquittance to the purchaser who shall not be obliged to see the application of the purchase of money.

<u>Section 4.</u> The faith and credit of the County of Warren, New York, are irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said Note.

Mr. Dusek requested an executive session concerning the Install Security Fence Project at the Airport and negotiations concerning a settlement of that matter.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Louis Tessier, who acknowledged at the recent Criminal Justice Committee meeting it was decided the Public Defender issue should be presented to the full board. He noted he called Oscar Schreiber, who made a presentation to the Committee previously, but was not able to reach him. It was decided this matter should be tabled to the next Board Meeting. He remarked it would not have any effect on the Budget because the dollars that they spend for the Legal Aid Budget and the Proposal for Public Defender were almost identical.

Chairman Thomas acknowledged the next meeting was the Adjourned Board Meeting where the Budget Officer presents his budget. Mr. Robillard noted the Adjourned Board Meeting was going to be November 8, 2002, at 10:00 a.m. Therefore, he suggested perhaps holding off on the Public Defender issue until the December Board Meeting. Mr. Tessier said he would see what he could work out and he would let them know.

Mr. Tessier responded to questioning, stating Oscar Schreiber was a Public Defender from Saratoga County, who now lives in the Town of Queensbury. Discussion ensued.

Mr. O'Connor stressed they really needed to address this issue, adding the sooner the better. He indicated they needed to hear from the District Attorney and the Administrator of the Legal Aid Office so they know what the problems were. He indicated it was an important issue and it was something everyone needed to listen to.

Chairman Thomas declared a brief recess at 10:34 a.m. to 10:39 a.m.

Chairman Thomas requested a motion for an executive session to discuss the Install Security Fence Project at the Airport; and motion was made by Mr. O'Connor, seconded by Mr. Kenny, and carried unanimously, to declare executive session pursuant to Section 105(d) of the Public Officers Law.

Executive session was declared from 10:40 a.m. to 11:12 a.m. (Mr. Mallison entered the meeting during the executive session.)

Committee reconvened; and Mr. Dusek apprised there was a proposed resolution before the Board, which would essentially allow a work-out agreement with the fence company known as Revico, Inc., working with C&S Engineers, Inc. He stated Revico would pay liquidated damages in the amount of at least \$18,000. He noted the engineering costs would be approximately \$32,000, part of which would be paid by FAA (Federal Aviation Administration) and shared by C&S Engineers, Inc., and the County. He noted there was a line in the proposed resolution to provide where these engineering costs would be paid from. He said he was told Marshall Stevens, Assistant Airport Manager, did not have anything under the FAA account so they may need a source of funding for it. Mr. Robillard pointed out they did not have one. Mr. Dusek questioned the Contingency Fund, and Mr. Robillard replied he did not know. Mr. Robillard asked if there were any funds left in that Capital Project at all, and Mr. Remington indicated he would check on it. Chairman Thomas remarked the "source to be determined", adding they would find the money. (Subsequent to the meeting, please note Marshall Stevens, Assistant Airport Manager, indicated there was sufficient funds in Capital Project No. H.9552 13 280 (H890-213) - Install Airport Security Fence.)

Motion was made by Mr. Montesi and seconded by Mr. Brower, authorizing amended or supplemental agreement with Revico, Inc. (previously known as Cooper Fence Company, Inc.) to Complete the Fence Installation at the Floyd Bennett Memorial Airport. The motion

was carried with Mr. Belden and Mr. Mallison voting no. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 662.

Chairman called for a vote on the resolution.

Resolution No. 662 was approved.

RESOLUTION NO. 662 OF 2002 Resolution introduced by Supervisors Montesi and Brower

AUTHORIZING AMENDED OR SUPPLEMENTAL AGREEMENT WITH REVICO, INC. (PREVIOUSLY KNOWN AS COOPER FENCE COMPANY, INC.) TO COMPLETE THE FENCE INSTALLATION AT FLOYD BENNETT MEMORIAL AIRPORT

RESOLVED, that Warren County, working with C&S Engineers, Inc. and entering into such agreements as may be necessary, enter into an amended or supplemental agreement with Revico, Inc (previously known as Cooper Fence Company, Inc.), which agreement shall contain terms and conditions to be recommended and negotiated by the County Attorney upon which Revico, Inc. will be provided additional time to complete the fence installation contract at the Floyd Bennett Memorial Airport and which agreement shall, among other things, be subject to any Federal or State Government Agency approvals necessary, cause the contractor to pay liquidated damages of at least Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000) and is anticipated to result in the County being liable for the payment of additional engineering costs of approximately Thirty Two Thousand Dollars (\$32,000) (Fourteen Thousand Dollars (\$14,000) after crediting the liquidated damages to be received from the contractor) with the FAA providing an additional amount of approximately Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000) to help offset additional engineering expenses and with C&S Engineers, Inc. and the County sharing the costs of additional engineering expenses up to but not to exceed Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500) each and, be it further

RESOLVED, that the County share of additional engineering costs shall be paid for from the account/fund to be determined, and, be it further

RESOLVED, that the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors be and hereby is authorized and directed to execute the agreements authorized above and such other documents as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this resolution, providing that all conditions set forth herein are met.

There being no further business, Chairman Thomas adjourned the meeting at 11:15 a.m. to meet on Friday, November 8, 2002, at 10:00 a.m. to review the 2003 Tentative Budget.

WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS ADJOURNED MEETING FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 2002

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren convened at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center, Lake George, New York, at 10:02 a.m.

Mr. William Thomas presiding.

Salute to the flag was led by Supervisor Tessier.

Roll called, the following members present:

Supervisors Gabriels, Mallison, Mason, O'Connor, Kenny, Belden, Bentley, Thomas, Tessier, Bennett, Brower, Caimano, Morrell, Champagne, Montesi, O'Neill and Quintal - 17. Absent: Supervisors Monroe, Sheehan and Haskell - 3.

Chairman Thomas noted the purpose of the meeting was for the Budget Officer to present the proposed 2003 budget; and he recognized Mr. Caimano, who continued with the meeting.

Prior to the review, Mr. Caimano commented that his twin grandchildren had been born this morning. He said what struck him was that at a time when new life was here, they were also hit with a life that was gone. He requested, and the supervisors observed, a moment of silence in remembrance of Betty Moynihan, wife of former supervisor John Moynihan, also deceased.

Mr. Kenny said he received an e-mail from Jack and Betty Moynihan's children, which said they were saddened by the passing of their mother, but it had been 100 days since their dad had passed away and they knew their mother missed their dad very much and that she would finally be rejoined with the love of her life in heaven.

Mr. Caimano then remarked concerning an editorial printed by *The Post-Star* today, and oted he, as well as many people, were very concerned over the editorial. He said he suspected that *The Post-Star* has some angst in the Editorial Department because they realize the supervisors know that the newspaper pays people like Freeman and Doolittle to write the nonsense that they write. He suggested that *The Post-Star* felt compelled to hold the supervisors to task for the county employees. He said he found that insulting, at best, not only to the Board of Supervisors that worked hard, but also to the people who work hard for this county for the taxpayers. He said when people were sick, those \$30,000 or \$40,000 per year nurses go out and take care of them; when people are infirmed and elderly, those \$30,000 or \$40,000 per year nurses take care of them day and night at Westmount Health Facility. He said he found it terribly insulting to the people of this county who work hard, that some people in the editorial department of *The Post-Star*, who probably could not find their way to this county building, felt compelled to insult the people that help the taxpayers in this county.

Mr. Caimano remarked that the person writing this editorial was "a guy with ink by the barrel", and he was criticizing employees of this county without even knowing where the county building is. He noted that one of the things *The Post-Star* talked about was salaries; and he provided the following statistic: Since 1997, the county's total employee count was down 2 percent. He said that during this time period, the total number of employees decreased by 18 people. He also noted that the dollar amount of the payroll was up about 2.95 percent per year, or roughly the rate of inflation per year. He concluded that the supervisors were not "giving away the store to dumb bunnies who can't do anything." He said he felt the Board of Supervisors was too thoughtful, too professional, and too considerate to let that happen in the first place.

Mr. Caimano proceeded with a review of the 2003 Proposed Warren County Budget. He noted that the 2003 department requests for appropriations were up 14.99 percent over the 2002 budget, and the estimated revenues were up 5.12 percent. He said that the Budget Officer's recommendations for appropriations were up 10.76 percent over the 2002 budget, and estimated revenues were up 10.82 percent. He said there were no salary increases

included in the budget for outside bargaining unit personnel, but acknowledged the supervisors were working diligently on a program which would change the salary structure of county employees. Until that happens, he said the salaries would not be touched.

Mr. Caimano noted that as part of the handouts he would be distributing, there was information on the Child Health Plus and Family Health Plus Programs; and he noted the supervisors would be able to see what this was doing to this budget. Again, he said, in spite of what has been written, these are the types of things the supervisors know nothing about until they are hit with them.

Highlights of the budget and proposed tax rates based on raising \$24,146,358.92 by tax were reviewed and distributed by Mr. Caimano. Copies are on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors with Budget Committee records.

Mr. Caimano thanked Mr. Robillard, Mrs. Dressel and Mrs. Parsons for their work on the budget. He noted that the county had a windfall in sales tax revenues, and he said it was his opinion that a portion of that should be given back to the taxpayers. He said that recommendation was reflected in the budget presented, and that was why the tax rates were down as low as they were.

Mr. Caimano requested approval by the supervisors of the proposed budget, which he noted if approved, would become the Tentative Budget and will be reviewed at a public hearing on November 20th.

Mr. O'Neill recalled that last year the supervisors did not include a pay raise in the budget for the members of the Board of Supervisors, and they were the only ones that did not receive one. He asked what were the plans for the 2003 year. Chairman Thomas said that would be up to the members of the board to decide whether they feel they want to do this or not. He noted it was not an easy budget year, and he said he felt a decision to increase the salaries of the supervisors should be done by a majority vote of the board members. Mr. O'Neill agreed.

Motion was made by Mr. O'Neill that the supervisors be granted a 3 percent pay increase in the 2003 budget. Mr. O'Connor seconded the motion. Mr. O'Neill noted this would amount to about \$400 per year per person.

Mr. Mallison asked if the increase was already built into the current budget, and Mr. Caimano said no. Mr. Kenny also recalled that last year at budget time, the supervisors made the sacrifice of foregoing raises at the Budget Officer's request. He recalled he had said at that time that he did not mind leading the charge, but when he got to the top of the hill, he wanted someone behind him. Unfortunately, he said, everybody else got raises, and supervisors did not. He said the supervisors have spent considerable time this year trying to make adjustments to the employees' salaries, especially the lowest-paid employees of Warren County. Except, he added, the supervisors were the lowest paid employees of Warren County, and they have not made any adjustments to their salaries. He said he thought long and hard about the issue, and said he felt he earned his salary, and he had no problem at all supporting a 3 percent salary increase for the supervisors.

Mr. Champagne said he would vote no on this motion. He said he felt from the perception of wrangling with this budget over the past two months and certainly looking to do what he considered to be drastic cuts in the budget, he felt the precedent-setting of this board would not be good for what they need to contend with in the future. He acknowledged that the supervisors have put in their time and were entitled to raises; however, he said he felt this was not the year to promote raises. Mr. Mallison echoed Mr. Champagne's remarks.

Mr. Bennett said this morning he asked the Sheriff to confirm that the patrol for the snowmobile trail system would not take place based on the figures in next year's budget, and that come April, the leased snowmobiles go back and they will not be available at the beginning of the next season so the patrol can be considered in the next budget. He said that will be one of the reasons why he would be saying no on the raises. He said he felt the issue was public safety, and he indicated he would give his \$400 raise to put that money back into the budget.

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Mr. O'Connor said he did not care whether the raises get voted up or down, and added if this was the first year that the supervisors were asked to forego raises, he would probably be in favor of doing so. However, he added, this was the second year the supervisors were being asked to do this; and he mentioned that the supervisors just discovered a "windfall". He noted that the supervisors work all year long considering what to do at budget time, and at budget time, they get a ton of press because they pass along expenditures to the taxpayers. He recalled that years ago the supervisors went years without pay raises, and then they gave themselves \$1,000. He said that the supervisors were maligned in the media for voting this raise. He suggested if the supervisors continue to go without raises, eventually somebody is going to want to be compensated, and if they look at another \$1,000, the same thing will happen as in the past. He said the supervisors came up with the 3 percent raises per year because it was fair and compensated the supervisors on an on-going basis, and nobody had a problem. He said he would vote in favor of the raises.

Mr. Montesi commented he would be voting no on the motion, because the supervisors were working to do something for the non-bargaining unit people in terms of a higher degree of fairness. He said this has not been done yet, and based on the year the county has struggled with, and the uncertainty of what is happening next year, he would just as soon leave his salary as it was.

Mr. Tessier referred to Mr. O'Connor's remarks, and recalled it had been 10 years that the supervisors had not had a raise, and as budget officer, he put in for raises for the supervisors. He echoed Mr. O'Connor's remarks over the malignment which happened by the press. Since then, he said the supervisors have received only what the rest of the employees received, and there has been no comments or complaints by anyone over how this has been handled. He said he personally did not care about the raise, but suggested if the supervisors do not do the increases and wait 4 - 5 years, it will be a big hassle.

Mr. Champagne said he felt the supervisors should be the "pace-setters." He said they were in a mode right now of practically deflation, and he thought they could all survive another year given the situation the county is in. He said he felt if the supervisors wanted to put the money in the budget, it should go to highways to do the roads.

Mr. O'Neill said he did not feel bashful asking for this raise, and added he did not feel it was a handout. He said he was on a lot of committees and many weeks he was at the county four or five days per week; and he mentioned he had a lot of town responsibilities, too.

Chairman Thomas requested a roll call vote on whether to introduce a resolution to increase the salaries of the supervisors by 3 percent. The roll call vote resulted as follows:

Absent:: 136 Supervisors Monroe, Sheehan and Haskell

Motion fails.

Motion was made by Mr. Quintal, seconded by Mr. O'Neill and carried unanimously to bring a resolution to the floor to approve the tentative budget and call for a public hearing. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 665 for the record.

Mr. Bennett asked that the funds be restored for the snowmobile patrol in the Sheriff's Department. He said as long as the system was there, he felt it needed to have policing in order to maintain safety and keep things under control. He mentioned that his wife has a business of three or four machines, they do not go out alone, they are escorted. He said he wanted to stress he was not doing this as a self-serving purpose, and noted there were only two days those machines were let out last year. If there are days the snowmobiles were out, he said he wanted the trail to be safe. He mentioned he worked on that patrol a number of years ago, and said he felt he knew the need. He asked the supervisors to please restore the funding.

Mr. Caimano suggested waiting until the public hearing and argue the issue then. Mr. Bennett said that was understandable. Chairman Thomas mentioned this could be voted on today if the supervisors wished; and Mr. O'Neill agreed, noting the budget could be amended now before adopting it as the tentative budget.

Mr. Bennett moved to amend the budget to restore the funds for the Sheriff's patrol for snowmobile trails. Chairman Thomas pointed out that there currently was a motion on the floor. He asked whether there was a wish to amend the motion on the floor.

Mr. Montesi recalled discussion by Mr. Caimano wherein he noted that the supervisors would pass the budget, and the first thing that would happen would be that the supervisors would start making adjustments. He noted the budget has not even been passed yet, and the supervisors were already looking to add money back into it. He suggested that was not what the supervisors wanted to do given the long time it took to work the budget out.

Mr. Quintal said his motion stood as moved. Chairman Thomas noted these items can be discussed further at a public hearing. Discussion ensued briefly on the procedure for adopting the tentative budget, which calls for a public hearing prior to adoption of the budget.

Mr. Gabriels recalled that earlier in the summer, a case was made that there were facilities in the county that may owe sales tax based on admissions. He asked the status of that revenue, and recalled the county was going to have discussions with the State Department of Taxation & Finance. Chairman Thomas noted that the discussions were not had directly. He noted they talked with the owners of the park in question, and they were going to go back and check on it and then get back to the county. He said he asked the County Treasurer to follow up on those discussions and find out where they are in the process. Mr. Gabriels said he raised this questions because it looked like it might be a considerable sum of money and additional revenues to amend the budget. Chairman Thomas suggested possibly they could discuss this at the public hearing on the budget, after the Treasurer has a chance to talk to the park owners.

Mr. Mallison said he has learned a lot this year, particularly about how much and how hard the people in this room work. He said he offered his thanks to Mr. Caimano for all of his efforts on the budget. He said he had also learned a lot about how dysfunctional his full time job is, being for the State in Albany. He suggested the State needed to get a message that they are forcing the counties to pass on unfunded mandates to property taxpayers, and that was unacceptable. He said he made a commitment to the voters of his district that he would not pass a budget that was over a 10 percent increase. He said he did not want to point any blame or fingers at anybody in the room; and he suggested the blame lies solely with the Governor of New York State, and the State Legislature. He said it was unbelievable the amount of unfunded mandates sent to the counties this year. He urged that the supervisors find a way to pass some sort of resolution on to the State Legislature and the Governor telling them it was unacceptable for the supervisors to pass on these kinds of costs to our taxpayers, and they should be responsive and do something for the counties, whether it be to resolve the unfunded mandates, or send new grants, or limit their own expenditures. He said he could not vote for this budget until somebody does something about this. Mr. Caimano said that this has been discussed and he was hopeful something would happen on November 20th at the public hearing on the budget. He also mentioned that Mr. Mallison has kept his promise to his constituents, as Glens Falls was going to have a tax increase of 7.25 percent.

Mr. Kenny recalled that last year when the supervisors met, they were talking about a \$76 million budget, and this year the budget (total appropriations) was \$85 million. He said the budget was up \$9 million, and he said he felt this could not go on. He said he felt no matter how the supervisors vote today, probably what was more important was how they voted all year long in committees. He suggested the supervisors cannot continue to have spending rise in Warren County the way it has. He said he commented at the Finance & Personnel Committee recently that he would not support the budget based on the fact that the supervisors had failed to act on an occupancy tax in Warren County. He said he would not

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support any subsequent budget that does not contain an occupancy tax for Warren County because the budget would fail to encompass revenue from an occupancy tax. He urged the other supervisors to join him in this mild form of protest. Somewhere, he said he felt Warren County Government has grown outside its intended boundaries and its intended normal scope of government services. He said he felt the county certainly offered many wonderful options for the residents that enhances the quality of life, but he suggested it was time to start moving back toward traditional services. He suggested a goal of the supervisors should be to evaluate every department in Warren County, and to define each department to find out what were mandatory services and what were optional services. He said he felt those optional services needed to be prioritized. He suggested the supervisors strive for next year to pass a budget that rises no more than the annual rate of inflation.

Mr. Bennett said his biggest concern lies with the cuts that have been made in the DPW budget. He said he listened carefully to what Mr. Kenny said regarding services; and he asked how they could possibly cut DPW further, which has been cut since 1997 to the point where he felt they were not able to do an adequate job on the roads. He discussed the needs of maintaining the roads, including plowing and sanding, and suggested they could not take more away when they were already down to nothing. Because of where the DPW budget was at, he said he would not be able to support the budget.

Chairman Thomas referred to Mr. Mallison's remarks, and addressed the county's efforts to try to do the highway projects every year. He noted that last year, the supervisors decided to do all the projects because they knew they were getting into a crisis situation. This year, he said, they did not have any choice but to remove some projects in an effort to help control the budget. However, he noted, the State each year talks about taking the Consolidated Highway Improvement Program (CHIPs) money away, which does these projects.

Mr. Caimano said that it was a matter of priorities, and a matter of wants and needs. He asked if the DPW budget was inadequate in terms of money, the supervisors should look at what other departments may have in excess funds or funds that are being spent that do not have a priority, which could be transferred to that department. He said it was not a matter of each department, but the budget as a whole, which has gotten out of control. He said that the supervisors are being forced to deal with a budget in which much of the expenses they do not know about until the State tells them. He mentioned the Family Health Plus and Child Health Plus Programs, as examples of mandated expenses.

Mr. Caimano concurred with Mr. Kenny's remarks, and suggested that at every committee meeting all year, the supervisors need to decide even though there is money in the budget for a particular thing, maybe it was not a priority and there was a greater need elsewhere in the budget. He said he felt the supervisors have done a woefully inadequate job of doing this.

Mr. O'Connor cited another example of a mandated program that was going to cost the county money, and mentioned the increase in the age for the PINS (Persons In Need of Supervision) Program from 16 years to 18 years. Discussion ensued, and Mr. Montesi questioned the impact that the county could have on a 16 to 18 year old, and suggested it was backwards and the emphasis should be placed on the younger child.

Mr. Kenny said he also took exception to the editorial in today's edition of *The Post-Star*. He said he felt generally the employees of the county were underpaid. Chairman Thomas agreed, noting the county obviously did not have control over what the newspaper wrote. He also echoed Mr. Caimano's remarks, and said he felt the county had quality people working in the county. He said that wages were paid based on education, qualifications, ability, and responsibilities; and he added he felt the ones making higher wages should not be penalized because they make more than a family's average earning. He said he felt that was not a good basis to put this on, and stressed these people were paid because of their qualifications and what they do for the county. He noted he worked in private industry for 21 years and they never saw what other people earned, but obviously the people who made more money, more was required of them. He said he felt it was incorrect for the newspaper to use

family income as a basis for what the employees should or should not make. He added he felt the county was bringing its lower-waged people up to a more living wage through ongoing discussions on the salary structure in Warren County. He concluded, saying he supported the county employees as they were the backbone of this county's government. He said he felt it was incorrect to be putting these people on the carpet everytime the supervisors talk about a budget problem.

Mr. Kenny also mentioned that in that newspaper it said that Supervisor Caimano was "the lone voice", and he said every supervisor has worked very hard to get that budget down and every department head has made a sacrifice.

Chairman Thomas said he felt discussion needed to take place in the next few months on increases for employees outside the bargaining unit. He noted that the supervisors were in the process of talking about readjusting the salary schedule. He asked if there was something in the budget to cover this expense; and Mr. Robillard replied, not to his knowledge. Mr. Thomas said he thought this would be an important point for the board members to look at. Mr. Caimano had left the room briefly, and upon his return, Chairman Thomas asked him if there was money in the budget for these employees; and Mr. Caimano replied yes. Chairman Thomas suggested the salary increases would be implemented once the supervisors complete review of the salary schedule. Mr. Caimano concurred.

Mr. Quintal said he was disturbed about another article in *The Post-Star* about two of the county employees. He said there was no comparison to the amount of experience these two employees have and how much money they were saving the county on things like the sewer project. He said that the Superintendent of DPW and the Deputy Superintendent (Mr. Remington and Mr. Lamy) had more experience than most of the engineers that are working privately. He said he would love to see a comparison of the private engineers' salaries compared to these two employees. He said he felt with their experience, they could get jobs in the private sector at much higher pays; and he remarked he felt the bashing *The Post-Star* did to these two employees was ludicrous. He said he supported both employees and added they did a great job for the county. He said Mr. Remington has cut overtime and has cut his budget any time the supervisors asked, and Mr. Lamy has saved the county millions of dollars by writing grants and bringing money into the county for sewers.

Mr. Montesi agreed with Mr. Quintal's remarks. He also referred to the comparison *The Post-Star* made of the DPW in Warren County and Washington County in terms of dollars and number of miles of road. He pointed out that Warren County has a lot of quality things that other counties do not. He mentioned the fish hatchery and the railroad and said they were things that brought tourism dollars into the county. He said he felt the newspaper made an unfair comparison as they did not take into consideration what DPW was all about in Warren County.

Mr. Bennett said he joined his fellow supervisors in their remarks concerning the county employees and the jobs they do. He added that the amount of traffic that travels over Warren County highways was so much greater than what travels over Washington County's. He said he wished Washington County had that kind of traffic, too, as it would generate additional dollars for them, but Warren County has such a tremendous usage of its highway system that they have to do more repair.

Mr. Bennett also talked about the PINS Program, and noted he spent years in education and, unfortunately, the ills of the society were growing. He noted that government was being asked to take the place of parents, although they cannot do that. He said government has to do the best they can with it, and school districts spend a great deal of money because of what is passed along to them to deal with. He said he felt it was unfortunate that the state was asking the property taxpayer to pick up these costs. He suggested this was something that should be done at the state level as it was a state-wide problem. Mr. Caimano pointed out that government was not asked, rather they were mandated to pay for these programs.

Chairman Thomas pointed out that another example was Child Health Plus and Family Health Plus. He said that the enrollments are going up, and the state takes credit for doing this and charges the counties 25 percent of the cost to do it.

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Mr. Bennett discussed the supervisors talking about the other things they do in this county that maybe could be eliminated. He suggested maybe they could do without the fish hatchery, but he asked the supervisors to consider the educational program that it provides to the school busses of children everyday. He suggested if they were going to make a difference in people's actions later in life, they need to start early. He said the kinds of programs done through the fish hatchery, the 4-H Program the county supports, and the programs done at Up-Yonda, are the kinds of things that often time they could do without, but it impacts on other things. He said he felt if the county was going to spend less to supervise these people, later in their lives, the county will have to spend more on programs.

Mr. Tessier concurred with the remarks about *The Post-Star* article. He suggested that the newspaper also did not compare the tax rates of the two counties. He pointed out that the Warren County taxpayers pay less in taxes than Washington County, and added he felt Washington County has nothing for their people.

Mr. Belden also commented on the newspaper article on the DPW. He thanked Mr. Remington for the time he takes to sit and talk with him. He said he felt that Mr. Remington has done a tremendous job, and he accused *The Post-Star* of not telling the whole story. He attested that when they revamped the department, there was originally 161 people, and today there was only about 120. He said they used to have three engineers, and Mr. Remington and Mr. Lamy are running the department without the third engineer. He acknowledged that this has been a tough year to do a budget, but said with Mr. Remington's help they would get through the year. He reiterated Chairman Thomas' remarks about the roads being done by the county without the CHIPs money, and noted they lost \$250,000 in operation and maintenance money under this program.

Mr. Belden mentioned that the power in the building had just gone out and the county's generator had taken over. He recalled that they spent the money for a generator three years ago and some supervisors did not want to spend the \$150,000. He said if they had not, they would be sitting in the dark today. Concluding his remarks, Mr. Belden complimented the efforts of the other county departments, also.

Mr. O'Connor mentioned that some county employees had written letters to *The Post-Star*, which were printed. He said he felt these letters spelled out the opposite side of the coin, and he applauded the employees for doing this.

Mr. Mallison referred to the unfunded mandates mentioned, and added they have not mentioned that the county has had to just approve construction of a \$25 million jail because the state said the County must. He noted he visited Mesa, Arizona, and found that the inmates stay in tents outside in a barbed wire area. He suggested putting the inmates in Warren County in that environment and they would not be back and the county would not be stuck with these costs. He said he felt there were ridiculous amounts of mandates coming down from the state.

Mr. Mallison said he felt *The Post-Star* made a mistake in dealing with the two county employees in DPW. He said he felt the two individuals were very hard working people; but he commended *The Post-Star* for driving home to the residents of Warren County that the supervisors must be diligent in looking after the pocketbooks of the people who live in this area, as the supervisors are trying to do. He said if there was a criticism, it was that their overlooking the fact that each supervisor was trying to do that.

Chairman Thomas said he felt that good government was basically based on communications and the ideas of many. He said there were 20 supervisors on the board who have varied ideas, and he said he felt all-in-all, they work well together. He said there were times they did not agree on issues, such as the occupancy tax, and that will at some point come to a vote of the full board, he was sure. When it does, he said they will get along with whatever happens, as that is part of the entire scope of what the supervisors do to serve the people. He remarked he received comments sometimes that he was losing control of the board; however, he said from his view, he was losing something he never had. He said he never intended or tried to control the board, as the supervisors have their own ideas, they are

varied, and it is government at its best when this happens. He cited some of the activities ongoing with the board and said he felt this was a progressive board. He said he felt the control was among the supervisors making intelligent decisions, not one person ruling the board.

Mr. Champagne said he believed in Chairman Thomas' system of governing and said he felt he was doing a marvelous job.

Mr. Tessier said he felt that when there was talk on the mandates on social services, it reflects back onto the employees; and he stressed it was not their faults. He said for the \$9 million in taxpayer money spent in Warren County on social services, it creates a return of \$46 million to the county that is spent by the employees and the people that receive the benefits.

Chairman Thomas called for a vote on the resolution approving the tentative budget and calling for a public hearing.

Resolution No. 665 was approved.

RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors be, and he hereby is, authorized and directed to cause to be printed or mimeographed at least 100 copies of said tentative budget for distribution to the public and that he give public notice of such hearings as required by law.

Mr. Belden suggested this resolution also go to the federal government, too, since a lot of these mandates are handed from the Federal Government to the State Government to the Counties.

Chairman called for reading of resolutions.

Clerk indicated a motion was necessary to bring Resolution Nos. 663 and 664 to the

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floor. Motion was made by Mr. Montesi, seconded by Mr. Belden and carried unanimously to bring the resolutions to the floor.

Chairman Thomas called for a vote on the resolutions.

Resolution Nos. 663 and 664 were approved. Mortgage Tax Report and Report of Committee on Assessment Rolls, were submitted.

RESOLVED, that after relevy on the town and county tax rolls, all such relevied amounts shall become a part of the total tax to be collected.

Adopted by unanimous vote.

Mr. Bennett spoke concerning Resolution No. 663, authorizing charges to the Town of Lake Luzerne, and reminded the supervisors that was a need to repay a loan to the county because of an error in the rate that was charged in the district last year. He said there was a need for the county to recoup the funds. Chairman Thomas thanked Mr. Bennett for his willingness to work with the county and make this happen.

Mr. Brower talked about the occupancy tax. He said he felt the occupancy tax was an opportunity for the county to enhance its tourism. He said that tourism has been touted as the number one industry in Warren County, and an occupancy tax would enable the county to receive revenues from their visitors and not the residents. He said it would be dedicated to

tourism promotion and it would enable the county to recoup the \$1 million it spends from the General Fund for tourism promotion, while at the same time, doubling the amount of promotion that is done by the county to attract more visitors who will spend more money in the community and pay more sales tax. Hopefully, he said this would avert discussion in the future over increasing sales tax.

Mr. Brower said he felt this was a very important matter for this board to consider seriously. He said the board members have discussed this for a number of years, and the Pinnacle Study was done and confirmed that an occupancy tax would be of benefit to the communities and the county. He said he knew the Rules of the Board required a two-thirds vote for a resolution to come to the floor; however, he asked the County Attorney whether that was two-thirds of the members present or of the full board. Mr. Dusek replied it was two-thirds of the entire board, or 667 votes. He said it was a matter of standard law practice and everything the board does requires full membership to be considered.

Chairman Thomas pointed out that at the time this was discussed previously, it was his feeling that this should go back to the Finance & Personnel Committee for a referral back to the board. He said the Finance & Personnel Committee did not vote favorably on this; and therefore, he said, any recommendation from another committee would not be honored by him at the full board.

Mr. Brower continued, referring to Chairman Thomas' remarks that he did not try to control the board; and he acknowledged that Chairman Thomas was a very open chairman and very fair. However, he asked that Chairman Thomas consider in the future a change of committee membership that would more closely reflect on the most important committees, the population representation of the county, particularly on Finance & Personnel and Budget Committees. He said he felt the key committees that the county has should be represented and more closely reflect the weighted vote of the board. He said he felt it was very crucial, and that was not the way the committees were set up now. He said he felt there needed to be a change in order that representative government works effectively in the county, and he said this could only occur through Chairman Thomas' actions and noted he was putting the responsibility on him for the coming year to make this a fairer board.

Chairman Thomas pointed out he had not been chosen at this point as Chairman for next year, and Mr. Brower said he would direct his comments to whomever the chairman will be

Mr. Bennett said he found Mr. Brower's proposal interesting because there are 11 towns that make up Warren County, and he said it sounded to him that the proposal was that the rest of the supervisors should go home and Queensbury run the county. He said he hoped that was not what Mr. Brower meant, but he added he found it not satisfactory. He encouraged Chairman Thomas to give all parts of the county equal representation and not skew it toward any one town.

Mr. Brower replied that the composition of the Finance & Personnel Committee was currently with nine members, and he suggested the fair representation on it would be three members from Queensbury, two from Glens Falls and the balance filled by other towns in the county. He said he felt that this type of representation would be fair and reflective of the population as a whole. Chairman Thomas responded that decisions have historically not been made based on what town a supervisor was from. He noted that the decisions have been made based on the experience of the supervisor that is serving whatever part of the county. He said if a supervisor has been on the board a long time, they usually have more knowledge and they become someone who gets on the Finance & Personnel Committee, for example. He suggested that further discussion could be had later on.

Mr. Bentley said that he had 23 weighted votes on the board and the City of Glens Falls has 228. Yet, he continued, there were more tourism beds in his town than the City of Glens Falls. Mr. Kenny responded that he had more taxpayers in the City of Glens Falls than in the Town of Horizon.

Mr. Champagne said he received a number of telephone calls on the occupancy tax and also talked to people while he was out in the community. He said he agreed to have Donald Hess come to the board meeting as a representative of the public, and he noted he was a non-hotel non-motel owner. He said Mr. Hess was someone who has had a serious interest, and he asked that he be allowed to speak.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Mr. Hess, who said in discussing the occupancy tax with Mr. Champagne, it seemed to him and a lot of citizens, that the bed tax seemed to make the most sense, and it was something that should have been done sooner in the decision process, rather than what they were seeing in the newspaper going on and on. He said there were more citizens who pay taxes as residents all over Warren County, and he asked how they should communicate with the supervisors on this, not the four or five supervisors that are negative to the proposal. He said it seemed strange to the citizens he was referring to that based on the newspaper's list of townships that were negative, the bigger population of the county has not been communicated. He asked whether these people should write the supervisors or did they need to buy advertising. He said they need to get something to the supervisors to say that the bed tax should be done and should have been done a long time ago.

Mr. Mallison addressed the vote on the tentative budget, and noted he voted to bring the budget to a full discussion at a public hearing so that the people of this county may speak on it. He said he agreed with Supervisor Kenny and if there was not an occupancy tax coming up for a vote before the budget is put before him for a vote, he could not in good conscience vote for the budget. He said he could not ask the people he represents to pay a 7.5 percent increase without asking the people who come into the county to also pay.

Mr. Mallison also disagreed with Mr. Bentley's comments, and said he did not represent simply one interest in his community. He said Mr. Bentley mentioned he had beds and hotels in his district, and he noted he had many heavy industries in his district. He said he would not ask for those people not to pay taxes because he represents them as taxpayers, since the tax money from those heavy industries is needed. He said he was not asking to burden those heavy industries to the point where they have to lay people off, but he was asking them to pay their fair share. He said he was asking the same thing of the people who run the hotels and motels in the county. He said he had not heard an argument why this was not needed. He said he felt it made zero sense to him that the county did not have an occupancy tax at this point. He asked that the full board make a vote at sometime in the near future because he said he could not vote favorably toward the budget if it is not done.

Chairman Thomas said he felt this was good conversation between the supervisors, and felt it was the best form of government they could have since the supervisors are able to discuss the needs of their respective communities. In the end, he said he felt the supervisors come up with good decisions. He said he believed that progress did not come easily and it was always contentious with a lot of discussion. He said he felt there had to be a lot more active board today because they are looking at all options that come forward.

Mr. Champagne said he had to defend the folks in Queensbury, and noted that they do not have a large number of beds in their town, but between Glens Falls and Queensbury well over 50 percent of the dollars that go out the door in tourism promotion comes from those two municipalities. He asked if those that have the motels were willing to share in that \$1.2 Million to promote tourism, and added he was concerned when his town picks up the tab and then these people are not willing to accept an occupancy tax to at least offset some of the cost. Chairman Thomas said he supported the occupancy tax for different reasons. He noted in Johnsburg they had rafting, skiing, and the train, and they were trying to increase their sales tax to the county and share with the county. In order to do that, he said the town needs a lot more promotion, and they did not need a three-month season, they needed a 12-month season.

Mr. Bentley remarked that there were 1900+ beds between Queensbury and Glens Falls and 37,000+ in the rest of the county. He said that Queensbury and Glens Falls have

the majority of the weighted vote and were taxing the minority. Mr. Caimano interjected that this vacillates back and forth and happens on almost any issue.

Mr. Gabriels said in one of his conversations, one of the more creative revenue enhancement ideas would be to consider the county imposing a 1 cent per gallon tax on every gallon of gasoline and diesel sold in the county. Chairman Thomas acknowledged the supervisors have discussed several ways to raise revenues. He mentioned the supervisors had suggested the state raising their sales tax one percent and giving half of it back to the counties. He said that was a way for the state to help take care of some of the unfunded mandates they have imposed. Then, he said, everyone would be the same.

Mr. Montesi said he has listened to the justifications presented against the occupancy tax, and he wondered if there were concerns over who was looking over whose shoulder. He said in his mind, every motel has to file a sales tax report and that report shows the amount of sales. As a county, he said all he was looking for was that the motels claim whatever they were claiming to the State of New York in sales tax claims. He said he did not wish for the county to be looking over shoulders or auditing these books. He said if the State of New York was happy with what they were receiving from the motel owners in sales tax reporting, he would be glad to accept that for the county for the occupancy tax. Mr. Tessier pointed out that sales tax was not collected by housekeeping cottages, which is a good bulk of the business in Warren County. Therefore, he said, there was no record of sales tax payments.

Mr. Tessier said he questioned why people felt the \$1 million being spent on tourism promotion was out of line with the sales tax that is coming in. He said if that was the big issue then it should be addressed, and it did not take a 4 percent occupancy tax to address it. He suggested that a 1 percent tax would bring in \$1 million. Chairman Thomas suggested thinking carefully about raising sales tax when it has provided that much more revenue to the county this year.

Mr. Kenny said that the occupancy tax does much more than relieve the taxpayers of that \$1 million burden. He predicted it would increase tourism in the county by approximately 20 percent, and it would increase sales tax revenue and property values. He said it would increase needs for goods and services for those people involved in tourism-related businesses, and added it was an economic development tool that has worked everywhere in the country.

Mr. Brower recalled that it was not that many years ago that he asked at a board meeting, "What would happen if the county did not spend anything on tourism. Wouldn't they still come?" He said he remembered seeing the Pinnacle Study and he remembered the discussions over the last several years that have convinced him that the occupancy tax was the right thing to do for Warren County. He said he believed this was the fairest tax as it benefits the people it is imposed upon ultimately. He also said he felt the people that are happy to be open six or eight weeks will eventually be bought out by people that desire having year-around facilities and those who are interested in events that the county can create that will draw people here, like the Balloon Festival, the Car Show and Americade. He said he felt this trend will happen in the future and it will bring Warren County to a new level of success in being a tourism region.

Mr. O'Neill and Mr. Belden left the meeting at 11:30 a.m.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Robert Orlando, who said after sitting through some of the meetings of the board, he was never more disappointed than last week after the Finance & Personnel Committee meeting. He said he felt some real discourse amongst the government leaders in the county. He said that he felt the supervisors all have their own things to be concerned about, but he said he wanted to deliver the message that the supervisors have to stick together as a county and they cannot be divided and they cannot be singling out and throwing stones if they want to get somewhere. He said he was not happy as a taxpayer to see his taxes go up this year, nor the taxes of the business he represents

(Aviation Mall), based upon the budget. He suggested maybe the supervisors can do something in the future, and he suggested maybe the supervisors could be creative in their revenue enhancement. As supervisors, he encouraged them on one hand to represent the people they need to represent, and on the other hand, do what is best for the entire county.

There being no further business, on motion by Mr. Caimano, and seconded by Mr. Gabriels, the meeting adjourned at 11:32 a.m.

WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 20, 2002

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren convened at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center, Lake George, New York, at 10:00 a.m.

Mr. William Thomas presiding.

Salute to the flag was led by Supervisor Bennett.

Roll called, the following members present:

Supervisors Gabriels, Monroe, Mallison, Sheehan, Mason, O'Connor, Kenny, Belden, Thomas, Tessier, Bennett, Brower, Caimano, Morrell, Champagne, Montesi, O'Neill, Haskell and Quintal - 19.

Absent: Supervisor Bentley - 1.

Motion was made by Mr. Mallison, seconded by Mr. Belden and carried unanimously to approve the minutes of the October 16, 2002, board meeting, and November 8, 2002, adjourned board meeting, subject to correction by the clerk.

Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing on the 2003 Tentative Budget open at 10:04 a.m., and requested the Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

Deputy Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

Chairman Thomas introduced Supervisor Caimano, Budget Officer, and turned the meeting over to him for the 2003 budget review.

Prior to Mr. Caimano presenting his Budget Message, he commented on some comparison figures on the 1993 County Budget versus the 2003 County Budget. The information he provided is in writing and on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors with Budget Committee records.

As Mr. Caimano reviewed the aforementioned figures, he noted the ratio of revenues to appropriations in 1993 was 77.93 percent, and the ratio of revenues to appropriations in 2003 was 67.94 percent. He pointed out there had been a 10 percent decrease in the ratio of revenues to appropriations, and commented that this substantiated the fact that the county was spending a lot more money on a lot more things and getting a lot less money to help do that.

Mr. Caimano noted the growth in appropriations in 10 years was 58.58 percent, while the growth in estimated revenues in 10 years was 38.25 percent. He said that the amount to be raised by tax ten years ago was (approximate figures used) \$12,450,000, and this year, it will be \$24,146,000. He noted the ratio of the amount to be raised by tax to the appropriations has increased 5.18 percent in ten years. He suggested reasons for this trend were inflation, reduction in state aid, increase in state and federal mandated programs, and programs being implemented under grants, and when the grants go away, the programs are absorbed.

Mr. Caimano presented the following Budget Message:

"BUDGET MESSAGE NOVEMBER 20, 2002

"Only fools who write editorials in windowless rooms would say that this budget did not take some effort to get where we are. Clearly, the efforts of Joan, Harold, and Anne, as well as the department heads working closely with the supervisors and committee chairmen have not been in vain.

"These same fools never cease to amaze me with their short-sightedness, too. If they were to ask questions of our ill or our needy or our elderly, or if they were to question whether or not our citizens feel safe, or if they like the fact that we have a superior educational facility, or if they were to ask these questions of many more, they would see what it is that the county tax pays for. But, some folks just do not want to see.

"Having said all of that does not take you and me as supervisors off the hook. I said it last year, and I'll reinforce it this year. The budget, and therefore the taxes, are kept in check not in October - but every month of the year, at every committee meeting by every supervisor and committee chairman committing themselves to doing so. Just because something is put into the budget in October does not mean it has to be spent. If that was so, then the reverse would be also. That is, anything not in the budget as of today, could not be paid for. Obviously, that is not the real world.

"Things happen. Roads collapse, bridges fail, people leave, snow is greater than expected, and on and on and on. But, you don't pay for these things all the time by adding to an already swollen budget. You pay for them, in my opinion, by not spending money on less important items. Wants and needs. We talk about that all the time. For example, last year, I made issues regarding travel, not because I did not think it was important and we couldn't learn, but because it was not as important as other items. I ask you to think fiscally conservative, and I renew my call.

"While I am at it, and since it impacts the budget, I will say a word about the occupancy tax. We are accused of not listening, when in fact we have listened for over 4 years. More importantly, in all of this time, not one single piece of evidence has been put forth to show the damage that such a tax can cause. None has been put forward, because none exists. We are told that we are dividing the County. The very essence of a democratic republic is the debate of ideas distilled into a decision. We are told that a 4 percent tax is an insult to customers, but a 3 percent occupancy tax and a 1 percent sales tax is not. Moreover, such a set up would increase expenses of motel owners, since their supplies would now carry an increase in tax.

"Finally, there is this. If we had moved on this tax 2 years ago, we probably would by now have put about \$1 million back into the General Fund. That million would have taken this budget from a 10.7 percent increase to about a 5 percent increase.

"It is past time for us to run this County more efficiently. Just with the Jail alone, we face extra expenses. Medicaid will bite us, and something unforeseen will hit us. We can't escape that, but we can escape the old practice of simply adding to our expenses. We can do the more difficult, more judicious work of adding expenses by trading off those that are less necessary. And that is my challenge to all of us.

"Respectfully submitted, Nicholas Caimano Warren County Board of Supervisors"

Chairman Thomas extended privilege of the floor to any member of the public wishing to speak concerning the 2003 Warren County Budget.

Privilege of the floor was extended to George Weinschenk, of Diamond Point, who said he would very much like to address what's been going on with the budget. He referred to the process as an "annual show" and said by the time the public gets to speak, as usual the budget is cast in stone and no matter what is said, it does not amount to anything.

Mr. Weinschenk said he felt the creative Budget Committee has taken the budget process to a new low. He accused the supervisors of playing shenanigans and not facing the issues. For example, he said, the supervisors took \$625,000 in solid waste costs out of the budget and said they just were not going to deal with it. He said the supervisors know they are going to deal with it, and if they do not, they will be in default on the bonds. He asked why the supervisors don't just say "Here it is, we have to pay it." He suggested there was no such thing as deferring things. He referred to the supervisors increasing the estimated revenues for sales tax by an additional \$2 million for next year. He said he felt the economy appeared to be slowing down, and the County may not get as much as this year, or they may get more - nobody knows.

Mr. Weinschenk referred to a statement made at an earlier meeting by a member of the board - "Well, you roll the dice and see where they come." He said he felt that was a heck of a way to do a budget. He suggested if this is the way the County was doing its financing, the only difference between Warren County and Enron was that someone left in handcuffs at Enron, and he added he felt that was a sad state.

Mr. Weinschenk criticized the County for giving \$100,000 to New York City because of 9-11. He said that the thought may have been great, but he posed the question of whether it was practical. He replied no, and said the reason he felt that way was because the County does not have the money to spend. He also mentioned that the County has given approximately 2 percent of its sales tax to Glens Falls, and estimated this amounts to about \$10 million during the life of this deal. He referred to the sewer deal between Queensbury and Glens Falls, and said that the rest of the taxpayers have to make up for this. He suggested the County cannot keep giving money away that they do not have. He suggested if Queensbury and Glens Falls want to work out a deal for the sewer plant, let them pay for it and do it.

Mr. Weinschenk said in the last 20 years, he has been given the same speech, and this year, some of it appeared in the newspaper, stated by the Chairman of the Budget Committee. He said the comment was, "What part of no don't you understand?" He indicated he had been saying this for years on this budget. He said this was the first time he recalled it being brought out that the supervisors have to take a look at the things not mandated to operate the county and that are not mandated by state and federal government. He posed the question whether any of these things have been eliminated, and answered no. He suggested there had to be changes in the way Warren County does its financing.

Mr. Weinschenk suggested there be new leadership in the Budget Committee. He recalled that the Budget Officer had said in the newspaper that the County did not want to pay for the benefits for retired employees, and suggested that was a real morale buster for the present employees. He said he felt these kinds of things cannot be done, and that was a fact of life. He indicated he felt those types of statements were embarrassing to the County and the taxpayers. He mentioned another newspaper article comparing Washington County salaries to Warren County salaries, wherein it was noted that Washington County management was paid a lot less. He said one of the excuses was that this was because of longevity, and he said he did not believe everyone in Warren County has been here longer than Washington County employees. He acknowledged there were some deserving people in Warren County that were probably underpaid, and there are probably some that were overpaid, but not everybody should be ahead of the other county, he contended.

Mr. Weinschenk discussed the budget cuts made in DPW, and said he felt this was not a wise decision. He indicated he felt the county had bridges and roads falling apart, Now, he said, instead of them becoming simple jobs, they become complicated and more costly. He said he felt the state of the bridges and roads were a disaster, and he contended the longer the County lets it go, the more they will pay in the long run.

Mr. Weinschenk then discussed the occupancy tax, and said he felt that becomes minute when the supervisors looks at where the County is right now. He posed the question if the County puts in a 1 percent increase in sales tax, and uses one-half to reduce property tax and one-half to go back to the County, would they solve their problems. He answered no, and pointed out the supervisors raised the revenues equivalent to one-half percent increase in sales tax this year and the problem wasn't solved.

Mr. Weinschenk suggested there be some rethinking on where this Budget Committee is going and what it is doing. Maybe it was time to appoint new leadership, he said. He said this was an on-going process and it has been a deteriorating budget situation in Warren County for many years, and he added he did not see it hitting the bottom yet. He suggested the County cannot keep going on this way, and urged the supervisors to make some changes. He concluded that the supervisors cannot just keep processing budgets every year and then put the money back in next January. He asked for an honest budget, and suggested the supervisors take a hard look at the things that they do not have to pay for. He acknowledged

that the programs were probably good programs and people may be hurt if they are discontinued, but he said it was coming to a point now where everybody in the County was being hurt. He suggested better management of the revenue sources.

Mr. Weinschenk said he was one of the supporters of increasing sales tax 1 percent, but now after looking at the budget for 2003, he was changing his mind and would fight a sales tax increase also.

There being no one further from the public wishing to speak on the budget, Chairman Thomas extended privilege of the floor to any supervisor wishing to speak.

Mr. Haskell thanked Mr. Caimano for the time he spent on the budget. He acknowledged it was a tough job and he thanked the department heads for their efforts and the severe cuts they made.

Mr. Monroe responded to Mr. Weinschenk's remarks concerning the \$625,000 removed from the solid waste budget. He assured him that was not done as some sort of budget device, and there was a good reason for the reduction. He explained they expected to have a deal with Wheelabrator within the next couple of months and then be refinanced in July or August.

Mr. Mallison also responded to Mr. Weinschenk's remarks and said he wanted to thank the Board of Supervisors for their intercession with the City of Glens Falls and the Town of Queensbury with regard to the sales tax agreement and with regard to the 2 percent sales tax that will now be going to the City. He said that money was needed to fill a hole in the City budget, and it was also a deal-maker. Without that money, he predicted the deal may not have taken place.

Mr. Mallison referred to Mr. Weinschenk's remarks regarding the DPW, and said he felt Mr. Caimano dealt with that. He recalled Mr. Caimano's remarks that there were things the County needed to deal with now, because they were going to cost more to deal with in the future. He remarked that he felt it was the State that was causing the County problems in dealing with these issues. He noted the State has cut the CHIPs funding and has forced other unfunded mandates upon the County time and again. He said it was very clear that the supervisors needed to send a message to Albany that there should be no more of this. Chairman Thomas concurred with the remarks, and pointed out the County was actually the bottom line and the supervisors were the ones that have to face the public when a budget needs to be adopted.

Mr. Caimano interjected that Mr. Dusek had just left the meeting to retrieve a resolution which set forth the concerns voiced by Mr. Mallison. He recalled discussion at the November 8th Adjourned Board Meeting wherein he recommended putting forth such a resolution of opposition to go to the State.

Mr. Belden acknowledged that there had been some heavy cuts in the DPW budget, and he offered his compliments to Mr. Remington and Mr. Lamy for the way they worked with the DPW and Budget Committees. He said he felt they could get through next year without losing services.

Mr. Belden remarked on the time that Mr. Caimano spent on this budget and complimented his efforts. He acknowledged that it has not been an easy year.

Mr. Brower stated he realized that the County was not bonding for the Public Safety Building (PSB) in 2003, and it has been postponed until 2004. However, he said he wished to make a plea to the County Treasurer and the board members that when they do get to the point of bonding the PSB that it be bonded for 30 years, not 22 as previously planned. He said this would enable greater cash flow for the County over the next 30 years, and added he felt it was appropriate public policy to bond for the useful length of an improvement. He said that certainly the PSB would have a 30-year life, if not longer, and the taxpayers would benefit.

Secondly, Mr. Brower commended the supervisors for the unending support provided to the Town of Queensbury and the City of Glens Falls, keeping in mind the need for balanced growth within the county, and keeping in mind the need for light industrial manufacturing to balance the tourism and retail growth that the County is already successful in attaining. He continued, noting that thanks to the supervisors' great efforts, they have been able to achieve a sewer agreement, and they are under construction on the South Queensbury/ Queensbury Avenue sewer line, which will bring sewer to the new Queensbury Industrial Park on County Line Road. He said it would also allow them to sewer the Airport and the Warren-Washington Counties Industrial Park, which was essential for future industrial growth in the town. He said it has also allowed them to expand sewer service on Route 9, and they are moving rapidly to form a district which will extend sewer from The Sleep Inn at the top of Miller Hill to Route 149. He said they also intended to sewer Corinth Road past Interstate 87, toward the industrial parks, and Bay Road was also planned to be sewered. Mr. Brower said he felt this was important for balanced growth for the County and for the future to enable full-time year-around good-paying jobs with benefits for residents of the community.

Mr. Bennett said he hoped that the projects under Public Works would be restored. He said he felt the department has suffered tremendously over the past several years. He said he felt next year's outlook was not better, but he suggested these projects could not continually be put off.

Mr. Bennett said another area of particular concern to him was the removal of funds for snowmobile control (in the Sheriff's budget). He recalled information he received at the recent Association of Towns and Villages Conference over the problems of obtaining snowmobile insurance for municipalities. He said he felt that one of the things that will certainly add to that problem was if there was not proper coverage and protection to protect those who utilize the system. He said he felt this was a health, safety and welfare issue and he said he hoped the funds would be restored to the Sheriff's budget.

Chairman Thomas asked if Mr. Bennett had an amount he recommended, since today would be the day that the Tentative Budget would be amended (before adoption as the Final Budget). Mr. Bennett replied he would recommend the same amount as was in the budget for 2002. Sheriff Cleveland responded that the amount for snowmobile enforcement was \$7,000

Motion was made by Mr. Bennett, seconded by Mr. Haskell to amend the Tentative Budget, restoring \$7,000 to the Sheriff's budget for snowmobile enforcement.

Mr. Haskell asked if there wasn't already \$4,000 in the budget for snowmobile enforcement. Sheriff Cleveland replied that was a line item for personnel. He said it was supposed to have been combined with overtime, but it was not. He said that was a figure for part-time, which has not been used in several years, as the patrolling has been done with full-time staff.

Mr. Haskell asked if the lease was up on the snowmobiles. Sheriff Cleveland replied he believed they would run out in April 2003, and that was when they would be returned. Mr. Mallison asked how much was being paid for the leases, and Sheriff Cleveland replied, roughly \$7,000. He said that was the buy-out on the snowmobiles and that was why he used that figure. He said the coverage was being done by full-time employees, so there was no expense there.

Chairman Thomas noted that any changes in the budget will now affect the bottom line, and all the figures distributed would have to be re-done. Discussion ensued, and Mr. Montesi clarified that the \$7,000 Mr. Bennett was looking for to go back into the budget was for the snowmobiles, not the patrolling of the trails. Sheriff Cleveland replied there were personal services and then there was the operation and purchase and/or lease of, snowmobiles. Mr. Montesi asked if the \$7,000 was for a buy-out of the snowmobiles, and Sheriff Cleveland replied yes. Mr. Montesi remarked if the \$7,000 was given to the Sheriff, the supervisors were perpetuating that they will have to continue patrolling snowmobile trails since the County would then have an investment. He asked about the payroll for enforcement, and Sheriff Cleveland replied that the payroll was no longer part-time, and they use full-time employees in the off-season.

Sheriff Cleveland said that normally, they would re-lease the snowmobiles in April, but because for the last two or three years there has been very little snow, the snowmobiles have very low miles and they found it would be more cost-effective to buy them. He said under the current scenario, the County would not have coverage for the winter season of 2003 and 2004 without the \$7,000.

Chairman Thomas suggested maybe the supervisors did not need to address that right now, and if they need the money later, maybe it could come out of the Contingent Fund or a capital project. He offered this as an idea, rather than changing the entire budget.

Chairman Thomas called the question to consider the amendment to the 2003 Tentative Budget, and the motion failed, with all supervisors voting no, except Mr. Bennett who voted yes.

Mr. Kenny added his compliments to all those who were involved in the budget process. He said he felt they did a great job and he said he appreciated it, although he would not be voting in favor of passing the budget. He referred to Mr. Caimano's remarks on the budget and drew attention to the statement that 10 years ago, the county taxes were \$12 million, and now they are \$25 million. He said he did not feel the County could continue on this way. He said he felt it should be a challenge to every committee to do a hands-on assessment of each department in Warren County, and to look at the needs of the personnel and review any equipment purchases and needs. He also suggested the supervisors assess the properties they own and the things that they do to see if they can continue supporting these optional services offered to the residents of the County.

Chairman Thomas read the proposed resolution (mentioned previously by Mr. Caimano) which was before the supervisors to oppose New York State mandated programs. He read same and the entire board unanimously agreed to sponsor the same. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 717 for the record.

Mr. Mallison commented that many of the mandates that come down pay for projects and programs that are worthy. He said he believed all children should have insurance and the Child Health Plus Program was a very worthy program. He said, however, he felt the simple message that needs to be sent is if the Governor and the State Legislature wish to provide people with these services, they need to pay for them. If, in fact, he said, the State wants the counties to pay for these programs through property taxes, they need to send a clear message that says that the Governor was telling the property tax payers that they have to pay for this program. He said he would like a message sent that it was not the fault of the counties that these taxes are rising.

Mr. Caimano reiterated his earlier comments over the fact that when the County receives a grant for a particular job, the supervisors say when the grant is over, that will be the end of the job. However, he noted, that does not happen. He said he felt the County could not just blame the State. Mr. Mallison said he was committed to the County making things more efficient, as well.

Mr. Monroe acknowledged that this has been an extremely difficult budget year, and he stated his appreciation to Mr. Caimano and the Budget Committee for the work that has been done. He said he felt it was very obvious that during this coming year, the County has to either dramatically decrease programs, or they have to find some new revenue sources. He said he felt it did not work to continue to increase property taxes. He referred to a recent survey done by NYSAC (New York State Association of Counties) asking across the state what was the least fair tax, and the vast majority replied, real property tax. A copy of the information discussed by Mr. Monroe is in writing and on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors with Budget Committee records.

Discussion continued and other supervisors voiced similar opinions on the budget restraints being placed upon the County due to State mandates.

Mr. Champagne suggested the formation of a retrenchment committee, and added he felt the supervisors needed to look at how best they can identify and specify those areas in Warren County that are mandated and required. He said he felt there were other supervisors that felt the same as he did, and suggested they look hard at cutting back and saving the taxpayers dollars. Mr. Caimano said he felt the supervisors had a vehicle and it was not used. He said he felt each committee can determine what is mandated and what is not, and what should and should not be spent. Mr. Champagne countered he felt it did not work.

Chairman Thomas suggested at the next board meeting this issue could be addressed. He agreed that the supervisors should go throughout the year talking about these things and maybe taking care of some of the problems by the time they get to the budget process.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Keith Bowden, of Queensbury, who noted he and his wife moved to the area a few years ago. He said they were not quite sure of the budget process, and noted his background was engineering and management. He noted he was used to seeing an executive summary and said he had hoped to see one in this budget document. He asked where he could obtain one. Mr. Robillard referred Mr. Bowden to page 102 of the budget for the summary.

There being no one further wishing to speak on the 2003 Tentative Budget, Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing closed at 10:45 a.m.

Continuing with the agenda, Chairman Thomas acknowledged a request by Thomas Wessling to address the board members regarding the occupancy tax.

Mr. Wessling, of Blue Lagoon Resort, Lake George, acknowledged the occupancy tax issue has been before the supervisors for a period of time. At last month's county meeting, he recalled that it was agreed that the occupancy tax would first be sent to the Revenue Enhancement Committee, and then to the Finance & Personnel Committee. He said this was never brought up to Revenue Enhancement Committee, apparently due to a lack of support. He noted the Finance & Personnel Committee voted against sending the occupancy tax to the Board of Supervisors. Subsequently, he continued, Mr. Brower tried to send this to the floor through the Regional Economic Development Committee, but fortunately, Chairman Thomas squashed the attempt. Now, he said, there was an attempt to bring this to the floor without it coming from any committee. He said the process everyone agreed to last month has been manipulated and not followed.

Mr. Wessling said he felt the occupancy tax issue was creating great division in Warren County. Accommodations feel that businesses in Glens Falls and Queensbury are supporting an occupancy tax to avoid a tax that may affect their business, he noted. He also remarked that this debate was being allowed to continue because many supervisors want the pressure off them to make sound financial decisions in difficult financial times. He suggested that non-accommodation businesses are forgetting that accommodations are large players in the economy and are critical supporters of other businesses, both directly and indirectly. He said that accommodations are feeling they are being singled out and being taxed to alleviate Warren County budget concerns. He said that talk is growing regarding boycotts and stopping referrals to other businesses in the county, and he suggested none of this would be good for the county. He reiterated comments made by Chairman Thomas to The Chronicle, noting he said he supported the occupancy tax because Johnsburg tourism venues need more promotion. He said he felt Mr. Thomas, however, fails to listen to the accommodations that refer people to, and hand out brochures for, the Johnsburg venues. Alienating Johnsburg and Warren County accommodations could hurt these venues more than increased promotion could help them, he suggested.

Mr. Wessling discussed the fact that the Lake George Convention and Visitors Bureau (LGCVB) has been actively involved in promoting an occupancy tax. He said the LGCVB stands to benefit from the creation of an occupancy tax because they see it on their web site. He said the accommodations fear the lack of accountability and the cost of bureaucracy that will exist with the contracting for large amounts of tourism promotion with the LGCVB.

Mr. Wessling said that Essex County created a bed tax and funneled the money to the Lake Placid Visitors' Bureau. After contacting many accommodations in Essex County, he said he found that a majority of complaints are about the handling of funds. He said that many were afraid to speak because of the "power of the purse" the Visitors' Bureau holds. He noted this deterred many from speaking at county meetings before the County's sunset clause expired. He said that some accommodations in Essex County responded in writing and he read quotes from the various letters, including: (1) "The problem is how and by whom the money is collected and distributed." (2) "We're not told how much money is raised, where it is spent, nothing." (3) "I am very concerned about the management of funds." and (4) "The resultant bureaucracy reduces the dollars available for promotion of tourism."

In conclusion, Mr. Wessling said the accommodations in Warren County would like the supervisors to do the right thing and not bring this to the floor. He suggested that the "top down" method that has been engaged in trying to pass this issue and the manipulation of the system, have received the greatest criticism at the State level. He said the hope was not to fracture tourism and other businesses in Warren County, as the fallout would far exceed any suggested benefits supervisors hope to create in the County.

Chairman Thomas referred to Mr. Wessling's earlier remarks on the referral of the occupancy tax to supervisor committees. He explained he referred this item to the Finance & Personnel Committee from the full board meeting. He assured that nothing had been circumvented in this process.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Chuck LaPlante, of Stepping Stone Resort, Diamond Point, who started his comments by saying he felt Warren County was unique. He asked when the supervisors were deciding whether a sales tax increase or an occupancy tax benefits Warren County best, that they consider the following: According to County statistics, 10 million people come to Warren County every year. Of those, he continued, 4 million stay overnight, 1 million camp, and 5 million visit and go back home the same day. He contended that an occupancy tax charges only 4 million people and does not tax 6 million people. He wondered if the supervisors truly want the tourists to help fund the operation of the county, why wouldn't they tax as many as possible. He contended that an occupancy tax does not solve the County's financial crisis this year, or any year. He said he felt the County had only two avenues to balance the budget. He said they could increase property taxes or increase the sales tax. He suggested no one in their right mind would drive outside of the county to save 1 dollar for every hundred dollars that a 1 percent sales tax increase would impose on them.

Mr. LaPlante suggested that sales tax was the only way to reduce property taxes. He noted that 95 percent of the accommodation industry opposes the occupancy tax because it will have a negative impact on their accommodations and it will ultimately have a direct impact on existing sales tax receipts. He said he felt the taxpayers will make up the difference, and asked the supervisors if they want to take that chance.

Mr. LaPlante said that some opponents of the sales tax say that a 1 percent increase will have a negative impact on their business, but then they say a 4 percent tax on accommodations will increase their business. He disagreed with the philosophy.

Mr. LaPlante said that many of the County supervisors favor the occupancy tax, and they have done a better job at educating the public on the occupancy tax than educating the public about the sales tax impact. He asked why would the supervisors deny a property tax reduction, and why would the supervisors want to tax only 4 million people out of 10 million. To balance the budget this year or next, he predicted the County will have to increase sales tax eventually. With a 4 percent bed tax, he said that the accommodations will now have to charge 11 percent. If the County increases the sales tax, he continued, it will be 12 percent that they will have to charge, and if the State increases their sales tax, which they might do, it will be 13 percent they will have to charge. He posed the question of when did the tax charged to the tourists become absurd. He asked the supervisors to remember that the taxpayer will make up any loss in sales tax revenue derived from a negative impact on the tourist industry.

Mr. LaPlante said that at the present time, approximately \$1 million is spent promoting the County, and some people want to increase it to \$3 million with an occupancy tax. He asked why not \$5 million or \$10 million, and then posed the idea of why not just pay people to come to the County. He said he felt having the County spend additional money at this time was wasting money, and he suggested there was a point where there was no return for the money spent. He said he felt spending \$150,000 to collect an occupancy tax, when the sales tax mechanism was already in place, was typical of the wasteful spending the County had a reputation for.

In conclusion, Mr. LaPlante asked if the County spent millions of dollars and eventually had tourists come to Warren County all year around, how would the life style change. He asked how many people wanted tourists here 12 months a year, and he said he did not. He said one of the nice things about Warren County was that they could have their County back with peace and quiet when the tourists leave. He said he could not be told that everyone did not look forward to Labor Day Monday. He commended the efforts of the supervisors who voted against the occupancy tax. He said he felt they obviously wanted a property tax reduction, and they obviously want to tax 10 million tourists instead of 4 million because they did the math.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Scott Walton, of Lake George Beach Cottages, Lake George, who said he went back a long way on the occupancy tax issue, and he recalled it had been confrontational at meetings. He said he felt this County's fight was against Cape Code, the Jersey Shore, and other points within a three-hour radius, and once they get people to Warren County, the best product will win. He said the idea of an occupancy tax did not come from any grass root support, and he added he felt if it had, there might be in a different situation. He said he was involved in the Convention Center Committee in Lake George, and the Business Improvement District in Lake George. He estimated it took almost 2 years to convince the majority of property owners to vote in favor of a business improvement tax in Lake George. He contended this was done because they had grass root support.

Mr. Walton said he felt one thing that has come out of all of this controversy was that there was no one organization, like the old tourism board or the LGCVB that will have 10 people or so, that will have the ear of the legislators, that will set the policy for tourism promotion, or that will come up with \$1.2 million in proposed salaries out of an original 4 percent tax. He said when this came up it confirmed everybody's fear that this was just a big nothing. He said he spent about \$10,000 per year on advertising for his several businesses in Lake George, and he said he knew how to spend money to benefit his businesses. He said he was afraid if the county creates an outfit with that much money to throw into advertising, etc., a lot of it will be done with the idea of creating jobs for that organization.

Mr. Walton said he felt tourism was the goose that lays the golden egg. He pointed out that there were 260 motel accommodations telling them that they are not in favor of this occupancy tax. He said he had not heard any negotiations to try to pull everybody together or any effort to work on less of a tax, or any other kind of alternative. He cautioned the supervisors that the County was going to see reactions to this plan, and he noted there were already plans to have a brochure burning. He said he hated to see this happen.

Mr. Walton concluded that he felt the only hope for the county was a 1 percent sales tax, and a return of one-third to one-half to the property owners. He said Mr. Kenny said he wanted to give relief to the tenants, and he said all the tenants are paying for all of these property tax increases. He said if the supervisors really want to do something for the tenants and the lower-earning class person, they need to create a sales tax increase, and he said it was a much better alternative in his opinion to the sales tax. He noted that all the economists are saying that they were looking at double digit recession next year, and he urged the supervisors not to try to take care of this with an occupancy tax.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Robert Orlando, a resident of Warren County, the General Manager of Aviation Mall, and President of the LGCVB, who stated he strongly urged the supervisors to bring a vote on the occupancy tax to the floor. He said that an occupancy tax was an established funding mechanism for tourism industry throughout New York State. He said that everytime he traveled on business part of what he paid was an occupancy tax.

Mr. Orlando mentioned that Saratoga County has had an occupancy tax for 17 years, and they are currently proposing a 2 percent increase. He noted that Essex County has a 3 percent occupancy tax and had decided to extend its legislation for another 3 years. He noted that Essex County's first quarter of sales tax was up 18 percent after enacting the tax. He said he agreed with the comment that Warren County was competing for tourism dollars and that was why he said he felt the county needed to step up its sales effort to attract people here.

Mr. Orlando said he felt Warren County was missing out on income that potential tourists and groups could bring to the area. He said he did not feel the county has done anything substantial to promote the shoulder season, and added he felt those were dollars out there to be had. He suggested Warren County could be a four-season destination as there are things for people to do here all year around. He said he was one of the people who would like to see the tourists here all year around, and added he felt an occupancy tax spent wisely to accomplish this goal was a good idea for Warren County.

Lastly, Mr. Orlando said the additional income that could be generated would benefit all of the businesses and all of the residents of Warren County. He said that right now, the tax dollars fund about \$1 million to the Tourism Department, and he wondered, based on the budget discussion, how soon those dollars will be in jeopardy. He said that an occupancy tax was a self-supporting tax which certainly would look at growing, as opposed to being reduced over a period of time. He asked if it was not about time that they started taxing the visitors to the county and relieving the taxpayers of this burden. He encouraged the supervisors to vote to bring the occupancy tax resolution to the floor.

Privilege of the floor was extended to David King, of Lake George RV Park, Lake George, a board member of the LGCVB, and Treasurer of the Adirondack Theater Festival, and he noted he was standing in the board room 10 years ago when efforts were being made to enhance the County's efforts in tourism sales and promotion. He said that he worked and strived in excellence in all of his businesses, and he said he knew the supervisors that represent their constituencies do the same. However, he said, they are constantly reminded that they are limited with the resources they have to work with. He said he felt there was no better way to generate revenue, in fairness to the visitors that have for generations come to this region to enjoy and recreate here, than the occupancy tax. He said it was the only mechanism he felt the supervisors could put into place now to move ahead with efforts in sales and promotion.

Mr. King said he would promise that his RV Park would never be open in the winter months, as it would be totally ineffective for them to market to a winter tourism market. However, he said, it was unrealistic for anyone in a seasonal tourism business here to not think that a family coming here in the off-season months, to recreate with their snowmobiles or skis would not possibly be introduced to this region and all that it offers for the very first time. He said their first experience here may be in the off-season, but he guaranteed that would bring the people back during the hot season in July and August.

Mr. King acknowledged that all of the businesses that are here from Memorial Day to Labor Day are opposed to this issue, and he pointed out that there are days between Memorial Day and the end of June when Warren County could do much better. He suggested not worrying about having too many tourists in the off-season, and he suggested worrying about bringing a few more tourists in here when we can really use them. He suggested creating better jobs, paying seasonal employees better, and enhancing and improving marketing and sales of this tourism product.

Mr. King said he felt it was almost embarrassing what Warren County does in a unified effort compared to the regions around the county. He said an occupancy tax, while it only taxes the accommodations industry, was still a voice of unity to the visitors that come here. He said he truly believed when a tourist visits an area he wants to come back to, he does not judge the plan on an occupancy tax. He also said a visitor coming here and paying an occupancy tax would know there is a unified effort and a collaboration between the public and private sector to work together to enhance and improve the tourism committee they are visiting. He said he felt an occupancy tax was essential in order for the county to continue as a world-class tourist destination. He strongly suggested that today was the time to make the decision of whether or not an occupancy tax should be used to help enhance tourism sales and promotion in the county. He said he felt it was essential and added he felt there was grass root support for the effort.

Mr. King concluded, suggesting that the tourism business running on their own continue to help themselves and he urged the supervisors to put a tax in place that shows unity within the industry.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Shawn Penrose, of The Georgian, Lake George, who addressed the comments made by Mr. Orlando and Mr. King. He noted he promotes the area as well as anyone, and he commented on his efforts for the information of the supervisors. He pointed out that it's November and if a tourist drives into the Village of Lake George, nothing is open, even places to eat other than Capri Pizza, and Betty's or the Prospect Dinner for breakfast. He stressed that the other areas wanted the people to come there, but he said in all honesty from May to October, the tourists were coming to the area for Lake George, not Glens Falls or Queensbury.

Mr. Penrose said he stood to benefit from the off-season people, but reiterated there was nothing open in Lake George. He suggested when tourists go to a place and do not find options, they go to other places. He asked Mr. Orlando what kind of promotion he did for Warren County. He acknowledged Mr. Orlando's stores advertise, but said he did not know if Mr. Orlando did. Mr. Penrose said he had promotions with the railroad, The Great Escape, and all the mountains. He asked if in addition to his advertising he does already if this would mean he will also have to pay a 4 percent occupancy tax to have other people advertise for him, or should he stop advertising.

Mr. Penrose expressed concern over the supervisors in favor of the occupancy tax not listening, or reacting unfavorably. He said the accommodations were not at the meeting to argue and gripe, they were trying to find a resolution so everyone would be happy. He urged the supervisors to work towards making everybody happy.

Mr. Penrose said that the fact is that most of the occupancy tax money would come from Lake George and even though 1900 beds are in Glens Falls and Queensbury, a majority of the money was coming from Lake George. He asked the supervisors to take into consideration some of the comments made both pro and con, and make decisions accordingly.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Ed Milner, of Chester, who said he was speaking as a member of the grass roots and as a member of the traveling public. He noted that for years before his retirement, he spent well over 100 nights per year on the road, and he remarked that he could not remember a single time when his decision on where to stay was based on the existence or lack of existence of an occupancy tax. He said he stayed where he needed to stay and where he wanted to stay and where it was appropriate for the job he was doing. In retirement, Mr. Milner said he spent about 20 nights this last year out of town, plus a month at a resort in the south. He said he stayed in motels in 7 different states, and in every instance there was an occupancy tax. He said it did not bother him, and he stayed where it was appropriate to the trip he was taking.

Mr. Milner contended that an occupancy will not either bring people or run them away, it was just a fact of travel. He also said if he had a basis for choosing a place to stay, he would not want to stay at a place that was glad to see him go. He said his money was just as good as anyone else's, he behaved himself and left the room clean and neat, and he added he

liked to stay in places where he felt welcome. He said some of the talk this morning sounded like tourists were not welcome in some portions of this county. He also said there was a heck of a lot more to Warren County than just Canada Street and Lake George, and he said he felt it was extremely important to look upon the county as a county and not just one small neighborhood.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Don Milne, of Queensbury, who complimented Mr. Caimano's budget statement and said it was well done and to the point. He said he was also a retiree and did not have a business or a vested interest in either a motel or a retail business. He said he supported the occupancy tax. He asked the supervisors if they believed that one result of an occupancy tax would be reduced dollars for tourism promotion as was alleged by one of the previous speakers. He asked the supervisors if they believed that any of this would reduce property taxes. He asked if the supervisors believed that it may close some budget gaps. He responded to the questions he posed, and said, first, that an occupancy tax will attract more than the current 4 million visitors who stay in motels, and for every dollar spent on promotion the County will get a \$2.50 return in sales tax (according to a tourism study). He said that this means there will be increased revenue to Warren County to make up some of the shortfalls, without increasing the percentage of sales tax. Secondly, he noted that it was recognized that the County would not drive away tourists with an occupancy tax. He said in every area that has instituted an occupancy tax that has been dedicated to the promotion of tourist, it has attracted more tourists.

Mr. Milne said he was a "fortunate" retiree, and he had traveled in 10 different time zones this past fall. He said he always paid an occupancy tax, and none of that turned him away, and he added that all of these areas are highly promoted using occupancy tax money. He concluded that good promotion would bring more people and more money to the County. He said if the County were able to use the occupancy tax for promotion and return \$1 million to the County budget, it will be something that will help bring revenues and expenditures more in line. He said he was certainly in favor of an occupancy tax.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Lara Currie, of Queensbury, who said she was a resident and a local business owner. She said she also supported the occupancy tax. She said that previously she served on the Arlington, Virginia, Convention & Visitors' Bureau and witnessed first-hand the benefits that such a tax can bring to a community. She said she was a professional meeting planner and in that occupation during the past 10 years, she has brought at least 2 meetings to Lake George to the Sagamore and Fort William Henry, and brought a volunteer group of women business owners to the Queensbury Hotel. She said in the past 10 years she has arranged meetings involving thousands of hotel rooms throughout the country, and not once has anyone voiced a concern about paying an occupancy tax.

Mrs. Currie said she and her husband travel extensively on business throughout the United States and Europe, and they have vacationed in Canada, Mexico and the Carribean, and she said she did not recollect one instance where they have not paid an occupancy tax. She said her business supports three full-time employees and some part-time employees, and due to the nature of the business, they spend several thousands of dollars per year in local businesses, such as Staples, Adirondack Engraving, Glens Falls Business Forms and Labels, Adirondack Pen and Pencil and Mannix Marketing. Because they think it is the right hing to do, she said they also purchase their vehicles locally and they are financed through local banks, many times paying a slightly higher fee to do so. She said an increase in sales tax would change this equation for them and for thousands of others in the County.

Mrs. Currie encouraged the supervisors to do the right and sensible thing - either bring the occupancy tax up for a vote for all the people in the county to decide, or vote to approve it at this board meeting. She said that based on some of the conversation at this meeting today, it sounded to her if maybe the issue is not so much about an occupancy tax, which the visitors would pay and not the motel owners, but maybe the management and control of the funds and how they would be disbursed.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Michael Spilman, a resident of Queensbury and representing The Queensbury Hotel, who said they employ 70 full time and part-time employees year around. He said he felt that tourism was indeed visitors that bring their families here when school gets out, and goes home in September. He said all the properties benefit from that and it was an important part of tourism. Also, he pointed out that there are associations, motor coaches, military reunions, Americade and other types of events and businesses that make the tourism picture complete. He said that these are groups that will come in May, June, September, and October, which are times they are opened and could use more business. He said it was time for Warren County to understand that they are grossly outspent in terms of promoting the County. He said his employees who would be in looking for paychecks this week were counting on them doing the right thing for promoting tourism.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Tom Burhoe, of Canoe Island Lodge, Diamond Point, who said he had been talking about the occupancy tax for a long time. He suggested, at this point in the maturation of the discussion regarding the occupancy tax, the most important thing for the supervisors to start to really take to heart was that a majority of the hotel owners have been under-heard. He said he felt there has been a "top-down" approach here which has created such distress, it is dividing the County. He asked that the supervisors understand that the arguments on whether an occupancy tax will support the County tourism or not becomes secondary to the division of the County. He suggested there could be some merit for an occupancy tax, but not the way the leadership was bringing it down. He suggested this approach being used will divide the County and will create huge problems internally with the businesses in the County. He recommended that the occupancy tax idea be taken back to a grass roots level.

Mr. Burhoe apprised he had to put in a new water system at Canoe Island Lodge a few years ago at a cost of over \$50,000. He said it was a mandate from the Department of Health and he did not make any uproar about it. He noted they also put in a sewer system themselves, and pointed out that these systems were climate controlled and he did not have the ability to open for 4 seasons. He said there were some fundamental restraints that he has which the supervisors are not aware of. He noted his insurance just went from \$42,000 to \$91,000 per year and he could not get an insurer. He stressed that was not the County's problem, that was his problem. He said one of the reasons for that problem is that his lodge was a Section 9 risk per the insurance company. He explained that this means he has wood structures and no town water. He pointed out that these are all issues that are not being brought up and addressed in terms of the viability of what hotels can do along that corridor.

Mr. Burhoe suggested what other states and counties were doing becomes secondary to, if Warren County was going to do an occupancy tax, how they would do it, and who would be in control of the money, and how it would be spent. He noted that 260 hotel owners have said they do not want anything to do with this, and he suggested the supervisors ask themselves why that is, and also they should ask themselves if their leadership approaches have worked. He answered no, and said he felt it has driven a wedge in the County. He suggested the supervisors take a step back and re-address the situation. He said he was not in favor of the occupancy tax now in the manner which it was being approached.

Privilege of the floor was extended to George Weinschenk, of Diamond Point, who recalled that when the occupancy tax was originally proposed and Mr. Kenny stated constantly, "Why should the people of the County pay for tourism?" He said he would agree with Mr. Kenny for now, but also questioned, why should the people in the County pay for sewers for Glens Falls and Queensbury. He suggested the County should put in a sewer tax and get that off the budget, too.

Mr. Weinschenk referred to Mr. Orlando's and Mr. King's comments, and pointed out that Mr. Orlando will not collect an occupancy tax, nor will any of his businesses. He noted that Mr. King's business will also not be subject to an occupancy tax. He said he felt the law the County has written is flawed, and he noted there is a provision which says if someone stays with him and spends \$1,000 at his place and the check he writes bounces, the County

has to help him collect it. He said he did not think the County wanted to be in that kind of business. He suggested the supervisors were acting prematurely, and added he felt that Mr. Burhoe from Canoe Island Lodge was right, and the supervisors have basically split the community in half.

Mr. Weinschenk said he felt there was a problem with the administration with the tax, such as how it was going to be collected and how it was going to be spent. He said he was very leery over collecting this money and turning it over to the County, and having the County spend it when they are not really involved in the tourism industry. He suggested this should be looked at and corrected. He acknowledged that Essex County does have an occupancy tax, but when it was implemented, it was supported by the businesses. He asked why most of the businesses in Warren County opposed this, and suggested there was something missing somewhere along the line.

Mr. Weinschenk posed several questions on items that have not been answered, such as collection and distribution, and reiterated he felt this action was premature. He suggested the supervisors were going to have difficulty collecting this tax, and noted he has not heard information on what part of the amount collected will be taxable. He concluded he felt the supervisors were off track on this idea and there were better ways.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Steve Parisi, of Country Road Lodge Bed & Breakfast, in Warrensburg, who reiterated that Mr. LaPlante asked the supervisors to do the math on the sales tax. He indicated that the advertising budget for tourism could be tripled to \$3 million, and there would be \$9 million left to add to the budget. He said he felt Mr. Caimano could do an excellent job on the budget with that amount.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Dottie Moore, of EconoLodge, of Lake George, who suggested it was time there was a round table discussion and find out what this is all about.

Chairman Thomas commented that most of the questions that have been discussed today regarding the mechanics of how the occupancy tax would work would be addressed at a future time as the supervisors go through the process. He said that today's vote was only an authorization to begin the process.

Mr. Montesi said that generally speaking he felt the concept of what this board had planned to do with an occupancy tax should at least be aired. He said according to his understanding, if a 4 percent occupancy tax was implemented, it would raise \$2.5 million, and 25 percent of it was to be given back to the individual communities in the County as a promotional fund. Chairman Thomas apprised if the County was authorized to go forward, this will be part of the next discussion. He reiterated that the County was not to that point yet. Mr. Montesi said he was trying to say that the proposal was to have the occupancy tax totally dedicated to promotion and part of it was going to be shared locally. He assured there were no smoke and mirrors and there was no group of people that were going to take advantage of the program.

Chairman called for reading of communications.

Clerk read communications, including the following:

Queensbury Economic Development corporation, expressing its support for the enactment of an occupancy tax dedicated to the promotion of tourism in Warren County.

Citizens for Queensbury, expressing its support for the enactment of an occupancy tax.

John Hodgkins, Lake George, encouraging the supervisors to take up the issue of the occupancy tax again, and suggesting how the funds should be used, if approved.

Paul Dusek, County Attorney, appointing Julie Garcia as Third Assistant County Attorney, effective October 15, 2002; and in accordance with the provisions of County Law Section 502, designating the order in which the Assistant County Attorneys shall exercise the powers and duties of his office in the event of his vacancy.

Adirondack Community College, Annual Report of its financial condition, for the year ended August 31, 2002.

Communications, resolutions and reports ordered placed on file.

Chairman called for reading of resolutions.

Clerk announced that Resolution Nos. 667 through 693 were mailed to the supervisors, and a motion to bring Resolution Nos. 666 and 694 through 717 to the floor was necessary. Motion was made by Mr. Gabriels, seconded by Mr. Belden and carried unanimously to bring Resolution Nos. 666, and 694 through 717 to the floor.

Mr. Quintal requested a roll call vote on Resolution Nos. 670 and 673. Mr. Mallison requested a roll call vote on Resolution No. 690.

Mr. Mallison referred to Resolution No. 711, which introduced Local Law No. 1 of 2003 and authorized a public hearing on the salaries of county employees serving fixed terms. He asked if there were changes in these salaries, and Mr. Caimano replied no, they were flat.

Mr. Kenny asked the County Attorney to distribute to the board members a proposed resolution asking for Home Rule Legislation from the State Legislature for a Warren County Occupancy Tax.

Mr. Kenny referred to Resolution No. 677, increasing capital project on Municipal Center Expansion, and said he assumed this resolution was taking the money from the tourism building and putting it into the Municipal Center Expansion for the DPW Facility. He asked if this would mean that the entire amount transferred into the account would be spent, or that this was just the amount available. Mr. Robillard responded that this means that the entire amount is available.

Mr. Kenny then referred to Resolution No. 690, establishing fee for Warren County Employees for flu vaccinations. He asked what was the actual cost of the vaccination to Warren County, and added he felt there was a benefit for the County to provide vaccinations to employees. He said certainly they could expect to see better attendance from the employees. Mr. O'Neill replied that the County cost was in excess of \$10 per vaccination. Mr. Kenny suggested the fee be set at the County cost.

Mr. Robillard noted that Mrs. Auer, Director of Public Health, asked if the County employees could be given a break on the charge. He said it was decided by the Health Services Committee that \$15 should be charged. Mr. O'Neill said that Mrs. Auer had apprised that some of the counties were reducing the fees for the vaccinations and absorbing the loss. However, he said, given the County's budget position, the committee chose not to do it. He said if the board wanted to change the resolution, they can give the shot away, but someone was going to pay for them. Mr. Kenny said he was not saying the shots should be given away, however, he said he did not think the County should make a profit. He said he would be voting no on the resolution. Mr. O'Neill pointed out that when the Health Services Department goes around with shots, if people cannot afford them, they are not turned away.

Motion was made by Mr. Kenny, seconded by Mr. Caimano to introduce the resolution entitled, "Home Rule Request by Warren County for the Enactment of Hotel-Motel Legislation in the County of Warren." Clerk noted, if approved, this would be Resolution No. 718 for the record.

Chairman Thomas noted that to bring this resolution to the floor, according to the County Attorney, a two-thirds vote was required.

Mr. Monroe commented that he had discussions with Mr. Caimano and Mr. Kenny wherein he indicated he would be in favor of having the full board vote on the resolution. He said if passage of the motion for introduction of the resolution requires a two-thirds vote, and then the resolution can be passed by a majority vote, he would have to change his vote to no on the introduction, since that is what the businesses in his town want.

Chairman called for vote on the motion, which resulted as follows:

Ayes: 685 Supervisors Mallison, Sheehan, Mason, O'Connor, Kenny, Brower, Caimano, Champagne, Montesi, O'Neill, Haskell, Quintal and Thomas.

Noes: 291 Supervisors Gabriels, Monroe, Belden, Tessier, Bennett and Morrell. Absent: 23 Supervisor Bentley.

Motion was declared duly passed. Chairman Thomas noted that Resolution No. 718 would become part of the packet of resolutions to be voted upon.

Mr. Kenny discussed the Resolution No. 718, and noted he had sincerely wished that when this day finally arrived after 60 months of discussion and numerous meetings that the vote would have been unanimous. He said he certainly had listened to pros and cons against the proposed law, and he enumerated the number of meetings held in various locations over the aforementioned time period.

Mr. Kenny said that he now realizes after dealing with these issues for the last 5 years, that unanimous support would never be possible. He said he felt that was unfortunate. He said he was convinced that at some point in time an occupancy tax for Warren County had a stigma attached to it, and a small group of people attempted to convince the business owners and residents of this County that an occupancy tax would have a negative impact on business. He said he felt that was simply untrue. He noted there was no "black cloud" hanging over the community, or any other community, county, or state, that has successfully instituted an occupancy tax. He remarked that an occupancy tax has been used as an effective economic development tool for nearly 50 years, which was a fact that the Economic Development Committee recognized when they recently endorsed the concept for Warren County. He said it has also been used effectively as a budgetary tool, which was a fact that the Budget Committee recognized by endorsing the concept for Warren County. He said it has also been effectively used for its primary purpose - enhancement of tourism promotion, which has a multitude of financial benefits for the County.

Mr. Kenny said he was disheartened by the notion that some of the businesses in Warren County who are in the tourism field did not seize the opportunity to support this incentive to the County. He said if there were a bright spot for those that have resisted, those same people who have resisted the most will be the same individuals who will become the greatest benefactor of this increased promotion. He said the time has long since passed that Warren County should join their neighbors to the north, Essex County, and to the south, Saratoga County, who bask in the successes of an occupancy tax. He said he made a determined effort to understand the opposing sides of this issue, but he added he failed to grasp the logic behind the resistence. He said he, as well as others in the room, have presented a mountain of documentation to support the tax, and the opposition has produced absolutely no evidence to the contrary. He added that there were two studies done by professional groups with national credentials supporting an occupancy tax.

Mr. Kenny indicated he had an opportunity to speak with people across the County and in many other counties, and the most commonly heard phrase he heard was, "It is a no brainer for Warren County." He said he agreed with that assessment. He remarked that when he got elected 5 years ago, someone older and wiser than he told him that the hardest job he would have was to balance the need of his constituency with the needs of the constituency of the County as a whole. Sometimes, he added, that was the most difficult task he performs. He noted that same person also told him it was not always what he thought was right that should be the determining factor on an issue, but rather what the people who elect him think is right. He noted the other advice he received was to listen carefully to those people, because he was their voice, not their brain. He said he felt it was his job to convey what these people want him to convey. He said if each supervisor could imagine for just a minute that they could somehow speak with every person they represent about this issue and talley the votes for and against an occupancy tax, that talley should guide the vote today. He said he believed at least 90 percent of the population, if not greater, of Warren County supports these issues. He asked, therefore, for the supervisors to let the voices of those they serve speak today in their vote. He agreed that a minority side of an issue should be heard, but said in the end, he felt it was the job of the supervisors to satisfy the wishes of an overwhelming majority. He urged all supervisors to support an occupancy tax for Warren County.

Chairman Thomas reiterated that this was the first action of a long process, and he clarified that this resolution only authorized the supervisors to go to the State Legislature. He asked the County Attorney to explain the process for everyone's information.

Mr. Dusek stated that this resolution, if passed, would authorize his office and the Chairman to contact the County's State Legislators and to say that the Board of Supervisors would like to move ahead with an enactment of hotel-motel tax legislation. He said that a copy of today's resolution would be sent as a starting point, and the legislators would, in turn review with their staff and other State officials the proposal. Then, he said, they would draft a version of the legislation, and it may have changes based on what the State feels is appropriate to change. Next, he said, that drafted version of legislation would be sent back to Warren County for review. At that point, he continued, another vote was needed by the Board of Supervisors on that legislation, and also at that point, the supervisors have a right to ask that additional changes be made to that legislation. He indicated he envisioned a dialogue back and forth with the State on this legislation until both the State and the County are satisfied that they have in terms what they want. Chairman Thomas interjected that public input will be allowed throughout this process.

Mr. Dusek continued, noting once the State Legislature enacts this legislation, the County will only have authorization and then a local law would be necessary to implement the tax. He said there will be another opportunity for a public hearing on that local law. He added that the local law would get into a lot more of the mechanics of the occupancy tax. He concluded that the supervisors were basically on the first step of a relatively long path.

Chairman Thomas assured that mechanics will be discussed throughout the process, and added that he hoped they would all come up with a product everyone can live with.

Mr. Brower said he felt a strong message has been sent by this Board of Supervisors today due to the fact that over a two-thirds majority vote was garnered to pass the resolution. He said he hoped that the State Legislators would take this very seriously and bring the legislation to the floor for a successful vote. He said he viewed this as a positive promotion of tourism in Warren County, and he hoped the benefits that are attained will be lasting and that any sunset clause in the legislation would be renewed because it is so successful. He added he hoped that many of the opponents of the idea of an occupancy tax will change their minds when they see the success it enables Warren County to have in the future.

Mr. Caimano said that one of the things discussed was the formation of an ad hoc committee to advise the supervisors on how things should be done with an occupancy tax. He said that given the comments by Mr. Burhoe of Canoe Island Lodge, he did not feel it was too early to do that. He said he hoped this process would assure that whatever they come up with would be more palatable and more correct. Chairman Thomas agreed and said he would give it some thought for the next board meeting.

Mr. Mallison asked if a roll call vote was required on Resolution Nos. 714, 715, 716 and 718. Chairman Thomas noted these have been brought to the floor as part of the earlier motion. Mr. Robillard added that there would be a roll call vote on Resolution No. 714, which adopts the County Budget, and the others would be part of the collective votes.

Mr. Tessier requested a roll call vote on Resolution No. 718.

Mr. Gabriels referred to Mr. Brower's comments wherein he said he hoped the State Legislators would take full cognizance of what this board has done. He agreed, but suggested that the legislators not only listen to what this board does, but to also listen to the constituents of Warren County. He noted that the Town of Bolton currently takes \$20,000 in tax dollars per year and gives it to their chamber, and he questioned if the Town of Queensbury did anything for promotion. Mr. Brower said they hoped to under the occupancy tax proposal. Chairman Thomas indicated that Johnsburg did, but there was a limit as to what they could give and it did not address all the needs. He said he felt that more money could certainly be used in this regard.

Mr. Kenny pointed out that Queensbury contributes a lot of tax dollars to Warren County which is used in promotion. He noted that the proposed plan for an occupancy tax included the provision for an ad hoc committee that would consist of motel owners, and businesses from within Warren County, and representatives from each town in the County to work on this plan. Discussion ensued, wherein Mr. Tessier expressed his concerns and said he would be voting no on the resolution.

Mr. Champagne commented that his rationale for voting yes on this resolution was in tone with what Mrs. Currie had to say. He indicated he had 25,000 people in Queensbury that he had to listen to. He pointed out that those people pay the taxes, and between Queensbury and Glens Falls, they pay 50 percent of the money for road maintenance throughout the county, as well as 50 percent of the other items that come down the road. He said he hoped that the State Legislators would listen to everyone.

The meeting continued and Chairman Thomas extended privilege of the floor to Mr. Dusek, who discussed the proposed sales tax agreement with Glens Falls that was before the supervisors for approval at this meeting. He noted the agreement was in final form and had been distributed to all board members. A copy is on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors with Finance & Personnel Committee records. He reviewed the details of the agreement for the information of the supervisors.

Mr. Dusek pointed out that the agreement before the supervisors was a little different from the one reviewed with the supervisors the last time. He noted there had been some minor changes, however, he added there was nothing he felt that were substantive or that would change the agreement, and added some of the changes were based on comments made by the supervisors during the last review. He reviewed the three basic changes to the agreement as follows: (1) This is now a 30-year agreement; (2) The County will pay \$330,000 this year to the City, based on the comments made by the Treasurer previously that there will not be a payment made out in February, 2003, but there will be thereafter and the sales tax that is paid the City will match the collections by the following February, 2004. and (3) The City wanted a payment time frame, so they put in 30 days, with the obvious understanding that the County would pay as quickly as they can.

Mr. Dusek said the last couple of changes were requested by the State Controller's Office Attorney, and he noted them as follows: (1) He referred to paragraph 2(c), which dealt with the fact that the City portion will not be reduced by the amount of any distribution the County elects to pay to municipalities. He said the State wanted to add in that it also would not be reduced by any amounts the County might pay to school districts, if the County was so inclined. He noted the County does not currently do this, but they could under law, so the State Controller's Attorney said if the County wanted to keep the agreement status quo, this provision should be included. (2) He referred to the formula and the State Controller adjusted the formula to read better (see Section 3). (3) He noted that some little words/typos through the document were changed, under Section 4, Miscellaneous, he noted that there was a clause (signified as [g]), which said at all times the County shall have amounts sufficient to remit to the City. He said in conversation with the City Attorney and the State Controller's Attorney and himself, it was agreed that this clause should be eliminated because this was not an arrangement whereby they are trying to set up a debt structure, but rather contract payments. He said everyone thought the language was not appropriate, so it was stricken from the agreement.

Mr. O'Neill called attention to page 8 of the document and noted Warren County's address is incorrect and suggested it be corrected.

Mr. Brower requested that the roll call vote on Resolution No. 718 be the first vote. At the conclusion of extensive discussion, Chairman Thomas indicated the resolution would be voted on in order.

Mr. Mallison commented on his no vote on Resolution No. 714, adopting the Warren County 2003 Budget, and said he made a pledge at the last board meeting that he would not vote for this budget unless the occupancy tax was passed. He said because the resolution

on the occupancy tax was not voted on first and he could not be guaranteed of its passage, he would vote no on the budget.

Mr. O'Connor said he, too, had made a similar pledge regarding the adoption of the county budget; however, he said he was firmly convinced the occupancy tax would pass and constructive dialogue would take place. Therefore, he said he would vote yes on the budget. Chairman called for vote on the resolutions.

Resolution Nos. 666 through 718 were approved. Estimate of Sales Tax, was submitted.

- 4) Any Department heads receiving inquiries from employees as to whether political activities may be engaged in shall refer said employees to the aforesaid Notice or revised Notice:
- 5) All Notices authorized and directed hereby shall be distributed with employee paychecks in the same manner as other County communications distributed with paychecks and the County Department or Departments arranging for paycheck distribution shall also distribute the Notices provided herein whenever requested by the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors.

With respect to Warren County Local Law No. 4 of 2001 (which was filed with the Secretary of State as Local Law No. 2 of 2001), Warren County Local Law No. 2 of 2002 and Warren County Local Law No. 3 of 2002, this Local Law shall not affect any of the administrative provisions or repeal or otherwise affect the previous authorization to submit an application for designation of certain areas within the County as an Empire Zone. Rather, this Local Law shall amend and/or supercede the previous Local Laws only to the extent that the areas designated as empire zones are added to or deleted to the extent shown on the maps previously referred to in Section 2 hereof, and to the extent that said particular revisions are approved by the New York State Commissioner of Economic Development. In the event that any particular addition or deletion is not approved by the Commissioner, the area designated or not designated as an Empire Zone shall remain as set forth in the previous Local Laws.

SECTION 5. <u>Effective Date.</u> This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing in the Office of the Secretary of State.

RESOLVED, that the Warren County Board of Supervisors, on behalf of the County of Warren and pursuant to Article 11 of the Constitution, hereby requests the Legislature to enact said proposed legislation, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors and the County Attorney be, and hereby are, authorized to execute any documents that may be necessary to formalize the above request and the County Attorney is specifically authorized to work with the representatives of the State Legislature in furtherance of introducing the proposed legislation, and be it further

RESOLVED, that this resolution is adopted with the understanding that it will be necessary for the Board of Supervisors to adopt a further resolution authorizing and making a Home Rule Request and until such resolution is adopted, the aforementioned legislation will not be enacted by the State Legislature, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors be, and he hereby is, authorized and directed to forward copies of this resolution to Senator Ronald B. Stafford and Assemblywoman Elizabeth Little.

Hotel or Motel Taxes in Warren County

1) Notwithstanding any other provisions of law to the contrary, the county of Warren is hereby authorized and empowered to adopt and amend local laws imposing in such county a tax, in addition to any other tax authorized and imposed pursuant to this article such as the legislature has or would have the power and authority to impose upon persons occupying hotel or motel rooms in such county. For the purposes of this section, the term "hotel" or "motel" shall mean and include any facility providing lodging on an overnight basis and shall include those facilities designated and commonly known as "bed and breakfast", "inns", "cabins", "cottages" and "tourist" facilities.

The rates of such tax shall not exceed four percent (4%) of the per diem rental rate for each room, provided however, that such tax shall not be applicable to a permanent resident of a hotel or motel. For the purposes of this section the term "permanent resident" shall mean a person occupying a room or rooms in a hotel or motel for at least ninety consecutive days.

- 2) Such tax may be collected and administered by the county treasurer or other fiscal officers of Warren County by such means and in such a manner as other taxes which are now collected and administered by such officers or as otherwise may be provided by such local law
- *3) Such local laws may provide that any tax imposed shall be paid by the person liable therefor to the owner of the hotel or motel room occupied or to the person entitled to be paid the rent or charge for the hotel or motel room occupied for and on account of the County of Warren imposing the tax and that such owner or person entitled to be paid the rent or charge shall be liable for the collection and payment of the tax; and that such owner or person entitled to be paid the rent or charge shall have the same right in respect to collecting the tax from the person occupying the hotel or motel room, or in respect to nonpayment of the tax by the person occupying the hotel or motel room, as if the tax were a part of the rent or charge and payable at the same time as the rent or charge; provided, however, that the county treasurer or other fiscal officers of the county, specified in such local law, shall be joined as a party in any action or proceeding brought to collect the tax by the owner or by the person entitled to be paid the rent or charge.
- *4) Such local laws may provide for the filing of returns and the payment of the tax on a monthly

basis or on the basis of any longer or shorter period of time.

- *5) This section shall not authorize the imposition of such tax upon any transaction, by or with any of the following in accordance with section twelve hundred thirty of this chapter:
- a. The State of New York, or any public corporation (including a public corporation created pursuant to agreement or compact with another state or the Dominion of Canada), improvement district or other political subdivision of the state:
 - b The United States of America, insofar as it is immune from taxation;
- c. Any corporation or association, or trust, or community chest, fund or foundation organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable or educational purposes, or for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals, and no part of the net earnings of which enures to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual and no substantial part of the activities of which is carrying on propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; provided, however, that nothing in this paragraph shall include an organization operated for the primary purpose of carrying on a trade or business for profit, whether or not all of its profits are payable to one or more organizations described in this paragraph.
- *6) Any final determination of the amount of any tax payable hereunder shall be review able for error, illegality or unconstitutionality or any other reason whatsoever by a proceeding under article seventy-eight of the Civil Practice Law and Rules if application therefor is made to the Supreme Court within thirty days after the giving of the notice of such final determination, provided, however, that any such proceeding under article seventy-eight of the Civil Practice Law and Rules shall not be instituted unless:
- a. The amount of any tax sought to be reviewed, with such interest and penalties thereon as may be provided for by local law or regulation shall be first deposited and there is filed an undertaking, issued by a surety company authorized to transact business in this State and approved by the Superintendent of Insurance of this State as to solvency and responsibility, in such amount as a Justice of the Supreme Court shall approve to the effect that if such proceeding be dismissed or the tax confirmed the petitioner will pay all costs and charges which may accrue in the prosecution of such proceeding; or
- b. At the option of the petitioner such undertaking may be in a sum sufficient to cover the taxes, interests and penalties stated in such determination plus the costs and charges which may accrue against it in the prosecution of the proceeding, in which event the petitioner shall not be required to pay such taxes, interest or penalties as a condition precedent to the application.

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*7) Where any tax imposed hereunder shall have been erroneously, illegally or unconstitutionally collected and application for the refund thereof duly made to the proper fiscal officer or officers, and such officer or officers shall have made a determination denying such refund, such determination shall be review able by a proceeding under article seventy-eight of the Civil Practice Law and Rules, provided, however, that such proceeding is instituted within thirty days after the giving of the notice of such denial, that a final determination of tax due was not previously made, and that an undertaking is filed with the proper fiscal officer or officers in such amount and with such sureties as a Justice of the Supreme Court shall approve to the effect that if such proceeding be dismissed or the tax confirmed, the petitioner will pay all costs and charges which may accrue in the prosecution of such proceeding.

- *8) Except in the case of a wilfully false or fraudulent return with intent to evade tax, no assessment of additional tax shall be made after the expiration of more than three years from the date of the filing of the return, provided, however, that where no return has been filed as provided by law the tax may be assessed at any time.
- 9) All revenues resulting from the imposition of the tax under the local laws shall be paid into the treasury of Warren County and shall be credited to and deposited in the General Fund of such county, and thereafter allocated and/or used as follows:
- a) up to a maximum of five percent (5%) of the revenues may be expended to deter necessary expenses of the County in administering the tax, and the Warren County Board of Supervisors may from time-to-time determine the particular percentage to be so expended by local law;
- b) after payment of the aforementioned administrative expenses, remaining revenues shall be used or expended solely for the purpose of promotion of tourism and tourist attractions in Warren County as follows:
 - Seventy-five percent (75%) for publicizing the advantages of the county or region as a whole;
 - ii) Twenty-five percent (25%) for publicizing the advantages of particular events in the city, village or towns in such amounts and at such times as the Tourism Committee of the Warren County Board of Supervisors shall determine, provided that it is also determined that expenditures for such events is in furtherance of publicizing the advantages of the County.

The use of the funds for expenditures provided for herein shall first be determined by the Tourism Committee of the Warren County Board of Supervisors. Any contracts for expenditure of funds shall remain subject to the approval of the Warren County Board of Supervisors

- 10) Each enactment of a local law may provide for the imposition of a hotel or motel tax for a period of time no longer than five years from the date of its enactment. Nothing in this section shall prohibit the adoption and enactment of local laws, pursuant to the provisions of this section, upon the expiration of any other local law adopted pursuant to this section.
- * 11) If any provision of this section or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held invalid, the remainder of this section and the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

Mr. Haskell thanked Mrs. Weinschenk and Mr. Wessling for giving him their comments. He said they were very polite and very informative. He also spoke concerning his no vote on the Glens Falls sales tax agreement, and said he was and still is in favor of the sewer project. However, he said he felt a 30-year agreement was too much, and he thought 20 years would have been sufficient.

Mr. Mallison said he was very happy so many people showed up for the board meeting today to discuss the occupancy tax issue. He said he wished the supervisors would get similar interest all the time. He stated regarding the passage of the occupancy tax, that he wanted people to know, who own motels and those that were ardently opposed to the occupancy tax, that he will be there to insure that their interests are protected as the County moves forward and shapes this project. Chairman Thomas said he felt that was a good comment and reflected the attitude of the entire Board of Supervisors.

Mr. Gabriels recalled that in the middle of summer a case was made about sales tax being paid for certain activities and there was discussion about the County officials talking with the State Department of Taxation and Finance. He asked the status. Chairman Thomas indicated that the County received a response from the organization involved, and he did not feel it was exactly what the County wanted to hear. He referred the issue to the Finance & Personnel Committee for further discussion.

Mr. O'Neill discussed the issue of the occupancy tax, and noted he voted to bring the vote to the floor, and then voted against the tax. He said he did that to extend the courtesy of a vote to all supervisors.

Mr. O'Connor noted that on Friday, November 15th in the B Section of the local newspaper, Mr. Tingley wrote a commentary over the fact that 5 supervisors voted yes on a pay raise. He noted he was one of those 5 supervisors and reminded that he prefaced his vote by saying he did not care whether the supervisors got the raise or not. He pointed out in response to Mr. Tingley's comment that "Supervisors have no where to hide" and said he wanted to point out if he was trying to hide and was a man of his girth, he surely would not be doing it in these chambers.

Mr. Kenny thanked all the supervisors who supported the occupancy tax vote to bring the resolution to the floor and to continue down the road. He said he hoped that everybody stays as involved as they go down that road, especially the public as they form and re-form the proposed spending plan and the proposed laws. Chairman Thomas also thanked the board members for their participation in the process.

Mr. Quintal commented on the leak in the roof which was pointed out by a member of the public. He recalled that three years ago he asked for a resolution to bond this project. He noted they finally got it bonded, but now they are in a lawsuit, which is why this project has not been done.

Mr. Weinschenk said that one of the comments that Mr. Champagne said was that Queensbury and Glens Falls pay 50 percent of the taxes in the County, and in the course of doing so, he said he mentioned Mr. Weinschenk's name personally. He said this was a perfect indication of where they are in the County and the use of the "bully tactic" - because a town has more population they are going to get certain things. He said he felt the roads in general in the County have been neglected for quite a few years, and they are in desperate need of repairs. He said he did not complain when the road past Lowe's was repaved, and added he thought that area was not in that bad of shape. He said some of the other county roads were in tough shape in his opinion, and whether the money comes from Queensbury or Bolton to do these jobs, he did not have any problem with it. He said he felt, however, that the bully tactics being used to get things was splitting the county apart. He said he did not feel these tactics built good relationships at the County.

There being no further business, on motion by Mr. Caimano, seconded by Mr. Montesi, the meeting adjourned at 12:33 p.m.

WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 18, 2002

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Warren convened at the Supervisors' Rooms in the Warren County Municipal Center, Lake George, New York, at 10:00 a.m.

Mr. William Thomas presiding.

Salute to the flag was led by Supervisor Bennett.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Supervisor Michael O'Connor, Chairman of the Federal Programs Committee, who asked James Baker to join him at the front of the room. He acknowledged Mr. Baker's recent retirement as Director of the Warren-Hamilton Counties Office for the Aging.

Mr. O'Connor recalled that his Pastor recently said to him, "Life is what happens when you are doing something else." He said he thought of Jim Baker immediately. He remarked that he was sure when Jim was in grade school and high school, that he had no idea he would spend better than half of his life devoted to the seniors of this area. He proceeded to read a Proclamation honoring Mr. Baker on the occasion of his retirement, and the board members acknowledged Mr. Baker with a standing round of applause.

Mr. Baker said it had been his pleasure to serve Warren County since 1974. He said he had wonderful mentors in Louis Spelman, Jr., and Ida Schneider, and a very good support staff. He said he had always appreciated the Board of Supervisors' commitment to the seniors, and added that this made his job very easy. He recalled that in 1992, Mr. Robillard came to him and acknowledged that issues might come up sometimes that he might feel uncomfortable with. He said that Mr. Robillard told him that his door was always open. He noted he took Mr. Robillard up on that, and Mr. Robillard was always true to his word, offering help and assistance.

Mr. Baker said he felt working for Warren County had been a wonderful experience. He concluded, stating that Warren County and the people of Warren County would always hold a special place in his heart. The board members again responded with applause.

Chairman Thomas recognized Mrs. Elizabeth Little, noting she was a former member of the Board of Supervisors, Warren County's Assemblywoman, and would be Warren County's Senator starting in 2003.

Assemblywoman Little thanked the supervisors for the opportunity to be present at today's meeting. She said she wanted to begin her comments by thanking the supervisors for all of their support which has resulted in her achieving the position (Senator) she was about to begin in 2003. She acknowledged that Warren County was where she learned a lot about government and stressed she would not forget that. She said as she moved forward in the State she would look to the supervisors and the people of the county for advice on how the State laws impact, and how the State can lower the property taxes for the people.

Assemblywoman Little commented on the retirement of Senator Stafford, and noted she had been in Albany over the past two days and attended a dinner honoring Senator Stafford on the occasion of his retirement. She said she felt it would be strange not to have him as her Senator and acknowledged he has been that for 37 years and had done a wonderful job and had been a wonderful advocate for the North Country. She mentioned that it will also be strange not to have Mr. Robillard here, who was also retiring in 2003. She wished Mr. Robillard and Senator Stafford well in their retirements.

Assemblywoman Little discussed her new organization in 2003, noting she would be moving to Room 903 in the Legislative Office Building in Albany. She noted that Rebecca Marino will be working at the Albany Office and taking care of legislative issues. In Glens Falls, she said she was moving to the second floor and her offices would have more room and better meeting space. She introduced Keith Scherer to the supervisors and noted he would be in charge of that office. Lastly, she said she would be setting up an office in Plattsburgh, and Nancy Dufrain would be running it.

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Assemblywoman Little announced she would be having a local swearing in ceremony on December 31st at 11:00 a.m. at the Queensbury Hotel, with a reception following. She noted that letters would be coming out.

Assemblywoman Little spoke briefly on the Senate activities and legislation pending or recently passed for the information of the supervisors. She concluded by noting she has not met anyone yet who has indicated there was a lot of money around in the State. She remarked on the need to not let the State shift the financial burden to counties, and pledged to work so that Warren County gets its share of money out of Albany. Again, she thanked the supervisors for their support and wished everyone the best of holidays. The board members responded with applause.

Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing on Proposed Local Law No. 4 of 2002 open at 10:07 a.m., and requested the Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

Deputy Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak on the proposed local law, Chairman declared that the public hearing would remain open for a short time in the event anyone wishing to speak might appear.

Chairman Thomas declared the public hearing on Proposed Local Law No. 1 of 2003 open at 10:08 a.m., and requested the Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

Deputy Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing.

There being no one wishing to speak on the proposed local law, Chairman declared that the public hearing on Proposed Local Law No. 4 of 2002 and Proposed Local Law No. 1 of 2003 closed at 10:09 a.m.

Roll called, the following members present:

Supervisors Gabriels, F. Monroe, Center, Sheehan, Mason, O'Connor, Kenny, Belden, Bentley, Thomas, Tessier, Bennett, Brower, Caimano, Montesi, Morrell, Champagne, O'Neill, Haskell and Quintal - 20.

Motion was made by Mr. Caimano, seconded by Mr. Tessier and carried unanimously to approve the minutes of the November 8, 2002, adjourned board meeting, and the November 18th regular board meeting, subject to correction by the clerk.

Chairman Thomas offered privilege of the floor to Frank O'Keefe, County Treasurer, and noted he may have an announcement regarding the replacement of his deputy, Anne Dressel, who was retiring. Mr. O'Keefe thanked the Chairman, however, noted the candidate has asked to remain anonymous until he advises his present employer. He said he would make an announcement as soon as he was able to do so. He commented that there were come good candidates for the position and he felt the man selected was highly qualified and had experience in government.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Steve DiRaimo, of Siemens Building Technologies, Inc., who reviewed some history of the proposed co-generation project. He recalled that the company went through a RFP (Request for Proposals) process with Warren County, and discussions have transpired over the proposals submitted. (Please refer to DPW Committee minutes of November 27, 2002 for the County Attorney's review of the RFP process.) Mr. DiRaimo indicated the proposals included co-generation facilities for the Westmount Health Facility, Social Services Annex, Detention Home and Annex #11, and also for the Warren County Municipal Center and the Public Safety Building (PSB).

Mr. DiRaimo highlighted some financial information on Siemens, noting the company did about \$60 million worth of business in Upstate New York. A copy of the 2001 Annual Report of Siemens Building Technologies, Inc. was distributed to board members and a copy is on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors with County Facilities Committee records.

Mr. DiRaimo mentioned two recent projects completed (or being completed) by the company, Saratoga County Nursing Home, and Hudson Valley Community College. Using visual aids, Mr. DiRaimo described each project in detail. He noted if any of the supervisors were interested in visiting these sites, he would make arrangements to take them. He described particularly with the Hudson Valley Community College Project, how they were capturing and liquefying the methane gas from a nearby landfill, and piping it to the facility for

power. He noted that was similar to what they would try to do for Warren County. (In subsequent discussion, he noted that they would not be piping the gas from the landfills, but rather trucking it in, because of the proximity of the landfills.)

Mr. DiRaimo said that today, Siemens was asking the Board of Supervisors to approve a development agreement that would provide Siemens with the ability to go forward. He stressed that this agreement did not bind the County to a lot of money. He discussed the four phases of the projects and the costs associated with each one. He explained that under the first phase, Siemens would be doing an energy audit, research for grants, etc. At the end of that phase, he noted if the project presented to the county was not at least "budget neutral", they would not proceed.

Mr. Champagne expressed concern over a project that was *just* "budget neutral". He talked about the maintenance and costs associated with changing this technology and asked if there was any way the County could go into this with better savings projections. Mr. DiRaimo replied that any and all costs associated with the budget need to be bore by the project in order for this to be deemed budget neutral. He stressed that the project had to pay for itself and not put any burden on the County. He noted that budget neutral was the worse case scenario, and Siemens would strive to provide more. He spoke on the availability of grant money and noted they cannot predict the cycles, but they will apply as money is available. He noted that any grant money Seimens gets for this project would pass through to the County. He mentioned there was grant funding available right now through NYSERDA for about \$500,000. He said if Siemens gets approval from the County today, they will submit the grant application in time to meet tomorrow's deadline.

Mr. Montesi asked for specific information on the Saratoga County Nursing Home Project, and Mr. DiRaimo responded. Using the visual aids, he described the project in detail, noting it was a \$3.7 million project which included an energy management system, lighting upgrades and a new rear entrance to the facility. He noted that the funds for the project come out of the utility budget. He explained that Siemens set up a municipal lease for the county for \$3.7 million, and the money gets put into an escrow account. He said the project is run like a capital project. He pointed out that nursing homes get reimbursement and nursing home projects generally achieve guaranteed savings, not just budget neutral status.

Mr. DiRaimo continued describing the project and answering Mr. Montesi's queries. He noted that the projects were generally for 10 years and then there is a transfer to the County for \$1. He noted the cash flow to the counties then increase because the capital portion of the project is completed.

Mr. Champagne questioned the technology to capture methane from the Queensbury Landfill. Mr. DiRaimo explained it basically looked like what Suburban Propane does. He explained how they would capture and liquify the methane gases and transport it for use. (Please refer to the November 27th DPW Committee minutes for details.) He also mentioned that the methane gas system was also backed up by a natural gas system, a diesel system and generators in the event there were any problems. He mentioned it was a very redundant system, and a lot of things would have to fail before there was a problem.

General discussion ensued on the redundancy of the system. Mr. Brower asked if in 10 years something breaks, whose responsibility was it, and Mr. DiRaimo replied, Siemens was responsible for the length of the project (10 to 15 years). Mr. Brower asked if they then walked away, and Mr. DiRaimo replied that was up to the County and how they wanted to proceed. He noted that Siemens can take care of everything, or the County can have Siemens train its personnel and they can take over.

Mr. Brower asked if Siemens was proposing two co-generation facilities, one for the Municipal Center side of the road and one for the Westmount Health Facility side of the road, and Mr. DiRaimo replied yes. Mr. Brower asked if they could look at just one project or the other and was there a proposal for that. Mr. DiRaimo replied yes and it was up to the County. He added he felt it was valid to look at the Municipal Center with what is going on at the campus (new PSB and new DPW facility) to see if the County can benefit.

Mr. DiRaimo stressed that Siemens was not present to tell the County what to do, only to offer an economic solution. He said the benefits of the proposal today is that there are a lot of grant funds available as everyone wants a renewable energy source.

Mr. Brower asked if the Saratoga County Nursing Home was given a guarantee of savings, and Mr. DiRaimo replied it was a budget neutral guarantee and the same type of agreement as is being proposed to Warren County. He reiterated how the Phases occur and pointed out that the last thing in the process the County would do is sign a contract for a project.

Mr. Dusek elaborated on the RFP process for the information of the supervisors. (Please refer to DPW Committee minutes of November 27, 2002 for details.) He explained there were four phases to the program, and as part of the RFP process, Siemens submitted proposals to do the two projects separately and also to do them as one project. He said if the County agreed to proceed with both projects together, Siemens could use the savings that may occur at Westmount Health Facility (which is pretty much a guaranteed savings) to offset the costs of the Municipal Center project (which may not have a budget neutral conclusion), thereby making both projects budget neutral. He said from everything they know, it seems the Westmount Facility part of the program will not only pay for itself, it will not exceed Niagara Mohawk fees, and therefore, will be better than budget neutral.

Lastly, Mr. Dusek spoke concerning what he termed a risk in the program, noting that the generators used to generate the energy is run on natural gas. He said if natural gas prices go up, so does the County's costs and Siemens does not assume this expense. Mr. Quintal mentioned with the methane recapturing system, the methane gas can be mixed with the natural gas 50-50, so they could cut the natural gas service requirements by 50 percent. Mr. Dusek added that Mr. Quintal was referring to the gas from the landfills as being free, and he pointed out that Warren County does not own the landfill, so they would have to do something with the towns and then transport it.

Mr. Dusek raised some issues for the board members to consider, such as, if the projects were combined, what if the County wanted to get rid of Westmount Health Facility. He suggested the supervisors may want to consider doing the projects separately in the event they want to get out of each project separately.

General discussion continued. Mr. Champagne said he felt another piece of this consideration is confidence and whether the supervisors were confident with whatever Siemens comes up with. He suggested talking with Siemens customers. He also wondered why there was not a proposal for one operation for both sides of the street instead of two. Mr. Quintal replied they looked into that, but because they would be crossing a federal highway there were transmission costs involved. Mr. DiRaimo concurred.

Mr. Caimano acknowledged there has been a lot of work done by the County, but said it was also important to recognize that the County was not re-inventing the wheel and this process has been done many times. He said he felt the question before the County was whether or not they were willing to continue to go forward, and part of that should be talking to Siemens customers and their competitors' customers, and finding out what the risks were.

Mr. DiRaimo offered to take the supervisors to visit customers and plants, or he suggested the supervisors could go on their own. He said the issue of the County producing its own power on site was very reliable, and he noted he could show the supervisors plants that have been off the grid for several years. He said he felt the question becomes the financial component of this project. He stressed that Siemens needed to go through a process and investigate things that come up. He noted that Siemens was already doing the work to apply for a grant for Warren County because they believe in the project.

Mr. Haskell remarked about three years ago there was a tour at Westmount Health Facility, and they saw what condition the facility was in. He mentioned that coolers were leaking, the boilers were 25 years old and the pneumatic controls were outdated. He said it became apparent they needed to do something and he went to County Facilities Committee and the committee decided the costs for repairs should be put into the Westmount Health Facility budget. He said subsequently, Mr. Payne came up with this idea regarding this

system. He said they went to visit a nursing home that had this system installed and they have been discussing it since that time. He said he felt it was time for the County to jump on board

Mr. Quintal added that in the Municipal Center Building, the cooling tower, piping and motors are also needing repair in the near future. He said the money for these repairs were taken out of the budget for next year. He said he has also visited facilities that Siemens have done and Saratoga County which already saved money and their generators have only been on line a few weeks. He said he felt the supervisors were looking at a system which down the road can save a lot of money for the taxpayers.

Mr. Montesi asked what percentage of methane did Siemens estimate they would be using as raw material for generation. Mr. DiRaimo replied they do not know that because they have not done the analysis. He referred to the Hudson Valley project and noted it was a 1 megawatt project and it provides about 75 percent of the facility's gas.

Mr. Montesi asked what had Mr. DiRaimo felt happened to the electrical rates over the last 10 years. Mr. DiRaimo said that everything goes up. He suggested the issue the supervisors needed to review, outside of Niagara Mohawk, was getting the County on a source it controls. He pointed out that Niagara Mohawk commodities, gas and electricity, were subject to supply and demand. He said the systems they have are at fixed capacity.

Mr. DiRaimo also spoke of long term, and noted that with Hudson Valley, they would be looking at going from a methane system to a digester system. He explained that would involve capturing municipal waste, paper and cardboard, decomposing it and using it as an energy source. He pointed out that methane was a depletable resource and it was not going to be available forever. He estimated that it would probably take a couple of years to get to this stage. He said Siemens did not view the County as a customer for one piece, and they would like to look at the county as a long term customer and use what they have learned from all around the world.

Mr. Mason asked if the grant money referred to by Mr. DiRaimo takes care of all the phases of this project. Mr. DiRaimo replied it was a reimbursable grant, and NYSERDA wants to build a renewable capital system. He said that Siemens would submit a grant saying how they could do this project and then NYSERDA will okay the grant. As they go through the project, the County would get the grant, he said, however, the County would not get the grant unless they build the facility. He mentioned there were other grants with NYSERDA which were for engineering studies, but they have not been applied for since Siemens did not know whether the county wanted to go forward. He said if they get these grants, they also go to the Counties and offset costs.

Mr. Champagne questioned if the County boilers were burning the methane gas, was that a savings to the County. Mr. DiRaimo replied that in and of itself, the system was a more efficient system, and one piece is the cost and the other is the efficiency of the system. He said that basically what happens is that the co-generation system becomes the heating system. He said they do not take systems down, they just tap into the returns. He also explained how this technology would work for cooling.

Mr. Mallison asked how far Phase 1 would go. Mr. DiRaimo replied that Siemens was not interested in spending \$50,000 to come to the County and say this project will not work. He said they know what the key grants are and they will probably invest \$15,000-\$20,000 to go to the landfills and do studies to see if there is enough methane available.

Mr. Monroe asked what was the life expectancy of methane gas at Hudson Valley Community College. Mr. DiRaimo estimated they had a 14 year supply available, and he reminded that this works on a sliding scale based on grading and production and consumption. He said once they get to the 10 year mark and the project is paid for, then they will go onto the digester piece. Mr. Monroe asked if the digester could use wood waste also, and Mr. DiRaimo replied yes. He said the second phase they were doing with Saratoga right now, is that they have magazines, paper and a few other waste streams they are sometimes paying to get rid of, and they are looking at putting them into the digester. He said they were putting in the same grant for them on the capturing side as they are putting in for Warren County on the production side.

Mr. Gabriels asked how many projects have Siemens walked away from because they have not met the financials. Mr. DiRaimo estimated 15 percent. Mr. Gabriels asked if the supervisors could have the names of those customers also, and Mr. DiRaimo replied yes.

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Mr. Tessier asked how big was the Saratoga County Landfill, and Mr. DiRaimo estimated 54 acres. Mr. Tessier asked how long it has been closed, and Mr. DiRaimo replied four years.

Mr Brower asked if the NYSERDA funding was from the State, and Mr. DiRaimo replied yes. Mr. Brower questioned whether that grant funding would be available if the County simply wanted to look at the nursing home, and Mr. DiRaimo replied the grant was specifically for the methane capturing system. He said he felt the Westmount Health Facility side of the project was covered because of the reimbursement, but they needed to be more creative on the Municipal Center side of the project.

Mr. Brower said if the grant was approved and Siemens was able to guarantee a budget neutral situation at Westmount Health Facility project, but the County decided not to proceed, would the County owe Siemens \$53,000, and Mr. DiRaimo said yes.

Mr. Monroe said he did not understand how NYSERDA can figure capped landfill methane as a renewable source because it does deplete. Mr. DiRaimo replied that it was renewable for the time that it exists.

Mr. Champagne asked what was the time frame if the County opted to proceed with the project(s) today. Mr. DiRaimo estimated a 6 - 8 month engineering cycle, and then probably a year to a year-and-a-half construction cycle and that depends on when they get involved.

Mr. Brower asked what guarantees the County has that Siemens will control their charges to the County during the first 10 years. Mr. DiRaimo said the costs are fixed and will be in the contract. He added that anything that Siemens is responsible for, they will guarantee, such as maintenance costs.

Mr. Brower asked what if the reciprocal engine blows up in year 3, would it be Siemens' cost to replace it, and Mr. DiRaimo replied yes.

Mr. Gabriels said he was not sure what option was being recommended. Chairman Thomas said before the conversation was finished, he wanted to allow the Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation representatives present at the meeting an opportunity to speak, and he wanted Mr. Dusek to explain to the supervisors all the options.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Alex Hall, an Account Manager of Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation, who said they recently came to understand that the County was considering several options with respect to several of their buildings. He said Niagara Mohawk's interest at the meeting today was to learn more about the process and more about the projects being considered, and also to offer assistance and help to assure the County makes the most informed decision that it can. He said Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation was clearly interested in retaining the County as a customer in any sense that it makes sense for the County to do so. However, he said, their number one issue and concern was to help make sure that the county has all of the information necessary to make the most informed decision

Mr. Hall said they did not have a lot of detail because they did not know a lot about the project yet. He said they were just learning and hoping to obtain more information.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Paul Dusek, who said the first option was just set forth and related to whether the County wanted to do more studying on this matter, or did the supervisors feel they had enough information to go forward. If there is enough information to proceed with the Siemens proposal, then he said the decisions become: (1) Whether the supervisors want to do one massive project, which is the Municipal Center complex and Westmount Health Facility complex. He said if they were merged together as one project, Siemens only obligation was to come back with a budget neutral project for all facilities; or (2) Whether the supervisors want to divide the two projects in half, which means Siemens would have to come back with separate budget neutral projects for the Municipal Center complex and Westmount Health Facility complex.

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Mr. Dusek said in his analysis of these proposals, he liked the two-project approach for the County. He said if the two projects were separated, Siemens could not use the savings that the County would get off the Westmount Health Facility project to justify the project at the Municipal Center complex. He said from the evidence seen in the past, on nursing home projects, because of the nature of the use of the nursing home, they would expect that Siemens not only would be able to come back with a budget neutral project, but probably would come back with a project that would show savings. He added that another reason to divide the projects is, if for some reason when the supervisors get through the Municipal Center complex project, if it is not that attractive, they could still go ahead with the Westmount Health Facility project because the savings were perhaps more attractive.

Mr. Caimano said he understood the County Attorney's recommendations, however, he posed the thinking that all of this money comes out of the same pocket. He said if the County saves money at Westmount Health Facility, they will not some how squirrel it away. If the energy costs were higher at the Municipal Center, he said he felt some of the money saved at Westmount would go toward paying the bills. Mr. Dusek concurred, but pointed out by splitting the projects, the County has the option of going forward with one project and not the other. Mr. Caimano reiterated he felt the County still only had one pocket. Discussion ensued.

Mr. Brower said his greatest concern was not during the first 10 years, but after the 10 years. He questioned how much it would cost to repair the systems and who will repair them. Mr. Quintal said he felt the County needed to look to the future. He said he felt the County would be able to contract with Siemens for a set amount for service after the ten years, so they will take care of the generators. In the alternative, he recalled Mr. DiRaimo said that Siemens would train County facilities people to maintain the systems. He said because the system alternated between three and four generators, he felt the life expectancy increases. General discussion continued, wherein Mr. Quintal gave examples of problem areas with facilities and urged the supervisors to proceed with co-generation.

Mr. Champagne said he did not feel there was any major risk to move forward with stage one of this plan. He complimented the efforts of the committees that have been working on this plan for such a long period of time. Mr. Kenny agreed and said he was also ready to move forward. He added, however, part of the equation was the uncertainty of fuel sources from the Middle East due to the tension, and a method to provide energy from methane gas may be very valuable in the very near future.

Chairman Thomas asked if it was the consensus of the supervisors to move forward with the plan, and the answer was yes. Chairman Thomas then asked if there was a consensus of the supervisors to move forward to do both projects, but do them separately, and the answer was yes. Chairman Thomas asked Mr. Dusek to prepare the appropriate resolution for vote by the supervisors, and he left the meeting to do so.

Mr. Tessier asked Mr. DiRaimo if the results of the study of methane gas would be given to the supervisors at the same time for both projects. Mr. DiRaimo indicated yes, and added that they will update the supervisors on a monthly basis on these projects.

Mr. Hall requested any public information available about the proposal.

Chairman Thomas dispensed with committee reports for December, and extended privilege of the floor to any committee chairmen or vice chairmen wishing to report on a particular item.

Supervisor O'Neill reported that he had recently attended the annual Soil & Water Conservation District meeting, and he reported that the Conservationist of the Year was Bolton Landing Highway Superintendent, Timothy Coon. He commented on Mr. Coon's efforts, and noted he has gone out of his way to help the District, and he has implemented best management practices when it comes to erosion control and sedimentation along the highways in Bolton Landing that end up draining in Lake George. Mr. Gabriels thanked the Soil & Water Conservation District on behalf of the Town of Bolton.

Supervisor Haskell, chairman of the Westmount Health Facility Committee, apprised that on Thanksgiving Day, the facility administrator, Hal Payne, was at the facility serving lunch to the patients. He complimented Mr. Payne, and said he felt this was above the call of duty, and he congratulated him. The supervisors recognized Mr. Payne with a round of applause.

Supervisor Monroe, chairman of the Finance & Personnel Committee, mentioned that at the last committee meeting there was discussion over whether any additional funds might be needed for the waste-to-energy plant. He said he received a call from Steve Lynch and he said the bill for December was anticipated at \$176,000. He said he believed that was within the Solid Waste budget. Mr. Robillard mentioned that \$15,500 was transferred into that code from money left over from ACC paving project. Mr. Remington said he believed the budget had \$175,000 in it prior to the transfer mentioned by Mr. Robillard. Mr. Monroe pointed out that this is the first year in several that the supervisors have not had to borrow money to cover the solid waste budget.

Supervisor Monroe also made a brief report as chairman of the Solid Waste & Recycling Committee. He noted regarding the negotiations with Wheelabrator, Waste Management and Foster-Wheeler, that they were down to three issues. He said he felt they made considerable progress on all three issues at the last meeting. He said that documents have been drafted and were being reviewed by the attorneys.

Supervisor O'Neill reported that Off-Track Betting revenues were down about 10 percent this year compared to last year. He estimated the revenues received were just under \$400.000 for 2002.

Chairman called for reading of communications.

Clerk read communications, including the following:

New York State Office for the Aging, 2001 Annual Report.

Paul Dusek, County Attorney, advising of the resignation of Julie Garcia and removing her from his designation as Third County Attorney.

John Haskell, advising of his interest in becoming a HEAP vendor through Warren County Department of Social Services, and apprising that he had been advised by the Warren County Attorney regarding General Municipal Law Section 901, as it applies to this situation.

Patricia and Chuck Wheeler, commending the services of Stella Rasicato, Public Health Nurse, who provided services for their elderly parents.

Capital District Regional Off-Track Betting Corporation, Financial Report as of August 31, 2002, September 30, 2002, and October 31, 2002.

NYS Lake George Park Commission, announcing increase of fees for the 2003 boating season, and announcing a public comment period was underway and a public hearing would be held January 21, 2003, at 7:00 p.m. at the Holiday Inn, Route 9, Lake George.

Annual Report:DPW

Communications, resolutions and reports ordered placed on file.

Chairman called for reading of resolutions.

Mr. Gabriels indicated he wished to bring a resolution from the floor on the use of Sonar in the Demonstration Project to control various spots of Eurasian Watermilfoil in Lake George. He presented the proposed resolution in writing and it was distributed to members of the Board of Supervisors. He said that there was a very lengthy adjudicatory hearing before a law judge on the project, and Adirondack Park Agency (APA) staff was a part of that meeting. He reported that on December 6th, the executive staff of the APA came out with a recommendation denying the use of Sonar in the Demonstration Project, and others who were part of the hearing feel an objective summary of the entire hearing should be prepared for the APA Commissioners before they make their decision, which is now scheduled for their January 2003 monthly meeting. Mr. Gabriels moved to sponsor the aforementioned resolution, and Mr. Quintal seconded the motion.

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Mr. Champagne asked if the resolution also states that the supervisors go on record as supporting the use of Sonar. Mr. Gabriels said he felt the Board of Supervisors has gone on record supporting the use of Sonar, and this resolution just requests that a summary of the adjudicatory hearing be prepared prior to the APA Commissioners voting.

Mr. Brower said he enthusiastically endorsed the resolution. He said he had called the APA, as well as other people about this situation. He said he was very discouraged to learn that the APA staff was recommending to the Commissioners that they not consider the use of Sonar in the limited Demonstration Project in the three bays, Moonlight Bay, Paradise Bay and Sawmill Bay. Chairman Thomas mentioned he had also made several calls on this issue, as did Supervisor Caimano.

Mr. Tessier said they also responded to this issue at the Lake George town level because they have been working years for this project to be done. Mr. Belden concurred.

Chairman Thomas called the question, and the motion was carried by unanimous vote. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 807 for the record.

Mr. Tessier recalled that the county went on record about a year ago objecting to the Lake George Park Commission raising boat fees. He said it came to his attention yesterday that there is a hearing on this on January 21st, and he asked that the supervisors go on record again objecting to these increases.

Motion was made by Mr. Caimano, seconded by Mr. Haskell and carried unanimously to waive the Rules of the Board to allow a resolution not in writing to be brought to the floor.

Motion was made by Mr. Belden to sponsor a resolution opposing the increases in fees by the Lake George Park Commission, seconded by Mr. Gabriels.

Mr. Kenny asked that the resolution be amended to authorize the Chairman of the Board to send a representative to the Lake George Park Commission public hearing on the fee increases. Mr. Belden amended his motion to include Mr. Kenny's recommendation, and Mr. Gabriels seconded the amendment.

Chairman Thomas called the question, and the motion was carried by unanimous vote. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 808 for the record.

Mr. Belden thanked the supervisors for sponsoring Resolution Nos. 807 and 808, and stated he felt they were very important to Lake George and the economy of Warren County. Mr. Gabriels concurred.

Privilege of the floor was extended to Paul Dusek, County Attorney, who reported that the Insurance Committee met and they had an issue of not having received a second quote in the insurance process. He said the insurance was due to lapse as of December 31st and new insurance must be in effect as of January 1st. He noted that Rose & Kiernan had produced a quote from the old companies which, although were increased over last year, were the only quotes they had. He said the supervisors were not sure what NYMIR was going to do. He said they received the NYMIR quote during the course of this meeting and it turns out that the NYMIR quote is more expensive than the quote from Rose & Kiernan. He estimated NYMIR's quote was about \$60,000-\$80,000 more in cost. He said if the supervisors would like, he had prepared a resolution that would allow them to renew the County's insurance with its current companies, assuming the supervisors want to pick the lower quote.

Mr. Haskell said he wished to proceed with the lower quote, and Mr. O'Neill concurred. He said he was disappointed with NYMIR, and added he thought this might be a chance for the County to recoup some of the monies left with them four or five years ago.

Motion was made by Mr. Haskell, seconded by Mr. O'Neill to sponsor a resolution renewing insurance with Specialty National Insurance (Kempes), pursuant to the information presented by Mr. Dusek.

Mr. Brower asked how much was the reserve that NYMIR still retained, and Mr. Dusek estimated \$150,000. He noted there were two or three different amounts involved, and acknowledged it was a significant amount of money. Mr. Brower recalled there had been discussion about a potential lawsuit if NYMIR was not cooperative in refunding the County's money. He asked the status. Mr. Dusek said the lawsuit was put on hold pending the receipt of this quote. He said that NYMIR, as part of this quote, had offered to reinstate the County

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in full without repaying any of the amounts of money, and it would put the County back into the same position as it was. He said that was hoped for as the need for a lawsuit would go away. However, he continued, now that this has not happened, they will have to re-explore the issue of getting the money back from NYMIR.

Mr. Bennett asked if both quotes covered the same items, and Mr. Dusek said yes. He added he called Lee Pollock, the County's insurance agent, and asked him to specifically to go over the information received and make a comparison of the insurance coverages to make sure the quotes were both the same. He said Mr. Pollock advised he did and NYMIR came in higher, as previously noted.

Mr. Tessier asked if pollution was covered under both quotes, and Mr. Dusek said that pollution was not covered by Kempes or NYMIR, but was picked up by another company. He noted there were a couple of insurances, such as Airport, workers' compensation, that were covered through other companies.

Chairman Thomas called the question and the motion was carried by unanimous vote. Clerk noted this would be Resolution No. 809 for the record.

Clerk announced that Resolution Nos. 720 through 784 were mailed to the supervisors, and a motion to bring Resolution Nos. 719 and 785 through 806 to the floor was necessary. Motion was made by Mr. Brower, seconded by Mr. Tessier and carried unanimously to bring Resolution Nos. 719, and 785 through 806 and 810 to the floor. (Please note, Resolution Nos. 807 through 809 were previously brought to the floor by prior motions.)

Chairman Thomas indicated that Mr. Montesi had left the meeting due to illness.

Mr. Mallison requested a roll call vote on 723, 770 and 777. Mr. Brower requested a roll call vote on Resolution No 757.

Chairman called for vote on the resolutions.

Resolution Nos. 719 through 810 were approved.

The Municipal Home Rule Law of the State of New York provides for notice and public hearing prior to the adoption of this Local Law and such public notice shall be sufficient to also advise the public of the proposed revision to the Empire Zone and said public hearing shall also constitute the public hearing necessary under General Municipal Law §969.

SECTION 4. Effect on Previously Adopted Warren County Local Law No. 4 of 2001 (which was filed with the Secretary of State as Local Law No. 2 of 2001), Warren County Local Law No. 2 of 2002 and Warren County Local Law No. 3 of 2002. With respect to Warren County Local Law No. 4 of 2001 (which was filed with the Secretary of State as Local Law No. 2 of 2001), Warren County Local Law No. 2 of 2002 and Warren County Local Law No. 3 of 2002, this Local Law shall not affect any of the administrative provisions or repeal or otherwise affect the previous authorization to submit an application for designation of certain areas within the County as an Empire Zone. Rather, this Local Law shall amend and/or supercede the previous Local Laws only to the extent that the areas designated as empire zones are added to or deleted to the extent shown on the maps previously referred to in Section 2 hereof, and to the extent that said particular revisions are approved by the New York State Commissioner of Economic Development. In the event that any particular addition or deletion is not approved by the Commissioner, the area designated or not designated as an Empire Zone shall remain as set forth in the previous Local Laws.

SECTION 5. Effective Date. This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing in the Office of the Secretary of State.

WHEREAS, Sonar has been successfully used in hundreds of water bodies throughout New York State. the Nation and the world, and

WHEREAS, without all available scientific and technologies to control the spread of this invasive and exotic species within the Adirondack Park, it will be impractical and too costly to continue to manage the growth of Eurasian Water milfoil in Lake George as has been attempted over the past 15 years with limited local resources, and

WHEREAS, the preparation of an objective summary of the hearing record is allowable under the Agency's rules and regulations and is a critical document for a fair discussion and decision by the Agency's Commissioners and for the general public on this Demonstration Project, now, therefore, be it
